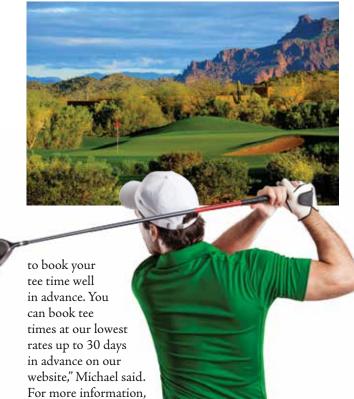

# A COVID-19 Story and the Complications that Can Follow

any patients may suffer for weeks or more after having been diagnosed with COVID-19. We are seeing that those who have persistent, unresolved symptoms usually have some underlying unresolved



COVID-19 infection requiring Myers IV therapy along with a clear diagnosis of any co-infection or, like in a recent patient I treated, had an environmental toxicity that would normally resolve if the body was healthy.

Many physicians are *ghosting* patients who are not feeling better after *two weeks* of having had COVID-19 and some are sending them to psychologists saying it's all a mental issue. Let me be clear, as is Mayo Clinic and John Hopkins Medicine: COVID-19 syndrome, also called COVID-19 *Long Haulers*, is a real thing.

I had a patient seek out our practice, Mesa Naturopathic, after several doctor's offices wouldn't see him after he was diagnosed with COVID-19. One doctor's office said that, "they don't see any sick people *at all* due to COVID-19."

My patient was released from a two-day stay at the hospital in early December having been diagnosed with sepsis in the emergency department. A COVID-19 test was done and a CT scan was performed that showed left lower lobe pneumonia.

He was sent to the COVID-19 floor when his test came back positive, and he was strictly treated for COVID-19 and the sepsis diagnosis was dropped. He was treated with hydration and antibiotic IVs, given an inhaler to which he said to the nurse he wasn't having any cough or shortness of breath and was told, "Well he had to take it because he had COVID-19."

After two days he was sent home not feeling much better with the main complaint of terrible fatigue. All this time his oxygen levels were normal, which was a good thing.

Unfortunately, he continued to have strange symp-

toms of dropping temperatures. His normal temperature is around 97.8 degrees, but he was lucky if it got up to 96 from a very low hypothermic temperature of 94. What about this up and down with his temperature?

He was on day nine of his COVID-19 diagnosis when he found Mesa Naturopathic and felt like he was going to die unless someone helped him. He had debilitating fatigue; he couldn't get his core body temperature to regulate and there was something wrong with his vision. He was in hypothermia, but why?

He started coming down with his first high temperature and cough in late October. Then he got better, then

got sick again in November. He was well for a few weeks and then on Thanksgiving weekend, he developed a very high fever which sent him to the emergency department. But what was really going on here?

When I heard about his symptoms, I was curious about this neurological aspect of the fluctuating body temperature. Of course, we saw him right away, feeling that maybe he was still in sepsis, which can cause this drop in tempera-

ture and can be deadly. After many questions, my patient was not on any blood thinners, was not released on any further antibiotics, and was not tested for West Nile virus after he clearly stated to the emergency department staff that he had a terrible mosquito problem in his yard and house in October.

He had heard that the West Nile virus can cause neurological problems. He also told the doctor and nurse that he had probably experienced a large exposure to lead in mid-November helping his son tear down a shooting range shed due to the lead dust he was exposed to from the bullets.

After examination, my patient had hyperreflexia with pinpoint pupils not reacting to light. This is a clear sign of neurological deficit from a disease, infection, or poisoning.

After ordering diagnostic blood tests for antibodies to COVID-19 to confirm this diagnosis and to West Nile,

clotting blood tests were also ordered. The patient's clotting marker, called a D-dimer, was terribly high most likely due to the COVID infection. He was then sent to have another CT scan to check for any blood clots in his lungs due to such a high reading.

He was put on a clotting medication and supplements, had daily Myers IVs for five days, and antibiotics were ordered due to the CT scan showing that the pneumonia had spread to his right lung. He had antibodies for both COVID-19 and West Nile viruses, a duo diagnosis.

After five days of treatment, my patient felt better, and his temperature was regulating. He was referred to

his ophthalmologist for a clear diagnosis of his pupils and vision symptoms. He had complaints of unclear vision in the mornings, "like looking through a rainy window," for about an hour or so. His pinpoint pupils were still unresponsive to light.

Another discussion about the lead exposure led us to test his blood and urine lead levels. Both were extremely high in lead. He was then started on a series of EDTA chelating IVs. After the

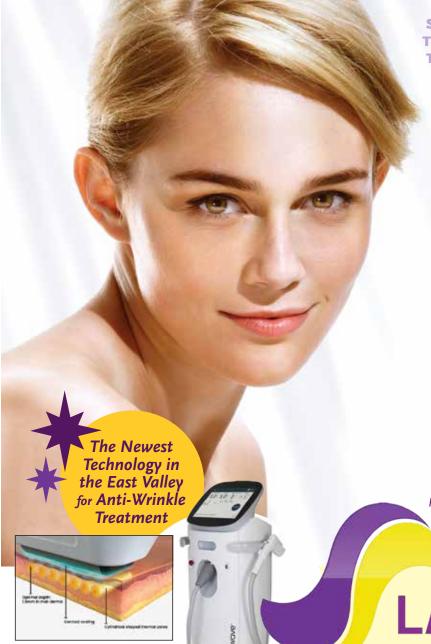
first chelation IV, his pupils started responding to light. His body temperature is now stable.

Two weeks ago, my patient was fearful of losing his life. Today he is back to work and feeling much better. ■

# **Certified Teachers Lead**

LEARNING AT MESA PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Thether inspiring students to become lifelong learners or helping them develop their full potential, certified teachers make a difference. In Mesa Public Schools, highly qualified state-certified teachers lead learning for the district's 60,000 students.

To obtain standard certification, a teacher must have a bachelor's degree, complete a formal preparation program, and pass the state's subject and professional knowledge exams. Going through all the credentials gives educators a well-rounded understanding of what classroom management is and helps them become better teachers, according to Renee Parker, director of human resources for certificated personnel at Mesa Public Schools.

"As I got my certification, I could recognize students who needed differentiated instruction, those who were not responding to interventions, and when I wasn't providing materials that were enriching enough," Renee shares. "Getting my certification gave me the lens to look through, otherwise I would have just presented the material, hoped my students got it and moved on."

#### **GOING FOR THE GOLD**

Many district teachers choose to pursue the highest level of certification by achieving and maintaining National Board Certification. This time-intensive certification process must be renewed every five years. Teachers demonstrate their eligibility by submitting evidence including classroom instruction videos and written materials.



Each educator has a unique reason for pursuing certification. Some look for a challenge and others want to impact education on a larger scale. Many use the opportunity to elevate their effectiveness in the classroom in new ways.

The National Board Certified Teacher (NBCT) cohort in Mesa Public Schools is growing, thanks to educators like Lauren Cluff, Hughes Elementary second-grade teacher, and NBCT mentor. There are currently 41 new and maintained National Board Certified Teachers in the district. This winter, the district had the highest number of new National Board Certified Teachers in the state, and the third-highest number of teachers earning Maintenance of Certificate. Lauren shares that NBCTs provide value to their schools and community because they are dedicated to improving not only their own teaching but also education as a whole.

"It can take hundreds of hours and up to three years to complete the National Board Certification process," Lauren says. "It helped me become the teacher I always wanted to be. I get to give back by mentoring others, helping them become highly effective teachers."

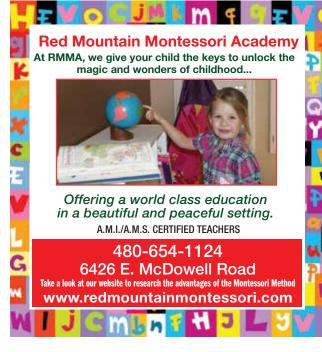

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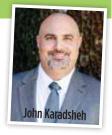

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# Term or Whole Life Insurance: WHICH IS RIGHT FOR YOU?

**7**hen shopping for life insurance, you'll face several important decisions. One of the most basic is whether you want a term life or whole life policy. Understanding the benefits and risks of each will help you choose the best policy for your current and future financial needs.



### **TERM LIFE**

With term life, you pay premiums for a certain period, say 20 years, and in exchange, the insurer agrees to pay your beneficiaries a stated benefit if you pass away during that time.

### **PROS**

You'll receive great value. Term insurance can be purchased in large amounts for relatively small premiums.

You can match terms to needs. Many people choose to match the length and amount of their mortgage to the term and coverage amount of their life insurance policy. If the unthinkable happens and you pass away, the mortgage can be paid off with the life insurance proceeds, providing protection and security for your loved ones.

### **CONS**

The policy is temporary. One of the key benefits of term life is also its biggest risk. If your term expires and you still have life insurance needs, you'll re-enter the market as an older and potentially less-healthy consumer. That means significantly higher premiums, provided you qualify for coverage.

The benefit may not be paid. If you outlive the term, your beneficiaries may never receive the benefit. Companies like State Farm offer Return of Premium Term life insurance though. With this type of term life insurance policy, the premiums you've paid will be returned to you if you

outlive the term. If you pass away during the term, your beneficiaries will receive a death benefit.

### WHOLE LIFE

Whole life insurance provides a death benefit throughout your life. It also includes a cash value component that accrues value over time, allowing you to borrow or withdraw funds as needed.

#### **PROS**

Lifetime coverage. A whole life policy covers the rest of your life, not just a stated term.

You'll retain access to your money. A portion of the premiums you pay for a whole life policy become part of the policy's cash value. Once sufficient cash value has accrued, this cash value becomes available to you through loans or as a surrender value. You can even report the cash value as an asset when applying for a line of credit.

You may receive dividends. The insurer may pay dividends to whole life policy owners, depending on the company's financial performance.

Estate planning. If you plan to pass on sizable assets, your attorney or estate planner can help you use the policy's death benefit to address estate taxes for your heirs.

#### **CONS**

Higher initial premiums. In the first years of a whole life policy, the premiums are often higher than a comparable term life policy. However, the lifetime level premiums for a whole life policy become more affordable over time, while term renewals can involve significant increases in

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# Where Are All the Houses?

n Feb. 1, the Arizona Multiple Listing Service (ARMLS) had the fewest number of active listings for any Feb. 1 in ARMLS history. Today, we are easily eight times below the listing inventory needed for a balanced market.



We see a Valley filled with houses, so why aren't more homes on the market? Let's break it down.

- 1. Baby Boomers (1946-1964) own about 42 percent of all homes in the United States and they are staying active longer, working longer, and, consequently, staying in their homes longer. Baby Boomers are not downsizing as quickly as expected and their homes are not entering into the cycle of inventory.
- 2. Low rates drove refinances and last year many homeowners cashed out equity from their homes for remodels and other investments.
- 3. Low rates and rising prices also caused more homeowners to become stuck. Homeowners found themselves able to afford the payment they had, but not able to qualify for their own home at its new value or buy an equally valued property at a higher interest rate.
- 4. The booming vacation rental business has turned homes into businesses and consequently, taken many homes out of the general housing inventory. A recent Phoenix New Times article estimated that "more than 5,000 properties out of Scottsdale's 90,000 households (nearly 6 percent), are now listed as vacation rentals for some part of the year."
- 5. Institutional buyers are scooping up single family homes at a record pace and turning them into traditional rentals. In the past year, it is estimated that 10 percent of all properties purchased in Maricopa County between \$250,000 and \$500,000 were purchased by institutional investors. These large investors hold roughly 30,000 properties in Maricopa County.
- 6. New home sales were down 15.7 percent in January year-over-year, which evidences the supply chain

and labor issues that builders are facing today. Until builders can get homes completed, people who purchased those homes (some as long as a year ago) cannot put their existing homes on the market. Furthermore, until builders can increase the speed by which they build homes, our inventory will remain low.

But despite all of this, we are out looking at inventory and finding properties for our buyers. Today's market requires a bit of sleuthing and a lot of hustle.

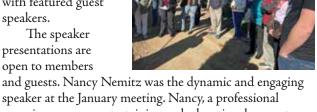

For added convenience, you can schedule automated shades to move at certain times of the day, like open at 7 a.m. every morning for your first cup of coffee.

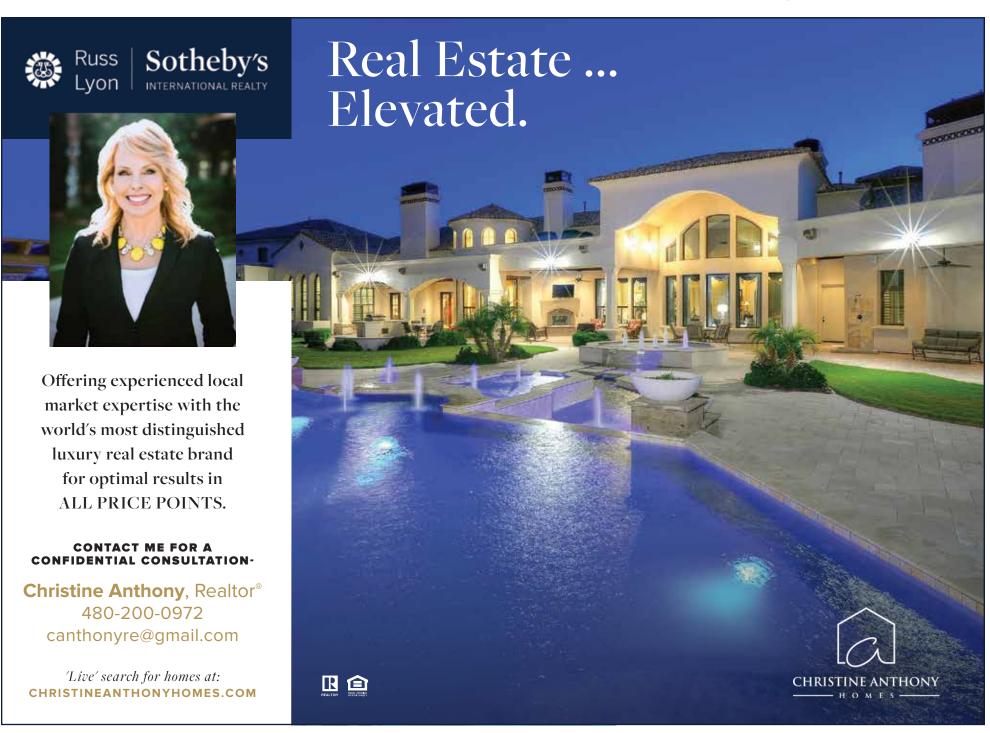
