"When I was a pilot, I was in Arizona for a layover and went on the boat, but I didn't learn anything," David said. "I was disappointed, and I said, 'Gosh I want to know about the saguaro.' So, my deal when we bought it was four things—geography, geology, history, and wildlife—that's what I wanted to focus on."

The fun atmosphere

complete with beer and wine, educational commentary, and beautiful views, make the Desert Belle the perfect attraction for out-of-towners, as well as Arizona residents who might not have visited before.

"We even get a lot of people who say, 'I've lived in Mesa for 30 years and

I've never been to the lake, or 'I've lived in the Valley since 1975 and I've never been here,' and they're just so blown away by the beauty," said Director of Operations John Waldron, who's worked on the Desert Belle since 1994.

The Desert Belle is open seven days a week and operates 700 cruises a year, many of which sell out, so David recommends booking a couple of days in advance, especially for weekends in the spring, which are popular due to the great weather.

This month, guests can even look forward to seeing saguaro cactus blooms in addition to impressive wildlife, like the bald eagle, which can be spotted year-round.

While at the lake, visitors can also stop by the Saguaro

Dockside, a docked boat that features a gift shop, complete with local, one-of-a-kind items like amethyst directly from Four Peaks and prickly pear jam. There is also a view deck serving local beers and wine paired perfectly with live music.

The Living Library is fashioned after the Human Library, a worldwide movement for social change. Peter, a reader and social worker added, "The human library indeed gives community members one more channel to understand another side of people, who often rely on newspapers and whispered rumor. They might not have a chance to engage in an equal dialogue in a safe environment."■

SDA STUDENTS TRAVEL THE SILK ROAD

The students will learn new material and participate in new knowledge-based projects in the morning and will work toward a culminating activity in the afternoon.

DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM

With so much time having been spent behind the screen, SDA brings back the focus on hands-on, in-person learning. The summer program's activities will allow the students to use their knowledge in a fun and creative way to recreate and explain ancient discoveries, as well as create works of art. Many of the art designs will incorporate math concepts, patterns, and geography that lead to the students creating jewelry, tapestries, and other objects through their designs.

The culminating activities will be a STEM-based project related to a civilization along the Silk Road. The projects will include using math and science to devise methods to move large stones, how to erect large buildings, and ship building to name just a few of the possible projects the students will participate in.

Students will also participate in a reenactment of the ancient civilizations utilizing the art they create throughout the summer. The students will set up a bartering system where they trade as the ancient people did along the trade route. This will allow them to use what they learn about the ancient civilizations in a fun, interactive way.

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The Russian Invasion, the US Economy AND HOW IT COULD AFFECT YOU

ince the beginning of the year, financial markets have been erratic, fuel costs are rising, inflation has been growing and there is talk of rising interest rates. Now with the Russian invasion of Ukraine in Europe, what is the outlook for the US economy?



The United States has recently banned fuel imports from Russia, which will lead to an increase in overall fuel costs, but fuel costs were already rising due to the economic sanctions being imposed on Russia from most of the Western countries. Russia amounts to less than 10 percent of the United States fuel imports and will have a lesser impact than European countries.

Inflation has already been on the rise and the economic consequences of the war in Ukraine could possibly slow down economic growth in the US, but it should not be enough to trigger a recession or wipe out the rapid gains made in the economy as the country recovers from the pandemic.

Job growth is much stronger than anticipated with the February jobs report showing an increase of 678,000 jobs versus an anticipated growth of 440,000. Unemployment has dropped to 3.8 percent.

Recovery from the pandemic is progressing at a much more rapid pace than the 2008 financial crisis. Twenty-four months after the beginning of the pandemic, employment levels are 1.4 percent below pre-pandemic levels, where it took 67 months following the 2008 financial crisis to reach the same levels. Unemployment may drop even further since there are almost 11 million job openings currently, which is 1.7 job openings for each unemployed individual.

Another reason to believe in the strength of the US economy is the amount of money Americans have in savings. According to Bank of America, Americans have 19 trillion dollars in savings, which will allow for their ability to withstand the effects of inflation.

The United States has limited economic ties with Russia and the size of the Russian economy at 1.48 trillion is smaller than France at 2.63 trillion, Italy at 1.89 trillion, and Canada and South Korea each at 1.64 trillion. The effects of the war and economic sanctions will be far less for the United States than for European countries that have a much higher reliance upon Russian fuel sources.

Your investment and retirement statements will show volatility as the markets move up and down, but it is helpful to remember that based upon data that goes back to 1896, the DOW gains 2.7 percent the week after the index experiences a 10 percent correction, gains 3.3 percent the month after the correction, 5.2 percent six months after the correction, and 8.7 percent a year afterward. (*Market Watch* 2/23/22).

While investing, patience is a virtue, and you should



not make any hasty decisions because exiting the market at the wrong time can lead to unrecoverable losses. Or as Warren Buffet has said, "The stock market is a device for transferring money from the impatient to the patient."

Your investment portfolio should match up with your individual needs and risk tolerance. Money you need today or in the near future should be treated differently than money you intend to access at a later date, such as upon retirement or a child's education. Having a stable contingency fund allows you to weather out financial storms that are based upon either your own individual circumstances or national or worldwide economic issues such as we are experiencing today.

How Solar Affects Selling a Home

olar is an important investment you make in your home and offers long-term benefits like significantly lower electricity bills, reduced reliance on fossil fuels, and protection from rising energy prices.



But what if you decide to sell your home after installing solar panels on your roof or property? Will solar still be a good thing for your bottom line? And what if you are looking to purchase a home that already has a solar system installed?

The good news is that the benefits of solar kick in immediately, and solar panels can lend a significant boost to home resale value. So, if you are considering installing solar but may sell your home in the near future, solar is still likely to increase your bottom line. Similarly, if you are a home buyer, buying a house with solar panels allows you to tap into the benefits of solar as soon as you move in.

The cost of solar panels has dropped 36 percent in the

There are also tax incentives to install solar.

CURRENT TAX INCENTIVES TO INSTALL SOLAR

Federal Solar Investment Tax Credit (ITC)**

The 26 percent federal solar tax credit is available for purchased home solar systems installed by December 31, 2022.

Arizona Residential Solar **Energy Tax Credit**

The 25 percent state solar tax credit is available for purchased home solar systems in Arizona. (Max. \$1,000 personal income tax reduction.)

HOW DO SOLAR PANELS AFFECT HOME RESALE VALUE?

A number of studies have demonstrated the positive impact that solar panels have on home resale value. According to a recent Zillow report, homes with solar panels sell on average for 4.1 percent more than comparable homes without solar across the US. A study conducted by Berkeley Lab also found that homes with solar panels tend to sell faster than those without.

WHAT IF I FINANCED MY SOLAR SYSTEM WITH A SOLAR LOAN?

Purchasing a solar system with a solar loan allows you to own your system while paying the cost over time. With a solar loan, you still have access to the benefits that come with purchasing and owning a solar power system, like a

Should you decide to sell your home during your solar loan term, you have a couple of options depending on the

If you financed your solar system with a secured loan, such as a home equity loan, you will need to pay off the rest of the balance before you sell (since your property was used as collateral for the loan.)

If you financed your solar system with an unsecured loan (one that is not tied to your property), you can sell your home before paying off your loan — but you will still be responsible for paying off the loan.

Whichever route you take, keep in mind that your home will likely command a higher selling price because it has solar panels; so, you can likely pay off the loan with that additional revenue.

WHAT IF I'M SELLING A HOME WITH A **LEASED SOLAR SYSTEM?**

If you sell your home before the end of the lease term you have two options:

• Pay the rest of the lease. Buying out the remainder of your lease allows you to own your solar energy system before you sell your home. That way, you can sell the



system as part of the home and command a higher selling price.

Transfer the lease to the new homeowner. This option allows you to transfer the lease agreement to the new homeowner's name. While some homebuyers may not have a problem with this, it may be an issue for others. The buyer has to qualify for the mortgage, adding the extra monthly lease payment as debt and qualify with the solar lease company as well.

Having solar can greatly reduce your monthly utility bills and the payback can take anywhere from 10 to 25 years depending on the plan. If you sell before that time, you will get a higher price for your home if it is an owned solar system, meaning it is already paid for or you will pay it off at closing and there is no cost for the system to the buyer.

A leased system is not as favorable as an owned system and you may need to extend the closing time to allow for the lease transfer. A leased system may not have an increase in the sales price over other similar homes depending on how long is left on the lease.

Inside versus Outside-Mounted WINDOW TREATMENTS

7hen it comes to new blinds or shades, in addition to choosing a style and color, you'll also need to consider whether you want to mount your window treatments inside or outside the frame.

With an inside mount, you'll install your blind or shade within the window frame. An outside mount is just that—a blind or shade mounted outside the window frame—on the trim or above the window.

Here's a look at each.

WHY CHOOSE INSIDE MOUNT?

An inside-mounted blind or shade delivers a clean, finished look that's perfect for highlighting beautiful window trim.

Inside mount is also ideal if you have a deep sill that you use as a shelf for plants or objects.

Inside mount works well when layering with drapes, because the mounting brackets won't get in the way of the drapery rods.





WHY CHOOSE OUTSIDE MOUNT?

An outside-mounted window treatment is great for making a window look larger (you can hang the window treatment as high as you want) or hiding an unattractive trim.

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
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

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

Dr. Lynch is a former Mesa Public Schools harp student. As a student, he discovered the program after attending a presentation at Taylor Junior High School given by Karen Miller, the district's first harp specialist.


"There was no way my family could afford a harp, and the district's program makes it attainable for students and families," Dr. Lynch said. "I started the same way that my students are learning the harp today."

"I hope this program instills a love for the instrument," he says. "Whether students continue in college or simply play for the enjoyment of it, there are incredible opportunities." ■




