PlumbSmart Grows by Giving Back

PlumbSmart owner Wayne Decker has learned a lot during his 40 years in the service business, one of the most important being the need to give back to the community and take care of others.

"There are so many people who get a surprise \$400 or \$500 plumbing bill where it's a week's check, or a chunk of it that they just can't afford," he said. "To be able to help them take care of the service allows us to be a blessing to people."

When COVID-19 hit, his company provided more than 200 free emergency air conditioning and plumbing services to families affected financially by the pandemic.

"The beauty of it is it takes so much humility for someone to take advantage of that gesture when those who called really needed it," said Wayne.

This generous philosophy toward service starts with Wayne and has been adopted by the whole team. Recently, when an elderly, disabled woman couldn't afford a new water heater, a member of the PlumbSmart team asked if he could install one for her for free, and the team quickly agreed.

"They showed up at her home with a new free water heater and installed it for free," the woman's friend Charlotte recounted. "The plumbing technician even donated his time. With all of the negative that we see, it was not only refreshing but a blessing to see a company truly care."

It's become such a part of the company's culture that

Wayne hadn't even been aware of the good deed until he read the glowing review.

"I am so proud of my guys," he said. "They're my people who buy into what I know is a winning formula for doing business."

"Those struggling financially still have plumbing situations and we've got to take care of them," Wayne said. "I want people to know that we're a safe zone. We're a plumbing and air conditioning safe zone."

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Will the Increasing Mortgage Rates Affect the Market?

ates have been very volatile recently and just as we saw historically low rates last year, this year we are seeing rates significantly increase over the past few months and are now at the highest rate since

2010. The historically low rates — which were as low as 2.65 percent in January 2021 — were a direct response from the federal reserve during COVID to help support the economic recovery.

Higher interest rates can have a big impact, especially on first-time home buyers who are already struggling to buy a home in this market. They may now have to reduce their purchase price to take into consideration the higher mortgage payment.

It's a general rule of thumb that for every one percent that interest rates go up, a buyer loses 10 percent of buying power. Some buyers may no longer qualify for a loan at the

Higher rates will also keep some sellers out of the market. If they refinanced or purchased a home at the lower rates, they are less likely to want to sell now and lose their cheap rate.

An example of the difference a one percent and two percent interest rate increase will have:

\$500,000 loan amount with no taxes, fees or PMI % = \$2,998 % = \$2,387 % = \$2,684

No one wants to pay a higher interest rate but waiting for them to drop again is a big gamble. Will they drop and if so by how much? How long will it take to get to the lower rate you want to lock in at, but more importantly what will the purchase price of the home be if you wait.

If we are conservative compared to last year and calculate a 20 percent price increase on a \$500,000 home, the purchase price would be \$600,000, which would increase a monthly mortgage payment at 5.5 percent interest rate from \$2,839 to \$3,407.

HOME PRICES

With home prices continuing to increase, the bigger threat may not be the interest rate but the purchase price. The median sales price for March 2022 in the greater Phoenix area was \$462,000 compared to \$360,000 in March 2021, which is a staggering 28.3 percent increase year-over-year and there is no sign that home prices will be coming down.

We have seen a little softening in the market and are coming into the seasonally slower market as the second home buyers leave and we head into the hot summer months. While there are no sign home prices will be coming down, we do expect the increase to be weaker for the third quarter.

So, if you are looking to purchase a home, the next few months may be the best opportunity before rates increase more and while home prices settle a little during the summer months.

RELOCATION

Rates don't have any impact on cash buyers, and as anyone who is trying to purchase a house knows, there are a lot of cash buyers out there right now. Phoenix is still one of the fastest-growing cities and saw the biggest population growth of 81,000 residences last year according to Redfin.

With many relocating from California and Seattle, they are selling their expensive homes and bringing that cash to Arizona, where they are purchasing a lot more for a lot less.

With more people working from home and moving across the country and living where they want to be rather than where they have to be, sunny Arizona is a top destination.

HOW INVESTORS IMPACT THE MARKET

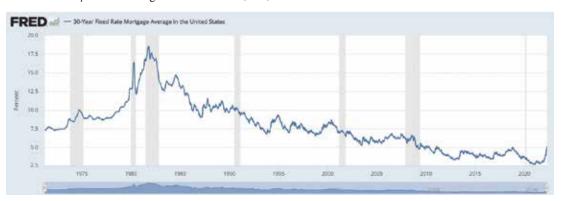
A great indicator of the market is to look at what investors are doing — as investors buy in a sellers' market. IBuyers such as Opendoor and Offerpad are still very strong players in the market, buying homes to flip while other institutions are buying homes as rentals. For the investor, residential real estate looks like a safe haven and a hedge against inflation. As long as the investors are buying you can expect to remain in a seller's market.

TO SUM IT UP

Even though rates have increased they are still low, investors are still buying, and prices are still increasing, just maybe at a slower pace. With Phoenix being a top desirable city to live in, demand will remain strong.

WHY SEE A NATUROPATHIC DOCTOR?

Markison, NMD Mesa Naturopathic **7**hen I hysterectomy at 45 years old, I went into



instant menopause. I had hot flashes, anxiety, insomnia, and felt very weepy. I called my gynecologist who did my surgery and asked if I could start hormone replacement. He didn't believe in hormone replacement and told me"I would adjust."

I felt worse, more revved up, and still had some insomnia and anxiety. l started gaining weight and not understanding what was happening to my body. I was going to see this doctor to

lose weight!

Then we moved to Arizona and I began the arduous journey of going to naturopathic medical school. I had to observe a naturopathic doctor for two weeks when I started as a requirement for school. I learned she balanced hormones.

After some tests, it was determined my liver had some methylation issues meaning it was harder for my liver to detoxify the byproducts of the hormone replacement creams. She put me on some specific supplements to help my liver's detoxification process and she lowered my hormone replacement doses. I finally felt normal.

Naturopathic medicine's first and foremost goal is to get to the root of the cause of health decline and disease. The body knows how to heal once we remove the barriers to healing. A visit will consist of one hour to discuss all concerns, blood tests will be ordered if necessary, and then a plan will be made.

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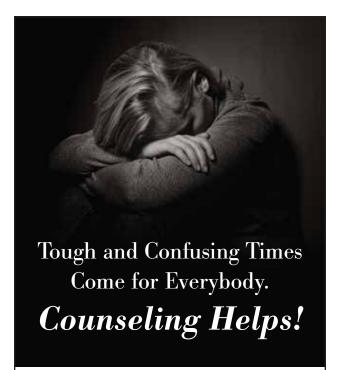




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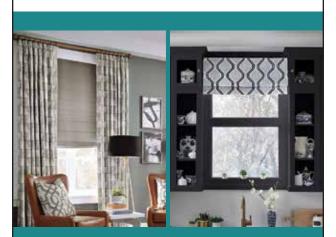


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Downsizing and Right-Sizing

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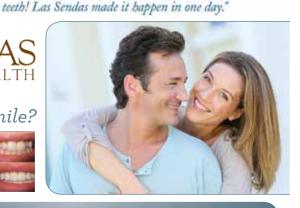
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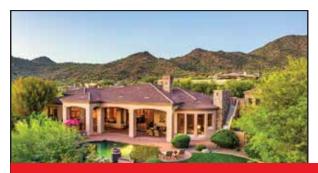


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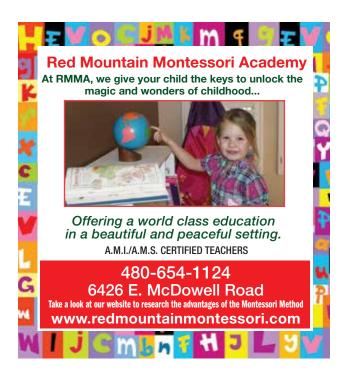

Eagleridge Enrichment Program **Serves the Homeschooling Community**

Principal Amanda Ball shares that the homeschooling community is diverse and encompasses a variety of approaches to education. Families typically choose Eagleridge for two reasons: they are looking for the social aspect that the program provides and for learning opportunities in subjects they might not have access to in the home school environment.

"Eagleridge has a wonderful sense of community," Principal Ball says. "Whatever approach a family uses for their homeschooling journey, one thing we all have in common is the desire to be here."

Students attend Eagleridge part-time, preserving home schedule time for their core learning instruction. Students attend one to three days per week, choosing schedules and classes that match their interests and needs. Students engage in classroom thematic instruction with a teacher similar to a typical school setting. The focus is for students to participate in a supportive, collaborative, and hands-on learning environment.

Primary students (K-3) have the same teacher all day. Their specials include music, physical education, and library book checkout. Students in fourth grade and above can participate in multi-age classes or attend with only their grade-level peers.

The program offers different courses each year, such as creative writing and hands-on equation classes that enhance



and build on what their parents have taught them. Favorite classes include band, orchestra, PE, Eagle TV, and art.

"As parents and teachers, we can't be experts in all subjects," Principal Ball shares. "For example, if a child is interested in guitar and the parent doesn't have a knowledge base in guitar, we can fill that niche."

Rhiannon Teaters teaches creative and visual arts at Eagleridge. She is also a homeschooling mom, and all four of her children attend Eagleridge. Rhiannon shares that one of the things that attracted her to the program is that the staff has a kind and loving grasp of homeschooling students' needs, which can be a little different than students who attend typical public schools.

Along with ceramics, 3D, and social networking art, students are currently painting the town Eagleridge-style with thoughtful bright-colored murals. The goal is to provide students the opportunity to leave a legacy for the community.

"Students have an amazing array of classes taught by highly qualified, certified teachers," Rhiannon says. "It is so much beyond what one would expect from an enrichment program. I love every single Monday that I get to be with my students."■

elp Protect Seniors

But online activity can open us up to scams. What's more, scammers are particularly adept at targeting older adults.

That's why it's so important for seniors to feel empowered when going online. Understanding best practices and signs of phishing, fraud, and other online scams go a long way to help boost confidence.

While new scams are perpetrated every day, the most common are those that attempt to create a sense of urgency around sensitive information, which is why older adults are often targeted by criminals for tax-related scams. - Share with care. It's easy to get caught up in social media and lose sight of the personal details we are making public. Consider adjusting privacy settings to limit who has access to the profile content.

- a sense of urgency such as an email asking for money — is likely a scam. Scammers can get access to personal information by prompting you to click links in the emails they send. If something appears out of the ordinary, it's best to just delete it or reach out directly to the company or person to determine if the email is legitimate.
- **Beef up security.** Locking all devices computers, tablets, and cell phones — with a strong, secure password can add a second line of defense. Consider mixing in letters, numbers, and symbols, and leaving out easyto-guess information, such as name or birthdate.
- Use security software. Installing antivirus software from a reliable source can add an extra layer of protection to online devices. Be wary of security updates from pop-up ads or emails, as these may be malware (malicious software) that could infect your device. It's important to remember no software is infallible. Log out of apps and websites when you are done using them.
- Contact an expert. It's natural to feel unsettled after being the target of an online scam. However, seniors must realize that it's nothing to be ashamed of. It's critical that these incidents are reported to the proper authorities to provide support and to alert others who may be impacted in the future. If you do find yourself or your loved one affected by a scam, reach out to a trusted source — such as family member or a techsavvy friend — for guidance.

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Early Writing Literacy Leads to School Success

ome of my fondest childhood memories include not only going with my family to the beach, picnicking by the river, or visiting museums and parks, but what we did upon our return from these excursions. My father was a poet and a professor, and upon our return from those enjoyable outings, he would write poems about our fun experiences.

The day after the trip, he would gather the family and recite to our delight the poems he would write. My siblings and I would be inspired by his simple, rhythmic poetry, and we too would attempt to write similar poems describing the common experiences we shared and how we felt about those events on the beach, by the river, or at the park.

Of course, we were preschoolers then, and too young to write, but we did write. We drew pictures and scribbled on the papers. We tried to write words by using letters for sounds to narrate our stories.

Now, years later, as an educator, I wholeheartedly promote a similar approach for laying the foundation of early literacy for young children. The foundation for early literacy is laid much before the formal schooling. A critical component of early literacy is early writing.

Research indicates that a good early childhood program must include an effective preschool curriculum, the use of best practices, and an ongoing professional development program. Important to early literacy is creating a writing environment that is developmentally appropriate, intentional, enjoyable, and conducive to writing. Instructional framework for teaching early literacy in writing can be used at the preschool, early elementary grades, and at home by parents.

Kissel (2008), in researching early writing literacy in early childhood programs, identifies five necessary components. First, helping children gather information from their experiences to generate ideas for writing. The teacher can promote a common or shared experience by discussing a particular field trip, a read-aloud book, or an exciting activity that will create enthusiasm for writing. If students make personal connections with these events, then they are more apt to write about them.







Second, the teacher, or the parent, must demonstrate the process of writing that writers can use when composing text. The teacher interactively composes a piece of text by soliciting input from the students. The teacher discusses the strategies used when creating the text to demonstrate how students themselves can apply such strategies. In a preschool program, the teacher uses printed drawings at the start of the year. Gradually, the teacher includes letters and beginning sounds as knowledge of the letters and corresponding sounds increase.

Third, the writing environment should be conducive to generating plenty of ideas for writing. One way is to provide opportunities to share ideas with other students. Students are encouraged to use oral language to discuss with each other their experiences and goals for writing. The teacher encourages an appropriate early literacy environment that helps in scaffolding students' writing through social interactions.

Fourth, the adult must schedule a block of time for children to write. The teacher may give feedback to a few students at a time to hone their writing skills. To keep the students motivated to write, children must have choices in selecting the topics they write and the genre they use.

The fifth and final component of early writing literacy is to provide a culminating experience to share students' writing with the class. They can use the author's chair and share their writing, and obtain valuable feedback. They

also learn that there is a value behind their writing, a message they are sending.

I reflect upon the gift my father gave us; the gift of short simple verses to motivate us to write and develop a love for reading. My father, perhaps intentionally, provided us with the early writing literacy experience by using shared experiences and meaningful knowledge gained from those fun family picnics and trips to the parks. He modeled the writing process by using simple, rhythmic, poetic form to describe events and emotions. He encouraged us to discuss our experiences and ideas with other family members and provided a platform to share our craft.

As Kissel says, "The goal to introducing young children to writing is to create writers for life — not to create a life where children hate writing."

Are you working past age 65?

You do not need to sign up for Medicare when you turn 65 if you have employee-based insurance through you or your spouse's current job. You can wait to sign up when you stop working or you lose your health insurance (whichever comes first). Be aware if your employer has less than 20 employees or you have COBRA,



you will need to enroll in Medicare at 65 to avoid any penalties.

If you are still working and have employee insurance, you can enroll in Medicare Part A. Medicare pays secondary to other insurances, including paying the deductible. There are some restrictions — the charge has to be Medicare-covered services and the total amount paid must be equal to or less than the Medicare-approved amount. There's little downside to enrolling in Part A. It covers hospital stays and skilled nursing care once you've paid the deductible (\$1,484 in 2022), and it's premium-free to anyone who worked for at least 40 quarters in Medicare-covered employment.

Everyone's situation is unique. Things like the cost of your current health plan, your plan's deductible, your prescription coverage, doctor networks, and other considerations should all be considered when making the decision when it is best for you to enroll.
