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Self Development Preschool Has **Been Serving Mesa for 35 Years**

ood morning, Ms. Vernetta," says Matthew **T** sporting a smile as he signs in his three-year-old son and walks him to class — exactly what his mom used to do when Matthew was enrolled as a toddler at Self Development. This routine of signing the child and the accompanying polite manners of greeting people as one meets have continued at Self Development Preschool (SDP) since its inception, 35 years ago, in 1988.

Matthew first came to SDP as a toddler. He loved his teachers, made many friends, and honed many skills necessary for success in school and life. A few decades later, after thoroughly researching several area early childhood programs, Matthew enrolled his son at SDP. Matthew's mother unequivocally supported the decision to select SDP.

Matthew and his mother were pleasantly surprised that more than two decades later, Ms. Vernetta, the director, and Ms. Loni, the toddler teacher, were still working at the school. Additionally, they learned Ms. Rachel and Ms.Cinda, long-term employees of Self Development, recently retired, and Ms. Cinda still substituted occasionally.

In an industry overwhelmed by staff turnover, the early childhood program at Self Development Preschool proudly boasts that the teachers at SDP continue to work for many years as they pursue their passion to make a difference in the lives of these precious children. With the commitment to the *greater good*, the staff continues to work at SDP, year after year. Thus, the parents are comforted that they see the familiar faces of teachers who nurture their beloved children.

SDP's record of low staff turnover speaks volumes about the quality of the program the preschool offers to its students. A vital component of a quality early childhood program is the staff: the consistency, reliability, education, and training of nurturing caregivers and early childhood educators.





Ms. Terri interacts and cares for the two-year-olds using a well-researched and highly integrated SDP curriculum. She monitors for all age-appropriate milestones. Ms. Mickey and Ms. Amber in the 3-year-old program work hard to prepare students for the vertically aligned curriculum for the next level. Ms. Crystal and Ms. Anna work with the four-year-olds and prepare them for kindergarten. Not only do they have several years of experience working with children, but both Ms. Crystal and Ms. Anna have bachelor's degrees, in elementary education and sociology with a focus on teaching, respectively.

Besides a well-qualified staff and a rigorous curriculum, SDP's early childhood program exemplifies what high-quality preschool should provide. Quality early childhood programs must address the four areas of growth and development — cognitive, social, emotional, and physical.

The first five years of a child's life are critical. Children grow rapidly in all areas of development, including cognitive development. SDP uses a rigorous and purposefully developed curriculum to help support children's cognitive development. Children learn to communicate through listening, and talking. Teachers assist children in using communication skills to learn new concepts and develop an understanding of the world surrounding them.

Early literacy is an essential component of SDP's curriculum. It is not too early to expose children as young as two years or younger to the alphabet through songs, books, and crafts. SDP staff not only introduces the three-year-old and four-year-old students to pre-reading and pre-writing, but if they are ready, they begin the actual reading process, through letter/sound recognition, phonics, word recognition, and reading with fluency and expression.

Social development enables the growing preschoolers to form bonds and relationships with others including the



caregivers. An excellent early childhood program, such as SDP, provides a nurturing environment where children learn to interact positively with their friends and adults. Through play, they learn to solve problems and create situations where they resolve issues and learn to respect each other. They learn to remain calm, relaxed, and collected through challenging situations.

Emotional development is the ability to recognize and express one's own feelings, as well as the ability to understand the emotions of others. Children listen to various music, observe and examine artwork, and recognize their reactions and emotions. By listening to carefully selected stories, children learn to identify with different characters and can develop compassion and concern. As the name Self Development specifies, we provide building blocks for developing self-esteem and a strong sense of self by focusing on effort resilience.

Physical development addresses physical growth in size, muscle coordination, and body control. The spacious playground provides ample opportunities to climb, slide, ride trikes, and run and hide. Whether at the art center, water play area, or the stem room, children hone their fine motor skills to become adept in grasping, picking small items, and counting.

For nearly 35 years, Self Development Preschool has provided a state-of-the-art preschool experience to Mesa's generation of families, first the children and now the grandchildren. ■

How a VA Loan Can Set You on the Path to Home Ownership

7ith Veterans Day approaching, we all think about what else we can do to help those who have valiantly served our country and made such sacrifices. As a Certified VA Realtor and supporter of



the Veterans Advocacy and Benefits Association, I am honored to be able to help veterans purchase a home.

A VA loan is a mortgage guaranteed by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and issued by a private lender, such as a bank, credit union, or mortgage company.

There are many benefits that veterans may not be aware of. What better time than during Veterans Day to write this article and give information about what a VA loan is, who qualifies, and what benefits it offers to help veterans who are thinking about purchasing a home?

WHY YOU SHOULD CONSIDER A VA LOAN

As a military homebuyer, you may be eligible for the fantastic advantages of a VA Loan. This powerful loan option can help you afford the home of your dreams with benefits that may result in huge savings. Due to the monthly savings, it may also allow you to purchase a higher-priced home than you could if using a regular conventional or FHA loan.

VA HOME LOAN ELIGIBILITY

You may be eligible if you meet one or more of the following requirements:

- Serving on active duty during wartime for 90 consecu-
- Serving in the National Guard or Reserves for at least
- · Discharged under honorable conditions
- Serving on active duty during peacetime for at least
- The spouse of a service member who died in the line of duty or as a result of a service-related injury

Those eligible will get a Certificate of Eligibility (COE), which is required to prove eligibility for a VA Loan. Your lender can help you obtain a COE or you can request it through the VA website: ebenefits.va.gov.

ADVANTAGES AND BENEFITS OF A VA HOME LOAN

- No down payment: Other loan types require down
- No mortgage insurance required: FHA loans require mortgage insurance regardless of the down payment amount and conventional loans usually require mortgage insurance if the down payment is less than
- Lower rates: VA loans usually have lower rates than conventional mortgages.
- Limited closing costs: Closing costs are the various fees and expenses you pay to get a mortgage. The Department of Veterans Affairs limits the lender's origination fee to no more than one percent of the loan amount and prohibits lenders from charging some other closing costs.
- VA loans can be assumed: This means that when you're ready to sell your home, you have the option of allowing the buyer to take over your existing mortgage. This can be a selling point if your rate is lower than the current average mortgage rate.

VA LOAN DISADVANTAGES

- VA loan funding fee: Although VA loans don't require mortgage insurance, they come with an extra cost called a funding fee. The fee is set by the federal government. As of April 7, 2023, the fee ranges from 1.25 to 3.3 percent of the loan, depending on your down payment and whether it's your first VA loan. You can pay the fee upfront or fold it into the loan. It is possible to have the funding fee waived if you're a veteran receiving disability or an unmarried surviving spouse.
- Purchase loans are only for primary homes: You can't use a VA loan to buy an investment property or a

TYPES OF VA LOANS

The VA loan program offers a variety of options, including: Home Purchase, New Build, Refinance Mortgage, Renovation Loan, Rehab Loan and Native American Direct Loan.

LOAN LIMIT OF A VA LOAN

There is no loan limit for a VA loan, but you do need to meet the lender's requirements for credit and income.

MINIMUM CREDIT SCORE

The VA doesn't set a minimum credit score for VA loans, but lenders can set their own minimum standards. The lender will also consider your income and debts to evaluate your ability to repay the mortgage.

TYPES OF PROPERTIES THAT QUALIFY

The property you want to buy must meet safety standards and building codes and will be your primary residence. Borrowers are typically required to occupy the residence within 60 days, though this may be extended to 12 months under certain circumstances.

The VA does not limit property type to a single-unit primary residence. Duplexes and fourplexes are allowable as long as the borrower occupies one of the units as their primary residence.

Getting a VA loan isn't a one-time deal. As long as you're eligible and you're able to qualify with a lender, there's no limit to how many times you can take out a VA loan in your lifetime.

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
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FULL-TIME VERSUS VACATION RENTALS: **Maximizing Your Property Investment Returns**

- Rent Increment Restrictions: Depending on the region or state, there might be regulations or limitations on how often and by how much you can increase the rent, potentially affecting your return on investment (ROI) in the long run.
- Risk Factors: One of the most significant risks is ending up with an unqualified tenant. Evicting such tenants can be burdensome, time-consuming, and sometimes costly, depending on the local laws and regulations.

VACATION RENTAL

A vacation rental is a fully furnished property rented out to tourists or travelers on a short-term basis, ranging from a few nights to a few weeks. These rentals are often fully furnished and have amenities similar to a hotel.

The primary purpose of vacation rentals is to serve as a temporary accommodation for people on vacation or a short trip. They can be listed on platforms like Airbnb, VRBO, or other online markets that handle the visit logistics and payments. The rental rates can vary greatly depending on the season, location, and the property's features.

The characteristics of a vacation rental are:

- Higher Revenues: Vacation rentals can potentially rake in double the revenue than full-time rentals. However, this heavily depends on the property's location and the season. Peak and shoulder seasons typically span from October to April, when homeowners see the most income.
- Property Maintenance: Regular cleaning between short stays makes long-term damage to the property less likely. Frequent cleanings allow for issues to be spotted and corrected swiftly, preventing future expen-
- Flexible Homeowner Access: One of the most attractive perks of a vacation rental is that the homeowner can block out dates for personal use. This flexibility ensures the property can double as a private vacation spot whenever desired.



Less Risk of Long-Term Damage: Frequent turnover and regular maintenance checks decrease the chance of sustained damage from any particular guest. And if damage does occur, security deposits can often cover the costs.



Real Estate Demand in Mesa and the East Valley IES DUE TO JOB **GROW**

Thile it may still be too hot to wear coats and drink hot cider, it is the perfect weather for enjoying outdoor living, once again.



The nicer weather seems to have also gotten more buyers out and about. The luxury market continues to have life and buyers in all price ranges are slowly starting to look at property again — although they are not necessarily rushing to buy unless the property is perfect.

As of mid-October (when this article was written), inventory was very low with just over 8,000 single-family homes on the market in all of Maricopa County. Of that inventory, only 1,173 single-family homes were on the market in Mesa, Gilbert, and Chandler (these three cities have over 1.1 million residents combined). While demand remains lukewarm due to high mortgage rates, when buyer confidence picks up, we will be back to a robust market very quickly due to the limited inventory.

We know that demand is coming to Mesa and the East Valley simply because of the growth that is occurring.



We had the opportunity to take a four-hour Southeast Mesa Bus Tour in October hosted by the Mesa Chamber of Commerce. The amount of development that has occurred since 2019 is absolutely staggering. These older maps of the Elliot Tech Corridor (first image) and Pecos Advanced Manufacturing Zone (second image) give you just a hint of the area, but almost every parcel is now spoken for including Google's recent announcement of a \$600 million project on Sossaman and Elliot.

The development and growth on and around Gateway Airport are equally impressive with a new five-gate terminal expansion, 225,000-squarefoot Gulfstream service facility, and Virgin Galactic Manufacturing facility.

Currently, Southeast Mesa has an impressive 46.2 million square feet of construction and planned development — with 17 million square feet currently under construction. There is everything from manufacturing to logistics and aviation support to supply chain for the Intel and TSMC mega projects. This incredible growth has put Mesa on the map both nationally and internationally.

The City of Mesa has a fantastic interactive map of current development which allows you to see the developmental stages of any project in the city. It is a great tool for understanding what is happening in your own backyard and a fantastic tool for understanding the magnitude of growth happening in Southeast Mesa. Go to gis.mesaaz. gov/storymaps/developmentsites to see for yourself.

The Office of Economic Development, led by Director Bill Jabjiniak, had another banner year as noted in their FY2023 Annual Report: "We attracted, retained, and assisted in expansions of 53 companies. This resulted in more than 4,100 jobs, a record number for the department. These projects resulted in the creation and absorption of more than 5.2 million square feet of space and more than \$1.5 billion of capital investment," said Bill.



Bill will be retiring in November and his departure will be a huge loss for Mesa. Natascha has served with the award-winning director on the City of Mesa Economic Development Advisory Board since 2015 and reflected on her time working with the director. "We have been so lucky to have such a strong and visionary leader promoting Mesa and helping us transform from a community driven by retail sales and housing permits to one that is economically diverse and vibrant. Bill leaves behind a legacy of transformation that will shape the city for generations to come."

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

You will assume that the art is better for being broken,


and that revision is like the circle of life: unscrupulous and unavoidable,

Some people have more fast-twitch muscles than others and some muscle groups have more fast-twitch muscle fibers than others. Our natural response to the sensation of muscle burn is to be worried, but it's okay to keep pushing through. The burn sensation is different

As muscles fatigue near the end of a set, that is when coaching and encouragement are vital. The brain is a prediction machine, and we have to intentionally override the survival mechanisms that tell us to stop exercising and preserve some energy in order to achieve the greatest results.

People often look to muscle soreness as an indication that the workout was effective, but it doesn't actually correlate to results later on. Muscle burn doesn't necessarily lead to muscle soreness afterward.

Eccentric training doesn't burn as much as basic strength training, but it does produce more soreness later on. Delayed onset muscle soreness occurs more at the beginning of a new program and tends to reduce over time.




sponsored retirement plans. You might also be eligible to

contribute to an IRA. Here's one final point to keep in mind: While some investments are appropriate for certain goals, they may not necessarily be suitable for your individual situation — so keep all your options in mind and take the steps that are right for you. ■

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
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

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

In addition to bacopa, several other natural nootropics including ginseng, green tea, and ginkgo biloba can help to support our brain health.

Most folks make tea from dried bacopa. To make tea, add one teaspoon of dried bacopa to one cup of boiled water and steep for about 10 minutes. Drink two to three cups daily.

Bacopa plays well with other plants, too. Think about the people you have in your life. Aren't there a few of them that just make you feel better when you are around them, and raise your spirit? Herbs work the same way.

A little note on lion's mane mushroom. With the cooler weather coming and farmer's markets popping up all over, check one near you and see if someone is selling fresh lion's mane. We like to take these mushrooms, slice them thinly, and sauté them in a bit of butter and fresh garlic. Then add those slices to your favorite pizza. Wow! Delicious and healthy.

Everything we need to keep us happy and healthy is right before us. Try combining two or three of your favorite herbs and see what results you get. People are better together, and so are herbs.

Helen's Hope Chest provides HOPE AND SECURITY TO FOSTER CHILDREN

he holiday season is starting to come into focus, and with the celebrations, a chance to change

There are plenty of opportunities to volunteer and donate around the Valley, but perhaps none with as rich a history as Mesa-based Helen's Hope Chest (HHC). For the last decade, Helen's Hope Chest has provided people with an opportunity to change a foster child's life with a Gift Away program known as Jakelle's Christmas Box.

"Thousands of children are provided with gifts, books, stuffed animals, and quilts at no cost to their foster families," Helen's Hope Chest website says. "The spirit of the season is felt throughout the week as volunteers help the families pick out the perfect gifts."

While Jakelle's Christmas Box started small, the program has grown into a week-long mid-December event, allowing foster and kinship parents to come to Helen's Hope Chest and do their holiday shopping for their foster child free of charge.

There are nearly 14,000 Arizona children in foster care, but only about 3,000 licensed foster families to take them in, according to the Arizona Department of Child Safety. The demand and need are real, but the families who can help just number too few. "There are nearly five children in care for every licensed foster family," the DCS

In 2009, Mesa United Way formed Helen's Hope Chest to reduce the financial burden on foster families, giving kids in the foster system a glimmer of hope.

"They want to be loved," said Janice Walker,

co-director of HHC. "They want to feel valued and cared about. At Helen's Hope Chest,

we are able to support these children with clothing, shoes, books, basic hygiene items, backpacks, and special items for birthdays and Christmas. We average serving more than 400 children per month with clothes shopping visits, not including special visits for backpacks and Christmas."

The kids can visit the store by appointment and select items they need free of charge.

"If you've never been to Helen's, you might be surprised at what a truly special place it is," Janice said. "HHC is a boutique-like setting, with clothing for ages birth to age 18, thoughtfully arranged by size and season. Clothing is either new or gently used, and most has been donated by the generous folks of our community. Our need for good condition clothing, boys' sizes 5T to young adult is always needed, as fewer items for boys are regularly donated. Also, sneakers or tennis shoes that are new or gently used in boys' sizes 3 and up are always on our list of needs."

Helen's Hope Chest envisions a community where every child in foster care understands their value and selfworth, and realize they have a place in our community, while every foster/kinship parent knows they are supported.

Helen's Hope Chest comes from humble beginnings. The program started out with a patchwork of volunteers working from two rooms in the back of a church, but thanks to community support and skyrocketing need following the 2008 recession, Helen's Hope Chest now operates an 8,000-square-foot facility at 126 E. University

Helen's Hope Chest memorializes the life of Helen Paula Simmons, a former foster child who managed to

raise a family of her own despite difficult circumstances.

Her daughters Debbie Jacobus and Regena Field felt compelled to further their mother's legacy when Helen passed away in 2009. While going through her belongings, they came across a powerful note their mother had left behind. "Children are the anchors that hold a mother to

Debbie and Regena vowed to share their mother's love and determination with the community and felt Helen's Hope Chest would fill the need.

In addition to the store, Helen's Hope Chest operates special programs to help kids feel ready when they walk into school for the first day of classes, too. As part of its K-to-College program, Helen's Hope Chest collects backpacks and fills them with school supplies for kids heading back to school, and partners with ASU for students headed to college.

WHAT CAN YOU DO TO HELP? DONATE.

"Clothing, new pajamas, full-size hygiene items (toothpaste, deodorant, shampoo, body wash), books, shoes, or items for our birthday room are a few ideas," Janice said. "We also will be looking for items for our Christmas event, Jakelle's Christmas Box held in mid-December, where we will serve 2,000 kids with gifts this year."

The Arizona Foster Care tax credit is another great way to help, according to Janice. HHC is a Qualifying Foster Charitable Organization (QFCO). Financial gifts to HHC qualify for the Arizona Foster Care Tax Credit of up to \$1,051/couple or \$526/individual per year. ■

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
