If you want to incorporate your heirloom pieces, or a favorite painting or sculpture, into the design, he can create an eclectic mix that will blend the old and new together. "The result will be uniquely you," Ryan promised.

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


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Manage Your Waste Stream OVER THE HOLIDAYS

ith the holidays in full swing, it can only mean one thing—holiday parties, gift buying and eating one too many cookies.

All we can say about eating too many holiday goodies is to come up with a good exercise plan. However, we do have some specific tips on how you can manage the excess waste generated during this time of year.

Use reusable bags.—The next time you go grocery shopping to pick up items for your holiday feasts and social gatherings, don't forget to take your reusable grocery bags. Not only can you fit more items into each bag, you also will reduce your use of disposable plastic bags. However, if you forget your reusable bags, please remember to recycle your plastic bags at your local grocery store or favorite retailer. Plastic bags are not accepted in Mesa's blue barrel, as they can become entangled in the machines and slow down the sorting process.

Bonus tip: If you are only buying one or two items, consider skipping the bag altogether.

Buy items with recycled packaging—Not

only is it important to buy items that come in recyclable packaging, but also in packaging accepted in your recycling program. As an example, when buying a carton of eggs, it is better to buy eggs that come in a paper carton versus a Styrofoam one. While both are recyclable, only the paper carton is accepted in Mesa's blue barrel. Styrofoam is not accepted, as there is no local buyer for this material.

Buy items with reduced packaging—Try to avoid buying items encased in excess packaging. Many manufacturers now are realizing minimal packaging is not only good for the environment, but also helps them reduce their operating costs.

Recycle—Don't forget to maximize the use of your blue

recycle barrel. Acceptable materials placed into this container will be recycled and kept out of the landfill. If you find you have large boxes or a temporary surge of excess recyclables, don't forget to use the City of Mesa's public recycling drop-off center. The 24-hour drop-off site is located at the East Mesa Service Center, 6935 E. Decatur St. Large bins are available for residents

oles, or entre e

to recycle their cardboard, and blue barrels are available for everything else.

Reminder: Items placed into the blue barrel should be loose, dry and relatively clean. Please do not bag your recyclables, which can slow down the sorting process.

Exactly how much more waste do Mesa residents generate due to the holidays?

In 2011, Mesa residents sent 2,075 tons of trash to the landfill, and recycled 617 tons of material per week on an average basis. However, during the week after Christmas and the week after New Year's, the average increased to 2,326 tons of trash and 810 tons of recyclable material per week. Therefore, for the two holiday weeks, trash levels increased 12 percent, and recycling activity increased 31 percent more than the average week.

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

Breadsmith will be open on Christmas Eve. "Although we are normally closed on Mondays, we will be open on Monday, Dec. 24," said Greg Farr, owner of Breadsmith. "We want to ensure our customers have the fresh baked items that help make their holidays special."

"The origin of Panettone has several different stories," Greg said. "I am including my favorite."

In 15th century Milan, a nobleman falconer named Ughetto Atellani fell in love with Adalgisa, the daughter of a poor baker named Toni. To win her over, the nobleman disguised himself as a baker and invented a rich bread in which he added butter, eggs, raisins, candied lemon and orange peel to the flour and yeast. (Breadsmith adds apples, apricots, cranberries and almonds.)

The Duke of Milan, Ludovico il Moro Sforza (1452-1508), agreed to the marriage, which was held in a local church. Among the guests was Leonardo da Vinci, whose signature is contained in the church records as an honored guest. This resulted in the launch of the new cake-like bread Pan del Ton, or Toni's bread.














Get Nude and Spicy Nude and Kiss Me

AT ZUSHI - NEW SUSHI ROLLS, THAT IS

Tude, Spicy Nude and Kiss Me are just a few of the more than a dozen new sushi offerings and specialties Zushi has just introduced to its menu. "Rolls feature wrappers of rice paper, soy paper, iceberg lettuce or thinly peeled cucumber, instead of the traditional Nori seaweed," said owner Shawn Suh.

"Zushi's new specialties are made with no rice and no seaweed, and some have no wrappers at all," Shawn said. "People are looking for alternatives. They want low-carb, and some don't like seaweed. So, we want to be on the cutting edge with our menu items, and they are delicious."

For those not familiar with the new craze for nonseaweed-based sushi wrappers, the Zushi menu offers some examples. "Now, when we say rice and soy paper, we don't mean regular paper," Shawn explained. "These are food items like very, very thin tortillas, made from vegetable sources. They are very healthy, and sometimes are flavored and colored with turmeric, spinach or other vegetables."

Nude Roll combines salmon, tuna, crab and avocado wrapped in thin rice paper and finished with a Ponzu Sauce mixture of soy sauce and tangy citrus. Spicy Nude combines salmon, shrimp, yellowtail and spicy tuna, garnished with jalapeño and avocado in rice paper, with

Dynamite Sauce and chili sauce. Shawn says he is already getting great feedback on these two menu items.

"New soy-wrapped rolls have rice, but are somewhat different from seaweedwrapped rolls," Shawn explained. "More and more people are asking for soy wrappers." Exciting combinations like Kiss Me combine snow-white yellowtail,

avocado, cucumber and cream cheese in soy paper with shrimp on top, and finished with wasabi cream, sweet chili sauce, green onion, smelt eggs and sesame seeds.

Some of the new specialties with no wrappers are Oysters in the Half Shell with chopped sushi ginger, smelt eggs, green onion and sesame seeds with Ponzu Sauce, sesame oil and a dab of chili sauce. The Jalapeño Poppers, a spicy-tuna-and-cream-cheese-stuffed jalapeño, is tempura-fried, and finished with wasabi cream, eel sauce and Dynamite Sauce.

Others are oven-baked, like a new favorite of customers, Tiger Eye. It features a spicy-crab-stuffed avocado topped with pepper-jack cheese and baked. It's finished with tempura crunches, kiwi sauce and Dynamite Sauce.

Shawn also is getting raves about his new appetizer, Garlic Chili Soybeans.

"We have something for everyone," said Shawn, also referring to his new Asian Fusion menu, the extensive bar and luscious desserts. "And remember, all sushi and almost all other food items cost up to \$1 less during happy hours, which run from open at 11 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Saturday," he continued. "Then, another Reverse Happy Hour goes from 9 p.m. until close. And it's Happy Hour all day on Sunday."


or the past 23 years, Campbell's Dance Studio **◄** has presented *The Nutcracker* ballet every holiday season for the enjoyment of the community.

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LAS SENDAS HISTORY PROJECT PRESENTS ECLECTIC FINDS

It's done—the book is off the press.

Las Sendas: The Dreamers, the
Builders, the Community will be
presented to the public at a launch party at
the Trailhead Members Club on Dec. 6.

Finally, a smart little book on local history has come to fruition.

Janet Patrick, Katherine Karpinsky and their team researched every aspect of the Las Sendas history. Their project was 20 months in the making, until the team of 11 volunteer researchers pulled their finds together in a book.

"Very little had been written about Las Sendas and its surrounding area," Janet said. Only one Mesa Historical Society publication, Las Sendas, Where the River Meets the *Valley,* by Dr. Ben Furlong, has described the geology, native culture and early settlement of this area.

Janet, Katherine and their team thought there was a lot more to say about their home turf. So, they picked up from where the Furlong publication left off. "We wanted to capture the concept of what drew people out here into the desert," Katherine recalled.

Soon, Janet compiled information from articles, passport documents, ship lists, as well as census and public land records. Katherine set out to collect interviews with former landowners and developers.

All involved in the Las Sendas History Project are confidently hoping this book will elevate community pride even more.

"We use no preservatives or additives," Cheryl said of Piefection's many creations, "and only the finest ingredients around—freshly ground nutmeg, real butter, real whipping cream—and we scour the country to find only the best quality...peaches from Georgia, cherries from Michigan, and wild blueberries from Maine. Our chocolate only comes from Belgium...Callebaut, the best."



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

THIS ARTIST FALLS HEAD-OVER-HEEL IN LOVE WITH GOURDS

arbann Watkins, your Las Sendas neighbor, has a flair for decorating natural vessels with intricate designs as she carves, dyes, and burns patterns into gourds—with amazing results.

"I start from seeing what is there before making the gourd into anything," Barbann explained. Her artistic vision emulates and enhances the innate quality of her object. "I always try to let the beauty of the gourd shine through," she said.

For this fall and holiday season, Barbann has decorated at least 300 gourds to take to art shows. Her works filled the dining table and a substantial shelf. Themes ranged from flowers, animals and Southwest images, to geometric and seasonal designs.

Previously, in Portland, Ore., Barbann had mastered the art of carving lifelike birds out of tupelo wood, down to the smallest feather. These birds, however, were quite pricey, because they took so many hours to craft.

A year ago, Barbann fell in love with the gourds. At the time, she was burning intricate designs onto wooden boxes, which her husband Bill helped her build. "Why don't you try your art on gourds?" a customer asked her, giving her a contact number.

So, out with the boxes, in with the gourds. Barbann orders them from California, Kentucky, and even from an Amish farmer in Pennsylvania. For this artist, who likes to integrate natural shapes and colors, each gourd feels like a revelation.

"I am fascinated by gourds," Barbann said. "I love them." The process is not easy, though. Gourds take at least a year to dry. And when she cleans out the potentially moldy inside mess, she always wears protective gear.

"Gourds have a long tradition in human history," she explained. "They were used for keeping water or other liquids, served as eating vessels, and in pre-airconditioning days, people used to hang them from the ceiling with water inside for cooling."

In Barbann's skilled hands, each one-of-a-kind gourd becomes a little masterpiece. With power tools, carving utensils and a wood burner, she fashions luminaries, birdhouses or eye-catching modern sculptures out of them, big or small, any pattern or color.

"Gourds are an ideal material for birdhouses," Barbann discovered. About a dozen were hanging on a portable lattice in her living room. A birdhouse looked like a beehive, another imitated a Russian doll, and yet another resembled an Indian teepee.

"I keep my gourds plain," she stated. "Many people decorate them too much." With morning glories winding around the bulge, or a gecko climbing up its neck, these gourds ranged from old-time to

whimsical. Each design was precisely executed.

"Birdhouses are the only objects I will use paint on," the artist continued. For all other color accents, she uses dyes, which cover but don't conceal the characteristics of the gourd. To make the birdhouses more weatherproof, she coats them with polyurethane.

The whole Watkins family is into the arts. Barbann and Bill, who have lived in Las Sendas for 11 years, have established a good teamwork for the art shows, with Bill joking, "I just go there to look pretty."

Bill helps Barbann with transport, set up of the display and layout of electrical. Their daughter, Michelle Watkins, often joins them with her delicate resin-silver jewelry, which encases natural flowers. This precious metal clay is entirely recovered from silver-gelatin films.

With the holidays around the corner, Barbann has cranked up production. The excitement of new designs wakes her up early in the morning. "This is more than a parttime job," she said. "It is what I do before anyone is up." ■

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

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
