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

Tontrary to popular belief, classic pension plans have not disappeared. Corporations mostly have jettisoned them, but highly profitable small businesses are giving them a second look, deciding to adopt old school, employer-funded retirement plans.

The tax breaks may be substantial. In fact, if these plans are funded with insurance contracts, 100 percent of the plan contributions may be tax deductible for a business. While a SEP (a defined contribution plan) permits a business owner to save thousands of dollars for retirement annually, that might still leave a huge chunk of the net income to be taxed at 33 percent or 35 percent (or 36 percent or 39.6 percent, if the Bush-era tax cuts expire in 2013).1,2

There is no cap on how much you can save. IRAs, 401(k)s and SEPs all have annual contribution limits. Traditional employer-funded pension plans do not. Business owners have the potential to accumulate millions for the future through such a vehicle.

For the record, the IRS does limit the yearly retirement income a participant in a defined benefit plan may receive. In 2012, the pension benefit resulting from such a plan may not exceed a) \$200,000 or b) 100 percent of the participant's average compensation across three highest-paid consecutive years of service.<sup>3</sup>

If you are earning well into six figures and you are 45 or older, you may have entered the sweet spot when it comes



to defined benefit plans. You will presumably be in your peak earning years, and yet, you may need to accelerate retirement savings. A defined benefit plan offers the possibility to do just that.

What are the downsides? Cost and complexity. Actuaries have to be involved (and paid) when you have one of these plans. You need an actuary to perform regular and annual calculations and valuations to see that the plan is being properly funded. In addition, the pension benefits need to be insured through the federal government's

Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation (PBGC). In exchange for that service, the business must pay the PBGC annual premiums.4

An actuary must determine the annual employer contribution amount needed to fund the plan (typically adjusted yearly in light of investment performance) and the actuarial formula used to make contributions per worker. The business must fund the plan year in and year out, regardless of how well it is doing.

Could a family business adopt a traditional pension plan? A long-established family business with a payroll made up of a few family members may find one of these plans highly attractive. The plan contributions can be large, and the benefits can go directly to family members and/or

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
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












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# Baby Bookworms Offers THE GIFT OF READING

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



lancer's Incredible Sandwiches and Pizzeria has done some impressive remodeling to its very successful Gilbert restaurant.

Now, the entire east patio and about half of the north patio have been enclosed by replacing the wrought-iron railings with walls and an ingenious bank of vertically rolling windows, somewhat like glass garage doors.

"The window design allows staff to convert the area in minutes from an

outdoor seating space to part of the indoor air-conditioned or heated main restaurant," Jeff explained. The previous outside wall has been replaced with a steel-paneled half wall.

"By enclosing this area, customers will be able to eat in air-conditioned comfort during the hot summer months, while still enjoying pleasant weather the rest of year," he said. "We also will be better able to accommodate our loyal diners by reducing the wait time during popular dining hours, as well as welcome larger parties." This new space also can be used as a semi-private room for meetings or special events.

"In addition to creating the new indoor/outdoor

space, we also improved and remodeled the existing interior," explained Jeff. "Our goal was to maintain the comfortable neighborhood feel with the displayed record albums our customers like, while incorporating some of Gilbert's history via a number of old photographs. We've also given our space an even cooler, hipper vibe through the use of steel, different lighting and new colors."

Interior designer Naomi Siegler, of Siegler Designs, coordinated the remodeling. "Gilbert has a rich ruralindustrial history," she said, "and we wanted to pay homage

to that history and the people who were a part of it. This is partially accomplished through some interesting wall treatments, utilizing a combination of local history pictorials and the original record-album collection," she continued. "Mixed with some period furniture, it gives it a 'mod rocks rural-rustic roots' feeling."

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
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# New Idea For Your New Year's Resolution COULD BENEFIT FAMILY MEMBERS

**7** hile taking a listing for a house, which was an asset of a probate estate, is something I have done many times in the past, the listing taken on a couple months ago was different.

A single father, in his 40s, had owned this house where he lived with three teenage children. The father passed away after a short illness. Unfortunately, he did not leave any will or trust. Consequently, the handling of the estate fell to the father's sister, who currently is navigating the estate through the probate court system.

Without a will or trust in place, the court had to have a separate proceeding to appoint a guardian and conservator for the children, as they were minors. The court also had to appoint a personal representative to manage and liquidate the assets of the estate, which included selling the house to provide the inheritance to the children's conservator. Luckily, there were relatives who were willing to take on these separate responsibilities.

What was different about the sale of the house from this particular probate compared to houses I have sold out of other probate estates is the fact the judge ordered the house could not be sold without the judge's prior approval of the sale.

The property was very sellable, and shortly after it was listed, I received an offer. While the personal representative accepted the offer on behalf of the estate, we still needed court approval before the transaction could proceed. This meant the attorney handling the estate had to file a formal petition with the court explaining the terms of the sale and why the sale was in the best interest of the heir, and then obtain a hearing date for the judge to consider the petition.

The judge handling the case went on vacation, and, at press time, our court date still is several weeks away. I

only hope the buyer will be patient. Otherwise, we will have to start this entire process again. In the meantime, the estate must continue to pay the mortgage, property taxes, utilities, HOA fees and insurance. Had there just been a will or trust in place, this entire process would have been far simpler and much less stressful on all those involved.

As you make your New Year's resolutions for 2013, consider adding get will or trust created to your list. If

you already have these documents in place, consider getting them updated or revised, especially if they were created in another state and you now reside in Arizona.

I know my wife and I struggled to make the difficult decisions as to who would be the guardian to our young children. I am sure that is the main reason people avoid getting their affairs in order. But as hard as it was, it was easier to make those decisions than to think about a judge handling those decisions for our family.

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



# MEET A DOCTOR WHO LISTENS

Then the doctor is in, this cardiologist is

Time is of essence for Dr. Afroze Ahmad. Not in the rush-rush sense, but as in dedicating enough time to a patient. Over the years, she has developed a keen ear for matters of the heart.

"We have to take better care of cardiology patients," Dr. Ahmad stated in view of her mission. She established the Las Sendas Cardiology, P.C., on the corner of Power and Thomas roads, this January. The clinic offers a full-service cardiology practice, with high-tech diagnostics and a comprehensive treatment approach.

"I felt compelled to offer a practice style where the patient is actively involved in his or her care," Dr. Ahmad pointed out. "We have so many disabling and chronic diseases in heart health, but follow up and intervention still only play a miniscule part in therapy. Patient initiative, however, is crucial to the success of a treatment plan."

Dr. Ahmad divides her clinical assessment into three main steps. First, as a specialist, she identifies the predominant problem through exam and interview. Then, she configures the most appropriate treatment plan, for example, to lower the blood pressure.

Now, add to the highest medical standard, the third component—time and care. "For me, it is crucially important to search for possible causes of disease with the patient," the specialist explained. "Together we ask, why is the blood pressure high?"

So, the patient understands what the bad influences are and learns to avoid relapses into illness. If the intake of salt needs to be reduced, a patient may be advised to cut down on canned or cured foods. Or increase exercise for heart strength. Or accept any beneficial modification

"Unfortunately, there is no cookie cutter approach for such a customized therapy plan," Dr. Ahmad summarized."In our two-way communication, I always want to let a patient know why a certain risk factor needs to be



avoided or how to take their medications correctly."

In her work in the field of heart disease, Dr. Ahmad has observed many cases of depression. She has a compassionate view about this concomitant disease.

"It is very simple and easy," she said. "We must address depressed moods, because depression

and heart disease travel together, like brother and sister. Heart patients are frequently depressed. This is common but not normal."

"Depression feeds on heart disease and vice versa," the cardiologist continued. "The cause for depression in heart disease is not known. However, depression has been observed leading to heart disease.

"What we do know is that people who are depressed and in a low mood, exhibit certain dynamics in blood pressure that may not be favorable," she continued. "The immune system and clotting mechanisms also are adversely affected and mortality rate increases."

Whatever the case, a thorough interview and medication review can be life altering for heart patients. Dr. Ahmad assesses side effects and possible interactions, as well as affordability of brand versus generic medications.

"The perfect care for heart patients has not yet been devised," Dr. Ahmad conceded. And there is no such thing as a one-fits-all therapy. Some factors (genetic lipid profile, age-related dysfunction) cannot be changed, but keen awareness can save lives.

"A young patient of mine achieved normal test results, but later she still had chest pains. The doctor has to be accessible when a patient calls and reassure them. In her case, the symptoms were stress related."

As uninformed behaviors may put a sound heart at risk, Dr. Ahmad routinely asks family members about their observations. What about the diet? How much salt? Do your legs retain water? Can you keep your legs elevated?

"We can't change our genetics, gender or age," Dr. Ahmad said, "but so much intervention can be done to achieve a favorable outcome and promote well-being. Every heart truly matters." Dr. Ahmad is a doctor who

# **Bulk of Bank Money Goes to**

# SHORT SALES AFTER ROBO-SIGNING SETTLEMENT

n Feb. 9, 2012, the United States Justice Department released the \$25 billion settlement they reached with

The settlement occurred because the banks were accused of widespread use of robo-signing, which was a practice used by the banks to automate the processing of foreclosure against homeowners.

It has been 10 months since it was announced. So, how has the money been used to help homeowners?

Out of the \$25 billion, \$5 billion was the only amount that was a mandated payout to be paid in \$2,000 payments to homeowners who had been foreclosed on. The remaining \$20 billion was split into three areas. A total of \$10 billion to assist homeowners who were delinquent on their mortgages, \$7 billion to help with short sales, forbearance and relocation assistance and \$3 billion to help homeowners refinance.

With \$17 billion dollars being allocated to help homeowners in distress, it was thought the best way to achieve this would be through principal reductions. This is not what has happened, and only 7,093 people have seen a principal reduction on a first lien modification. Even though this settlement had funds set aside for it, the banks and the government are still not willing to go down that road. Principal reductions are just not going to happen (other than a few with very specific situations).

More than half of the \$25 billion dollars already has been spent. So, if homeowners are not getting



principal reductions and there has not been a huge increase in loan modifications, where has this money gone? As there was nothing mandating exactly where the money was to be spent, only that it had to

be used for foreclosure alternatives, the banks pooled the \$20 billion into one fund, and they are using this pool to offset any losses they incur on foreclosures, loan modifications and short sales.

Essentially, this \$20 billion dollars is being used as a lump

sum by the banks to credit themselves back. They are just transferring the funds from the pool back to the banks. While this may not have been how we thought the money was going to be used, and it certainly hasn't helped homeowners remain in their homes as we had hoped, it has helped drive foreclosure alternatives at a faster pace, specifically short sales.

As much as 80 percent of the funds spent so far has been used for short sales. Short sales are outnumbering foreclosures, especially here in Arizona, and will continue to do so, certainly while the banks can offset the loss against the settlement funds.


There also were servicing standards, which had to be implemented. The most important standard was that the banks are no longer allowed to continue with fore-



closure procedures while a loan modification or short sale is being negotiated. This is huge for anyone who has a foreclosure notice, and will allow the homeowner to remain in the house until the short sale has been approved without the fear of being foreclosed on.

As long as there are still funds available in the settlement, the major banks are more willing to do a short sale than ever before. If you think a short sale may be the right option for you, now is the time to do it.



# MESA'S BRIDGE TO NOWHERE ENDS AT OLD LDS LEHI TRAIL

riving on the Red Mountain 202 Freeway, between Val Vista Drive and Gilbert Road, you pass under a \$2.7 million overpass with no freeway entrances or exits—Mesa's Bridge to Nowhere.

Well, not exactly nowhere. It will lead you to the end of the Old Lehi Trail, the route a band of Latter Day Saints (Mormon) pioneers forged in 1877, led by Daniel Webster Jones, who left St. George, Utah, at the urging of Brigham Young, to establish a settlement further south, according to historical information from the Sharlot Hall Museum in Prescott.

No remnants of the old Lehi settlement remain except a marble monument on the trail commemorating its founding. If you want to get a feel for what early pioneers experienced, however, turn north off McDowell Road onto Lehi Road, and head downhill off the mesa (yes, Mesa is on a mesa).

As you descend toward the Salt River bottom, you will get a glimpse of what the area might have looked like back then. There are fabulous vistas of the surrounding mountain and the river channel, canals and some older buildings among the few remaining citrus groves—what used to be a major Arizona corporation Citrus growers still offer their wares at the Orange Patch

and other fruit stands amidst the trees.

Continue toward the river, and the bridge is on your right. This so-called Bridge to Nowhere was added about 10 years ago, during the construction of the 202 Freeway, to provide access to groves for local farmers who gave up land for the project.

The only other public access to the bridge is to turn west

off Val Vista Drive at Thomas Road. Thomas Road then crosses over the huge, mostly unused freeway bridge, and dead-ends into a citrus grove surrounded by a chain-link fence and no-trespassing signs. To find the Lehi Trail, cross over the bridge and turn right onto the dirt road, which ends in a dirt parking area. No motorized vehicles are allowed on the trail, which begins just to the north. Signs mark the way.

The trail, which was a major route for pioneers and extended into the Superstition Mountains, has been only partially reconstructed, and now is used by

hikers, bikers and horseback riders. From the bridge, you can travel for a mile or two along the Salt River. With nothing to block the view, there are panoramic vistas of all the surrounding mountains.

About halfway along the trail is the white pyramid-shaped monument. According to news reports of the time, the memorial has been rescued twice by Lehi citrus grower Art Freeman, owner of the Orange Patch fruit stands. During the 1970s floods, Freeman moved the monument out of the path of rising floodwaters, in the middle of the night, shortly before a bank washed away.

As you travel east, back toward Val




Vista Drive, you pass by Tyler Farms, a grass-fed cattle ranch, and horseback riding and boarding facility. Behind the ranch is a network of canals and waterways, attracting various waterfowl.

A short distance further takes you back to the South Canal trail, which runs under the freeway, back to McDowell Road. The unpaved trail east also follows the South Canal all the way to the CAP Canal and the Verde River.

The Lehi Trail to the left also continues on from here, but, according to James Hash, bicycle and pedestrian planner for the City of Mesa, the trail winds along the border of the Salt River Pima-Maricopa

Indian Reservation, and is not reconstructed or well-marked and does not show up on trail maps. Those who want to try following it should take care to avoid trespassing on tribal lands, James advised.
