
Roasted Tomato Gazpacho

- 1 cucumber
- 1 jalapeño—seeded
- + 1/2 red onion
- 3 cloves peeled garlic
- 1 quart tomato juice
- 1/2 cup olive oil
- 1/2 cup lime juice
- 1 ounce cilantro

Roast roma tomatoes over a flame. Roast until skin gets blistered. In a blender, purée all ingredients, and slowly drizzle olive oil into mixture to emulsify. Salt and pepper to taste. Garnish with diced cucumbers and cilantro.


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

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

Treats Sleep Apnea

Sleep apnea is a condition whereby a person's breathing is closed off for a period of time during sleep, sometimes occurring as many as 100 times in a night.

Sleep apnea can increase chances for heart disease, high blood pressure, sexual dysfunction, depression, learning or memory loss and tiredness. Many times, the person suffering from sleep apnea may not be aware of the condition. Often, the spouse initially notices the problem.

An 18-month study involves sleep apnea patients at the

South Texas Veterans Health Care System. An oral appliance, called the Thornton Adjustable Positioner (TAP), is used to treat those suffering from moderate to severe sleep apnea.

According to Dr. Paul McLornan, at the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio, many patients with moderate to severe sleep apnea were not adhering to standard treatment with continuous positive airway pressure (CPAP) machines.

Many factors, including the noise, cumbersome attachments, bloody noses and the lack of flexibility of different sleeping positions prevent many people from using their CPAP machine.

Dr. McLornan's study proves the TAP device, which is smaller and fits in a patient's mouth, is now an option for patients with mild, moderate and now even severe sleep apnea. He states it was previously thought treatment for patients suffering from severe sleep apnea was limited to the use of the CPAP or surgery. This study adds to the body of medical and dental research literature by showing

oral appliances can be effective in treating people with severe sleep apnea.

The device is less cumbersome and better tolerated by patients. It is also much less invasive and costly than the CPAP or surgery. Patients in the study were fitted with the TAP appliance, and given a tiny key, which fits in the front of the device.

The patient was instructed to wear the appliance every night, inserting and turning the key several millimeters before bedtime. By turning the key, the patient

pulls the lower jaw forward, creating an open airway in the throat. Patients then informed researchers when they reached a comfortable point in the adjustments, and when they felt they were able to sleep without snoring or gasping.

The patients are then evaluated using standard sleep studies to determine whether or not their sleep had, indeed, improved. It was found patients improved significantly using the TAP. (Source: Mission, University of

Texas Health Science Center, San Antonio, Spring 2009)

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

Winter is the Best Time FOR POOL MAINTENANCE

ools, decks and pool equipment take a beating all summer long resulting from heavy use, dust storms, algae problems and the Arizona heat.

"If you have a heating system for your pool, you can still be swimming right now," said Chris Quam owner of Arizona Pool Guy, Inc. "We install the most economical



heat-pump systems, as well as other heater types, but whether you heat your pool or not, winter is the best season to take care of regular maintenance issues."

"Most people don't realize that pools should be drained and refilled with fresh water every two to three years. As pool water evaporates, it concentrates hard water mineral build up

on tile and pipes. That, mixed with chemical and organic byproducts, also makes your skin feel dry," Chris explained. "If you're buying a home with a pool, you definitely want to start out with fresh, clean water. And, of course, call us if your pool turns green."

Because of Arizona's heat and sun, it's risky to empty a pool in the summer because it can damage the exposed plaster, so now is the best time to do it, said Chris. "We use a quick turn-around to pump out the used water, quickly refill with fresh water, and set the chemical balance."

As for plaster, most pools need a total re-plastering every 10 to 15 years or so, Chris stated. Nowadays, pool owners are opting to upgrade their pools with one of the new pebble finishes, available in natural stone looks or with dramatic color combinations from greens to lavenders, mixed with glass beads or abalone shell pieces. Add a natural stone waterfall and decorative decking features and your home has its own backyard oasis, Chris said.

You can also consider adding a spa, a gazebo, a fire pit, or the most popular of all these days, an outdoor kitchen. Winter is such a great outdoor time here, you want to make the most of your home's outside areas, suggested Chris.

"Our design planners can assist you in putting together a backyard area that's just perfect for your family's lifestyle. And, of course, we install new pools, and alternative chlorine systems, too."

It's important to remember to clean your filter system. Sand filters should have a complete sand replacement every 5 to 7 years. Diatomaceous earth filter grids and cartridge filters need replacement every 3 to 4 years, and both need cleaning at least once a year.

If your pool pump is older, replacing your existing pump with a variable speed pool pump can reduce pool

energy costs by up to 80 percent and save up to \$400 per year, according to the Arizona Public Service Web site. APS offers rebates of \$200 for qualifying equipment and Salt River Project offers up to \$150. "We are certified variable speed pump installers and provide the paperwork to get homeowners their rebates," said Chris. ■
