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







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Cool your pool in the hot weather

ith the days getting hotter,
your pool is cool and refreshing, but you know what's going to happen soon.



On some blistering hot afternoon, you'll feel like you can't take the heat one more minute. The backyard pool looks crystal clear and so inviting. You jump in and—ugh—it's like bath water.

"There is a way you actually can chill your pool water down 10 to 15 degrees," said Chris Quam, owner of Arizona Pool Guy, Inc. "The same technology used in the heat pump that heats and cools your home, is available to heat and cool your pool."

According to Chris, if you already have a pool heater that works for you, it is possible to get a device, which just cools your pool. It costs only pennies a day to operate, and runs on household current.

"Your pool is a big investment in family recreation," said Chris. "If you can't use it comfortably in summer and winter, you're missing out. I've been heating and cooling my pool, at home here in Northeast Mesa, for several years now." As a single dad of two active daughters, Chris admits he can't keep them out of the pool in any season.

Another benefit to lower pool temperatures is the fact cooler water uses less chlorine and other chemicals than warmer water, thus saving you money. "A 10-degree drop in water temperature

can result in a savings of 20 to 25 percent on chemical consumption," Chris claimed. And USA Swimming and the Mayo Clinic Web sites suggest water temperatures should be no higher than 86 to 88 degrees for safe

exercising and lap swimming.

"Our units also provide digital controls that can be used with an existing wireless remote system," Chris said. "You can even heat your spa during the day, and then switch to cooling your pool at night when the air is cooler. It's very easy to operate," he continued. "Just think, several hours after your cooling system switches on, your pool will be way cooler and really refreshing."

An Arizona state licensed contractor, and designated a certified pool operator, Chris has 10 years experience in the pool business. Arizona Pool Guy, Inc. was just voted *Best Pool Company* in the Best of Mesa 2014 contest. "We're very honored that our neighbors took the effort to vote for us," Chris said.

Roasted Cauliflower Curry Soup

- 1 tablespoon butter or olive oil
- 1 to 2 large leeks, thinly sliced
- 3 or 4 cloves crushed garlic
- 2 teaspoons freshly grated ginger
- 1 head of cauliflower
- · 1 large sweet potato, peeled and cubed
- 3 teaspoons cumin
- + 3 teaspoons coriander
- 2 teaspoons turmeric
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- Cayenne, to taste (add by the 1/2 teaspoon up to desired spiciness)
- Salt and pepper, to taste
- 1 cup cooked wild rice blend
- 1 can 2 percent evaporated milk
- 1/2 cup packed shredded Swiss cheese



Preparation

Start by first cutting up the cauliflower, then coating it with olive oil and sea salt, and roasting it in a 400-degree oven for about 30 minutes. Remove after 20 minutes to flip the browned sides. Once the cauliflower is nearly finished roasting, begin heating the butter/oil in a large pot over medium heat. Add the leeks, garlic and ginger, and sauté until the leeks and garlic are softened, about 5 minutes.

Add the roasted cauliflower and cubed sweet potato, and all the spices. Continue to stir the ingredients for another 5 to 10 minutes to let the sweet potato start to cook.

Once the ingredients cook down a bit, add 4 cups vegetable stock, and let simmer for about 25 to 30 minutes. Once the sweet potatoes are fully cooked through and softened, whip out the immersion blender and blend the soup until velvety smooth.

At this point, the consistency may still be a bit thick, so add more vegetable stock, then the evaporated milk and cheese, and finally the cooked quinoa. Leave the soup on low for a few more minutes to allow the flavors to meld.

New Ryland Homes Set For Las Sendas

yland Homes has broken ground on its new community, located in Las Sendas, on the corner of McDowell Road and Ridgecrest Drive.



They hope to have the models built and ready for sale by October. These homes are designed for a low maintenance, easy living lifestyle, and are a cross between a townhouse and a traditional home. They are detached homes but have no backyard. Instead, they have the garage at the rear of the home, which is accessed by a side street.

The yard is at the side of the house, and each side yard is only 10 feet wide, which allows the homes to be built very close together. As the road is at the back of the homes, to access the garages, the front of the homes will have a foot path for entrance through the front.

There will be approximately 145 home sites, with



three main floor plans, from Ryland's 600 Series. There also will be some larger homes from their 900 Series. The size of these homes is up to 2,500 square feet. At this time, however, Ryland Homes was not sure how many of these would be available. If no changes are made to the current site map, it looks as though there will be 40 of these larger

All the homes are two-story, with a two-car garage and a 10-foot side yard. The floor plans offer a great room design with no formal dining or living room. Ryland Homes have utilized the space very well, offering a spacious family/dining room and large kitchen. There is a half bath downstairs, and the utility room is upstairs. The optional disappearing sliding glass walls, from the great room, leading out to the side yard, really open up the living area. These will be great starter or second homes, or for the homeowner who wants more of a lock-up-and-go home with very low maintenance.

Floor Plans

- + 612 Plan—Two-story, 2,089 square feet, four bedrooms, three-and-a-half baths and two-car garage.
- 611 Plan—Two-story, 1,992 square feet, three bedrooms, two-and-a-half baths and two-car garage.
- 610 Plan—Two-story, 1,688 square feet, three bedrooms, two-and-a-half baths and two-car garage.

Pricing

Ryland Homes will not release any prices until approximately one week before they are ready to start selling. The Phoenix Business Journal reported in September 2013 the average base price was in the range of \$275,000. I will continue to meet with Ryland Homes and if they release the prices earlier, I will post them on my Web site.

Homeowners Association

The community will not be gated, and will have its own pool and children's playground. At the time of writing this article, neither Ryland Homes nor Las Sendas Homeowners Association (HOA) had any information as to whether these new homes would have their own HOA, or be part of Las Sendas. This is still under review.

The Ryland Web site does not yet have any information on this community. Therefore, I have added it to my Web site. 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


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

Self Development Academy Recognizes Student Achievement

ore than 500 students attending Self Development Academy (SDA) recently received awards at the end-of-the-year festivities.

Student academic achievement is recognized in the areas of reading, mathematics, citizenship and attendance, as well as overall academic performance. The number of students having earned awards in these categories is a testament to the commitment and working relationship among the administration, teachers, parents and students.

At the end of the school year, students demonstrate their Math Facts knowledge, and compete to earn a Math Facts certificate. Each class has one Math Facts winner, and that student receives a Math Facts certificate, acknowledging mastery in this curriculum area.

The students are acknowledged during one of the school's most anticipated events, the end-of-the-year class plays. The class plays are a wonderful opportunity for students to showcase their creative talents. Every year, each class (grades one through eight) performs a play, with each student having a role. Some students even write their class plays. The classes also create backdrops and props. Some of this year's plays included The Bremen Town Musician, Abraham Lincoln, Little Red Riding Hood's Granny, and Rosa Parks Leads the Way.

Together, the class plays and awards ceremony served as a wonderful way to end the 2013-2014 school year. We are so proud of our students.

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




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HERE ARE FIVE REASONS TO BUY A HOME THIS SUMMER

Tith the local housing market heating up like an Arizona summer, here are five good points to contemplate with regard to purchasing a home at this time.

WE ARE NOW IN A BUYER'S MARKET

Between 2012 and 2013, we saw local property values appreciate year over year by more than 20 percent. During those years, inventory was historically low, and we had a lot of investors in the marketplace who were attracted by the large inventory of distressed properties. Now, in 2014, investors have moved on to other markets, while the increased values have made it financially possible for homeowners to put their homes up for sale again. With less demand from investors, and a greater supply of traditional listings, buyers are in the driver's seat. For buyers, this means more properties from which to choose and less competition from multiple offers.

INTEREST RATES ARE STILL LOW

At the beginning of the year, it was expected we would see substantial increases in interest rates. However, by early May, the average rates for 30-year fixed mortgages fell to their lowest point since the week of Nov. 7, 2013, and were about .32 percent lower than at the beginning of 2014. While rates still are expected to rise by year's end, the increase is expected to be very gradual.

THE REAL ESTATE MARKET IS ON THE ROAD TO RECOVERY

This past March, foreclosure starts fell to the lowest

level in seven years. The Valley real estate market is more balanced than it has been in years, leaving the big ups and downs behind us for now. Furthermore, unemployment levels are dropping. While unemployment was 9.1 percent in April 2011, this April, it was just 6.3 percent. Jobs allow people to purchase homes, and home purchases stimulate other related sectors, such as construction, residential maintenance and home improvement, etc. While values are not skyrocketing like they were 18 months ago, they still are moving up, and it is anticipated they will continue to increase over the next few years.

INVESTING IS STILL A GOOD OPTION

While the opportunity to buy discounted properties on the courthouse steps may no longer exist, purchasing a home to use as a rental can still be a good idea. Because many people are not able to re-enter the market due to short sales, bankruptcies and foreclosures, rentals remain popular. Household creation also is declining as millennials find it difficult to save for a down payment and juggle their student loan debt. Further, they also are getting married later and choosing to spend their money

on entertainment, dining and travel over housing. So, instead of buying, they are renting. If you have children who currently are renting, you might want to consider investing in a piece of property, which they could rent from you. You also may consider helping your kids buy their first home, so they can appreciate the tax benefits of homeownership and long-term property appreciation.

BANKS ARE LENDING

When the new lending regulations went into place, we saw an initial market

slow down, as lenders and borrowers struggled to figure out how these new guidelines would be implemented. Now, things have settled down, and lending has opened up again. In mid-April, a survey of the Mortgage Bankers Association revealed the fact it is easier now for individuals to get mortgages than it has been at any other time over the last three years. Furthermore, in mid-May, Mel Watt, the head of the Federal Housing Finance Agency, instructed Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac to make more credit available to homebuyers. This has yet to trickle down, but, hopefully, it will continue to encourage the availability of financing for homebuyers.

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

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




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
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
