Happy Pets features 5,000 square feet indoors, which includes sleeping villas and four indoor playgrounds. The outdoor area is 2,500 square feet of sprawling playgrounds, including shade structures, playground equipment and above ground swimming

pools. They even have an exclusive playground dedicated just for small and teacup breeds of dogs, up to 10 pounds.

At Happy Pets, dogs aren't just sitting all day long in a kennel. They can go indoors or outdoors, take a swim, and get plenty of attention and exercise. Dogs are kept busy during the day, so they can rest easily at night.

In light of recent news regarding dog kennels, owner Linda Huss stresses the emphasis on safety at Happy Pets.

"We take the trust that pet parents place in us seriously," said Linda. "We've taken extra measures to ensure that dogs are comfortable, in a clean environment, and they are safe."

Some of those safety measures include security alarms, heating and air temperature alarms, staff onsite 24 hours a day and eco-friendly cleaning products and pest control. They also feature live web cams, which allow pet parents to check in on their furry family members through an app on their smartphones or computers.

"We truly take every measure to ensure safety in every aspect of what we do," stated Linda.

Happy is the key to Happy Pets. Before dogs can stay, they must go through a behavioral interview process, as they do not accept aggressive dogs. Dogs also must be current on their vaccines, as well as be spayed or neutered. According to Linda, a well-trained staff

also is important to keeping both canines and their owners happy. Rather than just relying on

the knowledge of being a dog owner, Happy Pets invests in thorough training for their staff. In fact, before an employee can work with the dogs, the individual must complete 10 out of the 60 training courses. These courses center on not just general care, but also on understanding a dog's body language, stress signals and safe dog-dog group play.

"I'm an overprotective pet parent, myself," admitted Linda. "So, I want to reassure pet parents that we truly are focused on their pets' well-being."

In addition to boarding and doggie daycare services, Happy Pets also offers at-home pet sitting and a self-serve dog wash, which features water from a water softener to help prevent itchy, flaky skin, as well as a shampoo line, which is sulfate-free, paraben-free and pH balanced.

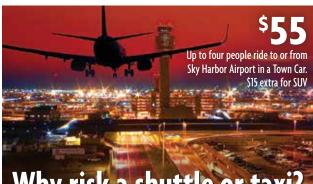

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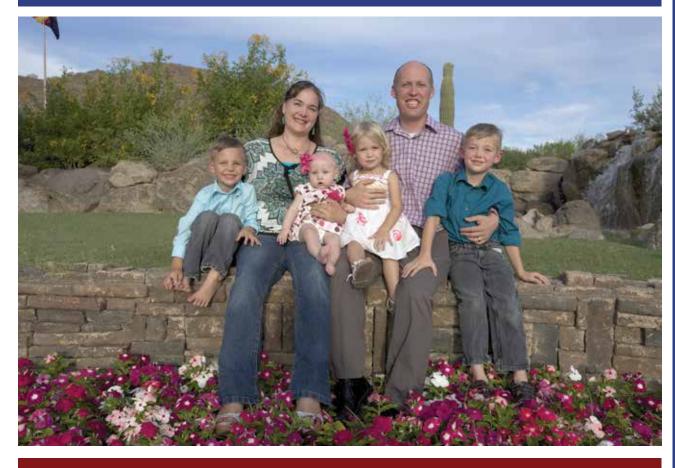

## DISTRICT 5 CANDIDATE MAKES FIRST RUN FOR PUBLIC OFFICE

f you are the type of person who would never run for public office, District 5 candidate Robert Cluff can relate.

This is the first time Robert has pursued public office—something he thought he would never do. For the past eight years or more in Mesa, there have not been a lot of candidates from which to choose. He would like District 5 voters to have a choice.

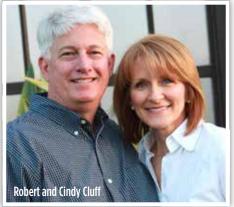
Robert, age 51, is a fourthgeneration Arizonan who has called

Mesa home for more than 20 years. He has lived in District 5 for the past 14 years. He and his wife of 27 years, Cindy (Richardson) Cluff, have five children. Born in Safford, Arizona, he has lived most of his life in Arizona and Utah.

"The last 20 years, I have spent my time and energy helping my wife raise our family, establishing my career and serving in church leadership," Robert said. "I am now at a time in my life where I can serve my community." Robert was appointed by the city council to serve on the board of the Mesa Museum and Cultural Arts, a position from which he was required to resign to run for city council. He also has volunteered as a youth corrections group-home counselor, Boy Scout leader and Mormon bishop.

"My desire is to serve the citizens and businesses of District 5 and the city, to listen to their needs and concerns, while learning how to best meet those needs," Robert said.

Robert has worked in the financial, construction and information technology industries in Arizona for the past 25 years. He currently is the chief executive officer of LVM Systems, the nation's leader in health care call center software. Last year, LVM celebrated 25 years in business. "For the last 15 years, I have helped our Mesa-based company grow from seven employees to over 60," Robert



stated. "LVM has been profitable each of its 25 years, and increased revenues annually, all while having no reduction in workforce, pay or benefits," he continued. "My hands-on, boardroom experience will help guide Mesa on the path to continued prosperity."

"Most political leaders talk about getting big business and high-wage jobs to come to Mesa," Robert continued. "While that's definitely important, it's today's small businesses that employ the majority of all Arizona workers. Today's small

business is tomorrow's high-wage employer."

Robert is not your typical politician. When asked who his ideal supporter would be, Robert said, "Anyone who has stopped voting due to politicians being great *campaigners* but lousy elected officials; folks tired of candidates who seek political endorsements more strongly than the citizens' vote; voters who are tired of the financial influence politicians solicit; for that matter, even those who are simply tired of seeing campaign signs littering our public roadways." Robert added, "It's really quite simple, if voters in District 5 want to elect someone with practical business acuity and no political indebtedness, I'm the right candidate."

Robert also is encouraging those he meets to get involved and run for office. He was the first candidate to announce running against an incumbent in District 5 throughout the past six years. That incumbent resigned within days of Robert announcing his run. Since there are no more than two candidates running for each open position, each of Mesa's local elections will be decided in the primary on Aug. 26. Therefore, Robert encourages all residents to vote in this year's primary election. "If the residents want their voices heard," he added, "they must vote in the primary."

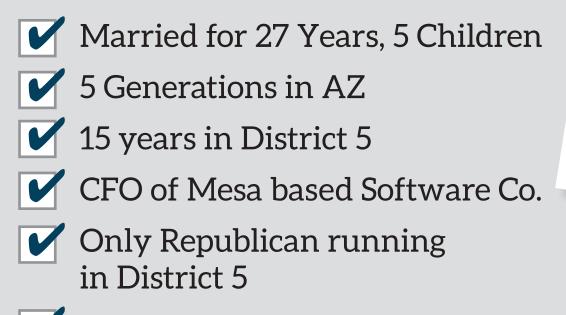

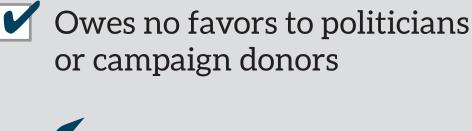

## UPDATES AND STATISTICS COMBINE to Reflect Current Housing Market

By Lorraine Ryall, Realtor, CDPE, CSSN, MSSC, Coldwell Banker Trails and Paths Premier Properties While 2013 proved to be a great year for the housing market recovery in the Greater Phoenix Metro Area, with

the median sales price increasing 20



percent, most of the gain was in the first half of the year, and December ended with the same median sales price as July.

The slower pace has continued for 2014. Typically, the spring season almost always is the strongest part of our year for demand. However, this year has seen a decline.

#### SUPPLY VERSUS DEMAND -GREATER PHOENIX METRO AREA

In the first half of 2013, we were in a seller's market, with a chronic shortage of supply and higher demand, which created multiple offers and surging home prices like we hadn't seen in years. In mid-2013, we started seeing the supply begin to increase each month, while demand decreased 21.4 percent. The housing market has now shifted from being chronically short of supply and a seller's market, to a much more balanced market, and now is weighing slightly toward the buyer.

#### FALL SEASON IN ARIZONA

Unlike other parts of the country, Arizona's housing market gets another boost in the fall, with second home buyers. With our soaring temperatures, Arizona's summer months are the slow season. We hope to see sales tick up again starting in September.

#### LENDERS AND BOOMERANG BUYERS COULD HELP DEMAND

Lenders and so-called boomerang buyers could be key in helping solve the demand problem, according to Michael Orr, the director of Arizona State University's Center for Real Estate Theory and Practice. Lenders, also feeling the brunt of weak demand, have been hurting for business in recent months, with new mortgage applications falling to a 14-year low, according to the Mortgage Bankers Association.

Orr suggested this might finally push lenders into easing their ultra-tight lending restrictions, which have been exacerbating the demand problem.

Phoenix was one of the cities hardest hit in the housing crisis for short sales and foreclosures, which also means we will have a greater increase in demand from boomerang buyers over the next few years. These are the buyers who lost their homes to foreclosure or short sale, and have waited the required time period to be able to qualify for a new mortgage again.

#### CHANGES TO SHORT SALE WAITING PERIOD FOR NEW LOANS

In June, Fannie Mae announced that as of Aug. 16 and going forward, they will no longer allow a borrower to



qualify for a conventional loan two years after a short sale unless they can document the fact their short sale was caused by an extenuating circumstance (see full article for definition of extenuating circumstance). Instead, a borrower must be four years beyond their short sale in order to qualify for a conventional loan. Visit my website for the full article and all the new guidelines.

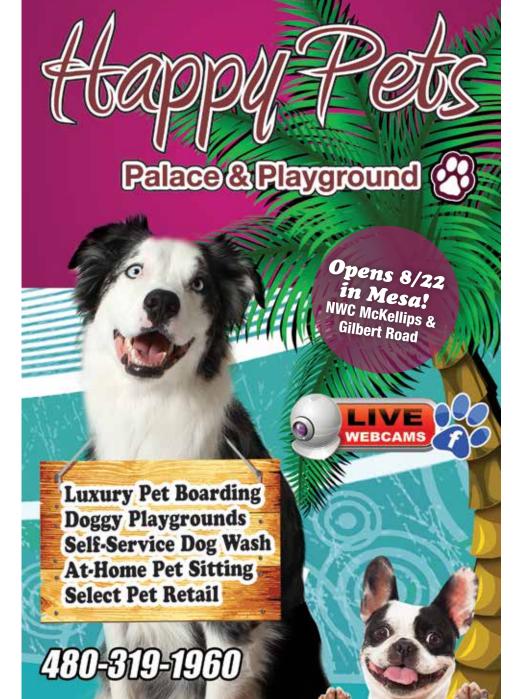
#### THE RED MOUNTAIN EXPERIENCE

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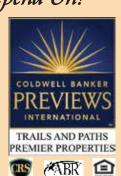

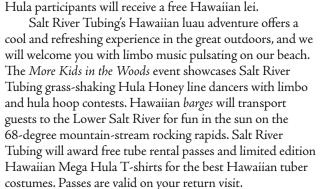

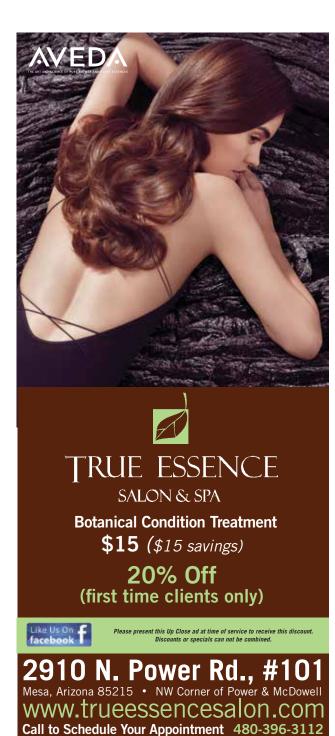
the airport and other community assets, which make the region so attractive to new employers. Much of the same can be said for the Falcon Field area.

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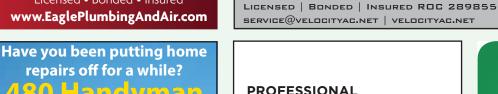
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
