

# Wyatt Martin Was Loved by Many and An Inspiration to All

yatt Martin's death, at the tender young age of 22, has made us realize how fragile life is.

When Wyatt made the decision to join the Army, it was with a passionate calling. After his decision was made, it was as if Wyatt was made whole. His path was secure. He was ready to be where he needed to be, when he needed to be, for all of us. Wyatt cherished life, his country, family and friendships.

Wyatt was killed on Dec. 12 while serving his country in Afghanistan. He died when an improvised explosive device hit the vehicle in which he was riding. As a combat engineer, he was a member of a unit assigned to disarm the explosive devices.

This brave soldier was a Mesa resident and a graduate of Skyline High School. The only son of Brian and Julie Martin, Wyatt was a loving brother to two older sisters.

Wyatt's house has been a buzz from sunrise to sunset. As his sister Katie said, "How many people can say their loved one died happy, doing what they knew they were meant to do?" It is with this faith and conviction that the Martin family and friends are dealing with their loss. Katie and Wyatt spent many hours talking about the what if. And all Wyatt said was, "Know that I died happy."

Wyatt spent every summer in Michigan with family. Every moment was enjoyed with zeal and a desire for excitement and adventure. A true outdoorsman, he could be found fishing for hours, waiting patiently for that bite to come, or out camping under the stars without a tent.

"Wyatt was the one to keep us in line," Levi Krecklow recalled. "We were the 303 family from a forest trail where we camped, fished and had lots of fun. I know he'll be watching me do more dumb things from above."

When Wyatt knew he was being deployed, he made his last months at home count. "We treated every moment as if he wouldn't be back," his sister Beth said. "We did all the things he loved, and got in hugs, kisses, cuddles, and we relished every day."

Knowing he would be deployed for Christmas

2014, Wyatt spent quality time with those cherished friendships in 2013. They went to the lake, golfed and made memories together. "He has always been one of my best friends," Alex Slota shared. "He always showed how much he cared and loved his friends. He was nice to everyone he met. I feel blessed to have gotten to know him for the time I did. I loved him as the kids we were to the man he became."

Wyatt is many things to many people. He has been my son Jordan's best friend since they were 3 years old. Every Christmas Eve, a group of boys would come to our house, have a bonfire, play some games, drink some drinks and just be boys. This started when they were 15 and continued to this year—only now it was different. Different in that smiling Wyatt wasn't walking down the hall or coming in our front door and sitting around that fire pit. But he was in the heart of each of the boys and in the memories they shared.

"Wyatt was truly an amazing person, and the greatest man I have ever met," said Sean Marucha. "From summer nights at Apache Lake, to Christmas Eve bonfires, they will never be the same without him. We never got to do that wrestling rematch that you were supposed to beat me in," he continued. "I'll miss you, you big Paul Bunyan. Hugs. I love you, brother, and thank you for your service."

For these young men, death has come too soon, too close to home. "Wyatt was the first person who was friendly to me when I moved to Mesa," Robert Gundran stated. "I can't think of one bad thing anyone on this planet would say about him. He's one of the greatest people I've ever met, and I'm lucky to have known him these past nine years of my life."

"Easily the greatest man I've ever met," Jordan Williams said. "He always found a way to brighten people's days, no matter what. It was what drove people to him." We should all be blessed to have a friend like that.

Thank you for your sacrifice. Rest in peace our dear, sweet Wyatt. XOXO ■





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


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### TROUBLE WITH HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE MEANS A TRIP TO THE EMERGENCY ROOM

This is the second of three articles on the why, what and how of high blood pressure.

**→** he Monday following the Thanksgiving weekend, I had a message waiting for me from Jim O'Maley, which surprised me, since Jim has not kept any of his appointments at my clinic for the past four months.



Jim wants to come and see me on an urgent basis. He also wants me to know that on the Friday after Thanksgiving he went to the emergency room. While there, he was found to have a very high blood pressure of 220/110, and was admitted for a few days. He had been discharged home the night previous to my receiving the phone message.

#### WHAT HAPPENED HERE?

Jim O'Maley has been taking blood pressure medications longer than he cares to remember. Long before he had established as a patient at my cardiology clinic, he already was on three blood pressure medications. "I am perplexed," said Jim. "All through my adult life, I have been compliant with my blood pressure medications. I never missed a single day of taking my blood pressure pills," he emphasized. "Yet during a very special time, when my kids and siblings were visiting us for the holidays, I end up in the hospital, all because of high blood pressure."

#### WHAT DO THESE BLOOD PRESSURE **READINGS IMPLY**

Blood pressure readings not only increase with age, but also vary throughout the day. Isolated increase in the blood pressure may not amount to much, but a persistent rise in the blood pressure from the usual baseline should be taken seriously. Blood pressure of less than 120/less than 80 is considered normal. On the other hand, blood pressure of 140/90 or more should be considered for treatment. In between values of 120 to 139/80-89 should prompt serious and dedicated lifestyle changes, including weight loss, salt prudence, alcohol restriction and cognizance of certain medications, including over-the-counter cough syrup, nasal decongestants and ibuprofen, as well as Advil, Aleve and steroids.

#### WHAT IS THIS FEELING?

I asked him what made him go to the emergency room in the first place. Jim looked at me and said, "Doctor, this is the funny part. I really did not have any specific complaints. There was no shortness of breath or chest pain," he continued. "I simply felt woozy, funny and tired."

### WHAT ARE THE SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS OF **HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE?**

The most concerning aspect of high blood pressure is the lack of symptoms or symptoms that are non-descript. This absence of symptoms labels high blood pressure as a silent killer. Lack of symptoms does not prompt the patient to seek medical attention. In the meanwhile, the elevated blood pressure creates havoc in the body.

#### LIFE WAS HECTIC, AND THE BACK **WAS HURTING**

Later in the evening, while visiting with him in the clinic, Jim updated me, "Doctor, I strained my back while helping my son lift some heavy furniture, and the back doctor prescribed steroids and ibuprofen for the back pain," he said."Within a couple of days, I noticed an increase in my blood pressure." Jim admits the restriction in physical activity with the back pain was a real setback. Anticipation



of hosting Thanksgiving with a bad back prompted him to imbibe alcohol with both lunch and dinner.

#### **MORAL OF THE STORY**

Cardiologist who cares.

Despite a controlled blood pressure and compliance with medications, many factors, including cough syrup, nasal decongestants, pain medications, salt imprudence and alcohol, may lead to higher blood pressure. What the patient needs to do is to keep up with regular doctor appointments, keep a log of his blood pressure twice a week, and promptly report to their doctor the incorporation of any of the above noted factors in their medical regimen or lifestyle. ■

### Maintain your pool while the weather is cool

If you are not heating your pool or don't use your pool as much in the colder months, now is the best time of year for doing pool maintenance.

Chris Quam, owner of Arizona Pool Guy Inc., offers a maintenance timeline for pool owners.

#### **POOL MAINTENANCE CHECKLIST**

- ☐ Yearly—clean cartridge filters and diatomaceous (DE) filter grids.
- 2 to 3 years—drain and refill pool with fresh water.
   3 to 4 years—replace cartridge filters and DE
- filter grids.

  5 to 7 years—complete sand replacement in sand filters.
- ☐ 10 to 15 years—refinish pool surface.

"If you live in the Alta Mesa neighborhoods, or any home built before 2000, your pool probably is due for refinishing," Chris stated. "If you notice chips, puckers or staining on your pool surface, it's time. Redo the plaster and tile surround for a clean, fresh look, or you can upgrade with one of the beautiful new pebble finishes. There are natural stone looks or combinations with colored glass beads or abalone shell pieces in all sorts of dramatic colors," he continued. "While refinishing the pool, it's also a good time to add a water feature or expand the decking."

In addition, if you don't have a heating system for your pool, why not add one now. "We have a winter special on an economical heat-pump system," Chris said. He also suggests adding a spa, gazebo, fire pit, or the most popular of all these days, an outdoor kitchen. "Winter is such a great outdoor time here," he added. "You want to make the most of your home's outside areas. And, of course, we install new pools, and alternative chlorine systems, too."

Because of Arizona's heat and sun, it can be risky to empty your pool in the summer because it can damage the exposed plaster, so now is the best time to do it. "As pool water evaporates, it concentrates hard water mineral buildup on tile and chrome," Chris said. "That, mixed with chemical and organic byproducts, will make your skin feel dry."

If you're buying a home with a pool, you definitely want to start out with fresh, clean water. "We use a quick turnaround to pump out the used water, quickly refill with fresh water, and set the chemical balance," Chris explained.

If you have an older pool pump, replacing your existing pump with a variable speed pool pump can reduce your pool energy costs by up to 80 percent and save you up to \$400 per year, according to the Arizona Public Service website. APS offers rebates of \$150 for qualifying equipment, and Salt River Project offers \$100. "We are certified variable speed pump installers, and provide the paperwork to get homeowners their rebates," said Chris.

## **Enrichment Opportunities Abound** at Self Development Academy

Third, students use computers for research purposes in other classes, such as science, literature and journalism.


Lastly, the interactive boards allow teachers to enhance their lessons and quickly retrieve information, such as maps and pictures.

# STUDENTS HAVE LEARNED

**T**ith their Advancement Via Individual Development (AVID) binders containing color-coded notebooks and folders for math, reading and writing, the fourthgraders in Mrs. Cruz's class at Stevenson Elementary School are ready to stay organized and incorporate strategies to take them through, not only the fourth grade, but also life.

AVID has been around for a while, mostly in the junior high and high school environment. Now, this program is filtering down to the elementary level to help build a foundation for organization, note taking, and preparation for college years. "My binder keeps me from digging through my things," Elisha said. "I know where my papers are. I am on track with what we are doing, and I know where things go when I am taking notes, like my name, the date and the subject," she continued. "I know how to put notes in the right and left column."

The Star Strategy teaches the students how to set up notes, take notes, add to their notes and review their notes. By knowing their learning style, they are directed to the tips for visual, auditory and kinesthetic learning. "I am better able to analyze what I am writing down," said Justin. "AVID helps me understand more." He admits to being unorganized last year, with his papers everywhere.

Mrs. Cruz has been teaching for 10 years, and this is the first year she has been using AVID. "The students are taking notes on their own when doing an assignment," she stated. "They feel like they have more control over their work, and they now have a



resource that works across the curriculum.

Mrs. Cruz believes this system puts the accountability on the students with a feeling of ownership, while taking the burden off of the teacher to constantly be reminding them where to put papers and find them.

"The best thing is that it has helped me to stay more organized than last year,"

Student teacher Stacie Jenkins sees the benefits of the AVID system. "That compartmentalizing and color coding the folders and notebooks helps with organizing data in the brain," she said. "The students were more successful with where their work should be."

As Mrs. Cruz teaches her lessons, everything relates back to AVID strategies. The students were active participants in their learning. Questioning, analyzing, explaining, sharing, collaborating, listening and responding created a hum of electrifying success, confidence and power as they were fully vested in their learning.

"This is an organizational tool that they can master now, and life will be easier for them in the future," Mrs. Cruz stated.



## Here Are Some Valley Real Estate PREDICTIONS FOR THE NEW YEAR

ince the recession, the Valley real estate housing market has been **J** difficult to predict.

Each year, it seems there have been unexpected wildcards, ranging from the burst of investor influx, to the tightening of the lending market, which



resulted from the implementation of the Dodd-Frank Law. While the market had been relatively flat in 2014, I had seen a busier than average November and December, which bodes well for this year. Here are my predictions for this year.

FINANCING WILL LOOSEN. In an effort to increase the liquidity of housing credit, Fannie Mae announced in October it would back loans with down payments as low as 3 percent (previously 5 percent). The hope is this will stimulate the private lending market to loosen its purse strings, and make loans available to a broader spectrum of borrowers. However, with the relaxing of credit, I predict we will start to see interest rates tick upward.

**BUYERS WILL RETURN.** After a foreclosure or short sale, the waiting period to purchase a home again is seven years and four years respectively. If any individuals had a foreclosure in 2008, they will be poised to return this year. Whether or not these buyers will have the means to return to the market is yet to be seen.

### RENTS WILL CONTINUE TO INCREASE.

Valley rents have increased 5.7 percent over the last year, and they are poised to continue upward. As rents increase, this often motivates renters to become home buyers.

#### NEW HOME BUILDING WILL FLOURISH.

According to RL Brown Reports, homebuilders are on track to construct about 12,000 homes this year. But with low unemployment and an expected 50,000 jobs to be created in the Valley this year, the number of new homes could be much higher.

#### WE WILL HAVE A BOOST FROM TOURISM.

The Valley is poised for a lot of positive attention in the first half of this year, with the return of the car shows, the Phoenix Open and Spring Training. Additionally, this year we will have lots of activity from the Pro Bowl and the Super Bowl, as well as sun seekers escaping what is predicted to be a harsh winter nationwide. With this many people coming to the Valley, we should see a boost in the market.

#### WE MIGHT BE THE HOTTEST MARKET.

Realtor.com has predicted Phoenix will be one of the United State's top 10 hottest housing markets to watch this year. This is based on a predicted 22 percent increase in housing starts. Our local economic recovery historically has been tied to new construction. So, if that prediction comes true, all aspects of the Valley real estate market and economy will see growth. This, plus tourism, loosening credit and the return of sidelined buyers, could make for a banner year.

In a nutshell, I expect to see steady growth this year, with the possibility of a sudden boost in values if housing starts


to pick up. I think buyers are in the better position at the moment, with great deals remaining in the market. An interesting indicator is that I have sold many custom building lots in the last few months, a trend I have not seen for many years. This is a very positive market indicator, as it signals confidence on the part of builders and investors.

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


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
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### A YOUNG GIRL'S DREAM COMES TRUE

manda Tallman may have lost her battle with childhood cancer, but her dream of having a clothing line, assuring dignity and modesty for children who have had a central line inserted, lives in her memory through Comfycozys for Chemo.

Amanda's family, Lorraine, Marty, Rachel and Leah, started a nonprofit organization just 18 months ago. Amanda Hope Rainbow Angels produces the Comfycozys for Chemo T-shirts.

A central line is a long, thin, flexible tube inserted into the chest as a way to give medicines, fluids, nutrients or blood products over a long period of time. As Amanda endured three years of chemotherapy, she made her wishes for the future known. Amanda's dream was for peekaboo pockets in her clothing line, while her mom's dream was the actual shirt design.

Spirited and compassionate, Amanda would ask, "Mom, are you listening to me, with two ears?" She then made a request. "Mom, look at me," Amanda said. "You are to help every child, Mom." And she has. Comfycozys honor Amanda's wish.



## The Sludge Monster Could Be LIVING IN YOUR ENGINE

oday's vehicles sometimes give us a false sense of security when it comes to maintenance.

Manufacturers and oil companies consistently advertise longer periods between services. The problem is over time this allows sludge and carbon to build up inside your engine. Expensive engine repairs often are the result.

Sludge forms through heat and friction inside the engine assembly. This can interfere with how oil flows through the engine. Eventually, oil flow will subside enough and cause engine failure. Changing your oil every 3,000 miles will avoid a dangerous sludge situation.

We also highly recommend using an oil system cleaner annually to further reduce any buildups which may occur. Conventional oil is all that is required in your vehicle unless the manufacturer mandates a full synthetic. We also recommend using high mileage oil once your vehicle surpasses 60,000 miles. High mileage oil will help keep seals lubricated and expanded in your engine to help prevent oil leaks.

Carbon is a natural byproduct of gasoline detonation. As the fuel burns inside your engine, it will leave carbon residue in the throttle body, air intake, valve train and inside the cylinders. Over time, this buildup can cause valve issues. In extreme cases, piston rings can seize. These deposits also affect engine performance and emissions. Using fuels containing detergents will reduce these deposits but not eliminate them.



We recommend having your fuel system cleaned every 30,000 miles if you are using a top tier fuel, and every 15,000 miles if you regularly use lower quality fuels. Quality is based on how clean the fuel burns rather than the octane rating of the fuel. Using a high-octane fuel is not necessary unless dictated by the manufacturer.

Go through your home room by room, and try to see it for the first time through the buyer's eyes. It might be a good idea to take a photo on your cell phone before you start. Look at the picture, and see what stands out to you. Is it the features in the room, such as the bay window or the stone fireplace? Is it all the pictures on the wall, or the photos on the table?

Does the room feel open and spacious? Instead, is it cluttered with knick knacks and cramped with all the furniture? Taking a large chair out of a small room can change the entire feel of the room and open it up. Taking all the knick knacks off the mantel will draw the buyer's eye to the decorative stonework around the fireplace rather than to the clutter on top.

Remove most of your photos. I am not a believer that all photos need to be removed. You want it to look clean and tidy, but not sterile. Having some family photos shows it is a family home with happy memories. If you have a wall with a bunch of pictures on it, take down all but a couple of them, and don't forget to patch up the holes left behind.

The kitchen—This is the best room to declutter, as this is one of the top rooms that makes the buying decision. You want to show off how much workspace there is and how much storage it has, with all the cabinets. Put away any small appliances, such as coffee makers, toaster ovens, blenders, etc. Pack away any saucepans or serving dishes you haven't used in the past six months and probably won't use in the next few months.

Arrange what you have in your cabinets and drawers so it all looks neat and organized with plenty of room. Go through your pantry and pack away any non-perishable

goods you won't use in the next few months. Neatly stack what is left, and turn all the labels facing out. Trust me, buyers will open cupboard doors and drawers to see inside, especially in the kitchen.

Closets—You want your closet to look like there is plenty of room for all the buyer's clothes. Pack away any clothes and shoes you don't need, leaving some open space on the shelves and on the rails. Organize your closets so everything is neatly folded, hung or stacked. Purchase some wicker baskets or plastic tubs to keep everything neat and tidy.

Remember, you are selling your home and moving. So, going through your home and packing items before you list not only helps you sell your home, but also gives you a leg up on packing. Don't forget to mark all the boxes with a detailed list of what is inside. Stack the boxes neatly in your garage or shed to keep them out of the home while the weather is cooler. Don't forget if you are doing this coming into the warmer months, make sure you leave boxes with delicate items that cannot withstand our Arizona heat stacked neatly in the home, or rent an air-conditioned storage unit.

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

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
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
### The right folder can simplify YOUR FILING SYSTEM

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
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




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
