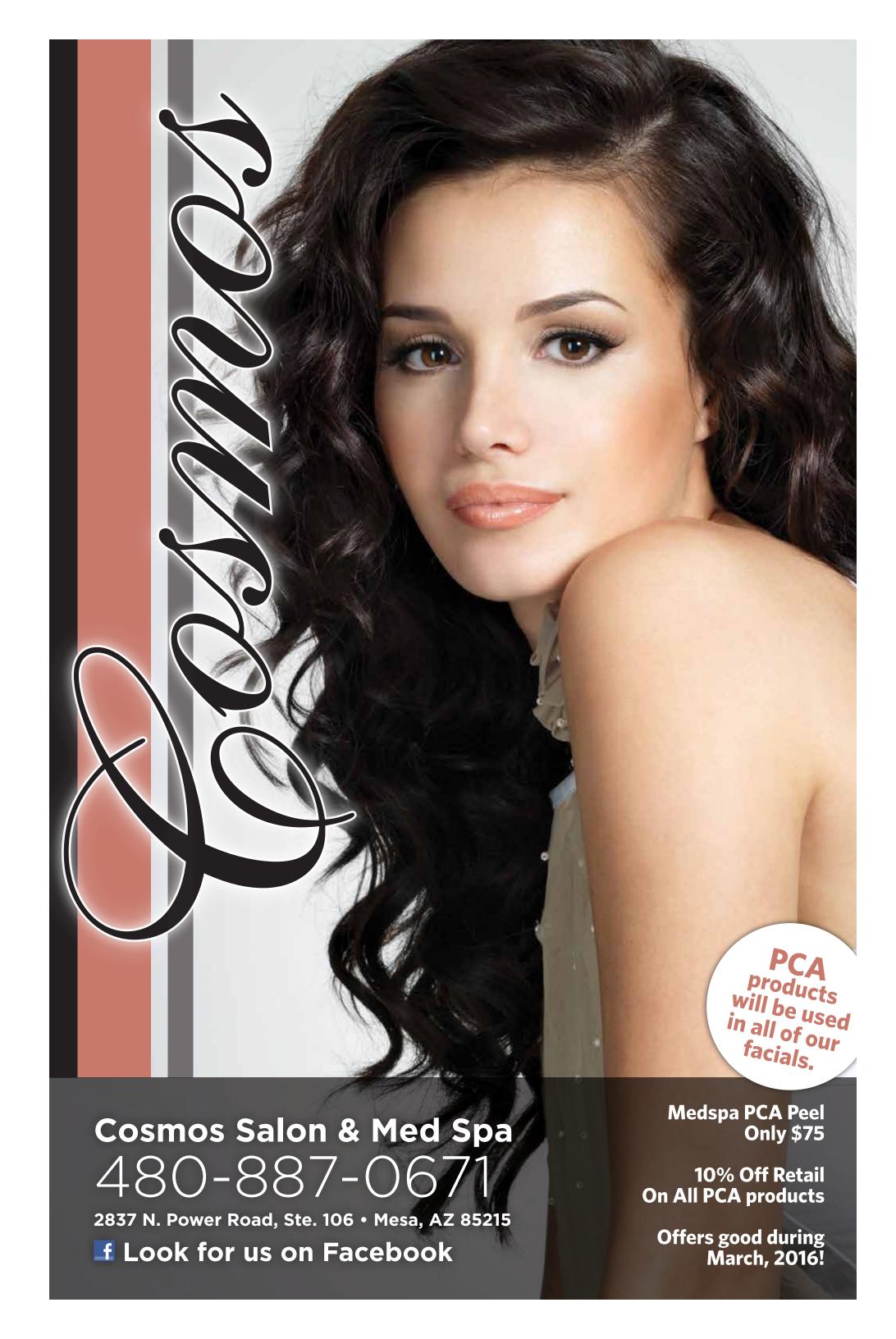

Adapted home transcends time for elderly homeowner

t 88 years young, Helen bought a resale home to live next to her daughter, but since her new house, built almost 70 years ago, was not designed for the elderly, she hired Jeanette Knudsen, owner of Design For A Life Span, to adapt

Considering her capabilities, Helen had two priorities for adapting her new home.

First, make her home safe enough for a senior citizen. Second, make it safe without looking like its owner is a senior citizen.

Here's what Jeanette did with the master bedroom and bath—originally two separate rooms opening out to the hall.

The first step was to seal off the bathroom door and open up the wall between the rooms. This ensuite design not only gave Helen easier access to the bathroom, it brightened both rooms and increased her privacy.

Next, the bathtub was removed and replaced with a European-style curbless shower. To add to the spa-like atmosphere, both wall-mounted and hand-held showers were installed, allowing the homeowner to enjoy more than one choice of bathing. In place of doors and shower glass, Helen opted for a curtain mounted on a double bar firmly secured to the walls.

Jeanette spaced the toilet and sink for easy access around both, and took advantage of the natural light coming from the outside window. For cloudy days, she added canned lighting in the ceiling, and the lights on both sides of the mirror have nightlights. The light

gray walls and floor tiles, which are white with black accents, have matte finishes to minimize glare.

Next, Jeanette addressed the grab bars. Also called balance bars, these supports now double as décor accents and come in many styles. The bars were coordinated with the sink and shower hardware, using a brushed nickel finish to complete the updated look.

Helen is thrilled with her home, with no plans to leave as long as she has a say. There will come a time when the home goes back up for sale. No matter when that happens, it will stand out from the competition for its timeless beauty with built-in safety features. ■

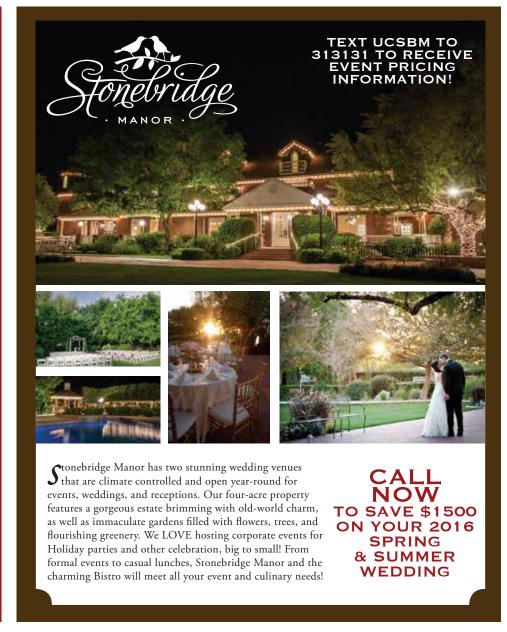

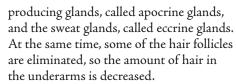

Those who use antiperspirants and/ or deodorants, but still sweat in the armpits, or for whom deodorants don't seem to be strong enough, might be the most interested. MiraDry, so named because it was the first Food and Drug Administration (FDA)approved treatment of odor-producing apocrine glands in the underarms, also has gained approval for eliminating sweatproducing glands in the armpits.

MiraDry added the name MiraSmooth to emphasize the new FDA approval for permanently eliminating underarm sweat glands, as well. The technology creates heat directed into the subcutaneous layer, just under the skin, while the surface of the skin is kept cool with a chill tip.

> The effect is to eliminate the subcutaneous odor-



It requires about 90 minutes of your time to have 80 percent to 90 percent permanent elimination of both underarm odor and sweat and about half of the underarm hair. This is all done in the same treatment.

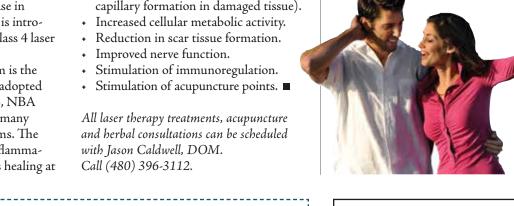
The armpits represent only about 1 percent of the body surface area, so it really won't create a noticeable change of sweating anywhere else. The odor production won't be missed (with the possible exception of your dog, traditionally using odor to identify you). Other things not missed are all the shirts ruined by antiperspirants mixed with sweat.

Many having underarm laser hair removal may want to consider this treatment instead, since it has the additional benefit of removing odor and sweat in the underarms at the same time. Although a second treatment may be necessary, it usually is offered at half price, and the vast majority of odor and sweat glands are eliminated in the first procedure.

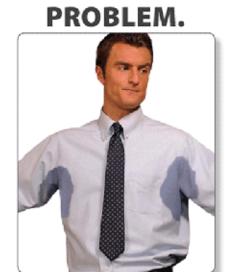

1. CURB APPEAL— FIRST IMPRESSIONS COUNT

Have your shrubs and grass trimmed, add new shrubs, and if needed, weed and freshen up any bare areas of stone or groundcover. Add pots with flowering annuals to the entryway. Curb appeal really does make a difference, and it's the very first impression the buyer will get when pulling up to your home.

Have your home cleaned from top to bottom, including baseboards, fans, light switches and door frames.

3. PAINTING

Touch up both the interior and exterior of the home or have it repainted. If you have any colored walls, such as a lovely purple wall, which matches your purple couch, have it repainted a neutral color. Stay away from white. You don't want the home to look cold and sterile. A nice beige or gray, which is the new white, can add warmth

4. DECLUTTER

It is a good rule of thumb to take down two-thirds of what you have displayed. You are going to be moving anyway, so use this as a great opportunity to start your packing early. Keep countertops clear, especially in the kitchen and bathrooms. Reorganize your closets to make them appear larger. Pack away anything you are not going to be using in the next few months.

5. OPEN UP THE HOUSE AND **KEEP IT BRIGHT**

Buyers don't like to walk into a home that is dark and feels closed in. Make sure all the blinds are open and the lights are on. Turn on any accent lights, such as under the kitchen cabinets and side lamps. These not only make the home bright but also add warmth.

6. KEEP OUT THE ODORS

Add a plug-in or oils to keep the home smelling nice, especially if you have pets. Put one at the entryway where the buyer

first enters the home. Just make sure not to use too many, or the smell will be too strong.

7. MAKE REPAIRS

Go through the house and fix any little minor defects, such as loose door hardware and faucets. Replace any burned out light bulbs. Consider hiring a handyman to review the home and take care of any minor issues. After all, the buyer will be having the home inspected. So, the more you do now, the better the inspection will be. If there is a major repair that needs to be done, discuss this with your Realtor before making the repair, as there may be other ways for you to address the matter.

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Self Development Academy Hosts Annual Information Night

Further elaborating on the school's language arts program, Ms.
Karissa Pletta, another faculty member at SDA, added, "In the writing classes, students take the five-paragraph essay model to heart, and learn how to adjust it to each style of writing." Ms. Pletta proudly shared, "SDA-Mesa's

language arts program is producing students who not only are confident in their work, but will continue to learn for life."

By the time SDA students reach middle school, many are prepared to enroll in the fields of advanced literature, as well as algebra and advanced science. During middle school, students have the opportunity to complete Pre-Algebra, Algebra I, Geometry, and Algebra II, Advanced Literature, Science, including Biology, Chemistry, and Physics, Technology and Spanish courses. Many of these courses are not offered until high school.

"Our mission is to send students off into their high school, their career and beyond with the ability to think like scientists," stated Ms. Laura Meyer, a science faculty member and a graduate of Massachusetts Institute of Technology. "Our advance topics and rigorous expectations continually push our students to rise to a higher level of understanding and learning," she said.

Students completing eighth grade at SDA are enrolled in honors and advanced placement courses upon entering high school. Additionally, many students receive high school credit for courses completed at SDA. This enhances their grade point averages, and makes them highly competitive students when applying to colleges and universities.

During the evening, former SDA students returned to campus to share their experiences in high school.

Aside from the academic focus, students have opportunities to develop other skills, such as public speaking, sports and performance skills. Class plays, winter performances and a science fair are just a few of the many annual in-house activities. Afterschool activities include Sports Club, Robotics, Foreign Language, Dance Club, Choir Club and Student Government. SDA is committed to developing well-rounded students who are well prepared for high school and beyond.

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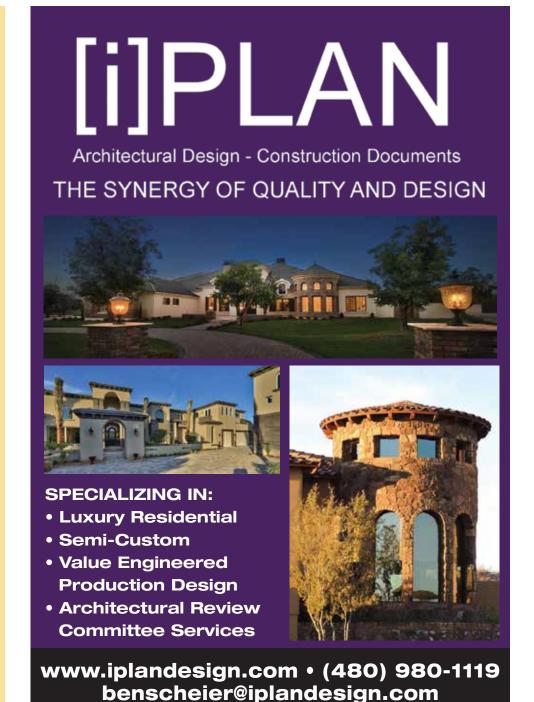
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Make time to discuss future financial decisions with family

- Living wills or health care directives.
- Insurance and other contracts (health, life, long-term care, annuities, auto and homeowners, etc.).
- Wills, trusts and deeds.
- Bank accounts and investment accounts.
- Credit card accounts and other outstanding debt.
- Contact information for lawyers, accountants, brokers and agents.
- Jewelry and other valuables.
- Essential keys.
- Instructions related to funeral arrangements.
- Personal instructions or messages.
- Location of birth, marriage and military discharge certificates.
- Information related to charitable gifts.

While it may be a difficult topic, open and honest communication about your long-term care strategy can be one of the best ways to prepare for a stress-free financial future.

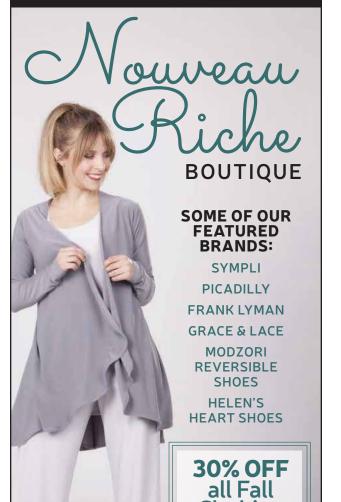

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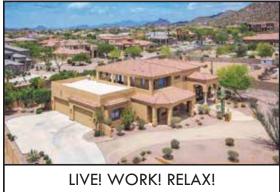

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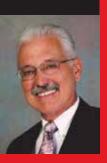

- 1) Home may need to be updated or completely remodeled.
- 2) Existing upgrades may not be to your taste.
- 3) Home may need maintenance and repairs.
- 4) Appliances may be at the end of their lives.
- 4) Landscaping may need updating.

Tonsider the stress you can eliminate, for yourself and your family, by having your financial and medical affairs in order.

Consider, too, the cost savings in avoiding a \$5,000 bill for a court guardian—conser-

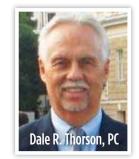
vatorship proceeding by executing financial and medical powers of attorney. Then, realize a further savings of an estimated \$2,000 to \$5,000 cost of a court probate and the lengthy time delays by utilizing available techniques which many attorneys do not suggest or even understand are available.

MOST PLANS DO NOT NEED TO INCLUDE A TRUST

It is now possible to settle most estates with only an original death certificate. Yes, you need a will, but only as a guide to clearly state your distribution plan to be carried out, or if you fail to plan. Common myths are a will is required so the state does not receive your property, or you need a trust if your estate is more than \$75,000, as stated typically in most advertising. These statements are just not true. Start getting educated today.

ARIZONA PLANNING

Arizona is probably the most consumer-friendly state and one of the most unfriendly to attorneys to whom you do not need to pay large



With respect to medical powers of attorney (POA), almost every document I am asked to review names only one person to act. This design is wrong, in my opinion, as the primary reason for a medical power of attorney is to allow your trusted family and friends to have immediate authority to speak to your medical professionals, and to assist with initial services in an emergency situation.

To facilitate your treatment and care, the second most important reason is to have immediate authority to obtain access and copies to all medical records. Therefore, I recommend having multiple appointees, including your spouse, and, in most situations, all of your children and frequently visited out-of-state family members. Other appointees may be close friends, if you so choose.

If you do not have family in town, try to name a local contact person who will give immediate assistance and contact your family. When asked about the need for a medical POA, almost everyone says the most important

reason is to make decisions. However, my understanding is this only happens no more than 5 percent of the time. You personally make about 50 percent of the decisions, and medical professionals make around 45 percent. The remaining 5 percent is, indeed, important but usually only happens at end-of-life situations.

The other reason for a medical POA is to advise the hospital of your decision on end-of-life pulling of the plug or living will. Just a personal note, I am very worried that some of you have executed Do Not Resuscitate, or DNR documents, and really do not understand the risk of such decisions. Normally, DNRs are limited to hospice arrangements. Arizona does not have an assisted suicide law.

FINANCIAL

With respect to financial POAs, almost every document I am asked to review is effective upon execution. This is the same as giving a blank check to someone. This design

> is also wrong, in my opinion. In most situations, this instrument should become effective only in the event of your incapacity. There are three phases of life. Competent requires no one else to make decisions on your behalf. Incapacitated is when you are mentally or physically unable to act. Death is when all POAs are void.

AVOID FAMILY DISPUTES

My approach includes steps to avoid family disputes by establishing the proper plan to distribute tangible personal property, get your family involved, and make them aware you have done comprehensive planning.

Be Aware of Heat Safety for Your Dog

Since it is already warming up, let's revisit the heat of Arizona, and take a true or false quiz to see if you can pass with flying colors.

1. It takes 15 minutes for your car to become so hot your dog suffers serious physical harm.

False—It only takes 10 minutes.

2. Parking in the shade will keep your dog comfortably cool if left in a car.

False—This only buys minutes, at best, to slow down rising temperatures. A shaded car still will reach high internal temperatures dangerous to pets within minutes.

3. A dog's normal internal body temperature is normally 100 degrees to 102.5 degrees.

True—Above 103 generally is seen as an emergency. If you have been exercising your dog and she seems listless afterward, do you yourself a favor, and check her temperature.

4. The best practice for cooling down a dog suspected of being in heat stroke, or overheated in general, is to put ice on the animal's body.

False —Submerging a dog in ice actually can cause the blood flow to constrict in the veins, slowing down the dog's cooling process.



5. If a dog is panting, he is cooling himself off enough to stay out of the heat danger zone.

False—This is the only way a dog can cool itself, just as we sweat. However, just because a dog is panting does not mean he will stay cool enough. It's important to monitor your dog after exercise to be sure he has not overheated.

6. If outside, as long as a dog has shade and water, there is no danger of overheating or heat stroke.

False—A dog's internal body temperature still can go above the normal range, even if he drank water and is in a shaded area.

7. If you exercise your dog in the early morning hours, she is safe from heatstroke.

False. Sadly, I personally know someone who was exercising his dog at about 9 a.m. The dog overheated, and on the way to the vet, she died. Do not underestimate the heat here. Just like people, different dogs have different tolerance levels to heat.

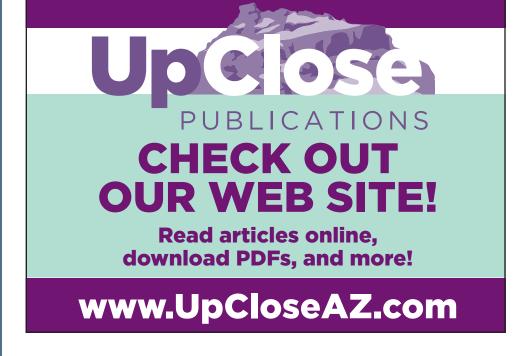
8. If you are going to exercise your dog, you should keep outside exercise times to 10 minutes or less if the temperature is above 85 degrees.

True—Again, we're talking about the dog's internal body temperature, not how the temperature feels outside. The higher the temperature, the faster the animal's internal body temperature rises.

It is very important to know your dog's limits. Dogs often do not know their own limits. Therefore, it is up to us, as our dogs' guardians, to take excellent care of them, just as Critter Caretakers does when we sit for your fur babies.

Salt River Project Analyst Is Guest Speaker at Red Mountain Ranch Social Club

reg Kamrumph, principal analyst at Salt River Project (SRP), was the recent guest speaker at the Red Mountain Ranch Social Club.

Greg has more than 31 years in the water business and understands the concerns and issues in Arizona. "Arizona is an arid state, but we have had good water planners," he said. "Before the birth of the Salt River Valley Planners Association, in 1903, there were 17 different irrigation companies in Arizona fighting over water."

In 1937, the Roosevelt Dam was built, at a cost of \$10 million, and all the canals were consolidated. This dam contributes 70 percent of our water supply. Other sources are Colorado River water, groundwater and reclaimed water.

Greg mentioned the fact California dumps their reclaimed water into the ocean, but, in Arizona, almost 100 percent of this water is used on golf courses, some water features and in other ways. We are a desert state, however, and there is room for improvement. Some

residents and homeowners associations requiring grass need to re-think this and consider desert-friendly landscaping, Greg said.

Almond

farms use water all the time, whereas row crops use water only while the crop is growing. Vineyards require much water also, but the Verde Valley is using Israel grown grapes for their vineyards, which need less water, and they are being watered with reclaimed water.

Another issue of importance is forest fires. According to Greg, SRP is actively engaged in the Northern Arizona Forest Foundation for the conservation of forests. The forests are too dense with little spindly trees between older larger trees, and the small trees are fuel for fires. This organization is working to thin the forests, improve the habitat and manage erosion. One of their goals is to raise awareness and foster conservation. To further this goal, they are going into schools to educate young people in the Phoenix area.

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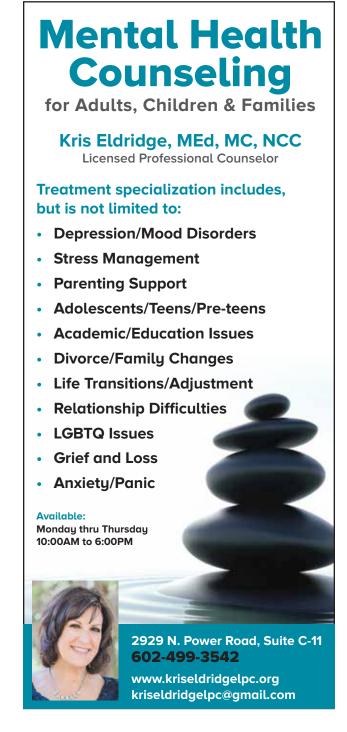

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Determine the Treatment Best Suited to Address Allergy Symptoms

By Stuart H. Agren, MD **7** ith spring in the air, some people are seeking out antihistamines or corticosteroids to tide them through allergy season.

These work fairly well for some patients, but for others, allergy immunotherapy (delivered through allergy shots or oral drops) can provide more

thorough, lasting relief. It's important to think about the severity and duration of your symptoms when considering immunotherapy.

- Severity. If you rank your symptoms as a 5 out of 5 on a misery scale, your allergies may be severe enough for immunotherapy.
- Duration. It's a red flag, too, if your symptoms last for multiple months. For example, if you are close to a 5 on the misery scale in spring and fall, and in moderate discomfort during other parts of the year, consider seeing a doctor about immunotherapy. Pills may be appropriate for short symptom bursts, but immunotherapy is often better for symptoms lasting more than four months per year.

GETTING STARTED WITH TREATMENT

Allergy immunotherapy presents some significant advantages over simply popping an allergy pill. First, immunotherapy is the only treatment proven to change the underlying allergic disease, not just its symptoms. Also, immunotherapy is nature-based and free of the side effects of synthetic medications.

ALLERGY TESTING

To determine if immunotherapy is right for you, your

physician may administer an allergy test (usually a blood test or skin scratch or prick test). Since tests are prone to false negatives and other inaccuracies, your doctor also will consider your symptoms and health history.

IMMUNOTHERAPY

Immunotherapy starts with an allergy serum, which contains traces of common pollens mixed into a saline solution. As your body is exposed to these pollens, it develops an immunity to them. So, it will stop overreacting every time it encounters them in nature.

SHOT-FREE ALTERNATIVES

For many years, immunotherapy was administered only through injections. Patients had to drive to the doctor's office a couple times a week for shots. More options are now available. Most of my patients prefer sublingual (under-the-tongue) allergy drops because they are safer than shots and can be taken at home. The drops absorb into the bloodstream through cells in the mouth.

Allergy drops often are a great choice for kids. Because of their safety profile, they can be given to younger children as opposed to shots.

Talk to a physician if you think you may be a candidate for immunotherapy. Medications provide temporary relief, but immunotherapy can provide a lasting solution. ■

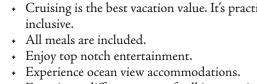

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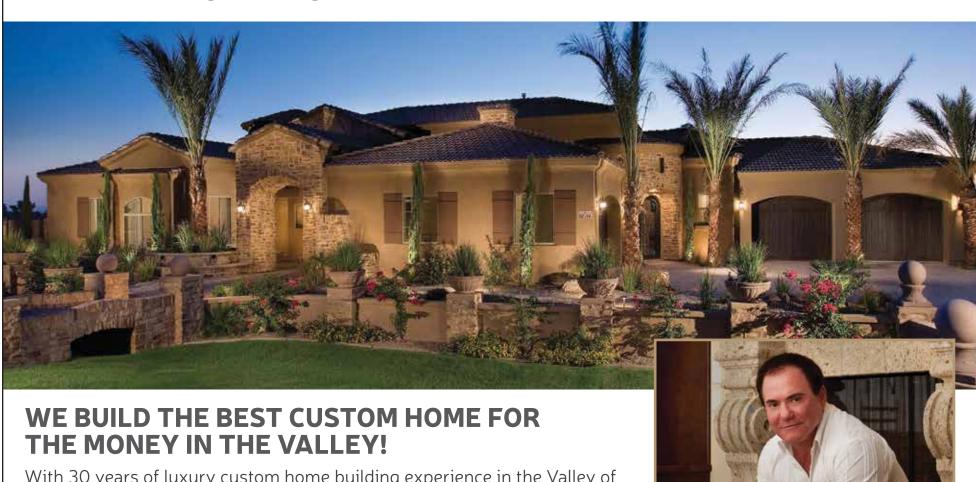


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
