# Neighborhood hangout offers Texas-style Mexican food

pen for barely a year, Matta's Cantina has become the new neighborhood hangout for residents near Ellsworth and Brown roads.

My husband and I checked it out on a Tuesday evening, not usually a busy night for restaurants, and it was quite full. Walking in the front door, you could immediately tell this is a comfortable, casual place that caters to the neighborhood. There was a lively mix of families and couples dining, and a crowded bar, with sports on the TVs, lots of chit-chat and patrons enjoying libations, appetizers and meals.

As soon as we sat down, a personable waitress brought us a basket of large, hearty corn chips and a generous bowl of spicy and very tasty hot sauce, which also is for sale at the restaurant and online.

This newest of Matta's four Valley Mexican restaurants, Matta's Cantina is owned by Peter and Gretchen Matta. This restaurant serves the same great West Texasstyle, made-from-scratch Mexican food famous at all the other locations.

There are so many offerings on the menu, it was difficult to choose. We probably should have tried a few different things, but we both decided we wanted to order the shrimp and chili burritos. They came generously stuffed with lots of good-sized shrimp, strips of green chilies, onions and rice.

My husband ordered refried beans as his side, and I tried the papas fritas. Matta's certainly doesn't skimp on its portions. The burritos were large, and the sides covered half the plate. The yummy refried beans were smooth, creamy and covered with melted cheese. The papas fritas were bite-sized, triangular-shaped pieces of fresh-cut



potatoes perfectly fried to a crunchy outside with a soft center. And even though they were so good, I couldn't finish the whole serving.

We had both eaten so much, we hardly could think of dessert, but the waitress convinced us we should at least give the caramel-filled churros a try. They were delicious. I forced myself to eat two of the perfectly crunchy confections, complete with a creamy caramel inside and sprinkled with cinnamon and sugar. The contrast between the crunch outside and cream inside was a real treat.

Matta's is a real family tradition, with Arizona roots dating back to 1953. So, it is no surprise Dominic Matta, son of Peter and Gretchen, works at the Cantina.

"We grew up in this neighborhood," Dominic said, "and we still live close by. We've always had a dream to start a nice little neighborhood restaurant here, where nearby residents could come for a quick lunch, a relaxing dinner or just to chill and have a beer or margarita, while hanging

out with their neighbors," he continued. "We invite our snowbirds to check us out, and meet some of their year-round neighbors, too."

Matta's also offers Fiesta Hour specials, from 3 to 6 p.m. daily, with discounts on combo plates and drinks. They have a lot of tequila selections, too. ■


If anything is not performing as well as it could

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# Arizona Is No Longer an Allergy Haven

**→**hough Arizona was once considered a refuge from allergies, due to its warm, dry climate, according to the Asthma and Allergy Foundation of America, Phoenix is now cited among the 75 worst cities for allergy sufferers.



A few factors are to blame:

1. Imported plants—Arizona already had some native allergenic plants, such as ragweed—a flowering plant and prolific pollinator. Then, throngs of newcomers to the Valley imported a barrage of allergy-causing plants, including Bermuda grass, junipers and mulberry trees. The plants beautified the desert but also created a hotbed of allergic activity.

2. Extended pollination season—It's true Arizona's summer heat may stunt pollens, but spring, fall and mild winters all are conducive to pollination, making for longer allergy seasons than are found in many states.

- **3. Dust**—About 20 percent of Americans are allergic to dust, and Arizona has plenty of it. Construction, development and lack of moisture all contribute to a dusty environment, which can, in turn, lead to hay fever and
- **4. Air pollution—**As Arizona grows, the state gets more people, development, concrete and cars. All of these contribute to declining air quality, which can stir up allergy symptoms. Couple this with the fact we live in a valley where pollens and other irritants can settle in for the long haul, and you have fertile ground for allergic misery.

A study published in the Journal of Allergy and Clinical Immunology tested more than 8,000 people nationwide and found no matter where they lived, approximately 45 percent of participants showed sensitivity to at least one allergen. Easterners were more prone to mold allergies, while Westerners were more sensitive to grass and

ragweed. However, the overall finding was no part of America—not even Arizona—is significantly better for

If you struggle with allergies, the good news is there is hope. For brief, mild seasonal allergies, prescription medications can take the edge off of symptoms. For more severe symptoms or symptoms lasting longer than a few months, allergy immunotherapy can help desensitize your body to pollens, pet dander, dust and other allergens, so it will stop reacting to them.

Immunotherapy is available through shots or underthe-tongue drops. Most of my patients prefer drops because they are safer than shots and can be taken in the comfort of home rather than at the doctor's office.

Stuart H. Agren, MD, opened the Family Allergy Clinic, in the East Valley, in 1985. He has helped more than 15,000

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



# Technology transforms student learning spaces

tudents throughout Mesa Public Schools are learning in new ways, thanks to one-to-one technology.

In fall of 2015, Skyline High School launched the One-To-One Technology Initiative Program. During registration, students were issued a Lenovo ThinkPad laptop to use for school-related purposes. The devices give students access to important tools to complete classroom and homework tasks and access digital and online textbooks and resources. The devices also serve to augment learning opportunities with teachers and peers in new and exciting ways.

### IT'S IN THE DETAILS

Every detail about the rollout was examined, from personalized identification stickers for each device, to a simple checkout process and the ability to track thousands of devices students take home. Michelle Hamilton, director of purchasing and property management, researched ways to streamline the process. She found the right fit for the district's needs, saving thousands of dollars in equipment costs by using an app that scans QR or barcodes.

"The process was seamless," Michelle said. "Students walked up to the table to get their device, and we scanned the student ID. We then took the device out of storage, loaned it to the student, hit *Enter*, and the process was complete."

### **A LEARNING CURVE**

Changes were made to incorporate how students now use the school's media center. Non-emergency work requests help less-dire situations. For immediate needs, there is a centralized location staffed by student technicians, called the tech squad, who are supervised by a lead technician. They help students with non-operating devices before and after school and every hour in between. Technology orientations are hosted in the media center for newly enrolled students to get them up to speed before they attend class.



Bookcases were removed, furniture was rearranged, and additional power strips were placed around the floor for easy student access. Additional chargers and textbooks are available for students who need to complete last-minute assignments.

"In the past, students would visit the media center to use the computers," said Marcy Ruggiero, Skyline High School's resource specialist. "Now, students come in to print papers, finalize projects or get help with their devices. My role has evolved into a triage specialist, where I systematize and prioritize students who need immediate help."

### **FUTURE PLANS**

The technology initiative is supported by a voter-approved \$230 million bond initiative, which funded the purchase of student devices and the Wi-Fi infrastructure, allowing 3,000 students to simultaneously access the Internet from their devices.

Westwood High School implemented the program at the start of spring semester, with Dobson and Red Mountain high schools slated for the 2016-17 school year. The Eisenhower Center for Innovation and Lehi Elementary School also use one-to-one during school hours.

# **Put Your Tax Refund to Work**

ith the average tax
refund in 2014 being
about \$2,700, and
upon receiving the same amount
this year, making a decision as
to what to do with it could be a
challenge.

You can probably think of a lot of things you might do with \$2,700. You might decide to

splurge and buy some big-ticket item you've been eyeing. Or you could use the money to pay down some bills, which might be a good idea, especially if it helps improve your cash flow. As an alternative, though, you might want to consider investing the money.



You might not think \$2,700 would make a big difference to your investment portfolio. But if you invested that \$2,700 in a tax-advantaged account, such as an IRA, and you left the money alone, what might you earn? After 30 years, your \$2,700 would have grown to more than \$20,500, assuming no further contributions and a hypothetical 7 percent annual return. That's not a fortune, of course, but it would help boost your retirement savings somewhat. In addition, since it originated from a tax refund, it was accumulated pretty effortlessly from your point of view.

Now suppose you put in the same amount—\$2,700—to your IRA each year for 30 years. Again, assuming that same hypothetical 7 percent annual return, your money would have grown to more than \$272,000. This amount certainly can make a rather big difference in your retirement lifestyle.

Keep in mind the fact you would eventually have to pay taxes on that \$272,000 if you had been investing in a traditional IRA, which is tax-deferred but not tax-free. It is possible, however, that if you start taking withdrawals when you retire, you'll be in a lower tax bracket.

If you meet the income guidelines for contributing



Thus far, we've only talked about putting your tax refund to work in your IRA—which, as we have seen, can be a very good idea. But suppose you've already developed the excellent habit of *maxing out* on your IRA each year by contributing a set amount each month.

You currently only can put in up to \$5,500 per year to your IRA, or \$6,500 if you are 50 or older. So, you could fully fund your IRA by putting in about \$458 per month (or \$541 per month if you're 50 or older). Those amounts are not unreasonable, especially as you move deeper into your career and your salary increases. If you do reach these limits each month, what could you do with your tax refund?

You can start by looking closely at your portfolio to see if any gaps exist. Could you, for example, use your tax refund to further diversify your holdings? While diversification cannot guarantee profits or prevent losses, it can reduce the impact of volatility on your portfolio—and the less you feel the effects of volatility, the more likely you may be to stick with your long-term strategy rather than overreacting to short-term price drops.

So, when Uncle Sam sends you that refund, consider investing it one way or another. You will be putting it to good use.

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

# **Student Passions and Pursuits Are Encouraged**

ncouraged by a culture of honing student leadership skills and developing social conscience, students at Self Development Academy (SDA) are encouraged to identify their areas of interest and pursue them with passion.

Examples of student initiative projects addressing their academic curiosity, community service and leadership abilities are present throughout the school community, in all grades. Not only do a large number of students participate in the annual Science Fair, but they also create various groups to serve different needs of the school or larger community.

Included among the many student initiated service groups are fund-raising campaigns, such as *Smash Cancer*, *Save the Animals, Be Kind to Your Friends* and *Help Youngsters with Homework*. A sense of responsibility to the community begins to surface as early as our lower elementary grades, when younger students look for ways to help their world.

SDA has consistently been ranked among the top 10 elementary and junior high schools in the state. The success of SDA students is due to a visionary leader, Dr. Anjum Majeed, superintendent of Self Development Academy, together with dedicated faculty and staff, supportive parents and hard working, diligent students.

Students learn a minimum of one year ahead of the Arizona Academic Standards. A strong academic foundation, especially in language arts and mathematics, is established during the elementary school years.



Junior high school students, ages 10 through 14, complete Pre-Algebra through Algebra II, Biology, Chemistry, Physics and high school level Social Studies and Language Arts coursework. In addition to obtaining a strong academic foundation, students gain necessary organizational and study habits for success in high school and beyond.

SDA students are encouraged to pursue their academic and extracurricular interests. The annual Science Fair, an optional event for grades two through five (mandatory for junior high), is one example of this type of opportunity. Many students are excited to participate in the Science Fair, since science, including science labs, is a regular part of the SDA curriculum beginning in grade one. This year, more than 150 students participated in the event. Topics included the areas of chemistry, physics, biology, aerodynamics and biomimicry.

The Science Fair requires students to develop a hypothesis and to complete an experiment. A lab report, including research, hypothesis, method, materials and results, as well as a tri-fold poster, are required. During the event, students field questions from teachers, parents and fellow students. Junior high students explain their experiments to judges. This year's winning projects included DNA extraction, beetle-inspired water collection, glucose levels of fruit, a zebra-striped cooling system, color's impact on memory, catapulting and concentrations of smell.

In addition to the Science Fair, students are encouraged to pursue their extracurricular activities and passions. This school year, five groups of students have proposed projects to Dr. Majeed.

One such project is Cancer Kidz. Inspired by personal family experiences with cancer, three junior high students, Emma Wolfe, Erica Fink and Paisen Alder, created Cancer Kidz to raise money for cancer research and cancer support groups for children diagnosed with cancer. The students, along with the support of the student government, have sponsored several events and raised more than \$1,200.

Bronson Staley, a grade two student, was moved to better the school campus by promoting recycling. In an inspiring letter to Dr. Majeed, he requested permission to lead his class in a poster campaign encouraging the school



community to pick up trash and recycle. Now, posters from his class are present throughout the campus.

Emmalee Sclease and Megan Parr are promoting and developing a project to care for abandoned pets and other animals. The girls are deciding if they wish to collect donations to help abandon pets and animals or care for abandoned pets. Outside sponsors are willing to support their project.

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
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
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
