



SWIM INTO SUMMER WITH Mesa Swim Club Seadogs

Summer is coming fast, and one of the best ways to keep kids active and entertained is with swimming.

The Mesa Swim Club Seadogs offers swimming groups for all interests and ages, from competitive and pre-competitive groups, to the Mermaid Program, which allows children and parents to have fun and get in a great workout, while wearing an adorable mono fin and tail.

"It's great exercise," coach Janine Simioni said of the Mermaid Program. "You can burn 2,000 calories in half an hour."

The competitive year round group meets six times a week and focuses on long-course swimming, 50 meters and up, during the summer, and short-course swimming during fall, winter and spring to prepare for the team's USA certified meets.

Those interested in joining the competitive group can prepare by entering the pre-competitive group first. Members of this group compete in non-official meets, and are able to choose how many times a week they would like to practice, up to five times.

"It shows them what competition is all about and what noncompetition is about," said Janine. "It's great exercise for the kids, and practices last from one to two hours."

The club incorporates fun into the practices and encourages participants to enjoy time with friends.

"We don't just swim," Janine said. "We do different kinds of relays, and we do fun water games with them."

Mesa Swim Club Seadogs also is a cost-effective way to get kids moving and having fun, with fees for some programs starting at just \$60 a month.

In addition to the mermaid program and the competitive groups, Mesa Swim Club Seadogs has a variety of other groups suited for different ages, ability levels and practice availability.

Mesa Swim Club Seadogs isn't just for kids, either. Adults and parents are welcome to get involved, not only in the Mermaid Program, but also in the Masters Program, which gives those over the age of 18 a place to open water swim, offering the opportunity to stay in shape and have fun with friends.

Valley residents also can go to Mesa Swim Club Seadogs for American Red Cross classes on CPR, first aid, lifeguarding and more.

Mesa Swim Club Seadogs has been operating for 16 years, and Janine has been teaching the entire time.

"I've been teaching for 16 years," she said. "It has been fun, and I love it."

The Mesa Swim Club offers programs at both the Skyline High School pool, as well as Red Mountain Ranch Country Club. Participants are able to register at any time, and they can stay involved all year long.

A retired school psychologist, Kathleen teamed with teachers to create safe, supportive and effective learning environments in schools in Mesa, Tempe and Scottsdale. The state's budget outlook has improved. The legislature must restore adequate funding to kindergarten through grade 12 education and our colleges and universities, driving economic growth by preparing a skilled workforce.

Kathleen believes the voters should have a choice on their ballots in November. They also should have the opportunity to vote for a candidate who shares the values of well-funded public schools and supports vulnerable children and teens, so they become responsible adults.

Glass containers are prohibited by law in the Lower Salt River Recreational Area and will be confiscated. Ice chests and coolers will be inspected for glass containers before boarding shuttle buses.

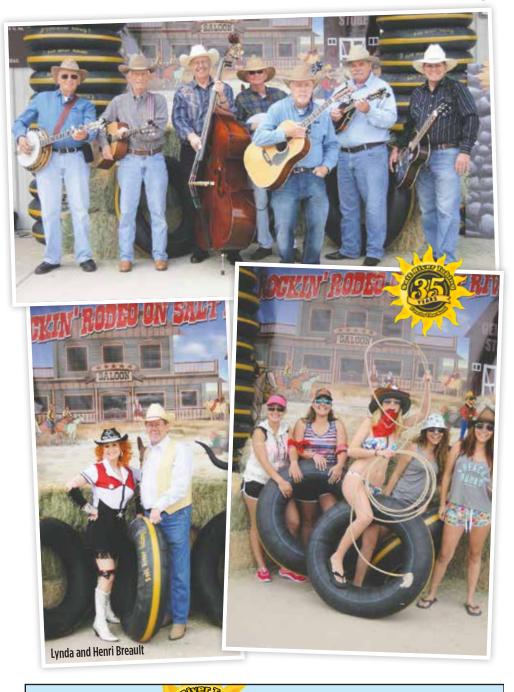
Have a great time on the Lower Salt River by responsibly appointing a designated driver before beginning your tubing adventure.

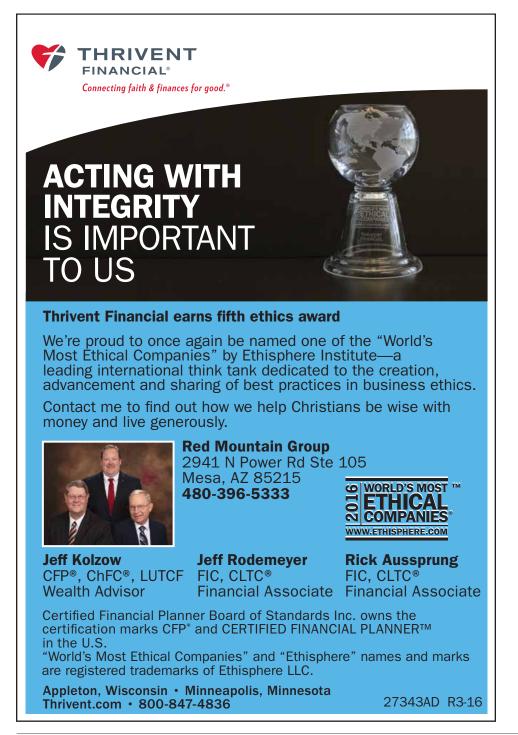
DON'T PASS UP FREE MONEY

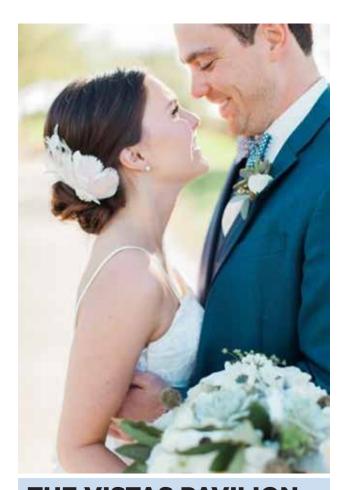

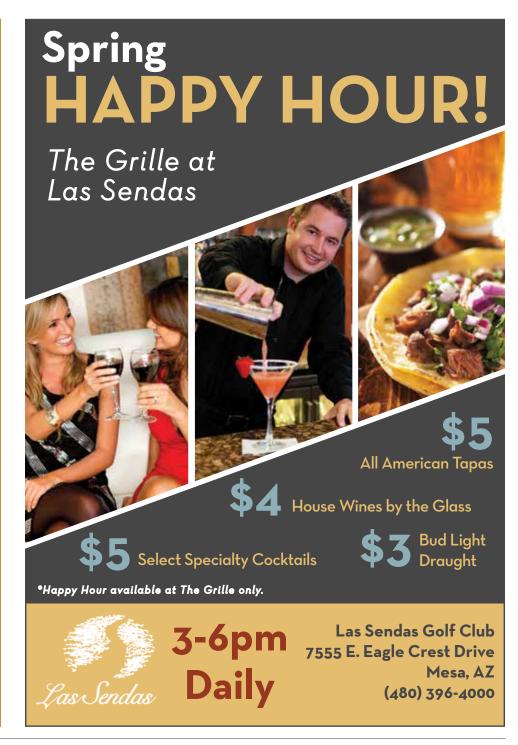

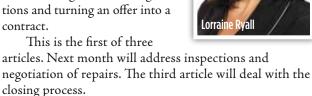
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BUYERS AND SELLERS SHOULD UNDERSTAND THE PURCHASE CONTRACT PART 1 OF 3

Thether you are the buyer or the seller, understanding the purchase contract is the first step to conducting successful negotiations and turning an offer into a contract.





Many different factors can drive the decision as to what price to offer. These include:

- If the home is over or under priced, which is based on the comps.
- The length of time it has been on the market.
- If you think there may be multiple offers, and how much you are willing to pay for the home.

NEGOTIABLE TERMS ON THE CONTRACT

Some terms of the contract can be negotiated when you are writing an offer to make yours the strongest and best one presented to the seller. The seller can then review your offer, accept it or counter it. In addition to changing the price, all the terms below can be negotiated when you are writing an offer.

Earnest deposit—This usually is at least 1 percent of the purchase price. However, if you want to make your offer stronger, the more you put down, the stronger your offer. The earnest deposit is completely refundable during the 10-day inspection period. Once the inspection period is over, and the

buyer and seller agree on repairs, the earnest becomes nonrefundable unless the home does not appraise for at least the contract price or the buyer can no longer qualify for the loan.

Down Payment—This really is going to depend on how much of a down payment you have and what type of loan you are going to use. For Federal Housing Administration, or FHA loans, the requirement is only 3.5 percent. While conventional starts at 5 percent, if you can put down 20 percent, you eliminate mortgage insurance. A buyer with a conventional loan with 20 percent down will look like a stronger offer to the seller than a buyer with a conventional loan with 5 percent down or an FHA. This really only matters, though, should there be multiple offers.

Close of Escrow—You will write the close of escrow date on which you want to close. Keep in mind the time your lender needs to close, such as 30 or 45 days. You also may want to add a few extra days to leave time for negotiations and counter offers. Your Realtor will help advise you on the timeframe needed to close.

Seller Concessions—A buyer can ask the seller to contribute toward the buyer's closing costs, which usually is stated in a percentage, such as 2 or 3 percent of the purchase price. Your Realtor will help you determine what percentage you will need to cover your closing costs. Remember, this will reduce the net to the seller. So, you may need to increase the purchase price if you are asking for the seller to pay your closing costs. This is a benefit to you if you don't have a lot of extra cash and would like to keep as much as possible.

If you are willing to pay \$350,000 but want the seller to contribute \$5,000 toward your closing costs, so you don't have to come out of pocket for the \$5,000 at closing, you may have to increase your purchase price to \$355,000. So, you still are paying the closing costs, just in the mortgage rather than cash out of pocket.

Inspection Period—The contract is set for a 10-day inspection period. This is the time for the buyer to carry out all their inspections and due diligence on the property. This inspection period can be changed when you are writing the offer. If you are trying to beat other offers, you may want to reduce this to 5 or 6 days, as long as you can get the inspections done within that timeframe. If you are out of state and want to be present for the inspection, you may need extra time. Therefore, you may want to extend it to 15 days.

Home Warranty—While the buyer will order a home warranty, it can be paid for by either the buyer or the seller. You can ask for the seller to pay for the warranty, and see if it is agreed to or countered. The result may depend on the strength of the offer you are submitting.

SELLER

All the above terms are negotiable, and you can counter back, changing any of them. If you want more of an earnest deposit, don't want to extend the inspection period, or need an extra week for closing, etc., these aspects can be changed in a counter offer.

All the negotiations are going to be based on the strength of the offer, the terms and conditions and if we are in a buyer's or seller's market or have multiple offers. This is why it is so important for both the buyer and seller to be represented by a good Realtor with strong negotiation skills.

company plans your trip, delivering you to hotels, restaurants and attractions—and you don't have to organize anything.

But how do you find the right tour, one fitting your age, activity level and preferences for lodging, dining and sightseeing? And what is the difference between the \$2,000 tour and the \$8,000 tour to the same place and on the same date?

Here are some tips:

DO YOUR RESEARCH

Travel agents can suggest tour companies to match your interests and demographics. Tour companies are members of United States Tour Operators Association (USTOA). At USTOA.com, the Find Your Dream Vacation widget lets you search by destination, tour company and activity. Talk to friends and relatives who have traveled to your destination.

KNOW WHAT IS INCLUDED IN THE PRICE

Most group tours cover hotels, guides and transportation to places on the itinerary and admission to attractions.

Usually, some or all meals are covered. Ask what types of meals are included. The larger the group, the harder it is to dine together in an intimate location.

Airfare is not included in the tour price, but it can be added. The biggest

cost factors are group size and type of accommodations.

Budget tours may save you money by reserving hotels outside of city limits. However, this makes it difficult to explore

Time of year affects price. Holidays and summers are usually more expensive. Fall is usually less expensive, unless your destination is New England, where fall foliage is a draw.

Unlike cruises, group tours rarely are discounted or have last minute specials. Booking well in advance may get you a discount.

TRAVELING SOLO

Solo travelers usually pay more because they are single occupants in hotels designed for two people.

Single supplements can raise tour prices anywhere from a few hundred dollars to a few thousand.

Some tour companies offer the option to share a room through a guaranteed share program.

BE FLEXIBLE

Some dates sell out quicker than others. So, have at least three dates in mind. Also, ask if the tour is a guaranteed departure. This means the tour will depart even if it is not full. Remember, tours can cancel if they do not have enough participants. Always purchase travel insurance. ■

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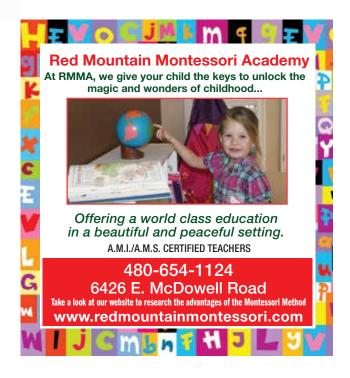


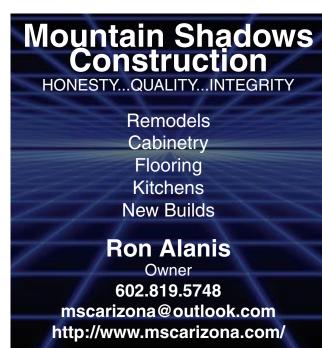
















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Lifestyles and Barn Doors Play Role in Real Estate Market

By John Karadsheh strong economy is what drives a strong real estate market. Recent statistics offer confirmation of what we are seeing on the ground first-time homebuyers and boomerang buyers are coming back to market. However, this month's real estate tidbits also



demonstrate the fact lifestyle plays a large role in the real estate market, as well.

- 1. Did you know Arizona's population increased by nearly 100,000 in 2015, compared to 77,925 in 2014? This uptick was largely the result of localized growth, as Maricopa County finished first in the nation for people moving in from other parts of the country.
- 2. In a new report by BBVA economists, Arizona has a zero percent chance of recession in the near term, and 2.5 percent growth is expected going forward. This is very positive, especially when you look at Wyoming, which has an expected 100 percent chance of recession.
- 3. These statistics complement the fact Arizona finally has recovered all of the jobs lost during the recession, and the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate is now at 5.4 percent.
- 4. After years of waiting, new production homebuilding suddenly has exploded. Unfortunately, labor shortages have slowed the speed at which these homes can be completed. Not only will this growth support jobs, but, from past experience, we also know it will boost the local economy as a whole. On the flip side, we anticipate the cost of new builds will continue to rise.
- 5. Bidding wars are becoming the new normal for listings under \$250,000. With an increasing number of firsttime homebuyers entering the market, and investors still dabbling, multiple offers have become a common scene in the lower price ranges.
- 6. The luxury market remains soft. In 2015, just 21 Mesa homes closed over \$1 million (Gilbert closed 19 and

Chandler closed 21). Through April 15 of this year, there have been three \$1 million plus homes that have closed in Mesa (again, on par with Gilbert and Chandler, which also have each had three \$1 million plus homes close so far in 2016). Consequently, this is great news for buyers. Most luxury customs on the market are listed below replacement cost and are a great value for the lot sizes, square footage, amenities and quality of construction.

- 7. According to a recent article in Bloomberg News, homes with barn doors, farmhouse sinks, subway tile and pendant lighting sell faster than homes without these features. Buyers definitely are looking for properties remodeled to current styles. So, if you are considering a remodel, look to HGTV's Fixer Upper for inspiration.
- 8. According to a Zillow study, homes near a Trader Joe's or Whole Foods appreciate faster than other properties. According to Zillow Group Chief Economist Stan

Humphries, "Like Starbucks, the stores have become an amenity in their own right—a signal to the homebuying public that the neighborhood they're located in is desirable, perhaps up-and-coming and definitely improving." While this news is perhaps not entirely good, given the fact we have neither a Whole Foods nor a Trader Joe's in Northeast Mesa, it does give us motivation to keep lobbying for more amenities.

So, after the first quarter of 2016, here is what we know. We are looking forward with confidence that our local economy will continue to grow upward for the next few years. We also think the best buys in the area remain in the price ranges over \$500,000. Lastly, we just bought a set of barn doors for our new offices. So, if you aren't sure about this trend, come by and check them out. ■

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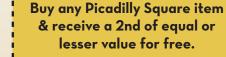

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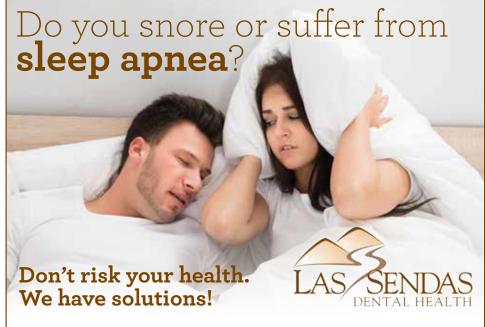

There was about \$9,000 of value in the

shoebox. The broken gold pieces had considerable scrap value, and the vintage diamond and Bakelite items brought top dollar due to condition and collector appeal.

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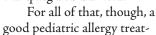


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There are options when dealing with allergies

By Stuart H. Agren, MD llergies affect nearly 40 percent of children, from babies on up. They can cause hay fever, asthma, eczema, hives and

coughing, as well as chronic ear and sinus infections. Food allergies can lead to nausea, gas, cramping and diarrhea.



ment can be hard to find. Allergy shots usually are not safe for kids under age 7. Medications can help temporarily, but they don't correct the underlying allergy. They also can cause side effects.

If your child has allergies, consider these options: **Avoidance**—To limit your child's exposure to allergens, restrict his time outdoors when pollens are high, and consider using HEPA filters at home. Keep rooms well ventilated, and use a dehumidifier to prevent mold. For dust allergies, launder bedding frequently, use mattress and pillow covers, and consider changing from carpet to hard flooring.

Be vigilant, but also be mindful that most allergy triggers are airborne and impossible to completely avoid. If avoidance measures are not helping, talk to your physician about the options below.

Medications—If your child's allergies only occur for a limited time, medications may be enough to keep the symptoms at bay. Inhalers can help with asthma, topical creams address eczema, and antihistamines are useful for hay fever. If your child's symptoms are severe, or if they last for more than four months per year, however, he may need something more. After all, medications don't touch the allergy itself—just the outward symptoms. So, once you stop the meds, the reactions usually resume.

Immunotherapy—Immunotherapy is the only treatment having been shown to stop future allergic reactions. In kids, it even has been shown to stop the progression of allergic rhinitis into asthma. Immunotherapy starts with

a liquid solution containing extracts of common pollens and other allergens. The liquid can be taken through allergy shots or under-the-tongue allergy drops (known as sublingual immunotherapy). Over time, the body develops an immunity to these allergens, so they no longer trigger an allergic response.

I favor sublingual immunotherapy drops for kids, since they avoid the pain and fear of needles. They also are safer than allergy shots, so they can be prescribed to children under 5 and dosed at home. Finally, unlike allergy shots, drops have been shown to curb food allergies, which are increasingly common for kids.

If allergies compromise your child's quality of life, there is hope. Contact a physician about an allergy solution.

Art Appreciation Plays a Role in Early Childhood Education

By Anjum Majeed, EdD 🕇 or children to develop a ◀ lifelong appreciation and love for the arts, they not only must be introduced to them, but beyond that, they also must be captivated by them.

When my first child was about 4 years old, my family had the opportunity to visit the Louvre Museum, in Paris, France. The Louvre Museum

houses some of the greatest works of art. Some are thousands of years old, while others are more recent.

Bewitched by the beauty of those masterpieces, I must have spent hours admiring those rare objects until we reached the room displaying one of the most famous paintings in the world. Excitedly, I picked up my daughter and said, "Shina, this is Mona Lisa." It was as if I were introducing a longtime dear friend of mine.

My daughter, exhausted from her jet lag, and having spent nearly a whole day at the museum, could barely say, "Mom, it is nice." Then, moments later, she politely added, "May we go back to our motel room? I am tired."

Imagine my dismay. In my attempt to expose my daughter to life's beauty, I neglected her basic needs of rest and sleep.

This story also shows an inherent flaw in teaching new material to children rather than teaching with them. The material may be important, and it may be interesting, but to really teach something, to make a difference in every child's life, one child at a time, the child's motivation is essential.

THE KEYS TO INTRODUCING ART TO YOUNG CHILDREN

When introducing art masterpieces to young children, we must consider at least three things.

First, we must take into account the various modalities of learning, which include auditory, visual and kinesthetic.



Second, for later recollection and appreciation of the art pieces, young children need to be actively involved in the process. For example, the physical act of movement helps later in the recall of the information.

Third, taking students' prior knowledge into consideration helps them understand and appreciate what they are seeing and discussing. Present new knowledge in context with something familiar.

Children have a great propensity to soak in large amounts of information from their surroundings. If the child is an auditory learner, use songs and read stories related to the artist and the work.

For the visual learners, the beauty of the colors, the shape and the structure of the painting are the attractions.

For the kinesthetic learners, activities, which include touching, doing and feeling activities, will facilitate learning and form the basis of long-term retention of information.

MOVING FROM SEEING TO EXPERIENCING

How do we develop an appreciation for the beauty surrounding us? A work of art can be an architectural structure of stone and concrete, a beautiful handcrafted piece of furniture, or a sunset painted with strong strokes and vibrant colors.

An artist creates a work of art expressing personal feelings and the ability to see differently from what may not be obvious to others. The artist may emphasize one aspect of a scene, such as the crashing waves crumbling the seemingly rigid rocks or mercilessly pounding the ship against the shore. As soon as artists emphasize one aspect of the view, they change the appearance slightly or a great deal. Art begins when the artists deviate from what may be obvious, sharing with the viewers how they feel and what they think of their subject.

The main component fostering the development of art appreciation is awareness. Awareness is referred to as the refined use of the sense and requires daily practice to perceive without prejudging. For developing awareness, individuals use their senses to gather raw data from the environment, excitedly participate in the new experiences and possess the capacity for empathy. A heightened sense of awareness enhances the capacity to process new information and see things in new relationships.

Children love to explore, investigate, poke and pry. Their natural curiosity to explore guides them to enrich their sense of awareness.

Many activities can lead to a richer sense of awareness. When we plant flower seeds, we can discuss with children the size, shape, the color and the texture of the seed. If planting in a planter, we can ask them to feel the soil. Was the soil wet or dry, warm or cold? How did the dirt smell as they let it crumble between their fingers? By active experience and questions, we are helping students develop their sense of awareness.

Another approach to enrich awareness is through empathy with the object. One becomes the object. For example, have them look at a tall tree. Have they thought about what it is like to be a tall tree? How does it feel when the wind constantly ruffles the leaves, the tree provides shade for the people from the intensity of the sun, or when the cold winter sets in and the tree may lose its leaves? How about if someone makes a home in the trunk of the tree to avoid the bitter cold of the winter?

INTERACTING WITH A MASTERPIECE

Works of art can open up new worlds for young students in literature, science, mathematics, music and more.

Van Gogh's The Starry Night is one of my favorite paintings to discuss with children. Ask questions. Do you think this scene looks warm or cold? Why? How do you feel when you look at this painting? What do you see in it? Which areas show movement? If you were looking for peace and quiet, where would you find it in this picture?

Here the thick and strong strokes give a sense of movement to the sky. The sky seems to be swirling, rolling and vibrating. Ask children to identify more familiar objects, such as the moon, the steeple of the church and the houses. To leave a lasting impression, ask them to express their feelings about this picture by using ribbons and sparklers and by moving to Tchaikovsky's 812 Overture. You also may sing a children's classic, Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star.

Campbell's Soup Can, by Andy Warhol, is another masterpiece I have used. Andy was a successful commercial artist. His goal of art was to produce a powerful, shocking image. What can we do with this print? We can develop pre-math skills by asking questions, such as which can is large and which is small?

We can have several actual cans and have the students count. They can fill several empty cans with different levels of water and investigate if they sound different. They can do a science float-sink test by using an empty can and a full can.

For the future architects and engineers, they can use empty cans or toy cans to build structures, a pyramid, a skyscraper or a can manufacturing plant. Finally, the chefs of tomorrow may hone their culinary skills by pretending to cook and serve tomato soup.

Preschool children will love the opportunity to observe, experience, imitate and even write about the works of art they are experiencing. To develop the whole child, art appreciation is an integral part of a quality preschool program. ■
