"Salt River Pirates is the second highest visitation day on the Lower Salt River during the summer," said Salt River Tubing President and Chief Executive Officer Henri Breault. "Everyone wants to be a pirate as they shoot the rocking rapids on the river. Our pirate-themed event endeavors to capture the attention of teens and their families and create a unique, memorable adventure in beautiful Tonto National Forest," he continued. "We hope our guests will return for multiple visits, and enjoy the natural wonders of the mini-Grand Canyon of our recreational paradise."

Launched on June 14, 2008, the pilot effort of National Get Outdoors Day was built on the success of the *More Kids in the Woods* and other important efforts to connect Americans—especially children—with nature and active lifestyles. The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Forest Service and the American Recreation Coalition agreed to lead an inclusive, nationwide effort, focusing on a single day when people would be inspired and motivated to get outdoors.

GO Day partnered with federal, state and local agencies, as well as key enthusiast organizations and recreation businesses to create a healthy, fun day of outdoor adventure aimed at reaching first-time visitors to public lands and reconnecting children to the outdoors.

Last year, 171 official GO Day sites across the nation welcomed thousands of new faces to the joy and benefits of the great outdoors.

Salt River Tubing operates in Tonto National Forest under permit of the USDA Forest Service.

The cost is only \$17 per person or tube, which includes tube rental, shuttle bus ride and free parking at Salt River Tubing.

TUBING TIPS

- Children must be 8 years old or older and at least 4 feet tall for tube rental and shuttle bus service.
- Glass containers are prohibited by law in the Lower Salt River Recreational Area and will be confiscated. Ice chests and coolers will be inspected for glass containers before boarding shuttle buses.
- Have a great time on the Lower Salt River by responsibly appointing a designated driver before beginning your tubing adventure.
- Drugs, alcohol and the Salt River do not mix. Play it safe, and just don't do it.
- Daily hours of operation are from 9 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., with weather and water flow permitting. Salt River Tubing is open seven days a week.

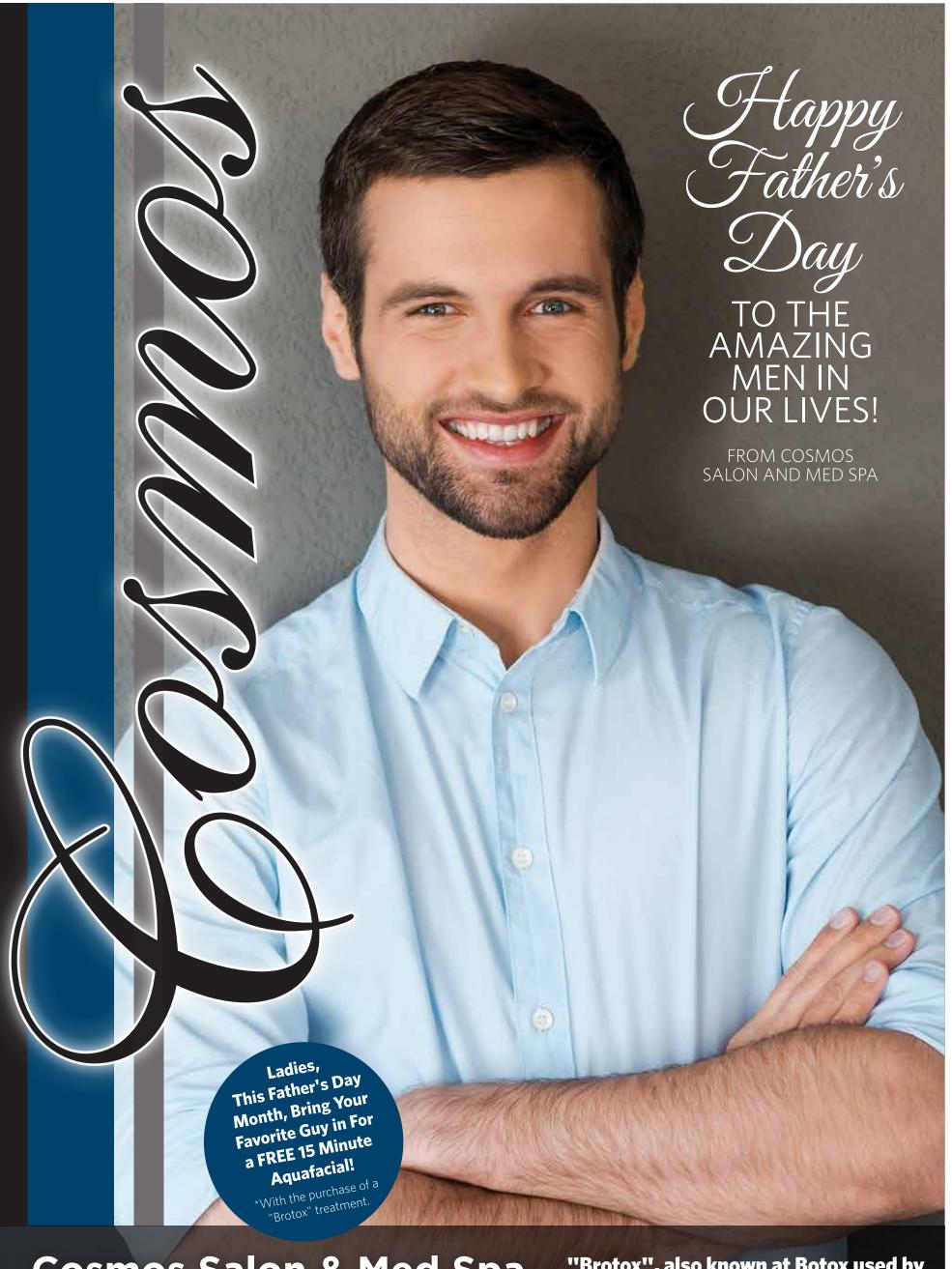

ith Fathers' Day fast approaching, thoughts of that perfect gift for Dad becomes foremost.

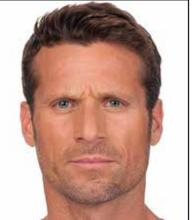

The team earned the spot in nationals after taking first place in the Arizona Real World Design Challenge Governor's Challenge.

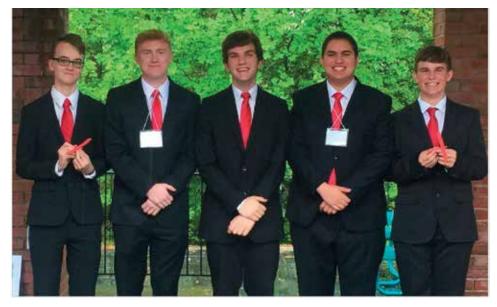

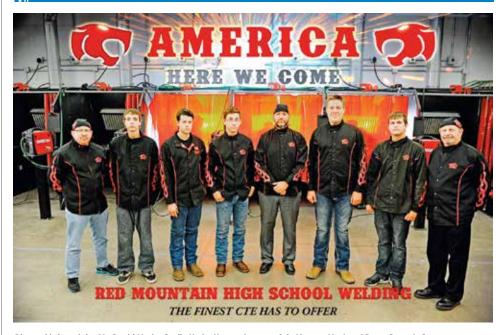
The Red Mountain team did an excellent job, taking third place behind Connecticut and Massachusetts.

▼he Red Mountain Welding Team finished the season with another impressive showing in the Mesa Public Schools Best in the West statewide competition, winning second place.

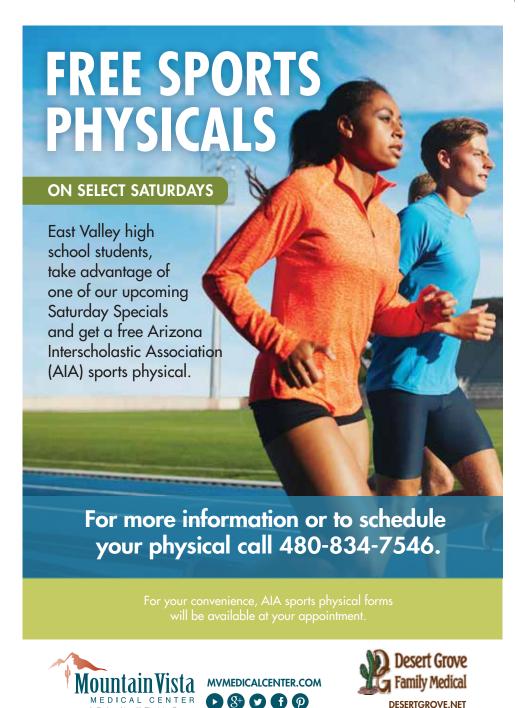

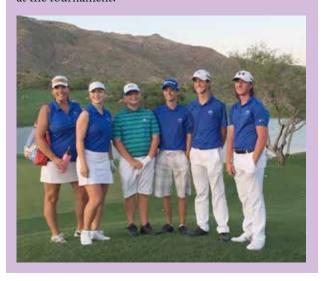

BUYING AND SELLING A HOME

INSPECTIONS AND NEGOTIATION OF REPAIRS PART 2 OF

nce the offer has been accepted and any counters are fully executed by all parties associated with the buying and selling of a home, you are in the inspection period.

Unless stated otherwise, it is a 10-day inspection period, and the days start from the date the

contract or the last counter was accepted.

The inspection period is for the buyers, at their expense, to conduct any desired physical, environmental and other types of inspections or investigations to determine the value and condition of the property. The buyers usually will have a home inspection and a termite inspection done, and also should take this time period to look into any other material facts deemed important, such as close by airports, crime rate, etc.

At the time the offer is written, the buyers also will receive the Buyer Advisory. The advisory is designed to make the home buying process as smooth as possible. Some of the more common issues the buyers may decide to investigate or verify are summarized in this valuable resource. It's a great source of information and lists useful websites and tips.

INSPECTION

The home inspection and termite inspection usually are done at the same time. The inspection takes several hours, and the buyers will meet the inspector and their Realtor at the property for the last 30 minutes. This gives the inspector the opportunity to go over his findings and anything he feels needs to be pointed out to the buyers.

The inspection report can be very detailed and overwhelming. So, having the opportunity to go over it with the inspector at the time of inspection and have him point out any areas of concern is a great benefit. If I have out-of-town buyers who cannot be present for the inspection, I will arrange for us to Face Time or Skype, so they still have the opportunity to go through the house and ask the inspector any questions.

Once the buyers receive the inspection report, usually within 24 hours, they will go through it and decide which items to ask the seller to repair. The inspection is not for the buyers to nitpick every little item, but to ask the seller to fix those items of personal concern or of importance.

SELLER'S PROPERTY DISCLOSURE STATEMENT (SPDS)

This is a form the sellers complete whereby they disclose any material facts about the property known to them, such as if there have been any water leaks, the names of the utility companies, if they are aware of any noise issues, etc. It must be delivered to the buyer within the first five days after contract acceptance. As a seller, it is very important to answer all questions as truthfully and as thoroughly as possible.

INSURANCE HISTORY

The sellers will provide the buyer a five-year insurance claims history within five days after contract acceptance. The sellers can call their insurance company, and it is usually emailed within 24 hours.

BUYER'S INSPECTION PERIOD AND SELLER'S RESPONSE (BINSR)

The buyer will fill out the Buyer's Inspection Notice and Seller's Response (BINSR), and request any items to be repaired by the seller. The BINSR has to be delivered to the seller prior to the expiration of the inspection period, and as soon as it is delivered, the inspection period ends. If it is not submitted within the specific timeframe, the buyer is agreeing to move forward without any repairs being done.

Warranted items—Per the terms of the contract, the seller is obligated to have all warranted items in working condition. Warranted items include heating, cooling, mechanical, plumbing, electrical, free-standing range/oven and built-in appliances.

Once the BINSR has been submitted to the seller, the seller has five days to respond. Warranted items are nonnegotiable. However, all other items are negotiable, and a lot will depend on the purchase price and how many repairs are being requested.

If the buyer is paying full price and only asking for major items to be repaired, the seller is more inclined to agree to it. If the purchase price was lower than expected, or there are a lot of disapproved items, the seller may choose to only fix a few of them. This is where some contracts fall apart. So, it's very important to have a Realtor with strong negotiation skills represent you. Oftentimes, it's not black and white and requires some creative negotiating.

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Know How to Select the Right Vehicle Tire

Thile every driver, no doubt, has purchased tires for a vehicle at one time or another, not everyone knows how to buy the correct tire. Generally, we count on the person selling us the tires to install the correct ones. Unfortunately, this is not always

Every manufacturer will place a tire decal on the driver's doorframe. Contained on the decal is the recommended tire size, and, in most cases, the weight and speed rating. This information also is imbedded on the sidewall of the tire. When purchasing tires, these specifications should be taken into account for the replacement tires.

Let's break down this example tire—P245/40R18 93W. The letter P indicates it is a passenger car tire. You also may find the letters LT to signify light truck or the letter T, which stands for a temporary spare. The next number, in this case, 245, is the measurement across the width of the tread surface in millimeters. Basically, this is how wide the tire is. This is important because it is dangerous to put on a tire that is either too wide or too thin for the rim size.

The next number, 40, is the aspect ratio of the sidewall height compared to the width of the tire. In this case, the sidewall height is 40 percent of the tread width, or 98 mm. The lower the number, the thinner the sidewall will be. Thinner sidewalls will make the car not absorb road imperfections as well because the material will need to be stiffer to support the vehicle's weight.

The letter R will be found on almost every tire because it stands for radial construction. Some of you may remember the days of bias ply tires, which used to have a D code. There also used to be ZR, which indicated a high speed radial, but this is seldom used any more.

Our next number, 18, is the diameter of the rim the tire will fit. This will mostly be a whole number, but there are some specialty rims, which are an extra half-inch, as in

The final set of digits, 93W, will signify the weight and speed rating of the tire. This example has a weight

rating of 1,433 pounds, and the speed is 168 miles per hour. So, the four tires on the vehicle will support a vehicle weight of roughly 5,700 pounds.

There also is other information stamped into the sidewall of the tire. Additional data includes the maximum pressure the tire can hold safely. However, the tire pressure you should keep in the tire also is found on the placard in the doorjamb of your specific vehicle.

Another number on the tire is the Department of Transportation (DOT) code. This is the code supplied to the DOT to indicate the tire's specifications. It also includes the tire-manufactured date as the last four digits. If the last four digits are 2815, this means the tire was made in the 28th week of the year 2015. You want to avoid buying tires more than two years old. The reason being the rubber will dry rot in about five to six years, and you may not get the full tread life out of them before they become cracked and unsafe.

Now, to make things even more confusing, replacement tires will have a tread wear, traction and weather rating. These factors also will need to be considered when making your decision.

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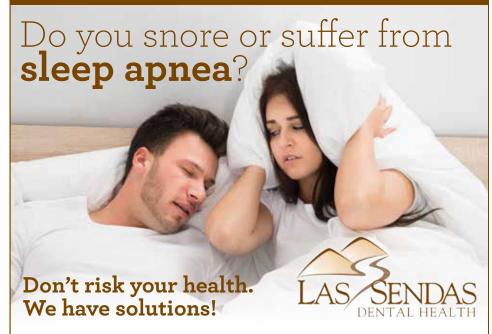
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These Mesa Schools Are Among the Best

Tor the second year in a ◀ row, Mesa Public Schools has nine schools among Arizona's best kindergarten through grade 12 public schools.

Brinton, Las Sendas, Taft and Whitman elementary schools, and Summit Academy, Shepherd and Smith junior high

schools, as well as Mountain View and Westwood high schools join the elite legacy of schools to have received the A+ School of Excellence award from the Arizona Educational Foundation (AEF).

To earn an A+ award, schools must show high achievement or significant improvement. Top schools identify and meet the needs of their students. Schools hold their title for 3.5 years. Mesa currently has 23 schools having earned the A+ School of Excellence designation.

"Schools earning the A+ designation go above and beyond expectations when it comes to the needs of students, staff and the entire community," said Bobbie O'Boyle, AEF executive director. "They demonstrate overall excellence through a written application and rigorous site visit by a team of school leaders from across Arizona."

THE ROAD TO EXCELLENCE

The application process is lengthy and encompasses a detailed description of things that happen at a school on a daily basis. Pat Estes, principal at Brinton Elementary School, says her school submitted a 58-page final document, which was reviewed by AEF and found to be of high quality, allowing Brinton to move on to a site visit.

"Reflecting on the writing and submitting of the A+ application, the Brinton community has been reminded of how we are rewarded every day by what we do for our students," Pat stated. information is reviewed, and AEF determines if a school is deemed excellent.

VALIDATING SCHOOLS PROGRAMS

Since its inception six years ago, Summit Academy has provided exceptional choices for students through the International Baccalaureate and Advancement Via Individual Determination, or AVID, programs. Students perform well on academic assessments, and they have an engaged community.

Principal Mark Andrews explained community support is evident in their enrollment.

"Summit's student population is nearly 50 percent open enrollment, which means half of our students come from outside of our neighborhood boundaries to be a part of our school," Mark explained. "Parents want their children at Summit Academy because we have a high parent approval rating, outstanding PTO turnouts and extracurricular events, and the A+ recognition validates everyone's collective efforts."

Since 1983, AEF has honored each A+ School of Excellence by giving recognition to remarkable Arizona public schools. Each of this year's 40 awardwinning schools receives \$500 and an A+ School of Excellence banner. 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Falcon Field Offers Valuable Features

It is a source of embarrassment to live just three miles from Falcon Field and know so little about it, but Dee Ann Thomas, marketing and communications manager, is making sure more people are aware of the facility.

Dee Ann recently spoke at the Red Mountain Ranch Social Club, offering valuable information about the field's past and present.

DEE ANN'S PRESENTATION

Falcon Field began operations in 1941 as a flight-training base for the British Royal Air Force and U.S. Army Air Corps pilots. Following World War II, the U.S. government deeded it to the City of Mesa, and, in 1948, the facility became a public-use general aviation airport.

Today, Falcon Field sits on 784 acres of land with parallel runways of 5,100 and 3,800 feet. Currently, 750 aircraft are based here, and there are more than 90 businesses providing more than 1,000 jobs. A couple of the businesses are MD Helicopters, with 250 employees, and CAE Oxford Aviation Academy, the world's largest flight training school, with 180 employees. The well-known Commemorative Air Force Arizona Wing Aviation Museum is here, with a collection of combat aircraft flown by all of our U.S. military services and selected aircraft of other nations.

Most other businesses are related to flying in some way, including a wing and helicopter maintenance and overhaul service, hangar sales and leasing, aircraft charter and tours, aerial photography, painting, repair and installation of radio and instrument equipment, and design and installation of aircraft interiors, to name a few. Another interesting business is a classic car parts store.

This airport is one of six large airports in the Valley helping to relieve congestion at Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport and Mesa Gateway Airport. In 2015, it was the fifth busiest general aviation airport in the U.S.

Recent improvements include a recently renovated terminal building, runway guard lights, landing aids and ramp pavement rehabilitation. Federal Aviation Administration personnel manage the tower. Police aviation planes are based here, and flights include medical and humanitarian services, fire control and search and rescue missions.

The Army Aviation Heritage Foundation, a non-profit organization, is located here with 170 members dedicated to presenting the Army Aviation story through patriotic flying presentations and displays of historic aircraft and equipment. Anyone can join them for a \$48 one-year membership fee.

Falcon Field is self-sustaining. While eligible for state and federal grants, our tax dollars are not used here. The City of Mesa operates the airport like a business, with the income being used for airport expenses and capital improvement projects. The operating budget for 2015-2016 is \$41.7 million.

If you are interested in seeing for yourself and learning more, the Falcon Warbirds, located at 4626 E. Fighter Aces Drive, offer a fly-in pancake breakfast. The breakfast is open to the public, from October through May, on the third Saturday of the month, from 8 to 11 a.m. The price is \$8 per person.

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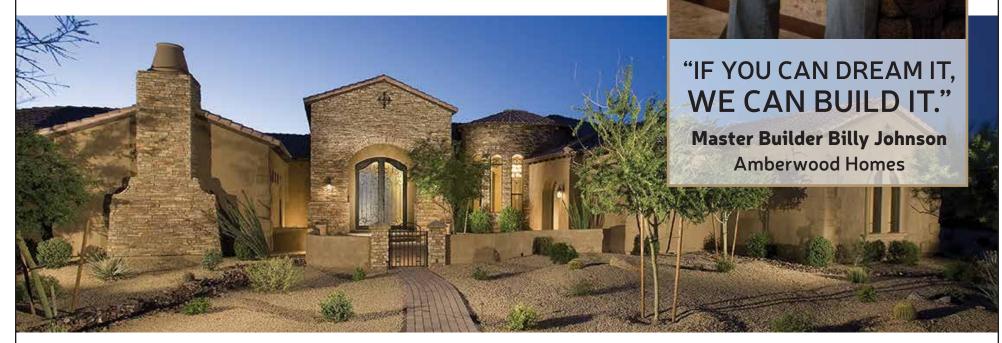


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
