

If you have a desire to learn new things and meet new people, New Frontiers for Lifelong Learning, a peer-led, self-directed organization of more than 300 members, operating under the auspices of Mesa Community College (MCC), may be the answer.

Opportunities for intellectual and cultural growth happen by joining interactive study groups about spirit guides, language play, Haiti, Tuscany and the national debt. TED talks include information presented and discussed about the brain, consciousness, health care, leadership, online videos, philanthropy and social change. Other topics include dysfunction of the American political system, defining your legacy, music, book reviews and more.

Social activities include luncheons, tours, traveling, plays, board and card games and concerts. Many members volunteer on the MCC campuses and in the community in many ways. A MCC student ID card gives members discounts on campus and in the community.

Classes meet on the MCC campuses at Southern Ave. and Dobson Road; McKellips and Power roads; Mesa Active Adult Center, at 247 N. Macdonald St.; and Red Mountain Active Adult Center, at 7550 E. Adobe Road, as well as other locations in Mesa.

Before each spring and fall semester, an open house is held for interested individuals to learn about the organization and meet the teachers and facilitators who are New Frontiers members. Not all teachers are members.

The next open house will take place on Friday, Sept. 9, on the fourth floor of the Downtown Center, located at 145 N. Centennial Way, from 1 to 3 p.m. Park in the parking garage on the second and third levels only. An elevator and stairway lead to the fourth floor.

After paying \$80 per year, members can register for as many classes as their schedules will allow. A few classes require materials at a fee. Those fees will be collected in the class.

The open house will be a time to join and pay the \$80 after learning about the group. Registration for classes will take place starting on Tuesday, Sept. 20, by computer only, if the fee is paid. For those who do not have computers or a friend with one, arrangements will be made. Those arrangements will be explained at the time of the open house.

Help your child develop lasting friendships

It is the start of a new school year for Mesa Public Schools, and the first weeks of school are an exciting time for children.

Discovery, learning and making friends are a few of the valuable parts of school. While students are off to a great social start, some children need guidance establishing a set of close friends.

"Developing friendships builds self-esteem," said Libby Sluder, Title I ESEA specialist. "It teaches children important behaviors, such as empathy, trust building, communications skills and conflict resolution strategies. These are behaviors and skills they will use their entire lives."

Libby shares tips with parents to help their children navigate the friendship waters.

- Practice listening with warmth and understanding.
 Raising children in a calm, consistent manner, where
 the focus is on open communication and emotional
 support, fosters a strong self-worth and social skills.
- Be a friendship coach. Talk with your child about how to make friends. Role-play things to say when meeting someone new, and teach him how to handle conflict appropriately. Be patient with your reserved child who may need to take baby steps when making friends.
- Take them with you. Children often learn how to make friends by modeling what parents do and say. Have conversations about taking turns when talking, actively listening and being respectful.
- Provide opportunities. Schedule play dates and activities allowing your child to interact with new friends, practice social skills and develop interests in

a fun, relaxed setting. If your child tends to be shy, choose noncompetitive activities and arrange shorter

 Teach empathy. Today's technology replaces some faceto-face conversations, making it difficult for children to learn empathy. This may affect their ability to make and keep friends. Volunteering, helping others and expressing how situations make us feel builds empathy. It also encourages children to apologize and have important conversations in person. ■

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

PROBLEM.

Salt River Tubing operates in Tonto National Forest under permit of the USDA Forest Service.

The cost of tube rental is only \$17 per person or tube, which includes tube rental, shuttle bus ride and free parking at the Salt River Tubing Terminal Building. As a security deposit, one valid driver's license is required for every five tubes rented. Tubing passes are valid on return visit.

The latest tube rental is 2 p.m.—weather and water flow permitting. The last shuttle bus pickup is 6:30 p.m.


TUBING TIPS

- Children must be 8 years old or older and at least 4 feet tall for tube rental and shuttle bus service.
- Children, non-swimmers and inexperienced swimmers should wear life vests.
- Glass containers are prohibited by law in the Lower Salt River Recreational Area and will be confiscated. Ice chests and coolers will be inspected for glass containers before boarding shuttle buses. Please bring plastic or can beverage containers.
- Drink one to two bottles of water per hour while floating.
- Have a great time celebrating Madcap Mardi Gras Magic by appointing a designated driver before your tubing adventure.
- Play it safe—drugs, alcohol and the Salt River do not mix. Just don't do it.
- Daily hours of operation are from 9 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., with weather and water flow permitting. Salt River Tubing is open seven days a week.
- Salt River Tubing is located in beautiful Tonto National Forest, just seven minutes from Highway 202 East and Power Road Exit 23A.

Market Update: Summer Real Estate Market Remains Strong

Thile we all are accustomed to the summer months being slow in the real estate market, with a lot of sellers taking their homes off the market during June, July and August, this year,

June remained strong and, in some areas, had the highest monthly sales year-to-date.

The Cromford Report data shows the Maricopa County Recorder processed 10,285 residential sales deeds in June (single family and condo), which is the highest monthly total since August 2006. Resales accounted for 88 percent, while 12 percent were new homes.

Median prices continue to increase, with \$229,000 the latest number, but a large part of that is due to the fall off in low-end volume, caused by the very short supply of homes for sale.

The ranges from \$200,000 to \$350,000 saw strong

growth in closed sales over June last year—up almost 19 percent. Between \$350,000 and \$400,000, we saw a little weakness, down 2 percent, but sales from \$400,000 all the way up to \$1.5 million were strong—up an impressive 21 percent. Sales over \$1.5 million were very much weaker than last year—down 44 percent. Sales below \$175,000 also were well down, but this was caused by a lack of supply. The segment over \$1.5 million cannot use that excuse. There are plenty of homes available, even though a large number have been removed from the market for the summer. Many of these are likely to be relisted at the end of September.

At first sight, it looks as though pricing was strong during June, with the median sales price up 2.2 percent from last month. However, this is deceiving because the average home price only rose 0.3 percent, and the average home size jumped 1.3 percent, from 1,978 in May, to 2,004 in June. The average price, per square foot, retreated 1 percent over the month, and we see this as a more accurate measure than the median sales price.

We expect overall prices to be flat to slightly lower over the next three months, as luxury homes make a smaller contribution when the temperatures exceed 100 degrees. Prices still are rising below \$200,000 and falling for most homes over \$1 million.

Dollar volume in June was a healthy \$2,529 billion, up 7 percent from June 2015, with about half of that coming from higher sales volume and the rest from higher pricing.

LUXURY MARKET

The main difference we saw between May and June was an improvement in demand for homes in the lower ranges of the luxury market, between \$500,000 and \$1.5 million. In particular:

- \$500K-\$600K saw an increase of 30% in dollars spent (compared with June 2015)
- \$600K-\$800K saw an increase of 20% in dollars spent • \$800K-\$1M saw an increase of 24% in dollars spent

- \$1M-\$1.5M saw an increase of 27% in dollars spent
- There is a big contrast above \$1.5M:
- \$1.5M-\$2M saw an increase of 2%
- \$2M-\$3M saw a decrease of 41% + \$3M and over saw a decrease of 61%



Economic Growth Plus Jobs Equals Higher Property Values

By John Karadsheh **T**e are always watching property values, and, in doing so, we also watch closely how Mesa and the State of Arizona are developing economically.

The Kauffman Foundation recently ranked Arizona third in the U.S. for entrepre-



neurial growth. Also, Kiplinger has predicted Arizona will experience the second fastest job growth in the U.S., at a rate of 3.2 percent.

The economic growth of our city and state are key contributors to the demand for housing. Here are some of the highlights for the first half of 2016:

- Santander Consumer USA opened in Mesa, bringing 970 jobs to the Fiesta District over the next three years.
- Dexcom, a global medical device company, will be bringing their operations to Mesa, adding 500 jobs and \$100 million of capital investment over the next
- In the first half of 2016, 928,389 square feet of space has been built/absorbed in Mesa, and the capital investment has been more than \$183 million.
- Major League Baseball Spring Training set new attendance records, with the Chicago Cubs and Oakland Athletics drawing more than 300,000 baseball fans to Mesa.
- Higher education continues to thrive in Mesa. Benedictine University recently became a member of the California Pacific Conference as a Division II school, in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, and is adding more sports programs. A.T. Still University is growing

and looking to add a 122,000-square-foot academic building. In addition, pending voter approval, Arizona State University will be adding a dynamic new campus to downtown Mesa.

- Dana Park, at Val Vista Drive and Baseline Road, is on track for a \$100 million expansion, featuring 70,000 square feet of new retail and dining space, a 260- to 320-unit multifamily residential complex, a movie theater, a six-story hotel and 153,000 square feet of new office space.
- Mesa's Boeing facility was awarded a \$1.5 billion contract to remanufacture 117 Apaches and a second contract for \$667.5 million to produce Apaches for Qatar.
- · Phoenix-Mesa Gateway Airport continues to see solid growth, and is striving to recruit more major carriers. Allegiant Airlines is expected to add more than 100,000 additional passengers per year, with newly added routes to Fresno, California; Memphis, Tennessee; Des Moines, Iowa; and Sonoma County, California.

What does all this mean for the Mesa and Phoenix

Ingo Winzer, a contributor at *Forbes.com*, predicts Phoenix will see property values increase by "at least 25 percent over the next three years."

He explains, "The strongest economic growth, and, therefore, strongest demand for housing, is in Phoenix, where jobs are being added at twice the national rate."



Screening for Heart Blocks Plays Important Role

Have you ever wondered if your family history plays a role in your own personal cardiovascular health? Do you experience chest pain or leg pain while walking or while at rest?

KNOW THE FACTS/UNDERSTAND THE RISK

Peripheral vascular disease (PAD) is a very common condition. It involves the large and medium sized arteries supplying blood to the legs, which can become narrowed or clogged, constricting the flow of blood. This condition occurs when the blood vessels supplying blood to the limbs and other organs of our body are partially or completely blocked due to plaque buildup.

Plaque generally forms out of the substances present in blood, such as fat, cholesterol, calcium and fibrous tissue, and the plaque deposits gradually harden, narrowing down the arteries. This narrowing limits the oxygen-rich blood supply to the various parts of your body, mostly affecting the blood vessels and the arteries of the legs.

Common symptoms include:

- + Pain during exercise, which is relieved during rest.
- Discoloration of the skin, predominantly in arms and/
- · Pain and muscle cramps in the legs while walking, climbing stairs (intermittent claudication).
- · Cold legs, feet, sensation of the skin.
- · Constant leg pain, tingling, burning or loss of sensation.
- Poor leg wound healing.
- · Sores on toes and feet, which become difficult to heal.
- · Numbness, weakness or heaviness of muscles.

Peripheral vascular disease (PVD/PAD) screenings help in early detection of atherosclerosis (blockage) of the arteries. When detected early enough, this condition can be well maintained. Our screening involves painless and non-invasive testing, which may include:

- Comprehensive medication review.
- · Comprehensive medical and family history.
- + Leg pain assessment.
- · Blood pressure analysis.
- · Body mass index.
- · Cholesterol/Lipid panel.
- Blood glucose index.

- · Heavy alcohol consumption.
- · Diabetes Mellitus.
- + High blood pressure.
- + High blood cholesterol.
- · Lack of exercise.
- Family history. ■

einforcing the creativity gene is an important aspect of Self Development Academy's curriculum. Because Scratch also is interactive, teachers and students can access and comment on student work as it progresses. "This gives helpful, real-time feedback for students as they work through problems together," explained Ms. Meyer.

Self Development Academy students will have coding opportunities to create animation games connected to the curriculum. What an engaging way to stimulate the *creative gene* among Self Development Academy students.

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


Keep you and your vehicle cool this summer

hile Arizona summers are pretty toasty, to say the least, here are some tips to help you and your vehicle cope with our hot weather.

How to cool off the interior of your vehicle quickly:

- 1. Open your windows to let the hot air out. A closed car can reach temperatures above 160 degrees. So, let that very hot air out after starting your car by opening the windows for at least a minute.
- 2. Start off your climate control using fresh air not recycled. Again, this is done because the cabin air will be much hotter than the outside temperature. This will help the conditioned air cool down faster. After a couple minutes, you can switch over to recycled air to continue cooling off the cabin.
- 3. Keep fan speed mid-range, not on high. Lower air volume will allow the air to get colder faster.
- 4. When possible, park with the dashboard facing away from the sun. A hot dash is your biggest nemesis to having cool air because the dash heats it up as it passes through it. If you have to park toward the sun, use a windshield shade. As a bonus, you also will be able to hold the steering wheel without oven mitts.
- 5. Tint your windows even if you have dark glass. The film not only shades the cabin, but it has UV protection,



During the summer, it is critical for your engine cooling system to be working properly. You want to make sure the system is full of fresh coolant. If your coolant is older than five years, it is time to change it. Coolant loses its protective qualities over time. We recommend using a multi-vehicle coolant, which usually is yellow in color.

If your vehicle uses Dexcool, we recommend changing it out with the yellow coolant within the first three years. Deco, which

does not handle air contamination very well, will start to solidify, causing cooling system failure. Never fill your cooling system with plain water. If your cooling system becomes diluted, corrosion will form and ruin the system.

Always address cooling system leaks immediately. A small leak can lead to expensive engine repairs quickly when not resolved in a timely manner. If your engine temperature reaches the unsafe range, stop your engine as fast as you can. Driving just one extra mile with an overheated engine can spell disaster.

You also need to make sure your cooling fans are working properly. The fans not only ensure your engine keeps cool, but they also work in conjunction with the air conditioning system to keep you comfortable, as well.

Now is a great time to replace your wiper blades. Our hot dry weather basically has baked the rubber onto the windshield. So, when you do want to use them, they either rip or streak the glass as they wipe. Our monsoons show up without notice. So, be prepared with a fresh set of blades.
