These awards reflect the combined opinions of more than 5


million restaurant reviews submitted by verified OpenTable diners for more than 20,000 restaurants in all 50 states and the District of Columbia.

MORTGAGE INDUSTRY CHANGES COULD AFFECT BORROWERS

re you a transactor or a revolver when it comes to your credit?

Although you may have never heard these terms, when it comes to your credit, they are about to become very important and will impact how millions of Americans qualify for a mortgage.

Starting this September, Fannie Mae's automated underwriter system will begin to analyze and weigh risk based on a person's payment history on his credit cards. In theory, there are going to be two different borrowers, a transactor or a revolver.

Transactor—This is the person who pays off his credit cards and other debts each month or makes more than the minimum required payment.

Revolver—This is the person who makes the minimum monthly payments on his credit cards and subsequently, pays interest on the balances.

Until now, mortgage lenders had difficulty distinguishing revolvers from transactors, but that is about to change. Two of the three national credit bureaus, namely Equifax and TransUnion, will supply two years worth of continuous, month-by-month data on the credit management patterns of millions of mortgage applicants.

This should prove especially important for consumers who might not qualify for mortgages because their credit reports contain too little information to generate credit scores. Many of these would-be purchasers are first-timers or millennials just starting out on their careers. Others are individuals who simply do not make much use of credit, but now need a mortgage.

Fannie Mae is now going to be able to distinguish between these two types of borrowers. As a general rule, according to Eric Rosenblatt, Fannie's vice president of credit risk analysis and modeling, the new system will "benefit borrowers who regularly pay off revolving debt"

and should "provide more creditworthy borrowers access to mortgage credit." Transactors will reap the benefits, while revolvers will get more scrutiny.

Here is a scenario to show how this change will have a positive impact on a transactor who previously may have had a lower credit score.

Mary has a credit card with a \$5,000 limit. She only has the one credit card

and uses it all the time. This was her first card and the limit still is very small relative to her income, as she has never asked for the limit to be increased as her income increased. She makes \$300,000 a year, and spends about \$4,500 a month on her card, but pays the balance off each month.

Joe has five credit cards with a total of \$25,000 credit limit. He only makes \$24,000 and has a total of \$5,000 credit card debt. He only pays the minimum due on his cards, but has never been late or missed a payment.

Mary has a utilization rate of 90 percent because she has used \$4,500 of her available \$5,000 credit. Joe has utilized only 20 percent. Mary pays no interest, and has a monthly credit card balance that is less than 2 percent of income. Joe has debt that is 21 percent of his gross income, and he pays a lot of interest.

Clearly, Mary is a much better credit risk than Joe. However, all else being equal, Mary would much likely have a much worse credit score because of her high utilization rate compared to Joe. The new Fannie Mae underwriting now will be able to see these patterns and use this data, which will have a positive impact for transaction borrowers.

Experts in the credit industry consider the upcoming move by Fannie Mae to be a major advance in fairer credit. According to Terry Clemans, executive director of the National Consumer Reporting Association, it amounts to

"the biggest change to the mortgage credit report in nearly a quarter of a century."

Only Fannie Mae is implementing this approach. So, a borrower who would be considered a revolver could just go to Freddie Mac instead of Fannie Mae for a loan. However, Freddie Mac is evaluating whether to adopt a similar approach, according to a spokesman.

The bottom line is:

If you are a transactor—Fannie Mae might be a better lender for you, as they have the ability to use this data and possibly offer better terms than lenders without it.

If you are a revolver—For now, Freddie Mac may be a better lender. So, make sure whichever mortgage company you use can offer loans by both Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac. You also need to be aware of the fact how you manage your credit could now become a key determining factor associated with securing a mortgage.

HOME INSPECTIONS ARE IMPORTANT BUYING PR

So often, buyers get caught up in the design, décor or location of the property, but they don't really stop and consider the mechanical and structural elements of the house.



Thankfully, the Arizona Association of Realtors purchase contract is designed specifically to prioritize inspections and provide buyers with a 10-calendar-day inspection period. During this period, we strongly recommend our buyers hire a licensed home inspector to evaluate the home, so they really understand what they are buying.

During the home inspection, the inspector evaluates all systems of the house, from the air conditioner and roof, to the window seals and shut-off valves under the

Some items called out in the inspection are considered warranted items and are required by the purchase contract to be in working condition. Buyers still can ask for nonwarranted items to be repaired, but the repair of those items becomes a point of negotiation between the buyer and seller.

While negotiating a purchase agreement often can be sticky, the inspection negotiation is often the tensest part of the buying/selling process. Many agents turn this negotiation over to a *closing assistant*, but we feel this is the most important time to strongly advocate for our clients. If the inspection does not meet with the buyer's approval, the buyer can request the seller to make repairs or the buyer can withdraw from the contract without losing his earnest money.

Naturally, every buyer wants a perfect house, and every seller thinks his home is perfect. The reality usually

lies somewhere in the middle. If, as a seller, you have been deferring maintenance with the thought of selling before having to spend money on repairs, you probably will find the inspection negotiation to be a bit challenging and/or costly. On the flip side, if you regularly take care of your home, your inspection process will likely be smoother.

So, what if I am not buying? Do I still need a home inspection? Well, again, you don't know what you don't know. I just had a home inspection on my house, and learned so many things about my home of which I was not aware. It is a great way to stay on top of your home's maintenance and also anticipate issues before they become major problems.

If you are getting ready to sell your house, start putting love into it now. Fix the leaky faucet and get your air conditioner serviced. A well maintained home always sells best.

STATE PROGRAM IDENTIFIES AND EVALUATES CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

By Nicole Zelman Tf you have concerns about a child's development and/or academic progress, the State of Arizona has established a program known as AZ Find.



This program requires the state to locate, identify and evaluate children of any age up to 21 years who have a disability and are in need of early intervention or special education services. This includes children who attend private schools, are homeschooled and are highly mobile (homeless children or migrant), as well as those who are suspected of having a disability regardless of whether they are advancing to the next grade level.

Any member of the community can refer someone, or the student can refer himself. Referrals can include concerns related to behavior or social skills, cognitive or academic skills, motor control or coordination, vision and hearing, as well as speech and communication skills.

AZ Find is divided into two components based upon the child's age. The first, Arizona Early Intervention Program (AZEIP), provides early intervention services for qualifying children from birth to 2 years and 10.5 months of age. AZEIP supports children by providing professional resources to families by screening the child and designing a plan to ensure developmental milestones are achieved.

The second component is designed to help preschool and school-aged children in local public and charter schools, through 21 years of age. This process includes an informal screening, which must be

completed within 45 calendar days from when the school was notified of concerns. In addition, the school has within 10 days to notify you if any concerns are identified.

If the school identifies a concern, the child may be referred to the child study team for intervention or for a comprehensive psychological evaluation. The key thing to understand here is, though the school may suspect a disability, that suspicion alone does not mean psychoeducational testing is necessary. The school may opt to complete a series of intensive interventions for a period of time before suggesting a comprehensive evaluation.

If you are unsure about reaching out for a referral at this time, the child can be supported in many other ways. For example, you may consider frequently communicating with your child's classroom teacher about the child's progress and asking the school for materials to support the child at home.

Other options include seeking tutoring at school or through an outside agency, attending local workshops or community events promoting learning and social growth, and considering a 504 plan, which provides the child with accommodations inside the general education classroom.

Remember to use your best judgment when it comes to referring a child to AZ Find. However, it may be beneficial to err on the side of caution if you suspect the child has a disability. The earlier the child is referred, the earlier he will be getting the help needed to be successful. ■

KNOW BEFORE YOU THROW

ownsizing? Determined to get rid of stuff you no longer need? Cleaning out a home or an estate? Stop. Know before you throw.

Fall is a popular time to clear out excess stuff, second only to the proverbial spring cleaning. Garage and yard sales can be a lot of work but can be a great way to recycle



serviceable stuff and turn that trash into cash. A few important things to remember when holding a

- There are professional thieves who target and work garage and yard sales. It's sad to say, but they know you are not a seasoned retailer and they exploit it. They pass counterfeit money, fake personal and bank checks, or simply shoplift your stuff when they have you distracted. There's a lot of information available online about this issue. So, do your research and be prepared. For instance, protect your cash with a counterfeit detector pen, available at office supply stores—see DriMark.com.
- · Make sure you are well staffed, and your people are watching for suspicious activity. Don't be afraid to ask a shopper to leave if you suspect he is up to something.
- · Don't let people into your home (even if they ask to use your bathroom).
- Always keep the cash box out of sight.
- There also are professional pickers. These people make a living buying underpriced items at garage, yard and estate sales and then reselling them. They like to show up early in the morning before the sale starts, or even the night before, with a story about why they can't come when everyone else does and asks to just take a look around. If they find that undervalued gem, they will beg to buy it before you are open for business.
- Do your research before pricing your items. The last thing you want to do is sell a box of junk jewelry for a few dollars when it might be worth thousands. (I wrote about this in the May 2016 issue, which you still can

access online at UpCloseAZ.com.)

- Don't allow one party to dominate a section and spend a long time sorting through and picking the best stuff. In these cases, the goal is to keep other buyers away until closing time. Then, they will make a very lowball offer. (Ask them to pay as they go. The more they actually pay for as they go, the better deal you might give them.)
- People expect to negotiate and pay less. Have fun with it. Remember, you don't want to bring it back into the house, so make a deal that's best for all.

What are the most popular garage sale items? In no particular order, you can expect people to be looking for kid's clothes, sporting equipment, electronics, power and hand tools, toys, DVDs (movies and games), furniture, household items and jewelry.

As legal adults, students over the age of 18 need their own advance medical directives, health care agent form and durable power of attorney for financial management, naming those who legally could act on their behalf.

IMPORTANT DEFINITIONS

- Advance medical directive Allows you to plan your health care before you may be unable to make sound decisions yourself.
- Health care agent form Allows you to appoint another person to make your health care decisions for you if you are unable to communicate them yourself.
- Durable power of attorney for financial management Gives someone the right to make financial decisions on your behalf if you are unable to do so.
