I couldn't, though, because Teppanyaki service requires a lot of space, and my restaurant area already was full," he continued. "Then, with luck, the business next door moved out. So, I was able to acquire 1,600 square feet of extra space to bring Teppanyaki to Zushi."

Teppanyaki dining is very popular on weekends and for special occasions. "I didn't want to make my customers wait a long time to get a table, so we installed eight Teppanyaki tables, which can seat at total of 72 at once," Shawn said. "Also, our Teppanyaki tables are bigger than the standard size, so we can serve groups of 10 to 20 at a time. And to make things even more comfortable, we installed three large air conditioners, so the heat from the grill is not a problem for warm-weather diners."

Zushi boasts three highly trained professional Teppan chefs who have more than 20 years of Teppanyaki experience. "Zushi will be the *very* best restaurant for Teppanyaki because of a very simple pledge to serve only the very highest quality meat, seafood and vegetables," Shawn stated proudly. "Customers will especially like our flavorful fried rice prepared fresh on the grill."

All Teppanyaki meals include the diner's choice of meat or seafood, an appetizer, soup and salad, fresh grilled vegetables and fried rice. ■

WHAT HAPPENS IN THE GALL BLADDER Does Not Always Stay In The Gall Bladder

1 ue, a 34-year-old mother of two, had come to see me for recurrent right-side

During the episodes, she would sweat profusely. Her chest pains would be associated with nausea, provoked by a fatty meal and would make her anxious and restless. She had been to the emergency room twice in the last six weeks. Her tests for heart attack were negative, and she was reassured and discharged on anxiety medications.

In my office, she lay on the exam table and appeared a little overweight, anxious and with a high blood pressure. As I attempted to examine her by placing my hand on her right lower chest, she almost shrieked with pain. This was a no-brainer for me to diagnose. She certainly was experiencing an attack. Fortunately, though, it was not a heart attack. She was having a gallstone attack.

I explained to Sue her diagnosis of gallstone attack and recommended, from my office, she report directly to the emergency room. With her consent, I personally called the surgeon who met with her at her bedside in the emergency room in less than an hour. She was admitted overnight and underwent gall bladder removal the next morning.

Upon her return office visit two weeks later, she

remarked, "Dr. Ahmad, I am so glad it was not my heart." I looked at Sue and replied, "Not so quick, as gallstones and heart disease can coexist."

One in every four people with gallbladder stones also will have heart disease. The likelihood of heart disease in such a setting is there regardless of the presence or absence of risk factors for heart disease in that individual. Risk factors, such as obesity, diabetes and high blood pressure contribute to heart disease in people suffering from gallstones. However, people with gallstones who are otherwise in good shape and healthy also have been found to have underlying heart disease.

The explanation is that certain kinds of gallstones increase the cholesterol secretion, which leads to increased cholesterol production and subsequent development of heart disease.

So, it goes without saying that adopting a lifestyle that would help prevent gallstones also may help in reducing the risk of heart disease.

Although there is no clear-cut or definite way to prevent gallstones, certain lifestyle changes go a long way in lowering the risk of gallstone formation. Try to stay at a healthy and relatively constant weight. Avoid crash diets with severe caloric reduction of less than 750 per day. In women, weight loss should be gradual and slow. So, a rebound weight gain is avoided, which may become a precursor for production of gallstones.

Do eat some healthy fats, as they aid in the contraction and emptying of the gallbladder and decrease the cholesterol secretion. Also, use of estrogens, whether to treat post-menopausal symptoms or as a birth control pill, may increase the risk of gallstones. Therefore, I encourage talking to your doctor regarding the risks and the merits of estrogen therapy.

Eyebrows are your most important facial feature

t doesn't matter if you like them arched and feathered, or straight and bold, eyebrows are arguably the most important facial feature of the moment.

If you're not satisfied with the brows you have, there are so many ways to update them, including brow gel, pencils and even tattooing.

"But now there's a very natural option that delivers semi-permanent results," said Elle Baker, licensed aesthetician at Cosmos Salon and Day Spa. "We'd like to introduce you to eyebrow microblading."

Unlike the sometimes Sharpie-esque effects of permanent makeup, microblading is more of an embroidery of trompe l'œil (an art technique, which uses realistic imagery to create a 3-D optical illusion), with strokes that look just like real hairs. "Microblading is perfect for those who want to fully reconstruct, define, cover gaps or fill in over-plucked brows," Elle explained. "The results are a natural, undetectable fringe."

WHAT IS MICROBLADING?

Microblading is a semi-permanent makeup technique, which leaves you with natural looking, fuller brows. It does not require you to shave your eyebrows or damage your natural hair. "During the microblading process, we use a special tool, a manual blade made up of a small row of very fine needles, to deposit pigment into the top layer of skin, drawing individual thin, hair-like strokes one by one," Elle said. "It's an extremely meticulous process that takes around two hours to complete. The result creates an extremely natural look as opposed to a permanent tattoo."

Before the actual microblading begins, about an hour is spent drawing in the shape with removable pencil. "That's the longest part and the most important step," Elle explained. "During this time, the best customized shape and color for every client is measured, discussed and

chosen. It is not a rushed procedure."

Microblading is designed to be a gentle procedure with minimal discomfort. In fact, it is the gentlest option out of all the methods for depositing pigment into the skin. Before the microblading begins, a topical numbing cream is applied to the area to minimize discomfort. Some clients may feel a slight discomfort, but it's relatively painless. Most people describe it as a tweezing or threading sensation.

"The best part about the technique is that there is no downtime, only a few days of *in between* time," Elle stated. "The healing process is different for everyone, and it takes between 10 and 14 days to fully heal."

According to Elle, during the healing process, the brows will lighten about 50 percent. "Two weeks following your first treatment, we provide a touch up," she explained. "Your new set of brows can last up to three years, but we do recommend coming in for a touch up every 12 to 18 months to freshen up."

There Are Things You Need To Know **ABOUT SOLAR POWER AND HOME SALES**

ecause my opinion on solar keeps changing with the more information gathered, I have rewritten this article three times.

I initially decided to write on solar after my own experience with selling a home and how solar

impacted the sales price. I started out feeling pretty negative about the benefit of solar based on my experience, but the more I looked into it, saw the tax credit and savings, I started to think maybe it was a good idea and headed in that direction.

Then, I learned more about the fees, not for the initial purchase of the system, but the fees the utility companies charge and how they vary. There is a huge difference between the benefit of solar if you are serviced by SRP or APS. You may not be given all this information from the solar companies, so you need to do some homework on the additional fees and surcharges your utility company charges.

TAX CREDIT

Although they have become more affordable in recent years, solar panel systems still are a considerable expense for the average homeowner. Arizona currently offers a tax credit equivalent to 25 percent of the system cost, capped at \$1,000. The federal tax credit is 30 percent of the cost.

SRP VERSUS APS

Both utility companies will charge a monthly service fee for grid access and maintenance. If you use more power than your solar produces, which usually is in the summer months, you will be billed a usage fee, which will vary between APS and SRP. The biggest difference, however, is the demand fee and how much higher SRP's fee is.

You may not have a demand fee with APS, depending on the plan you use. APS also will bank excess power your system produces for you to pull from during the months when you use more. SRP will not bank your excess, but pays you the wholesale rate at the end of each month. You could get paid the lowest rate for the excess and then billed the highest rate for the usage. There are more options becoming available, such as batteries to store your excess, so you can be completely off the grid. However, these are very expensive.

LEASING

At this time, you cannot get a leased solar system if your utility company is SRP. Since SRP implemented the demand fee and additional surcharges (unless you were grandfathered in), there is very little economic gain, and leasing companies will not service to homeowners within SRP.

SELLING YOUR HOME WITH SOLAR

Owned Solar System—There is no question owned solar far out ways leased solar when it comes to resale. When the solar is owned, the value both the buyer and the lender should place on the solar is based on the savings and what other homes with solar panels have sold for in the same neighborhood. This can be a challenge, as there may not be any recent comps with solar panels.

When I listed a home with solar panels, I called the vice president of one of the appraisal companies in the area. He calculates the value by taking the savings over the past year, multiplies by 3 and that is the value. For the home I had listed, the savings in the past year was \$1,700 multiplied by 3, which is \$5,100.

The appraiser should have added \$5,100 to the value of the home for the solar. You can imagine how shocked we were when the appraisal came back and he didn't add anything at all for the solar. I am sure this was the excep-

tion and not the rule, and appraisers will add some value for solar. Even then, however, it's not going to be very much compared to the original cost. So, don't plan on getting a return on your investment when you sell, especially if you are in SRP where your savings will be less.

Leased Solar System—Appraisers and lenders will not give any value on a leased solar system. A home with leased solar also can be a turn off for some buyers, as they would have to take over the lease. The buyer would need to qualify with the leasing company, and the monthly payment would be included in the buyer's monthly debt to income ratio, which could reduce the loan amount for which the buyer would then qualify.

PAYBACK

The average homeowner moves every five to seven years. Therefore, if you are not committed to staying in your home for at least eight to 10 years, purchasing a solar system might not make sense from an investment standpoint. You may want to wait until you are in a home you plan to stay in longer. ■

In kindergarten, our teacher would sit us down on a square, rainbow carpet and read to us every day. She held the book open in front of her face so we could hear the characters speak instead of her. I don't recall her name or the books she read, but the smile on my face was always big enough to hurt my cheeks, and my eyes closed when I laughed. When the story came to an end, we would cheer and then complain when we realized we needed to part with the characters with which we had fallen in love in those short minutes.

A year later, our school days consisted of reading those same stories on our own. I would ask for books instead of extra recess time. I measured playtime by the number of chapters I could finish before lining up to go back inside. When I wasn't reading, my friends and I acted out our assigned story of the week, using that same



rainbow carpet as our stage.

Now, years later, I see that same love of reading and pursuit of learning reflected in our current kindergarten classes at SDA. The students really already have made leaps and bounds. They recognize letter sounds and word families. They take turns reading from books to the class, holding the pages in front of them the way my teacher did for my class.

Tiny chatter fills the space between activities sometimes about the work they've just completed and comparing math facts from this week to last week—other times about books they read at home and recommendations on what should be read next. At snack time, I hear about princesses and superheroes they've created to complement the pre-existing ones they love. Last week, one of the little boys showed me a book he wrote himself. One of the girls finished a math test she hadn't been able to complete in time the week before, and the whole class cheered for her.

There is an old-fashioned view of kindergarten. Many people think it's just learning shapes and colors or singing the alphabet song 10 times in a row. Shapes and colors do make appearances throughout the day, but as tools to teach patterns and time and how to understand money.

Kindergarten is the foundation for life. Students are encouraged to find answers to their questions instead of being told the answer. They are shown how to study and how to take tests, and are taught how to make mistakes and learn from them in a healthy, generative way.

I recently graduated with a bachelor's degree in English. At the degree ceremony, I sat on a chair on a different colored carpet, with different classmates, looking at a completely different teacher, with the same smile that hurt my cheeks so many years before. My educational journey started playing back to me.

My days of putting studying first when school ended, my comfort with asking questions in class and the ability to speak to teachers on their level. So many other skills were introduced to me during kindergarten. This new generation picks up those same lessons and takes them even further. I know one day, when they sit in their degree ceremonies, they'll look back on these days now and be thankful their education was taken seriously so early.

SDA offers an accelerated academic program beginning with the kindergarten year. Students learn a minimum of one year ahead of the Arizona Department of Education Academic Standards. During kindergarten, students learn phonemic awareness, and they develop reading fluency and reading comprehension skills. They also write grammatically correct sentences and short stories, as well as master addition and subtraction, among many other skills.

In addition to providing a strong foundation for first grade, students participate in weekly music, art and physical education classes, and share their talents in bi-annual performances. All of the above occurs in a wonderful environment amidst dedicated, committed faculty.

Eniov a pig roast

Tant to roast an 80-pound pig tonight?

Roasting a pig seems like a good idea, but it just might be a lot harder than you think.

First, find one. The task is difficult, and cost is more per pound than pork chops or loin—about \$290 per pig.

Brine and refrigerate the entire pig in water with salt, sugar and spices for 24 hours. Remove and dry the pig. Inject two quarts of pineapple juice in different areas. Season with a good rub of spices. Refrigerate for 24 hours.

Find a 6-foot smoker—not easy. We bought a 500-pound beauty made by the Amish in Pennsylvania. Using apple wood or hickory chips, smoke the meat on low for six to eight hours, cavity face down. No peeking. Do not raise the smoker hood—ever.

Cool for 30 minutes. Remove the meat with large forks and gloved hands.

Serve with coleslaw, au gratin potatoes, potato salad and cowboy beans. Or just go to JJ Madisons any Saturday, at 4 p.m. and sip on a cold one until the pig is perfect.

SAUSAGE AND WHITE BEAN SOUP

Begin with 1 package (5) mild Italian sausage. Remove casing and break into bite-size pieces. Sauté in olive oil. Remove from heat and set aside.

In the same pan, sauté the following until soft:

- · 1 sweet or white onion diced
- 1 red or green pepper diced
- (Optional 1 jalapeño seeded and diced)
- 1 zucchini or 4-ounce baby spinach chopped
- Large pinch red pepper flakes
- 1 tablespoon oregano
- Pinch of sugar
- 1 can (6 ounces) tomato paste or 12 ounces diced tomato

Move veggies to soup pan. Deglaze pan with 32 ounces chicken stock/broth.

Add 2 cans white beans drained and rinsed.

Add sausage. Salt and pepper to taste. Simmer 30 minutes covered. Serve with sprinkle of Parmesan

Have at least one color copy of your passport's ID page stored somewhere safe and separate from your passport. You also should make copies of any visas pertaining to your current travel plans. Hotel reservations and train ticket confirmations, as well as all other travel documents, should be copied.

GET ADAPTERS FOR YOUR ELECTRONICS

Electrical outlets are different all over the world. Therefore, you'll need to have adapters, which allow your devices to plug into foreign sockets.

BUY HEALTH AND TRAVEL INSURANCE

Before you travel, check your health insurance policy to see if it includes international coverage. If not, consider buying a shortterm policy, which will cover you while you're abroad. Similarly, a smart way to protect your trip and your money is to purchase travel insurance. Policies and coverage vary from provider to provider, but the basic idea is you can have your money refunded if your trip has to be cancelled, postponed or cut short for a number of reasons.


It's hard to believe Black Friday is just around the corner. For most of us, this signals the start of our annual holiday gift
