
Ukulele Mania Makes a Comeback

the refreshing, mountain stream waters of the Lower Salt River. Fun in the sun at Salt River Tubing will include live entertainment, free giveaways, beach line dancing and hula-hoop contests during the holiday weekend.

Thousands of responsible public lands stewards have participated in the phenomenally successful Salt River Heroes = Litter Zero during previous holiday weekends. As a result, the amount of picnic trash on the Lower Salt

River has been reduced by 90 percent. In fact, a total of 712 tons of picnic trash has been stashed and bagged during the Take Pride in America events.

The Salt River Heroes = Litter Zero event is co-sponsored by iHeart Media (radio stations KNIX 102.5 and KISS 104.7FM). In addition to litter bags, Salt River Tubing employees will be distributing free patriotic leis to the first 1,000 tubers as they prepare to launch a memorable adventure on the Salt River.

"Salt River Tubing is very grateful for the Salt River Heroes who have taken personal responsibility for their picnic trash while floating and have helped to keep the Salt River a clean and beautiful recreational area," said Salt River Tubing President and Chief Executive Officer Henri Breault.

"Experience the great outdoors in Tonto National Forest's mini-Grand Canyon as you leisurely float past the majestic mountains and catch of glimpse of wild horses



crossing mid-stream and blue herons gliding across the water," Henri continued. "Our tube rental doors open at 8 a.m. Saturday through Monday of the Memorial Day holiday weekend. We encourage everyone to be an early bird floater."

The cost is only \$17 per person or tube, which includes tube rental, shuttle bus ride and free customer parking at Salt River Tubing.

Take Pride in America is a national partnership, which aims to inspire a new generation of volunteers to put their love of country to work to improve our national parks, wildlife refuges and public lands, as well as cultural and historic sites, playgrounds and other recreation areas. Salt River Tubing has received a record four National Take Pride in America awards for the company's conservation efforts in Tonto National Forest (1991, 2003, 2006 and 2010).

TUBING TIPS

Shooting the Salt River rapids is great fun, and company officials recommend the following helpful tips to assist tubers in planning their floating beach blasts for the holiday weekend.

· A valid driver's license is required for a tube rental deposit per five tubes rented.

- Children must be at least 8 years or older and 4 feet tall for tubing and shuttle bus service.
- · Life vests are strongly recommended for children, non-swimmers and inexperienced swimmers.
- Glass containers are prohibited by law in the Salt River Recreational Area and will be confiscated. Ice chests will be inspected for glass containers before boarding shuttle buses. Please use plastic bottles or aluminum cans.
- Have a great time during your floating beach blasts, but remember that drugs, alcohol and the Salt River do not mix. Responsibly appoint a designated driver before your tubing adventure.
- Floating picnic ideas include fresh fruit, burritos, fried chicken or sandwiches. Pack picnic items in Ziploc bags to keep dry. Please stash and bag all picnic supplies in litter bags while floating.
- Ice chest/cooler—Fill with ice, sport drinks, fruit juice and water. One to two bottles of water per hour are recommended while floating to help prevent dehydration.
- Sun block, tennis shoes, cap or visor should be worn. A minimum 30 SPF is recommended. Tennis shoes or closed toes also are recommended while tubing.

Checklist assures your pool is ready for summer swim season

If your pool is heated and you've been enjoying it during our mild winter days, it's probably set for summer, but if not, even if you have a weekly pool service, you've probably been ignoring it a bit.

Chris Quam, owner of Arizona Pool Guy Inc.,

suggests now is the time to take a good look at your pool and deck area to make sure it's ready for the long, hot summer.

Here's his checklist:

CHECK CHEMICALS

First, have your pool chemicals checked. If the amount of conditioner is too high, it might be time to drain and refill your pool with fresh water. Conditioner keeps chlorine from depleting too quickly, but too much can have an irritating effect on skin and eyes. In addition, because of our area's hard water, pool water usually needs to be replaced every two to three years.

GREEN MONSTER

If your pool is turning green, get it fixed quickly. A green pool is not only unsightly, but it also can be dangerous, too, as a mosquito-breeding ground.

CLEAN OR REPLACE FILTERS

Cartridge filters and diatomaceous earth filter grids should be cleaned at least once a year and need replacing every three to four years. Because sand filters get backwashed on a regular basis, or whenever the pressure rises, sand only needs changing completely every five to seven years.

BATHTUB RING

Our local hard water not only leaves rings in our bathtubs,

but can also mar a pool's decorative waterline tile. "It's almost impossible to remove it yourself without scratching or damaging your tile," Chris said. "We have a way to remove the buildup without hurting the tile."

PUCKER UP

A lot of plaster pools in our Northeast Mesa neighborhoods built before the year 2000 are due for refinishing. Puckering, large chips and cracks or stains in the finish are all indications it needs to be redone. "Now is the time to restore it with one

of the new mini pebble finishes," Chris stated. "They come in great colors and designs and are guaranteed for 10 years. Minor cracks or chips should be fixed as soon as possible, before damage becomes more extensive. We also can repair steps, and repair or remove rolled bond-beam edges."

INSPECT YOUR DECK

After time, the deck finish begins to erode, causing unsightly peeling. Cracks or chips not only look bad, but also can cause cuts or stumbles.

"We can apply a colorful, cool-touch finish, which comes in various shades and also can be made to look like flagstone or other surfaces," Chris explained.

"Whether your pool or deck needs a complete remodel or you need someone to check out your pool's finish, deck repair or equipment, call us," said Chris. "We are happy to give free estimates on any work needed."

In last month's article, I discussed how waiting to sell in today's market could cost you more. You can read that article on my website under the blog section. Here are some things to consider when deciding if you want to re-list or keep your home off the market.

TIMING

Certain times of the year are better to sell than others, depending on what type of buyer your home appeals to, such as second homebuyers or buyers who are downsizing or moving up. Sometimes, just taking your home off the market for a while and re-listing later can make all the difference. However, right now, we are in our peak selling season, so it's a great time to have your home listed. You don't want to take it off the market just yet.

PRICING

The first thing to look at, and the most obvious is was the home priced too high. Overpricing will prolong the

inevitable and usually costs you more in the long run. Some sellers want to give themselves some cushion, they want \$450,000 for their home but list it at \$475,00 to give themselves negotiation room. By doing so, however, they may be losing out on buyers who are searching only for homes up to \$450,000, as well as others who see the home as overpriced.

IF I RE-LIST WILL THE DAYS ON MARKET GO **BACK TO ZERO**

The MLS keeps track of how many days a home has been on the market. There are two numbers, which will show on the listing CDOM/ADOM 324/85—Cumulative Days on Market and Agent Days on Market. If your listing was cancelled or it expired, when you re-list your home, the Agent Days On Market will be reset and start from day one again. However, the Cumulative Days on Market shows how many days in total the home has been listed and the new agent's days will just add to the previous

I have been asked, "If my home is off the market for 30 days and then re-listed, will the Cumulative Days on Market go back to zero?" Unfortunately not. The home has to be off the market for 90 days for the Cumulative Days on Market to reset.

BENEFIT OF RE-LISTING

No matter how long your home was listed previously, when you re-list, the Agent Days on Market will start from day one, and it will show in the MLS as a New Listing. Any buyers who have a search set up for homes like yours will automatically be sent your home again as a new listing. A lot of buyers don't actually look at the days on market until they have seen the house and are considering writing an offer.

While most Realtors will do a great job listing your home, there are always those few who couldn't sell a house if it was free (we've all seen their pictures on the Internet). If you are going to re-list with a new Realtor, now is the time to do your homework and find the right Realtor for you someone who knows your area, has top notch marketing and proven success in selling homes in your neighborhood.

SPRUCE IT UP

Maybe your home doesn't show as well as it could. A lick of paint or deep cleaning can make a huge difference on how bright, clean and open a home feels. If you read my articles, you will know I talk about staging a lot. That's because it really can make a big difference as to how your home shows and how quickly it sells. You don't have to spend thousands of dollars to have it professionally staged. Most of the time, you can use what you already have. It just needs some tweaking. If the home is vacant, just a little goes a long way. Adding a few things, such as pictures, vases, or plants really helps the photographs with added color and focal points instead of just bare rooms.

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


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


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Various Factors Help Find Your Dream Home

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Technology is great, but always have a backup plan

ecently, have been having computer issues.



It is very convenient to

have your boarding pass loaded on your phone, but there is a risk. In case of a computer shutdown or malfunction, it is a good idea to have a paper copy with you

As you know, stuff happens. The hard copy shows your name, confirmation number and flight information. That can sometimes simplify a problem. With this same thought in mind, always print out your hotel and car confirmations, as well. If you were to arrive at the car rental or hotel and the computers are down, you would have copies of your confirmations.

The other thing I always do is ask the name of the reservation person with whom I am speaking, as well as the phone extension and where the individual is located. This helps if there is any confusion with your reservation.

The airlines always tell you to reconfirm your international reservations prior to traveling. Be aware that hotels, airlines and tour companies overbook. You would hate to show up and be told your reservation is cancelled or they can't find it. The paper copy will help with the issue.

Also, even though we don't change our clocks due to daylight saving time, the airlines do, and sometimes schedule changes occur. You should always double check with the airlines to make sure your flight numbers and departure times have

Did you know that the airlines close the gate doors 10 minutes prior to the departure time on your ticket? Make sure you allow plenty of time to get to the gate. The gate agents will not reopen that door once it is closed for departure.

Also, you might consider cancellation insurance. Most hotels have a very liberal cancellation policy unless you purchase a nonrefundable room. I always say, if you can afford to lose all or part of your money, don't take insurance. If not, you better take it.

Another little tip is to have the phone numbers of the airlines, hotels and car rental companies with you just in case there is an issue when you travel.

Lastly, double check flight numbers, dates, times, destinations and name spelling, etc. Errors may have been entered in the computer inaccurately. It's easier to correct errors or mistakes before you travel than standing at a counter somewhere in the middle of the night. ■

Practice Range Is Not a Tiny, **Insignificant Piece of Land**

By Nancy Nemitz **→** he Red Mountain Ranch practice range is "... just a tiny, insignificant piece of land," said Divot Partners' attorney Reese Anderson at the recent Board of Adjustment Public Hearing.



I think this was one of the two times the chairman of the board had to gavel to quiet the uproar of the homeowners. I think Reese quickly got the message that the practice range/open space is not insignificant to the homeowners in Red Mountain Ranch.

The April 12 Board of Adjustment Public Hearing was called to "... consider an appeal of a Zoning Administrator interpretation regarding the method of processing a request to develop a single residence subdivision in the location of the driving range for the Red Mountain Ranch Golf Course. The Zoning Administrator's interpretation is that the request must be processed as a major modification to the Red Mountain Ranch Development Master Plan's overlay zoning district, as it is considered a significant change that requires the modification or removal of a condition of the zoning. The applicant (Divot Partners) is appealing this interpretation."

The Red Mountain Ranch homeowners who packed the hearing room were challenged to wade through the legal jargon of city ordinances, master plans, modifications, procedures and processes. I don't think the board or opposing counsel realized how well informed and prepared the homeowners were because they did their level best to keep quiet when facts were misrepresented.

After formal arguments by attorneys for Divot Partners and the Zoning Administrator, public comments were allowed. Red Mountain Ranch Owners Association president, Shane Wikfors, came to the podium to inform

the board that the owners association voted in support of the City of Mesa's interpretation. Dave Knorr, representing more than 2,000 petitioners and 1,678 property owners, powerfully illustrated, with pictures, maps and graphs, the impact replacing the practice range with homes would have on the community. Dave also cited Divot Partners' own website, which showcases the golf course and practice range in its marketing of Red Mountain Ranch.

After two and a half hours of presentations and rebuttals, the six members of the board (one absent) went into public executive session to consider the matter and vote. The vote was unanimous to uphold the City of Mesa's Zoning Administrator's interpretation. In plain English, it was the outcome the homeowners worked so hard to achieve. The fight isn't over, but this vote is a positive step in the right direction.

No one's effort to make his voice heard is insignificant, and the driving range is not a tiny, insignificant piece of land. ■

- Follow a lifestyle or diet that modifies cancer-causing factors. Remember, diet remains the foundation of controllable prevention.

RISK FACTORS

Cancer is becoming as common in domestic animals as it is in humans. The same risk factors apply:

- Poor quality/improper diet resulting in a suppressed immune system.
 - Stress.
- Exposure to chemical or physical carcinogens, such as household cleaners, pesticides, herbicides and secondhand smoke. ■



These Early Signs of Dementia May Surprise You

It can be difficult to decipher the difference between natural memory loss due to aging and the signs and symptoms of dementia and Alzheimer's disease.

How are you supposed to know if the behaviors you are seeing in an aging loved one are normal or the early signs of cognitive decline?

We all know memory loss is a constant thread in aging, dementia and Alzheimer's, but there are others. One symptom doesn't necessarily mean dementia is beginning. However, several may mean your loved one needs to be seen by a neurologist.

Here is a list of the top five early signs of dementia. Some may surprise you.

1. VISION PROBLEMS—For some, changes in vision can be one of the earliest signs of dementia. Your loved one may have trouble reading or seeing the differences in color or contrast. He also may begin to experience trouble with judging distances, which may lead to problems driving. You may see your loved one is struggling to resolve spatial relationships of various types—the distance between the table and the chair, or the distance between holding a glass and putting it on the shelf.

2. PROBLEMS WITH WORDS IN SPEAKING OR WRITING—In the early stages of dementia, it begins to be difficult for the sufferer to follow conversations. You may observe your loved one stopping in the middle of a conversation with no idea how to continue. He may struggle to find the right words. We all forget words from time to time and eventually remember them. People with dementia cannot retrieve the word even after trying for a time. Your loved one also may begin to repeat sentences within a conversation or say the same thing repeatedly in a short period of time.

3. POOR JUDGMENT—Dementia changes and decreases one's ability to make good judgments. Your loved one may ask strangers for odd things like a tissue or a quarter.

They may begin to give money to telemarketers or pay less attention to personal grooming.

4. FORGETTING THE SEASONS—If

your loved one is in the early stages of dementia, she may not be able to remember what day, date or season it is. People with dementia may think they are in a different year—a time in the past. They may begin to lose the ability to understand that something happened yesterday or will happen tomorrow. Time begins to shrink, and dementia patients only understand

what is happening in the here and now. This confusion can extend to an understanding of place. For example, your loved one may be sitting in your living room, but she may think she is in another place entirely—usually another place that is familiar and carries fond memories.

5. WITHDRAWAL FROM WORK OR SOCIAL ACTIVITIES—Your usually outgoing loved one

suddenly may stop participating in activities, social gatherings and/or hobbies. Dementia may make it difficult to remember how to interact or conduct a hobby. In the early stages of dementia, people realize the changes they are undergoing and, as a result, may avoid social interactions altogether. The more complicated and noisy the situation, the more difficult it is for him to understand.

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
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
