High School Welding Program celebrates success

he welding program at Red Mountain High School was a huge success this year, culminating in 15 students who are now certified with the American Welding Society.

"Not everybody is going to go to college because of affordability, but they still need something to look forward to," commented Dan Hurst, welding instructor at Red Mountain High. "Welding careers are flourishing, so these students can be productive and are able to make a good living," he continued. "An estimated 250,000 welders will be needed by the year 2020."

To celebrate the welding students' accomplishments, including a first-place win at the Welding Without Borders: Welding Thunder Team Fabrication Competition, in Las Vegas, Nev., Dan and some enthusiastic parents and volunteers bosted an

siastic parents and volunteers hosted an end-of-the-year award ceremony and celebration.

"We've been fortunate," said Ron Kereluk, who attended the event with his wife, Angela, and son, Hayden, who transferred from Skyline High School to Red Mountain High for the welding program. "That's what he wants to do for a living," Ron continued. "He and Mr. Hurst get along really well."

Hayden said Mr. Hurst is the best. The admired teacher "... makes learning the welding trade easy," he commented. "He's really helpful. He would give his shirt off his own back," Hayden continued. "He's one of the nicest people I have met in my life."

Hayden's goal is to earn a pipeline welding certification. "Because the world will never not need it," he explained.

Las Sendas resident Carrie McCahan's son, Jack, has been in the welding program for the past three years. "We were surprised to see how creative they are with their projects. The things they create are beautiful," said Carrie. She thought the projects would be more industrial. Nevertheless, Carrie received a welded rose from her son as a thank you for her support, as did all the moms at the special event.

According to Jack, he enrolled in welding as a hobby. He has enjoyed learning new skills, such as how to use different machines, how to make various items and how to design things on a computer. "I found the class interesting and something I could learn from," Jack commented.

"Mr. Hurst is awesome," the student continued. "He's really smart. He knows how to teach, and he is all around a great guy."

Student Nicodemus Phaklides said he also enjoyed the welding class. "The fulfillment you get after finishing a big project is awesome," he gushed.

Everybody had smiles on their faces as welding club president Bryce LeSueur introduced Mr. Hurst, who thanked everyone for coming and for sharing their amazing kids.

Then, Red Mountain High Principal Jared Ryan thanked the parents as he said he was grateful for the difference the welding students have made on campus. "They have demonstrated leadership at our school," he said. "Through their work, their heart, they care about what they're doing," he continued.

"Mr. Hurst is a pretty special educator," Mr. Ryan said. "He is a special human being who has received the highest rating as a teacher."

As part of the welding club, Mr. Hurst requires the students to participate in community service at the school, including painting ramadas and making a new sign for The Commons at the library.

The students also created artwork for charity, raising more than \$15,000 over the past four years.

Bryce introduced Sal Guerro, who received a community service award from the welding club for donating paint and helping to refinish the ramadas at the school.

Publisher Kim Phillips also received a community

service award for her help in promoting the welding program in *Up Close*, a neighborhood publication distributed in Las Sendas, Red Mountain Ranch and surrounding Northeast Mesa communities.

Welding student Brock Witt received the Golden Rod Award for his exceptional contributions. "He is always here first thing in the morning, and he stays late," Bryce announced.

The Silver Rod Award went to Nicademus Phakalitus. "He is an outstanding student who is only 14 years old," Bryce told the audience.

Several other students and mentors were honored with medals and awards, including those who participated with the welding team at the Las Vegas Fabtech competition. Baylee Higginbottom received the first welded rose for always being there for Mr. Hurst.

In conclusion, the group honored their teacher and mentor with a shiny new watch. "Mr. Hurst always gives us his time and his patience," said Bryce. "So, we thought we would give him some time back."

Dan smiled. "It's been an amazing ride," he said. "Las Vegas was a challenge. Next year is going to be amazing. We are going to put together a girls' team and a guys' team," he continued. "God bless you for letting me teach your kids."

→ here will be pirate sightings on the Lower Salt River as they celebrate Get Outdoors Day (GO Day) with Salt River Tubing on Saturday, June 10, from 8:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.

Pirates will sail the Salt River on tubes while brandishing swords, waving pirate flags and humming Yo, Ho, Ho and a bottle of water. National GO Day, celebrating its 10th annual event, is a fan favorite.

Free pirate bandanas will be tendered to the first 1,000 participants. Salt River Tubing also will award free tubing passes for the best pirate tuber costumes.

"Join us for the time of your life at our Salt River Pirates event," said Salt River Tubing President and Chief Executive Officer Henri Breault. "Buccaneers can kick up their heels with our pirate line dancers, grab a photo opportunity with Smokey Bear, and ride our pirate warships (shuttle buses) to and from the Salt River. GO Day is keyed to enticing first-time visitors to the great outdoors and enjoying the mountain-stream waters of the Salt River while floating in the mini-Grand Canyon of Tonto National Forest," he continued. "Our recreational paradise is a fun-filled adventure in the great outdoors."

According to GO Day organizers, participants from federal agencies, nonprofit organizations and the recreation industry have teamed up to host the 10th annual event to encourage healthy, active outdoor fun at sites across the nation. On Saturday, June 10, these diverse partners will offer opportunities for American families to experience traditional and nontraditional types of outdoor activities. Prime goals of the day are reaching currently underserved populations and first-time visitors to public lands, as well as reconnecting our youth to the great outdoors.

The event's invited exhibitors include Tonto National Forest, Maricopa County Sheriff's Office Lake Patrol and Monster Energy beverage company. Extra splash and sizzle includes live entertainment by KISS FM 104.7 radio station, pirate coin grabs, water cannon battles and free giveaways.

On April 25, Governor Doug Ducey issued Arizona's Great Outdoors Month proclamation, which states,

"Arizona is blessed with outstanding opportunities for safe and healthy fun in the Great Outdoors enjoying our natural splendors in the company of family and in the company of old and new friends."

The pilot effort of National Get Outdoors Day was launched on June 14, 2008. GO Day partnered with federal, state and local agencies, key enthusiast organizations and recreation businesses to create a healthy, fun day of outdoor adventure aimed at reaching first-time visitors to public lands and reconnecting children to the outdoors. Not all air conditioning problems

require service calls

Before reaching for the

phone to call for service, use this checklist to determine whether you can solve any issues on your own:

Check Filter. A clogged filter will reduce the amount of cool air entering your home. Plus, it will make the system work harder and could lead to early system

Check Thermostat. It should be set three to five degrees below the room temperature to start the system. Don't be tempted to turn it down further to try to get your air conditioner to start. This can cause additional problems.

Check Circuit Breakers. Determine whether any of them are tripped in the electrical panel. Reset if needed.

Check Vents. Make sure all vents and return air ducts are open and not blocked.

Check Air from Indoor Vents. The air blowing should be cool. If there is no air, or it is warm, turn off the unit and call for service. Continuing to run your air conditioner could cause damage to the system.

Check Air from Outdoor Unit. You should feel warm air blowing from the vents. If there is no air, turn off the unit and call for service. Continuing to run your air conditioner could cause damage

Check the Outdoor Unit. Clear away any debris or landscaping to allow at least 15 inches of free space for proper airflow.

If you see the following symptoms, call right away to avoid damage to the

- Fluid or water is leaking from the unit.
- Water coming from the upper vent (typically located on the side of your house, about 10 feet up).
- You see a buildup of ice on the unit.
- + The system is making strange noises or is noisier than usual.
- The system has a hard time starting up, or you notice the lights dim when it
- The system runs continually.



ownsizing? Determined to get rid of stuff you no longer need? Cleaning out a home or an estate? Stop! Know Before You Throw.

Well, let me tell you about from the dirt with your bare hands, as this 14-year-old individual did on March 11. I'm really not kidding.

If you haven't finalized your summer vacation plans, you might want to consider this place. It's called the Crater of Diamonds State Park, located on the edge of Murfreesboro, Ark. Not Africa, not India, not Russia but Arkansas, in the good old United States of America.

For the paltry sum of \$10, you, too, can root through the dirt and perhaps find a diamond or two. Theses diamonds are in the rough, of course, but all polished diamonds start that way.

Around 1906, the first diamond was discovered at the site of the future park. On July 15, 1952, the area became a commercial venture open to the public.

In the early 1970s, the land was established as an Arkansas State Park.


Since the park started keeping records, in 1972, there have been a reported total of 32,444 diamonds found through 2016. The largest diamond recovered during this time was 16.37 carats in size, found by a Texas visitor, in 1975. That diamond was cut into the 7.50 carat Amarillo Starlight. Last year, a total of 501 diamonds were found by tourists at the park.

While most of us will never visit the park to seek our treasure in the dirt, many of us

have treasures in our dresser drawers in the form of old or unwanted jewelry. It might be broken, outdated or hold unpleasant memories. Don't just discard it, however, without knowing the value of what you have. Who knows, that old jewelry just might be your diamond in the rough and worth enough to fund your summer vacation.

BUYERS AND SELLERS SHOULD KNOW What to Expect During Inspections

nce the offer and any counters have been accepted by all parties, you are now in the inspection

Unless stated otherwise, this is a 10-day inspection period, and the days start from the date the

contract or the last counter was accepted. So, if you wrote the offer on June 1, countered back and forth, and the last counter was accepted on June 5, the 10-day inspection period starts on June 5 and ends on June 15, at 11:59 p.m.

The inspection/due diligence period is for the buyers, at their expense, to conduct any desired physical, environmental and other types of inspections or investigations to determine the condition of the property. The buyer will usually have a home inspection and a termite inspection done. The buyer should take this time period to look into any other material facts deemed important, such as close by airports and the area crime rate, etc.

THE BUYER ADVISORY

This is a 14-page document given to the buyer when the offer is written. Most buyers just sign it and never look at it again, but it is a great resource to help guide the buyer through the inspection period and throughout the purchasing process. It is designed to give the buyer information on some of the more common issues a buyer may decide to investigate, along with great websites and resources to use. It outlines the documents the buyer may receive and what to look for. If you are buying a home, I would recommend you take the time to look over the Buyer Advisory, as it really is full of useful information you may otherwise miss.



THE INSPECTIONS

The home inspection and termite inspection usually are done at the same time. It is much better for everyone if the seller is not present during the inspections, which take several hours. The buyers will meet the inspector and their Realtor at the property for the last 30 minutes. This gives the inspector the opportunity to go over his findings and anything he feels needs to be pointed out to the buyers.

After doing home inspections where the buyer has and has not been present, I can tell you it is so important for the buyer to be there and walk through the home with the inspector. The inspection report is very detailed and can be anywhere from 30 to 80 pages long (lots of photos), which would be very overwhelming if you just received it in an email without any explanations from the inspector. For my out-of-town clients or those who are unable to be at the inspection, I just FaceTime or Skype them in, so they still get to walk through the house with the inspector, see what he is seeing and ask questions.

BUYING AS IS

With the new purchase contract that went into effect on Feb. 1, one of the major changes was the removal of the Warranties section. Now, properties are sold in their present physical condition, as of the date of contract acceptance. Previously, the seller was obligated to repair certain items, such as heating, cooling, mechanical and electrical systems. Now, the seller is no longer contractually obligated to do any repairs. However, the buyer can and probably will still request repairs on items they would like fixed.

If the buyer is paying full price and only asking for a few items to be repaired, the seller is more inclined to agree to it. If the purchase price was lower than expected, or the buyer is asking for a lot of items to be repaired, the seller may choose to only fix a few of them. This is where some contracts fall apart. Oftentimes, it's not black and white

and requires some creative negotiating to keep all parties happy and the deal moving forward. If the buyer and seller cannot agree on repairs, the buyer can cancel the contract, and the earnest will be refunded. So, it's important to find a middle ground where everyone can agree.

SELLER'S PROPERTY DISCLOSURE STATEMENT (SPDS)

This is a form the sellers complete whereby they disclose any material facts about the property known to them, such as if there have been any water leaks, the names of the utility companies and if they are aware of any noise issues, etc. It must be delivered to the buyer within three days after contract acceptance. As a seller, it is very important to answer all questions as truthfully and as thoroughly as possible.

INSURANCE HISTORY

The seller has to provide the buyer a five-year insurance claims history within five days after contract acceptance.

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

Leasing Solar Panels Can Impact the Future Sale of Your Home

f you have considered getting solar panels for your home, you are not alone.

We have been getting many calls from our clients recently asking us our opinion. Nationally, residential solar installations have

increased by 50 percent per year since 2012, and we certainly can see the impact as more panels pop up on rooftops across the Valley.

With the high expense of purchasing solar systems out right, most homeowners choose to lease solar systems at little to no upfront cost. Solar has a lot of upsides. Specifically, you can reduce your electric bills, it's green, and leasing makes it affordable. Most homeowners assume the new solar panels will only enhance the value of their home and maybe even help them get a higher sales price when they sell their home. However, there are some challenges you should be aware of before signing a solar lease.

First of all, when you lease solar panels, the lease stays with the property and has to be assumed by the new owners. This means a potential buyer will have to qualify with the leasing company. Further, the cost of the monthly lease gets factored into the buyer's debt ratios, which can skew their ratios and impact their ability to qualify for financing. Interestingly, the cost savings does not get factored into the buyer's debt ratios. Additionally, at this time, the Federal Housing Administration won't finance properties with leased solar panels.

Secondly, before installing your solar panels, you want to make sure your roof is in great shape. Installing a new

roof once the panels are installed is much more challenging and has additional costs.

The other thing to consider is the fact it is highly likely the solar technology will improve within the next 10 years. In 10 years, when you are ready to sell your home, the panels will likely still work, but a buyer may not be interested in assuming a lease on older technology.

We are starting to see these issues appear in real estate transactions. Firstly, the lease can limit the pool of potential buyers who can qualify to purchase the property. Secondly, the new buyers also will have to deal with the lease when they go to sell down the road, which causes them to have pause. Also, once buyers realize they need to assume the lease, they often ask for the seller to pay out the lease. We have heard of several cases in which the solar panels have resulted in buyers backing out or sellers having to pay out the solar lease to get the deal done.

While we are not trying to talk you out of investing in solar technology, we do highly recommend that you carefully weigh the pros and cons before making such a significant investment in your home.



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It's Important to Change the Oil in your Vehicle



Thanging your oil is the single most important maintenance you can do for your car's engine, and ✓ it also can be the most confusing.

Manufacturers and oil companies keep lengthening the periods between specific service requirements, but your

local shop doesn't always agree with them. So, how do you decide when it is best to have your car serviced?

Let's start with the basics. What does the engine oil do? Your vehicle



The weight of the oil used in vehicles varies by manufacturer and type of engine. Back in the day, oil was much thicker, but today's vehicles use thinner blends to obtain peak efficiency. Using the correct weight oil is imperative to protect your engine. Most vehicles will use 5w30, 5w20 or 0w20 oil. These oils allow for quicker flow on startup, thus providing protection faster to vital parts and reducing friction, which improves performance and fuel mileage. These oils are almost always a synthetic or at least a synthetic blend.

The manufacturers and oil companies have made great improvements in their products to extend the oil's life. There are recommendations for 10,000, 15,000 and even 20,000-

mile oil change intervals. If you read the fine print, however, there are limitations to these claims. The most important fact to consider is the length of time you plan on owning your vehicle. You own the car, they don't. Manufacturers give minimum requirements they feel will keep your vehicle running through its warranty period, and the oil companies

> are not very specific when it comes to their warranties. So, if a problem occurs, it is you who has to pay for the repair.

The bottom line is changing your oil more often is in your best interest. The better you take care of your engine

when it is new, the less repairs it will require in the future. Here is why. The longer the oil runs in your engine, the more contaminants it collects. All engines consume a small amount of oil and if not checked regularly, can lead to oil deprivation. Engine sludge is real and causes expensive damage.

A pure, conventional oil should be changed every 3,000 miles. Oils with at least some additional protective properties or a synthetic blend should be changed at 4,000 miles. All full synthetic oils are recommended at 5,000 miles. Oil changes are relatively inexpensive compared to repairs caused by oil contamination and breakdown. The slogan of a well-known filter company back in the 80s still rings true. "You can pay me now, or you can pay me later."

"Hearing devices change the lives of millions of people every day," said Dr. Rachel Kruppa, audiologist at Mesa Public Schools. "However, most private insurance companies do not cover hearing aids. The \$5,000 to \$7,000 price tag can be a hardship for families. As children grow, so do their ears, which means ear molds need to be remade on a regularly scheduled basis."

A package of batteries for hearing devices can range from \$8 to \$10. The cost easily adds up.

"Technology advances afford excellent hearing aids, which get smaller and smaller, making it easier for a child to lose them," stated Nadine Miller, director of district health services and audiology. "We all remember losing a retainer and digging through the trash to find it. Just imagine a child losing a hearing device on a playground."

Engaged and excited, they don't stop to think about how their teacher gained her expert knowledge. They just know they're working on cool projects. However, educators, such as Nancy, never stop learning.

Just as professionals in medicine, architecture and law participate in professional development, so do educators. Mesa Public Schools' teachers share their passion for learning with students in a variety of ways. This includes honing their skills, while learning new techniques and strategies to provide excellent educational experiences. The sky is the limit for cutting-edge professional development programs.

TEAM MESA SHOOTS FOR THE STARS

A five-teacher team, from Kino Junior High School, Mesa Academy for Advanced Studies and Hale, Mendoza and Porter elementary schools, traveled to Johnson Space Center, in Houston, Texas, to participate in NASA's Microgravity University for Educators. Their mission was to test a student-derived Satellite Launching Experimental Device on the Precision Air Bearing Floor, while their



students watched live through a videoconference at school.

According to Kimberly Merlene, science teacher at Mesa Academy for Advanced Studies, having opportunities to find exciting ways to introduce Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics, or STEM, to students in meaningful ways is a priority. "Experiencing it first-hand takes it to another level," she explained. "Being able to sit in the cockpit of the plane on the way to Houston, chatting with the pilot about the instrument panel, and having the opportunity to experiment in the facility where real astronauts train for their missions was invaluable."

Expert engineers, astronauts and former teachers in the field introduced lessons, providing tutelage and time, so teachers could create the projects they will introduce to students. Supplies for these projects were shipped to their classrooms. So, now they have everything they need to share their experiences.

"The beauty of science is that students enjoy connecting real-life scenarios with experiments," said Amber Amaya, fourth-grade and fifth-grade teacher at Porter Elementary School. "Students problem solve and work together as a team, so they may fix issues and make something better, just like they will in the workplace one day." ■

Study of SuperAgers Offers Clues in

study called Rates of Cortical Atrophy in Adults 80 Years and Older with Superior Versus Average Episodic Memory was published in the Journal of the American Medical Association on April 4.

Senior author Emily Rogalski, associate professor at Northwestern University's Cognitive Neurology and Alzheimer's Disease Center, in Evanston, Ill., presented the findings of her team's study at this year's Cognitive Aging Summit, in Bethesda, Md., on April 6.

The study showed that SuperAgers, anyone who is 80 or older and whose memory is as strong as the average 50- to 65-year-old, and who scores as well or better than peers on other cognition tests, lose brain volume more slowly than their peers who are aging normally. This slower rate of decreasing brain volume seems to protect them from dementia.



Earlier research into the brains of SuperAgers showed they have a thicker brain cortex than most people their age, but it wasn't clear whether that was because they had a larger brain to begin with or whether they experienced slower rates of decline in brain mass. Emily and her team at Northwestern University were able to show evidence SuperAgers lost less brain volume than normally aging adults.

Most people experience some cognitive decline as they age. For some reason, however, SuperAgers don't fit into that mold. The study showed SuperAgers lost only 1.06 percent of their brain volume per year, while normally aging adults lost 2.24 percent annually. Their study lasted 18 months, over which time they followed 24 SuperAgers and 12 cognitively

average elderly adults.

Most of the SuperAgers were white women with a mean age of 83.3 at the beginning of the study. The mean age of the cognitively average group was 83.4. All 36 participants were tested at the beginning of the study and 18 months later.

Emily said their findings suggest, "SuperAgers are resistant to the normal rate of decline" that they see in average elderly people. They believe it may be helpful in the search for an effective treatment or cure for Alzheimer's to seek out the biological factors or bodily processes protecting people from brain loss and resulting dementia. Knowing what protects some people could provide clues in how to help protect others.

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
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
