This one-stop medical facility aims to **meet all your health care needs**

R ed Mountain Medical Plaza is a consortium of primary care doctors, specialists, lab and imaging services, physical rehab and even a pharmacy, all located at 8035 E. Brown Road.

The same cannot be said at many other area medical facilities. For instance, you're visiting your primary care doctor, and she says, "I'd like to get some blood work on you and also an ultrasound image." Your first thought probably is you will have to spend more time scheduling appointments, driving around in traffic and waiting agonizing days for test results.

Such is not the case at Red Mountain Medical Plaza. If you need additional care, it can happen right there.

If your doctor orders tests, a staff member quickly appears at your doctor's door and escorts you to the lab or imaging areas. Results get to your primary care doctor as quickly as possible, and they are relayed back to you as soon as they are received. If you need a prescription, you can pick it up at their pharmacy on the way out.

What if your primary care doctor thinks you need a specialist, such as a cardiologist or dermatologist? If it is an urgent matter, she will pick up the phone and call her





colleague across the complex. After a brief consultation, you may be escorted right to the appropriate office, or if it is not a pressing issue, an appointment can be made quickly without weeks of waiting.

"This innovative concept of the *medical mall* was created as a community solution to health care," said Kris Smith, manager of therapy services and one of the five founding members of the group, which opened the facility in December of last year. "There are now 14 physicians and many more ancillary services all working here together. All the doctors' staffs interact with each other, so we all know each other like one big family," she stated.

"Red Mountain Medical Plaza is the first program of its kind in Arizona," Kris continued. "It is a masterplanned facility offering superior primary care and complementing it with open access to convenient services and specialty practices. It's designed to save patients time and money by striving to see patients on the same day they have health care needs," she explained further. "With health care options all under one roof for convenience, it helps break down barriers, which often deter patients from receiving the care they need when they need it."

The Medical Mall of Arizona Family Practice team of primary care physicians takes time to get to know each patient and coordinates care with other providers and services to create a hands-on, attentive experience. They also offer same-day sick visits, newborn and wellchild checks, gynecological exams, weight management services and allergy treatments.

Specialty practices include doctors who are leaders in orthopedic surgery, physical medicine, pain management, cardiology, podiatry and dermatology. Because these specialists work closely with the primary care physicians to coordinate care and maximize effective treatment outcomes, patients feel truly cared for.

"Because our facility is housed in the same complex as Heritage Village Assisted Living facility, people sometimes assume we only care for the elderly," Kris admitted. "We are open to the public, however, and care for all ages, from newborn on. The closeness of the facility does allow our practitioners to take care to the assisted living patients, though, rather than having them come to us."

The facility accepts most insurance. You can call the office to find out if yours is included.

In order to give back to the community, the group is planning to offer free health seminars to the public starting this fall. They also have partnered with Mesa art shows to display artwork around the facility, all from local artists. This original artwork is available for sale.

(MCC) is busy preparing a wide variety of beautiful, vibrant colors and forms to include in one of only two locations in the United States selected to sponsor an international rose trial.

"We are pleased The Rose Garden at Mesa Community

largest rose garden in the desert southwest, took place earlier this year, initiating a two-year trial period. The unique climatic conditions in Arizona permit planting in late December to early January, with the first

blooms appearing in early April. As many as five to six complete bloom cycles may be observed annually. Trial roses will be judged, for qualities such as health, floriferousness, novelty and scent, by three separate panels, a permanent judging panel, an international jury and the general public. The permanent judging panel, consisting of not fewer than 10 judges serving throughout the two-year period, are appointed by garden curators to represent a wide spectrum of rose knowledge and experience.

The composition of the jury will reflect an international flavor. For example, the jury will include growers, breeders, parks departments, landscape architects and



Rigorous Curriculum and STEM Program ENSURE HIGH PERFORMANCE

eometry captivated an audience at Self Development Preschool. All eyes were on the instructor, and there was a hushed tone, respectful, the kind of air you'd find in a serious honors high school math class. There were two key differences however. First, it was only a basic geometry class, and second, it was in a preschool.

The teacher asked, "What is the difference between a square and a rhombus?"

Megan, a precocious youngster, answered, "A square has four equal corners and four equal sides. A rhombus only has four equal sides."

The story is impressive, heartwarming, and thanks to a new study from University of California, Berkeley, also confirms that introducing children to advanced concepts early yields higher performing students later. This study fits a nice narrative of a stronger learning program—rigorous and advanced, integrated and playful. These three features make for extremely high performing students in later grades.

RIGOROUS AND ADVANCED

The Berkeley study found children who attend these preschools outperform peers who attended less rigorous preschools on both literacy and math. In fact, children who entered a preschool by 2.5 years of age and remain through age 4 showed stronger cognitive gains. This seems to echo a longitudinal study in Britain, showing distinct benefits from higher quality preschools.

INTEGRATED

Additionally, the integration of the subjects seems key. Enter STEM programs. STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. The curriculum is an integrated approach to teaching a series of concepts, seeing learning and subject area as interconnected rather than discrete and isolated.

Although STEM is now a common program found throughout the nation, and its veracity and efficacy has been tested *ad nauseum*, Self Development Preschool actually has been using a STEM curriculum since the late 1980s, well before its popularity. The preschool integrates discrete sciences and builds upon the concepts and knowledge through the year and across age groups. The curriculum is both vertically and horizontally aligned.

PLAYFUL

Learning seems to be easiest when educators have the benefit of an academic *Trojan Horse*, a mechanism to sneak in the tougher concepts through a gift, like play. Bruce Fuller, the lead author of the University California-Berkeley study, stated, "Simply dressing up like a firefighter or building an exquisite Lego edifice may not be enough. If you can combine creative play with rich language, formal conversations and math concepts, that's more likely to yield the cognitive gains we observed."

A child's natural inclination to play is, in fact, just the natural inclination for scientific inquiry. For the past 20 or so years, play often is used as a way of carrying out mini experiments, reaching new experiences, and revising initial hypotheses based off the results of the *experiments*.

To this end, Self Development Preschool often unites STEM learning with play activities. Recently, a graduate of Self Development Academy developed and taught a summer camp on physics. He taught aerodynamics through the use of a generations old inexpensive toy—the paper airplane. Through concepts, such as wind resistance and drag, the tiny scholars learned how to design the perfect paper airplane.

SCHOOL READINESS

These results also seem to confirm that STEM and vigorously designed preschools have extraordinary impacts on school readiness, the degree to which students are prepared



for kindergarten from the moment they matriculate.

Early childhood education programs similar to the ones offered at Self Development Preschool are examples of this research. Self Development Preschool serves as a feeder school to Self Development Academy, a top ranking school in the nation, whose grade levels usually are one to two years ahead. The administration found that students who attend Self Development Preschool first have a vastly greater likelihood of success in their studies than students who have not attended the preschool.

Early childhood education is extremely important in ensuring that children meet cognitive milestones. Programs like those at Self Development Preschool help children not only meet these milestones, but also enable them to excel at challenging and top ranking kindergarten through grade eight schools. These programs help children become the next creative architects, like I.M. Pei or Frank Gehry.

Dr. Anjum Majeed, founder of Self Development Preschool and superintendent of Self Development Academy, likes to quote Albert Einstein to illustrate this last point. "To raise new questions, new possibilities, to regard old problems from a new angle requires creative imagination and marks real advance in science."

- By law, glass containers are prohibited in the Lower Salt River Recreational Area. Ice chests will be inspected for glass containers before boarding shuttle buses, and glass containers will be confiscated. Please use plastic bottles or aluminum cans.

SAFETY TIPS

- Children, non-swimmers and inexperienced swimmers should wear life vests.
- Drink one to two bottles of water per hour while floating.
- Play it safe. Drugs, alcohol and the Salt River do not mix. Just don't do it.

Salt River Tubing operates under permit of the United States Department of Agriculture Forest Service and is located in Tonto National Forest.

The cost of tube rental is \$17 per person, which includes inner tube rental, shuttle bus service and free parking at the Salt River Tubing Terminal. Salt River Tubing is located in Northeast Mesa, just seven minutes from Highway 202 East, Exit 23A, on Power Road. ■

The appraisal process is an important aspect of the sale

By Lorraine Ryall Realtor, CDPE, CSSN **KOR** Properties here are many factors to consider when buying or selling a home, but one area often overlooked is the appraisal process.

The appraisal is ordered by the buyer's lender to determine whether the purchase price is a

true market value of the property. This is a crucial element of the sale, which is done after the inspections have been completed and is the final contingency to be met.

The appraisal contingency in the purchase contract states, "The sale is contingent upon an appraisal of the premises for at least the purchase price." If the appraisal comes in below the purchase price, the contingency has not been met and the buyer can withdraw their offer. Because you may be weeks into the closing process before the appraisal is completed, you want to do everything you can to help the appraiser meet the value.

WHY APPRAISERS ARE MORE CONSERVATIVE

Appraisers are more conservative now than ever, since the real estate crash of 2008 and the new regulations implemented since then.

Prior to the crash in the housing market, mortgage lenders pretty much had free reign and were notorious for pressuring appraisers to inflate values. Lenders could use any appraiser and often had just a handful of appraisers who got the bulk of their business. This practice was arguably one of the causes of the housing bubble.

After the crash, regulators came down hard on the role the lenders played in the appraisal process, and lenders can no longer be in direct contact with the appraiser. As a result, many lenders chose to outsource the entire process to appraisal management companies (AMCs). The management company selects the appraiser and coordinates the appointment with the listing agent.

One of the issues we have seen with some of the third-party management companies is they are using appraisers who are unfamiliar with the area and the local real estate market, which can cause below-value appraisals. Having a third party to order appraisals also has added another layer in the process and can cause delays in getting the appraisal completed.

Another change directly affecting the appraiser is the Uniform Collateral Data Portal (UCDP). It is a single portal for the electronic submission of appraisal data files to Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae and facilitates the electronic collection of appraisal report data. With the new UCDP, all appraisals are entered into the database and given a score by the automatic assessment system. If the appraisal scores too high, it will be flagged and sent back to the appraiser for further review. If an appraiser gets too many appraisals flagged, they could be added to a black list.

With the appraisals being so scrutinized, appraisers are much more conservative than ever before, and it is imperative to ensure the appraiser is experienced, knows the area, and is familiar with the neighborhood.

HOW TO PREPARE FOR AN APPRAISAL

Think of this as the most important showing you will have. You may be in the process of packing and moving. So, your house is not going to be show perfect anymore, but try to show it the best you can. The general appearance of your home can affect the appraiser's valuation.

- Have moving boxes stacked as neatly as possible.
- Open the blinds, and turn on the lights.
- Make sure all the rooms are accessible.
- Have the home as clean and tidy as possible inside and out.
- Keep pets away.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

When is the appraisal ordered?

Typically, it is ordered after the inspections are complete but can be ordered at any time.

How long will the appraiser be at the house? Approximately 30 minutes to an hour, depending on the size of the property.

How long does the appraisal take to be completed?

This will depend on the type of loan and the lender. On average, however, it will take two to five days to get the appraisal assigned once it has been ordered, and then an additional 5 to 10 days after the appraiser has come to the home to get the report completed and back to the lender.

Who pays for the appraisal?

The buyer pays for the appraisal at the time it is ordered through his lender.

Can you dispute an appraisal?

Yes, but it is very time consuming and hard to do, and there is less than a 10 percent chance of increasing the valuation after an appraisal, which is why it is so important to be ready for the appraiser.

Can a seller get his own appraisal?

A seller can have their own appraisal done at their expense. However, it cannot be used as the appraisal for the buyer's lender. The mortgage lender will always order an independent appraisal.

Your Realtor also can be an important part of the appraisal process. I would recommend asking your Realtor how they assist through the appraisal process.



your activities can be planned in advance, and you don't have to worry about food.



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

HEALTH ULTRASOUND HELPS DETERMINE the cause of symptoms

r. Craig Weinstein, a sports and orthopaedic specialist at Red Mountain Medical Plaza, explains the benefits of diagnostic musculoskeletal ultrasound.


Q: Am I a candidate for a musculoskeletal ultrasound rather than a magnetic resonance image (MRI)?

A: Orthopaedic surgeons use a number of tools to help make a diagnosis. The two most common and helpful are taking a complete history and performing a thorough physical examination.

Often, we need additional tests to help see the parts of the musculoskeletal system. Most commonly, we use an X-ray because it is widely available and easy to obtain. While immensely helpful, X-rays have their limitations. Most notably, X-rays are excellent at showing the bones but not the soft tissues. This makes them ideal for revealing breaks, showing overall alignment and assessing for joint deterioration.

Soft tissues are structures like muscles, tendons, ligaments, nerves and even blood vessels that surround the bones. Traditionally, an MRI is used to help see the soft tissues. Since 2008, we have employed ultrasound to help us visualize the soft tissues. Ultrasound uses sound waves to create an image. Thus there is no radiation involved.

While an ultrasound cannot replace a traditional musculoskeletal MRI, it does offer a number of advantages. Most importantly, an ultrasound can be performed in the office without the need for a lengthy and often expensive visit to an outside imaging facility. Unlike an MRI, it can be used to measure how much flow goes



An ultrasound is a dynamic imaging modality, meaning if certain activities cause you pain or discomfort, they can be reproduced during your exam to look for changes. In contrast, you are asked to lie completely still during an MRI, which produces static images only. In-office ultrasounds can be used to localize the source of your pain and perform a quick screening to determine the cause of your symptoms.

For certain conditions, ultrasound offers a higher resolution and better detail than even an MRI. In addition, it can help guide in-office and other minimally invasive injections and procedures to help increase accuracy and effectiveness. Healthy Teeth Will Add Years To Your Pet's Life

Thile good dental care is just as important for pets as it is for humans, it often is overlooked. Poor oral hygiene can lead to dental disease, as well as more serious or even life-threatening health problems. Taking care of your pet's teeth can not only add years to his life, but will save you money on veterinary care.

Oral health problems start as plaque—a sticky, colorless film that builds up on your pet's teeth and around the gum line. Plaque left on the teeth hardens to create tartar, which can't be removed through brushing alone. As more plaque and tartar accumulates, your pet's gums can become red and swollen. If nothing is done to remove tartar, the roots of the teeth may become infected. Eventually, the bone and tissue surrounding the teeth erode and the tooth becomes loose. This can be a very painful process for your pet.

PLAQUE AND TARTAR BUILDUP ON YOUR PET'S **TEETH CAN DEPEND ON SEVERAL THINGS**

- Your pet's age—The older your pet is the higher the risk of plaque and tartar buildup.
- Your pet's diet—If your pet eats a high-carbohydrate diet containing excessive amounts of rice, wheat, tapioca or potatoes, his teeth will need to be cleaned more frequently. It's better for your pet's dental health if he eats a diet high in quality animal protein and low in high sugar-containing carbohydrates. Dogs and cats do not produce amylase in their saliva, an enzyme that breaks down sugars. So, the more high sugarcontaining carbohydrates your pet eats, the quicker the plaque and tartar will build up on his teeth. Diets offering low sugar-containing carbohydrates are best for dental health.
- The amount of saliva your pet produces—Saliva helps to wash away food and plaque. So, the more the better.
- The breed of dog or cat—Poodles, Maltese, Yorkshire Terriers, Shelties and Pomeranians are more prone to dental disease, as are Persians, Abyssinians, Maine Coons and Somalis.

Prevention is the key to keeping your pet's teeth clean, healthy and strong. A great place to start is by regularly checking your pet's mouth for any signs of trouble. A trip to the vet is in order if you see any of the following signs:

- Severely bad breath.
- Inflamed gums (red, swollen).
- Excessive drooling.
- Loose or bleeding teeth.
- Discolored teeth.
- Plaque and/or tartar buildup on the teeth.
- Unusual lumps on the gums or under the tongue.

CONSIDER THESE HEALTHY OPTIONS


- Low sugar-containing kibble, which includes carbohydrates, such as lentils, peas, barley and rye.
- Supplement kibble with raw meaty bones, raw chicken and turkey necks.
- In between meals, offer your pet healthy natural and safe chews, like bully sticks, beef Achilles tendons, lamb, pig or cow ears and beef trachea, etc.
- Use natural dental chews, like Whimzees, Get Naked and Petzlife.
- A raw food diet.
- Regularly brush teeth or use an oral spray. Taking your pet to the vet for an annual dental

exam is a good idea. Your vet can spot any signs of trouble early on, before bigger problems can arise. Just as in humans, if plaque and tartar build up on your pet's teeth, it must be removed by scaling the teeth. Pets need to be anaesthetized, thereby allowing the vet to get under the gum line for a professional, thorough dental cleaning.

By far, the best way to keep your pet's teeth clean and healthy is by brushing them regularly or by using a no-brush oral spray. It's best to start both of these preventative practices on your pet's teeth when he is young, before the age of one. By doing so, you can establish a routine, and he is accustomed to you touching his mouth. Brushing every night is ideal, or at the very least, several times a week.

Summer of Love. Last month, we covered some of the more collectible and valuable vinyl records of the 1960s. Hopefully, you were inspired to find an old turntable, dust off some of your old albums, and take a trip down memory lane. All the leaves are brown, and the sky is grey. You get the idea.

As I mentioned last month, the field of Rock and Roll memorabilia collecting is so vast it would take a few articles to touch on just some of the categories. This month, we will cover some of the ephemera of the era. Ephemera are things intended to last only a short period of time. Political buttons, banners, magazines and other printed materials are common forms of ephemera.

Some of the most collectible ephemeral items are the posters created to advertise concerts in the San Francisco area. Typically, these posters were produced in small runs and posted on telephone poles, sides of buildings and, of course, at the concert halls themselves. Iconic venues include the Fillmore Auditorium. Cow Palace and The Avalon Ballroom, which hosted the likes of The Doors, The Grateful Dead, and Big Brother and the Holding Company,

featuring Janis Joplin.

All were looking to get the word out about upcoming concerts. So, on a shoestring budget, in the pre-Internet age, inexpensively produced posters were the way to go. A fairly small contingent of area artists was commissioned to create these colorful, mostly psychedelic neon posters, and every one of them exemplified the wild psychedelic tone of the day. Artists like Stanley Mouse, Alton Kelley, Rick Griffin and Victor Moscoso dominated the poster design scene, and many were house artists for the venues or promoters.

Nowadays, many of these posters are highly sought after and can sell for thousands of dollars. Of course, factors, such as condition and whether it is a first or subsequent printing, help determine value.

Recently, a concert poster for an Avalon Ballroom performance by The Grass Roots was spotted online for \$2,350. Another, for Janis Joplin's March 9, 1969 performance, at the University of Toledo, was offered for \$8,900. Not bad for something meant to be tossed in the trash after the event. Maybe it's time to see what's rolled up in your closet. 🔳



Now, however, with the kids out of the house, we find we have little in common with each other and are disconnected. Please help us find our way back to each other.

Dear Passing Ships, What you are describing is quite common. Life gets busy, other things

become priorities, and the relationship is put on the backburner. Little by little, the flame diminishes and by the time you realize it, it's hard to get the fire back.

The first thing I would suggest you do

is to make the effort to connect with each other on a daily basis by spending time talking without the interruption of electronics. Put down your phones, step away from your computer, turn the television off and talk to each other. Find out what's going on in each other's lives.

Another good starting point would be to have regular date nights. Alternate who plans it, and maybe even add the element of surprise by not telling your partner what the plans are (aka a surprise date).



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

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
