"Nobody really thought about an integrative, horizontally-aligned, vertically-aligned curriculum for preschools. So, as the students started to grow, the parents saw them go to traditional schools, and then the charter movement came about. So, they put a lot of pressure on us to open a charter school because the students were so advanced."

The nationally recognized school boasts a top ten ranking among all Arizona schools for the amount of curriculum it is able to provide students during the academic year. In addition, the academy teaches a grade level above Arizona standards, and consistently sees its students surpass the Arizona average on standardized testing.

Above and beyond its impressive well-rounded curriculum, the academy even offers a more challenging and accelerated path for its most motivated and gifted students. In middle school, Self Development Academy offers such high school courses as Geometry, Algebra II, Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Advanced Literature.

In addition to academics, Self Development Academy prioritizes shaping its students into well-rounded individuals, with a variety of hands-on learning programs that


go beyond the typical lesson plan. Students have the opportunity to participate in science labs, take percussion lessons and learn about technology integration.



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
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

Trust Skilled Physical Therapy Rather Than Non-Medical Resources

When your physician recommends an evaluation by a licensed physical therapist, please listen. The expectation is that you will get better, and if therapy does not fully resolve your symptoms, your physician can continue along the pathway with options for resolution of your condition.

You Tube and Google are great resources, but they do not replace the training and critical thinking a licensed, skilled physical therapist can provide. ■

Mesa Public Schools PE teachers score a **WINNING GOAL WITH THE ARIZONA COYOTES**

E lementary students throughout Mesa Public Schools are learning street hockey skills, thanks to the Arizona Coyotes.

The team provided training and equipment for physical education teachers.

The district received a Coyotes-branded equipment package worth \$80,000 to launch the program, part of a partnership with the National Hockey League, National Hockey League Players' Association and the Industry Growth Fund League. Last November, Matt Shott, Coyotes director of amateur hockey development, trained 80 district elementary PE teachers on the curriculum and equipment.

"We provide the tools to make teaching hockey easier," Matt said. "Teachers know their students better than we do, and it is cool to see how teachers

tailor the curriculum to fit their classes." Mesa Public Schools is one of

the first districts to participate in the Coyotes Street Hockey Program, which the team hopes to expand to 700 schools statewide.

"The curriculum impacts 56 district elementary schools, reaching students in kindergarten to sixth grade," stated Deb Pangrazi, district elementary PE specialist. "This generous program provides Mesa with the most top-notch equipment in Arizona."

Equipment for each school includes 50 hockey sticks and balls, 50 scrimmage vests, two nets, a stick bag and Coyotes *Raise the Pack* banners. Teachers received a gift backpack, including flash drives with curriculum and videos for quality lessons, and booklets with overviews of teaching points, drills and game ideas. For PE teachers and students in fourth through sixth grades, the Coyotes provided free passes to see the team in action.

Teachers launched Coyotes Street Hockey in January.



According to Rich Peace, a veteran PE teacher at Hermosa Vista Elementary School, hockey teaches students about collaboration and sportsmanship while having fun.

Rich enjoyed the quality lessons taught in training.

"I played new games, and got a fresh approach to teaching skills and drills," he said. "Of course, I love the new equipment. The kids like the new balls because they move quickly and are easy to control. The hockey nets are awesome because they simulate a real hockey game feel."

Become Mindful Parents to Encourage Mindful Children

There is nothing inherently fantastic about this moment, but because I've engaged a bit of intentional situation awareness, reading seems to have more character.

Let's continue. Feel your feet in your socks, on the ground. Become aware of your breath, its simplicity and its flow. Feel the texture of the page. Capture the tones of colors in your periphery. Tune in to the sounds and squeaks of the environment around you. You are enlivening your senses until your mind is full. You are being mindful.

WHAT ISN'T MINDFULNESS?

You've certainly seen the image on magazines. An attractive person in yoga clothes tucked away neatly into a protective cocoon of a glowing halo, safely guarded from bills, taxes, teenagers and flash floods. This is not mindfulness. This is escapism.

WHAT IS MINDFULNESS?

Mindfulness, by its nature, is reality-based. Did you come home and notice that the dishes you had asked your teenage child to clean and put away were still there—in the sink. With more dishes added audaciously? Mindfulness isn't escaping to your happy place. It is recognizing the valid frustration attendant to this experience but not letting that frustration make the situation worse. While there are a million articles, each with millions of components to being mindful, we have narrowed them down to four essential mindfulness skills.

1. Observing the Environment—Mindfulness is about observing your environment like a video camera, engaging in wordless watching. Merely notice the body sensations but do not respond to the action urges. If you feel an itch or pain, simply notice it. You can even tell yourself, sensing. Observing the environment means paying attention on purpose to the present moment. It also means controlling your attention, pushing away nothing and clinging onto nothing.



2. Participate with Reality-Completely, wholeheartedly and 100 percent throw yourself into the activities of the current moment. Whatever that may be. Talking to a friend, playing football, even just driving. Become one with whatever you may be doing. Go with the flow.

3. Nonjudgmentally—Observe the environment, the events, the emotions, the facts of life, but don't evaluate them as good or bad. Just the facts, ma'am. This probably is the hardest skill. We humans are judgment machines. We are built to draw conclusions about the world. Resist this natural inclination, and become a video camera. Take in raw data and understand that you are part of the viewfinder. Record your own reactions and thought patterns, but don't judge them.

4. One-mindfully—Humans, by our nature, obsess over the past and worry about the future. It's a survival mechanism, but it really can take us from savoring the love we have surrounding us when we come home from work. To this end, commit yourself to being only here. Right here. If you find yourself thinking about the past or future, you can just say *thinking*. Let go of distractions like other action urges or thoughts and come back to what you are doing over and over.

WHEN TO PRACTICE MINDFULNESS

Quite possibly one of the best ways to practice mindfulness is while spending time with your children. And,

of course, there are clear benefits for your child, as well. Mindfulness can help your child regulate his own emotions, develop coping skills, even increase his attention span. Mindfulness can decrease screen time and increase enjoyment in a wide variety of activities. Here are some ideas to practice with your children:

1. Share a three-breath hug—Hug your child. While hugging, you and your child take three intentional breaths together. Inhale and expand your bellies against each other. Hold at the top for a second. Exhale, dropping your shoulders and relaxing all of your muscles, letting go of all tension in your bodies. Repeat two more times.

2. Share your sensations, thoughts and feelings-Have your child share about them, too. Pretend to be like a detective or a doctor, finding out what our brain is telling us. What our body wants us to do. What are we feeling exactly? Sad, or despondent? Angry or annoyed?

3. Mindfulness Practice—You also can schedule time to engage in mindfulness practice. Close your eyes and pay attention to your breath. Imagine your thoughts as clouds. Coming and going. Watch them come and go, but don't latch on to any one thought.

4. Name five things that are giving you comfort— Trade off with your child in naming five mundane things that are making you comfortable right now. For me, it's the taste of Sprite in my mouth, which I can still taste from lunch. It's comfy socks I chose to wear today. It's that I am sitting cross-legged at a desk. It's the slight smile I have while I am typing.

Mindfulness is really the act of savoring each moment, finding a secret indulgence often overlooked. What better time to practice than with the one with whom your time spent feels the most decadent—your children?

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HEALTH EARN WHAT TO DC WHEN TURNING 65

a friend at lunch recently, she mentioned she was turning 65 in a couple of years but really wished she understood Medicare.

She asked me if it was too early to be thinking about it. My reply was, "Absolutely not."



For most people, turning 65 means you're eligible for Original Medicare, Part A and Part B. This federal program provides hospital insurance and some medical insurance to Americans 65 and older and those under 65 with certain disabilities.

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

Featured Speaker Discusses Value **OF FRIENDS OF TONTO VOLUNTEERS**

Red Mountain Ranch Social Club ed Mountain Ranch Social Club's March guest speaker was Patti Fenner, executive director of the volunteer group, Friends of Tonto National Forest (FOTNF).

During her 33-year career with Tonto National Forest, Patti worked as a range conservationist, then as a noxious weed program manager during her last 10 years. Upon retiring five years ago, she founded the non-profit organization Friends of the Tonto National Forest.

This organization assists the forest in its critical mission to sustain and manage our natural desert and cultural resources for future generations. Friends of Tonto National Forest Volunteers organize and participate in community outreach, projects and outings to promote this worthy cause.

Tonto is the seventh largest national forest in the United States. Vegetation communities range from Sonoran Desert, to grasslands, to ponderosa pine forest. Resources managed on the Tonto include wildlife habitat, archaeological sites, rangelands used for permitted domestic livestock grazing, recreation, wilderness and minerals.

The forest holds unparalleled opportunities for hiking, horseback riding, hunting, fishing and exploration. Most important, it's right outside your back door. Roosevelt Dam, which was completed in 1911, was the reason Tonto National Forest was created by President Theodore Roosevelt.

Weeds spread very rapidly throughout the desert and crowd out native plants. Presently, two South African plants, Fountaingrass and Buffelgrass are threatening the long-term survival of many Arizona Sonoran Desert species, including our saguaro.

Fountaingrass is a close relative of Buffelgrass, the most problematic invasive species in Saguaro National Park. Fountaingrass is present in much of the western United States and is a big problem in Arizona.

Regrettably, Fountaingrass has escaped to Tonto National Forest. Moving rapidly, dangerous Fountaingrass and Buffelgrass fires burn at 1,400 degrees.

These plants alter the fire cycle to the detriment of native plants and animal species. During wet winters, invasive annual grasses flourish. Desert summer begins and the grass dries. When lightning strikes the Sonoran Desert, devastating fires have resulted from these dry invasive grasses.

FOTNF have been mapping out areas of non-native dangerous plants. Volunteers remove grass by digging it out. Additionally, the Tonto uses contractors who are certified to apply herbicides to control larger infestations.

If you notice any Fountaingrass in the desert and would like to help map, Friends of the Tonto use a smartphone app that can be downloaded for free, called *Collector*. If you would like to help with mapping these two invasive grasses in Central Arizona, contact Friends of the Tonto at friendsoftontonf@gmail.com.

They can provide brief training, so you are able to definitively identify Fountaingrass and Buffelgrass, download and use the Collector app on your phone, and provide passwords to be able to contribute to their electronic maps.

- Every fall, volunteers restore the monarch butterfly habitat. In addition to this project, there are several more that
- are helping Tonto National Forest in its mission, including: • Riparian photo point monitoring of more than 1,000 sites forest wide.
 - Range and wildlife water development inventory.
 - Adopt-a-Trail and Adopt-a-Site.

Patti encouraged anyone to become a member of FOTNF by checking out friendsofthetonto.org, a 501(c)(3) organization.

Because of the increase in fires, limited budget and reduced staffing, Tonto National Forest highly values this volunteer organization to aid in the conservation of our natural resources.

Sellers Often Make Seven Mistakes When Showing Their Homes

s soon as it is listed, you anxiously await the showings to start flooding in for your home.

The first couple of weeks usually are the busiest for a new listing. So, don't be surprised if



showings quiet down a little after the initial week or two.

You should have a professional photographer take excellent pictures that will showcase your home on the Internet. This is the first place buyers will look, and those pictures will determine if the buyer takes the next step to set up an appointment to view your home.

The last thing you want to do is have the buyer come to the house and say, "It doesn't look anything like the pictures." The photographs showcased your home, but now it's your turn. How you handle showings can have a big impact on how quickly you sell and for how much you sell.

When I take my clients to view homes, we often are amazed at some of the things we find. Many are things that have a negative impact on the buyer, but can easily be avoided. The buyer's first impression is so important and will set the stage for the rest of the showing.

MISTAKE NO. 1 BAD SMELL

This can be pet odor, house odor or scents that just are too strong. If buyers walk into a house to pet odor, chances are they will turn around and walk right back out. A musky or stale house smell can be remedied easily with a good cleaning and airing of the home.

While using scents, such as plug-ins, air diffusers or candles, is a good idea make sure it's subtle and not overpowering. Apart from the fact some buyers may be bothered by strong scents, it also can make them wonder if they are covering up something else.

MISTAKE NO. 2 TOO MUCH CLUTTER

Buyers need to be able to see themselves and their family living in your home, but that's hard to do if it's full of clutter. You want your home to look as spacious and open as possible. So, now is a great time to get a head start on your packing and the boxing up of all your knick-knacks and personal items. A home with clutter makes it feel messy and smaller than it is.

MISTAKE NO. 3 LEAVING LOTS OF FAMILY PICTURES OUT

I am not a believer that all photos need to be removed. Having some family pictures shows it is a family home with happy memories. However, if you have a wall with lots of pictures, take down all but a couple, and don't forget to patch up the holes left behind.

MISTAKE NO. 4 YOUR HOME ISN'T CLEAN AND TIDY

Think about a model home, the way it makes you feel when you enter. It's clean and bright, with everything having its place. That's the feel you want your home to have when buyers walk in.

Make sure all the beds are made, clothes are put away and the dishes are done. Keep your kitchen countertops clean and free of appliances, too.

The same applies for the bathrooms. Keep the countertops and showers clean and free from personal items. One of the simplest ways to do this is to have all your shower and bathroom items in a bin. That way, when there is a showing, you just pick it up and stash it under the sink or in a closet.

The same can be done with kids' toys and other items. Have one or two laundry baskets ready to grab. If you have to leave in a rush, you can just sweep the house, picking up anything that has been left out and put it in the laundry basket. Stash it in a closet or in the garage. You even can put it in the back of your car for the showing.

MISTAKE NO. 5 HOME IS TOO DARK

Open the blinds or shutters to let in light and turn lights on, especially side lamps that can give your home a soft warm glow. You may not want to open all the blinds if you are selling in the summer. So, open the blinds on the windows that don't get all the sun, and make sure to turn on the lights. You also can crack the blinds enough to let in the light but not the direct sun.

MISTAKE NO. 6 FORGETTING TO CHECK THE OUTSIDE

You can spend so much time getting ready on the inside that you forget the outside. Make sure you keep up with the landscaping and curb appeal. It is so important and the first impression a buyer gets of your home.

Check the backyard, and pick up anything that has been left out from the weekend BBQ or family pool party.

A quick way to help brighten up the yard is planting annuals in pots and replacing faded chair cushions with new bright ones.

If you have pets, don't forget to pick up the poop before the showing. That's the last thing you want a buyer to have to deal with.

MISTAKE NO. 7

NOT LEAVING DURING SHOWINGS There is nothing more awkward than showing a home

to buyers when the seller doesn't leave. The buyer feels uncomfortable and doesn't want to make any comments or ask questions, knowing the seller may overhear.

Instead of taking their time to go through the home and appreciate everything your home has to offer, they will rush through, so they don't inconvenience the seller anymore. The last thing you want to do is make a buyer rush or feel uncomfortable in your home.

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Prepare the Body to Make the Swing

eplacing a windshield is a common thing here in Arizona. Why is that? Think about the landscape. The highways and hillsides are decorated with colorful rock and gravel. A brief drive into this gravel can kick rock up onto roadways. A tiny rock easily can get flipped up onto vehicles at a high speed, resulting in a glass chip. In extreme heat, this chip can fracture into a long crack in a matter of minutes.

Originally, a windshield was placed on a car to shield from rain and wind. Since then, glass has taken on a much bigger function. Some examples include the windshield acts as a backboard

for the airbag to deploy. The glass helps prevent ejection from the vehicle. Today, 60 percent of a car's integrity is dependent on the glass.

So, the next time you hear that sharp click on the windshield and it leaves a chip, don't procrastinate the chip repair too long. Take your windshield to a professional for an assessment.


Chip repairs are only as good as the technician, tools and products used. An experienced technician can improve the cosmetic look 80 percent to 90 percent. It will never disappear, but just will look better.

In the chip, loose tiny glass shards are embedded. These extra pieces need to be cleaned out. This can be very tedious. The right kind of pressure must occur while slowly filling the hole with resin. This must be done carefully to keep the air bubbles out and the repair clean.

Unfortunately, this repair can be \$50 to \$130 per chip, depending on your auto insurance coverage. Price fixing, done by big national brands, inflates those prices. Shop around. Some windshield replacement companies will do the first chip repair for free.

Health Care Career Opportunities Expand AT MCC RED MOUNTAIN CAMPUS

Submitted by Mesa Community College esa Community College (MCC) is expanding its health care career education opportunities with the relocation of the Nurse Assisting Program to its Red Mountain Campus.

A new, 1,646-square-foot facility is being created by a renovation of the Acacia Village building, which will feature a 10-bed laboratory for student training. Although the new facility is based on the best aspects of the former nursing assistant teaching space on the Southern and Dobson Campus, federal Carl Perkins funds are being used at the Red Mountain site to provide all new, state-ofthe-art equipment and media.

"In addition to this new facility, we have restructured our former full-semester program into eight weeks so we will be able to serve more students interested in this in-demand occupation," said Diane Dietz, Nursing Department chair. "The course includes lectures, lab and clinical experience to prepare students for the State of Arizona exam to become a certified nursing assistant (CNA) or licensed nursing assistant (LNA)."

NURSING ASSISTANTS IN DEMAND

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the need for nursing assistants is expected to continue to increase at a much faster pace than most occupations. Nursing assistants provide basic care to young and old patients under the direction of nursing staff. Diane added that the MCC program is highly regarded and extremely affordable compared to for-profit colleges.

The Nurse Assisting Program often is where many students begin their journey to becoming a registered nurse (RN). The MCC Nursing Program is ranked No.1 in the RegisteredNursing.org list of 2019 Best RN Programs in Arizona. The ranking is based on analysis of National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) RN pass rates, comparing the percentage of graduates who pass the exam on the first attempt among the 27 RN programs in the state.



Pending site evaluation and approval by the Arizona State Board of Nursing, the Nurse Assisting Program at the Red Mountain campus is scheduled to begin in the Fall 2019 semester. 

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
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Downsizing Can Be A Daunting Process

By John Karadsheh f you've thought about downsizing, you're not alone.

We always have a steady stream of clients looking to scale back the size of their homes, simplify their home maintenance, and reduce their expenses by downsizing their primary properties.



Unless you have just watched a marathon of Marie Kondo's *Tidying Up* on Netflix, downsizing feels like a daunting task. Deciding what to keep and what to get rid of can be overwhelming and paralyzing. Moreover, rethinking how you want to live your life in a smaller space requires recrafting what already may feel perfectly comfortable. However, with some forward thought and planning, the process can be both positive and liberating.

The first thing to do when considering a downsize move is to establish why you want to do so. Maybe downsizing allows you to work less or retire earlier. Perhaps the move will allow more time for family or resources for travel. Maybe the change will simply provide peace of mind.

Our clients who have established their goals and focused on them have found happiness in the downsizing process. Moving because you think you *should* is never as inspiring as moving because you want to have the capacity to do something more.

Secondly, think about how you are going to use your home in the next five to 10 years, and then prioritize your wants and needs. Perhaps you love to restore cars and a three-car garage is a priority. For someone else, a gated community, with included yard maintenance, is key because they desire to travel more. Another person may just want to eliminate the mortgage to have more financial freedom.

The challenge with downsizing is that most clients

have everything they want in their current home. So, the process of giving something up feels uncomfortable.

Next, evaluate the costs. If you are downsizing to reduce expenses, carefully consider your current home expenses. Run scenarios for what costs might be associated with a move and establishing your next home (we can help with this).

Perhaps your idea is to move from a single-family home into a condo. This sounds like a great idea. However, will it really be less expensive? HOA fees in condo communities normally are much higher than traditional HOA fees. So, it is worth taking the numbers into account.

Also, smaller homes are in demand, so sometimes it costs the same amount to move into a smaller, newer home than it would to stay in your existing home. Because of this, many clients who start out with the intention of downsizing have found that it makes more financial sense to stay put, do a remodel and hire a maintenance service.



After answering the why, how and where questions associated with your situation, we recommend starting with a *pre-move* to prioritize what items in your home you wish to keep. When downsizing, it usually is not possible to take all the items from a 3,500-square-foot, three-car garage home and comfortably fit them into a 1,600-squarefoot condo with a two-car garage.

We will admit this part of downsizing can be a difficult process, but try to focus on keeping the things you love and will use every day and not as much on the items you might need one day or *should* keep.

One of our clients, who recently downsized, told us that she got rid of her everyday dishes and decided that from now on she would just use her Waterford glasses, fine china and sterling silver. "With our luck, our kids will just donate the lot to Goodwill," she said. "So, we may as well enjoy our beautiful things every day starting now."

In addition to slowly starting the *pre-move*, it is critically important to get out and start looking at what type of housing options are available. We find that clients often need six months to a year to wrap their heads around what they are looking for and what compromises they are willing to make, and blend that with what actually is available in the marketplace and within their budget.
