

7ith temperatures heating up and more people ready to dip their toes in the water, the Mesa Fire and Medical Department has provided my office with information to share with the community.



DROWNING PREVENTION TIPS

- · Supervise children at all times, even when you don't expect them to be around the water.
- Put non-proficient swimmers in life vests when you have a party or family gathering and a pool or spa is
- When around water, always designate a water watcher. Don't assume someone else is watching the children. Use water tags as reminders.
- · When small children are in the water, always keep them within arms reach.
- Use properly working fences, locks, alarms and other barriers to allow more time in case you lose track of your child.

- · Always check water areas first if you lose track of your
- Floaties are toys. Only use Coast Guard-approved flotation devices (life vests).
- Learn CPR—Mesa Fire has free lifesaver classes each month. Sign up at mesaaz.gov/fire.
- All family members should learn to swim.
- Non swimmers should not be the supervisors/water
- No one should swim alone at any age. In Arizona, we actually have more adults drown than children.
- If you have a canal in your area:
- Children should not be unsupervised when outside.
- Talk to children about the dangers and to not play by the edge.
- Never swim in a canal. They have strong undercurrents that can pull you under.

Have fun out there, but please, always remember to be safe around water.

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Self Development Preschool CELEBRATES 30 YEARS

elf Development Preschool (SDP) is now 30 years old. In that time, our staff and students have seen six presidents come and go. Just like President Bush Sr. and President Bush Jr., who walked the halls of the White House, this preschool building also has seen fathers and then sons walk through these halls and rooms of SDP.

Josh Pyle, former attendee who now sends his daughter to the preschool, said, "It all seems the same, only the size of the building and rooms seem smaller. When you are a kid, things seem so big," he continued. "The great room and the outside area when I was 7 years old were both massive compared to how I view them today."

Self Development Preschool opened in June 1988 with just 49 students. Asif and Anjum Majeed, along with the support of a few close and trusted friends, Vernetta Madsen and Rachel Hunt, founded Self Development Preschool. The idea underpinning SDP was as radical as it was necessary.

A child's inner capabilities are limitless when the child engages in self-reflection. "Self Development encompasses the acceptance of one's weakness, as well as strengths, and enhances self-esteem," said Dr. Anjum Majeed. "The school's mission is to foster the development of each student's maximum potential," she added.

"When Dr. Majeed approached me about moving to Arizona from Wyoming to be the director of her preschool, I knew it would be a great opportunity I could not pass up," said Vernetta Madsen, who still serves as director of the preschool. She also oversees Human Resources for the two Self Development academies.

"Anjie would concentrate on my strengths to help me grow by seeing how I could turn my weaknesses into strengths," said Ms. Vernetta. "The result of that is I grew in all areas and became the person I am today."

Sound familiar? This was exactly Dr. Majeed's definition of self-development. Dr. Majeed walks the walk and

What set SDP apart from other early childhood programs was the seamless way the preschool mirrored the best parts of home life. Kim Kunkle, parent and now grandparent to a preschool student remembers, "We were welcomed with open hearts by Ms. Vernetta."

According to Dr. Majeed, something special made SDP stand apart from other schools. "It's the caring and committed staff who truly believe in nurturing the youngsters and assisting them to reach their maximum potential." Kim agrees, "We are very happy with SDP and SDA," she stated.

Ms. Vernetta, in particular, seems to have been a key source of affection and love for these students and parents. "Even today, Ms. Vernetta seems to be synonymous for me with Self Development," said Josh. "She's always been kind



to me, personally, and to see my daughter and the affection she has for Ms. Vernetta, hugging her every time she sees her, is really special."

Reflecting on why she brought her own daughter to the school, Ms. Vernetta said, "The school is like family, and the staff goes out of their way to make sure everyone feels the same way." It was as much the school as it was the people.

Like Ms. Vernetta, Sara Pringle would not only work for, but would bring her daughter to Self Development. "It was my second home," said Sara, a former student who spends her adult time at Self Development, working at the academy next door.

"The teachers and staff were loving and nurturing constantly pushing us to be the best versions of ourselves," Sara remembered. "We were constantly taught to support and love one another, no matter our differences.

"The persistent push to be mindful, respectful human beings truly has helped mold me into who I am today," Sara further stated. "This same push is what solidified my decision to send my daughter to Self Development Preschool and on to Self Development Academy when she starts kindergarten."

Decades later, SDP continues to be a loving and nurturing place. "I feel the same personal connection of each teacher and staff member with each other, their care for the students, and the scholastic strength now, as I, we, did more than 20 years ago as a mother and as a grandmother," Kim Kunkle stated. "We absolutely love this school."

The love and care the staff provides at SDP allows the children to explore the world, rich with knowledge, skills and concepts. "At 4 years of age, my daughter, Shelby, could tell you the functions of her organs in her body and why we needed them," said Kim. Achieving such high-level thinking at such a young age meant resolute foresight into how the multiple age levels aligned in terms of their

cognitive development.

Rebecca Gau, a former parent of SDP and SDA, often recalls what surprised her about Self Development Preschool. "Not only did the preschool provide an enriched and integrated thematic curriculum, but this curriculum also was horizontally and vertically aligned with the other classrooms and ages of students," she said.

Fortunately for the kids, the intellectualism surrounding the design of the curriculum translated into serious fun for the students. Dr. Majeed emphasizes that educators should leverage children's instincts to play as means of discovery and learning. "Through play, they learn about concepts of float and sink and volume while spending time at the water table," she stated.

"I had a great group of friends I used to run around with there and it was always a fun way to end my school day," Josh recalled. And Kim remembers the experiences of her son, Nick. "He had fun every day, not even realizing how much he was learning scholastically and as a human being." Serious play was subterfuge for serious learning.

There is a core to every person. An essence no fury of predicament or catastrophe could shake. The seasons will change and the canyons we cross are tattooed on our faces, but inherent to everyone is a root that remains. Self Development Preschool is like that.

The same persons walk in through the same glass door, but they come in and out as parents, not students. Their children see the same walls, but hung on them is PAW Patrol, not Barney or Dora. Self Development Preschool adapts enough to just accentuate what made itself great over 30 years. ■

Maynard is a Grammy award-winning vocalist for the internationally revered music acts Tool and A Perfect Circle. This international rock star has set out to rock the wine business. As enticing as it may be, their current limited production doesn't allow for international distribution, and only a handful of blends are available for national distribution in select territories.

ABOUT THE VINEYARDS

Maynard, a U.S. Army veteran, is winemaker and owner of Caduceus Cellars and Merkin Vineyards, with 110 acres under vine throughout the state. Caduceus Cellars produces approximately 2,500 cases a year. Maynard researched wine-growing regions around the world to identify the varieties best suited for the high-desert conditions found in the Verde Valley, Cochise County and regions in New Mexico. As a result, the winery is producing some of Arizona's finest wines using Spanish, Italian and Rhone varieties.

Caduceus Cellars currently has five different blocks in Northern Arizona—Judith's Block on Cleopatra Hill, Jerome, 4,900 feet, is a combination of limestone, volcanic and sedimentary rock. The Marzo Block, 3,500 feet, and at 3,300 feet, The Agostina Block, are covered with fine river sediment over a bed of calcareous substrate. The Elephante Block, in Cornville, has a minimum of five different soils/terrain profiles all on a 28-acre site. The Southwest Wine Center, Yavapai College Block, is nestled in the alluvial foothills of Mingus Mountain. All this is peppered with volcanic magic dust. The main fruit source for Merkin Vineyards is the historic 70-acre Buhl Memorial Vineyard in the Kansas Settlement of Willcox.

Maynard also is owner, winemaker and founder of the Arizonabased wine makers cooperative, Four Eight Wineworks, as well as a founding board member of the Arizona Vignerons Alliance, a quality control and winegrower's data collection collective. He has been a participating member of the Arizona Winegrowers Association since 2009.



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A Bad Appraisal Doesn't Have to be a Deal Killer

fter having the most bizarre experience with an appraisal recently, which went from one extreme to the other, I thought it would make a great article to share.

In my 11 years of real estate, I have seen some crazy appraisals, but this one takes the cake. It's also a great example of how a bad

appraisal doesn't always have to mean the sale falls apart. After months of looking for the perfect home, the buyer I was representing found exactly what she was looking for here in East Mesa. The home had been on the market for only two weeks and was priced at \$625,000. After some counters back and forth, they agreed on a purchase price of \$615,000.

After the inspections were complete, the lender ordered the appraisal. I have to start by saying my buyer was using an out-of-state bank for her loan, which I had advised could cause issues. However, my client had all her personal and business accounts with this particular bank, and she didn't want to have to start over with a new lender. She assured me she had a great relationship with the bank, and they would take great care of her.

As I mentioned, the home was listed for \$625K, and the purchase price was \$615K. So, you can imagine how shocked we all were when the appraisal came back at \$537K.

As Realtors, we get involved in so many aspects of a home sale, many more than I am sure our clients can even imagine, and one of them is the appraisal. I have taken many classes with appraisers to understand how they value homes and what their guidelines are.

I studied the appraisal and outlined all the things that were wrong—the comps that were too old or too small to be used based on appraisal guidelines and the incorrect value used on items, such as the value of the lot and upgrades. I ran a new report showing exactly why I was

disputing this appraisal.

I presented my case to the bank. I was feeling pretty confident this appraisal would be in the 1 percent to get overturned, and we could get an adjusted value. A few days later, the bank called informing us they were ordering a completely new appraisal. While this was rare, we all were very relieved to learn a completely new appraisal was going to be done.

After about a week, we got the new appraisal. As I mentioned, the first appraisal was \$537K, and the new appraisal came back at \$615K, the exact price of the purchase contract and a \$78,000 difference from the first appraisal.

This is a great example of how an appraisal is such an important part of selling your home. When you list your home, your Realtor should thoroughly understand the appraisal process and how to contest an appraisal, if

necessary. When situations like this come up, and trust me they do, it's the Realtor's knowledge and experience that can literally save the sale.

A bad appraisal doesn't have to mean the sale has to fall apart. If it's a bad appraisal, it can be disputed, and if that isn't a possibility, there are other things both the buyer and seller can do to work through the challenge.

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

SPRING IS IN THE AIR

7 ith the winter over and nothing but sunshine (and some monsoons) in front of us, every HOA will see an increase of work being done by the landscapers in the community.

For instance, in Red Mountain Ranch Owners Association (RMROA), those organizations are DLC Resources Inc., in common areas, and Klean-Rite Landscaping, in the Villages.

All such contractors are into their pruning schedule. The following schedule is recommended by the Arizona Landscapers Contractors Association (ALCA) for shrub pruning and is the schedule our landscapers use as their guide:

January and February—grasses, oleanders, sages and tecomas are trimmed.

March through May-frost-sensitive plant material, such

as lantana, bougainvillea cassia, dalea, acacia redolens, calliandra brittlebush, is trimmed.

June—oleander are trimmed after blooming.

September through November—yucca and hesperaloe flower stalks and Mexican birds are trimmed.

December—grasses and oleanders are trimmed.

This above list is used as a guide. You may see some types of plant material on the list twice. Below are other items to help you prepare for the upcoming season(s):

MONSOON STORMS

July and August find us squarely in monsoon season. While we welcome the summer rains, the vigorous storms present some challenges for plant material. As your landscape management provider, we are prepared to deal with the effects of monsoon events.

Prior to the monsoon season, DLC Resources Inc. utilizes a proactive tree management program. Although strong storms and microbursts can damage any tree, we continually seek to minimize tree damage by identifying trees most likely to be severely affected by high winds. These trees are pruned to remove overly thick foliage and dead or structurally unsound branches to minimize the chance the tree will be damaged or cause damage during a storm.

When monsoon storms arrive, the emphasis shifts to cleanup and repair. Typically, the summer storms occur late in the day, after crews have left the property for the day. For immediate emergency aid, we have personnel on call 24 hours a day. These workers are equipped to deal with the most pressing effects of the storm, such as trees blocking streets or sidewalks.

Full-scale cleanup generally begins the following morning. Normal maintenance activities may need to be suspended or reduced in scope while the crew cleans up

debris and performs repairs. If necessary, extra personnel will be provided to expedite the storm cleanup.

In spite of the damage these summer storms can cause, there is a silver lining to the monsoon clouds—moisture. The monsoon presents us all with a great opportunity to save water. We assess the amount of water each storm brings and suspend or adjust irrigation schedules appropriately. Not only is rainwater free, it also is superior to irrigation water due to its lower alkalinity. In addition to providing moisture, the rainwater helps leach accumulated salts away from the roots of shrubs, trees and turf.

ASSESS YOUR OWN YARD

You can benefit from similar pre-monsoon practices in your yard. Assess your trees and have dead branches removed. If the foliage in your tree is exceedingly thick and heavy, have the tree pruned. You may want to hire a certified arborist to do the assessment for you.

Following a storm, check the status of your irrigation controller. Power outages can reset irrigation clocks and schedules, and it may not be appropriate for the weather. If your property receives a substantial amount of rain, turn off your irrigation system. Be aware of your plant material and soil moisture in order to determine when the water needs to be turned on again. Overall, you may not need to water as much as you did in the drier months of May and June.

Even if it does not rain, be aware of high humidity. Observe the condition of your plants, and check the moisture of your soil. The best way to check soil moisture is to stick a screwdriver in the ground. If you are able to insert the screwdriver easily to approximately six inches, there is enough moisture in the soil. If you have difficulty, you may need to apply more water.

Just some tips to assist you with your landscaping. Happy gardening. ■



It's Just a Pain in the Neck

ost likely you have experienced neck pain at some point in your life.

This pain often can be for just a few moments, such as after craning your neck to look at something at an awkward angle. Pain also could last several minutes or hours, such as when you wake up from sleeping with your head in a bad position, like sleeping in a car or on a plane.

Unfortunately, neck pain also can last for days, weeks or even years. Usually, neck pain that lasts for longer periods of time comes from some sort of trauma. For example, it can be due to a contact sport like football, being involved in a motor vehicle collision, or other activities that may lead to a fall (any bull riders out there?).

One of the most often overlooked, but very common causes of neck pain, is poor posture, or when completing some work activities, especially if you work extensively seated at a computer.

Neck pain can arise from many different causes, as well as any of the tissues of the neck. You could have degeneration in the discs, arthritic changes, bone spurs or simply a soft tissue disorder that causes muscular pain.

Other symptoms that can often be associated with neck pain include numbness and tingling, or weakness in the arms and dizziness from a type of vertigo called cervicogenic vertigo. Additional symptoms might be sharp pains with motion of the neck and head, shooting pains in the arms, or tightness and achiness, proving to be more constant in the muscles of the neck.



If you are experiencing neck pain alone, it often can be relieved by simple measures. However, sometimes the pain may require intervention by a health care provider. If you are experiencing neck pain with associated symptoms of shooting pains, numbness or tingling, or weakness in the arms, this could be a sign of a more serious condition. You should consult your physician.

Treatment options can include things that are as simple as cold/hot packs, simple stretches and light exercise, as well as rest. There also are some conditions that may require further treatment, including medications/injections, acupuncture, spine mobilizations or traction. The most severe cases may require surgery.

The most important thing is to have a medical provider assess the pain and start an intervention. You could see a family physician, an orthopedic specialist, a chiropractor, or a physical therapist to assess your needs.

Remember that early intervention typically will help alleviate symptoms more quickly and get you back to doing things you love, without the big pain in the neck.

Submitted by Tapestry Insurance Tpon retiring after a 35-year teaching career with the State of Arizona, my mother-in-law joined the state's Senior Supplement Plan, but everything changed this year, and, at the same time, I learned a great deal while helping manage her health care.



For the past 20 years, my motherin-law had Medicare Supplement Plan F. However, the state retirement board recently changed all Senior Supplement beneficiaries to an Advantage plan. It has been interesting observing the differences in the two types of plans.

First, I found she is able to save quite a bit of money on her monthly premiums. Her Advantage plan premium is about \$150 less a month than what she had been paying. At age 85, she is enjoying the savings. She does, however, have to pay co-pays when she has medical services.

Second, I found that because she started with a Medicare Supplement plan when she first joined Medicare, she is eligible for a free look at an Advantage plan. Meaning that throughout this entire year, she can go back to the Medicare Supplement plan any time this year if she is unhappy with the Advantage plan. This allows her to have up to a year to decide which plan is best for her.

Right now, we still are testing the waters. There have been some wonderful savings, but we also have run into a few things that have her considering a return to the Medicare Supplement plan she has had for the past 20 years. The good news is there are choices in Medicare.

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



- A valid driver's license is required for a tube rental deposit per five tubes rented.
- Children must be at least 8 years old and 4 feet tall for tubing and shuttle bus service.
- Life vests are strongly recommended for children, non-swimmers and inexperienced swimmers.
- Glass containers by law are not allowed in the Salt River Recreational Area. Ice chests will be inspected for glass containers before boarding shuttle buses.
 Please use plastic bottles or aluminum can containers.
- Have a great time during your floating beach blasts, but remember that drugs, alcohol and the Salt River do not mix. Responsibly appoint a designated driver before your tubing adventure.
- Floating picnic ideas include fresh fruit, burritos, fried chicken or sandwiches. Pack picnic items in Ziploc bags to keep dry. Please stash and bag all picnic supplies in litter bags while floating.
- Ice chest/coolers: Fill with ice, sport drinks, fruit juice and water. One to two bottles of water per hour while floating are recommended to help prevent dehydration.
- Sun block, tennis shoes, caps or visors should be worn.
 A minimum 30 SPF is recommended. Tennis shoes or closed toes also are recommended while tubing.
