Mountain View High Teacher **Receives Fulbright Grant**

Recipients of the grant are selected on the basis of leadership potential, and academic and professional achievement. She is one of 13 K-12 teachers who will travel abroad as part of Cycle II of the Fulbright DAST program in 2019.

The program gives educators the opportunity to share their knowledge and expertise with educators in another country. Tamara will travel to Kuwait to conduct workshops on the effective techniques used to teach American Sign Language and English as a Foreign Language (EFL) to deaf and hard of hearing students in Kuwaiti public schools.

"This grant gives me an opportunity to simultaneously incorporate my knowledge of American Sign Language and deaf culture with my love of adventure and international cultures," said Tamara. "I am eager to experience the Kuwaiti culture while collaborating with global colleagues to design effective pedagogical techniques that will support deaf and hard of hearing students."

Tamara said she is not only excited at the prospect of what she will learn during this experience, but also enthusiastic about the opportunity to share what she has learned with students and colleagues upon her return.

"I feel blessed that I have been chosen to represent my school, district and state with this transformative opportunity," she said. "I know I will come back into the classroom with experiences that will broaden my teaching and leadership abilities."

Poston Junior High Hosting Astronomy Night

Submitted by Sue Weippert and Sara Anderson oston Junior High will host its 9th annual Astronomy Night on Thursday, Nov. 21 from 6 to 8 p.m. All community members, including current and potential Poston students and their families, are invited to learn about the universe at this very fun, academically rigorous event.

Partnerships with NASA, ASU, and the East Valley Astronomy Club, as well as strong support from Poston staff and local businesses, make the hands-on activities a high-quality learning experience designed to engage the most advanced junior high school students, their preschool-aged siblings, and everyone in between.

This year NASA will again provide make-and-take soda rocket straws for the littlest of hands to learn about basic trajectory. And as in years past, the East Valley Astronomy Club will set up eight to ten large scale telescopes for guests to view various celestial objects. In addition, ASU students representing ASU's Center for Meteorite Studies will be sharing a large collection of meteorites with visitors.

Many other perennial crowd-pleasing activities will be back for this year's event. At the Impact Craters station, participants will drop *meteors* of various sizes (golf balls, marbles, etc.) on to a *planet's surface* (a flour-filled pan) and measure the depth and width of the meteor's impact to make some surprising discoveries.

Proportional understanding will come to life at the Play-Dough Planets tables. This station usually attracts lots of students, and with some help, they come to understand the shocking differences in the size of the planets.

The Leaps and Bounds station, a new activity last year, was incredibly popular. Kids tested their jumping ability here on Earth, measuring how high they could leap vertically and how far they could bound horizontally. The students then did the calculations to see how far that would translate if they had jumped on the moon or one of the other planets in the solar system.

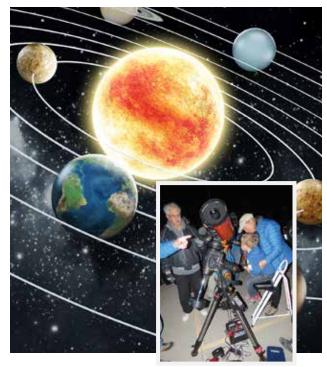
Many volunteers are involved at the Balloon Planets station, which uses some proportional mathematics, and Poston math teachers lend a hand for those who want

help calculating. Teachers are also on hand at the Measure the Universe station, where participants will learn about Kepler's Third Law. At the Phases of the Moon station, visitors see exactly why the moon looks different to us on Earth as it proceeds through its phases.

Natalie Guest, Poston's science department chair, is looking forward to Astronomy Night because it "unites our students, staff, families, and other community members in a night of engaging excitement." She reports, "there's something amazing about watching a seventh-grader explain to her younger sister how to find her favorite constellations using a star wheel, or watching an eighth-grader show his dad how far he could jump if he were on the moon."

Last year's Astronomy Night was attended by about 800 students and community members.

Poston administrators and event sponsors look forward to welcoming a similar crowd this year on Thursday, Nov. 21 from 6 to 8 p.m. The event is free and open to the public.

STRONG HOUSING MARKET EXPECTED FOR WINTER MONTHS

By Lorraine Ryall Associate Broker, CDPE, CSSN, CNE **KOR** Properties inally, the summer is over and the outdoors becomes ours again, this is why we live in Arizona, for the other eight months of the year. As we head into fall, we become the envy of those bracing for winter storms,



and with cooler temperatures come our annual flock of snowbirds, ready to relax and stay warm in our perfect winter weather.

While spring is still the highest season for buying and selling in Arizona with the peak month in May, we really don't see a drastic decline in the fall and winter that you see in other states. Plenty of residents will wait until after the hot summer months to make their move. Arizona is still one of the top destinations for second home buyers and not just the Canadians, we are seeing more buyers from within the U.S. and especially California.

AN UNBALANCED MARKET

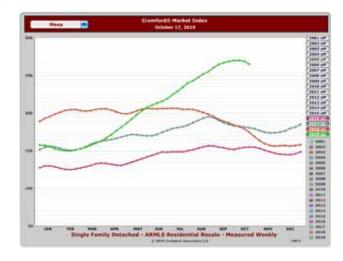
The inventory of homes for sale in the Phoenix area is the lowest we have seen since 2005, and with demand continuing to increase, the market remains very unbalanced. We are seeing more multiple offers and homes being sold before they are listed. I sold two of my listings this month to buyers driving by and seeing the Coming Soon signs.

The market is driven by supply and demand, and our unbalanced market is keeping us in a very strong seller's market heading into the winter season. There is twice as much demand as there is supply, with October inventory down 39 percent, September sales down one percent, and the median sales price has increased 13.5 percent year-over-year.

1031 Exchanges: What You Need to Know to Save Taxes and Maximize Your Investments

Submitted by John Karadsheh, Designated Broker, KOR Properties t is no secret that real estate values have increased L substantially over the past few years. While making money is a good thing, the resulting capital gains taxes are not as exciting.

For this reason, more and more investors are once again using the IRS 1031 exchange opportu-

nity to maximize their investments and financial goals.

WHAT IS A 1031 EXCHANGE?

Section 1031 of the IRS tax code allows investors the opportunity to sell investment property and defer the capital gains from that sale by purchasing *like-kind* property.

The term *like-kind* is very broad, so, that means you could exchange an apartment complex for raw land, an office building for a strip mall, or simply one rental home for two others.

To maximize the tax benefit, the price of the new property must be greater or equal to the price of the old property (for maximum tax savings) and the amount

of debt held on the new property must also be greater or equal than the debt held on the previous property.

EXAMPLE OF A 1031 **EXCHANGE**

You purchased a piece of raw land in Montana for \$250,000 and you sold it several years later for \$500,000. You are now subject to paying capital gains on your \$250,000 of profit, which would be around \$75,000.

IMPORTANT THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT 1031 EXCHANGES

1031 exchanges are only for investment and business property, and cannot be used to swap your primary residence for another home.

When the new tax legislation was being drafted in 2017, there was some discussion surrounding the elimination of 1031 exchanges altogether. While this did not

> happen, exchanges of personal property (aircraft, cars, franchise licenses) no longer qualify. Under the new law, only real estate qualifies.

Research and hire a Qualified Intermediary (QI) to assist with the exchange. A QI is a person or company that agrees to facilitate the 1031 exchange by holding the funds involved in the transaction until they can be transferred to the seller of the replacement property. These intermediaries are not federally regulated, so it is not advisable to just pick one from the Internet. Please do your research or call us for recommendations.

There are two critical and non-negotiable deadlines in a 1031 exchange. From the day that you transfer ownership of a property, you have 45 calendar days in which to identify a replacement property and then an additional 135 calendar days in which to close on that replacement property (180 calendar days total). If you don't adhere to these specific timeframes, you will not qualify for the tax deferment. It can be a challenge to secure property in a tight market, so it is important to have a strategy prior to even considering a 1031 exchange.

Seek advice from your financial planner, tax attorney, and CPA relating to your specific tax and investment goals, and personal situation. Make a plan before you start the process.
