TAX TIME IS UPON US

■ 020 will be our 33rd year serving Arizona. Congress has been busy the last few years changing the tax law. In fact, these last two years have seen more changes than in the last three decades!

As you work toward your tax filings this year, here is some information that may be helpful.

Lower tax rates: The 2019 tax rates range from 10 percent to 37 percent. The thresholds where these rates apply has also changed.

Increased standard deduction: The standard deduction amounts have almost doubled since 2017. For 2019, married couples filing joint, the new standard deduction is \$24,400. Fewer people will be itemizing.

Child tax credit: This credit is now \$2,000 per child. Also, \$1,400 of it is refundable. This means if you have no tax liability, you can get a refund, even if the credit is more than what you owe. This credit has income limitations.

Personal and dependent exemptions:

Exemptions are now eliminated. But remember, the standard deductions have almost doubled.

Health care: The tax penalty for not having health insurance is now gone. The floor of which medical expenses in excess of 7.5 percent of adjusted gross income can be deductible has been extended through 2019 by the very recently signed Tax Extender Bill. Previously, the floor was 10 percent.

Credit for nonbusiness energy property: The credit has been extended through 2019. The credit is 10 percent of the amount paid or incurred by the taxpayer for qualified energy improvements (windows, doors, skylights, and roofs) of principal residence. The credits range from \$50 to \$300 for energy-efficient property, including furnaces, boilers, heat pumps and others. It has a lifetime cap of \$500.



Mortgage insurance premiums treated as qualified residence interest: Those premiums are an additional cost you pay each month if your original down payment was less than 20 percent of the sales price. You can treat qualified mortgage insurance premiums as interest for the purposes of the mortgage interest deduction through 2019.

Above-the-line deduction for qualified tuition and related expenses: Through 2019, there is an above-the-line deduction (so you don't have to itemize to get it) up to \$4,000 for qualified tuition and related expenses for higher education. This deduction has income limitations.

And finally, things to remember when it comes to the IRS: The IRS does not:

- Call and demand immediate payment and tell you to use a specific payment method, such as a prepaid debt card, gift card or wire transfer.
- Demand you pay taxes without the opportunity to question the amount they say you owe and advising you of your rights as a taxpayer.
- Threaten to have you arrested. ■

Your Gifted Child Needs More Than You Think

his is a story about two dear children that attended an elementary school: one, with average intelligence, and the other, gifted. One was a perfect student, got good grades, paid attention in class, did not misbehave and the other — was gifted. Surprised? Well, if you are raising a gifted child this is a story far too familiar.

Giftedness is a person with an ability, which can express itself specifically or generally, that is significantly above the norm for the person's age. This is the academic description. However, this definition may not be helpful for parents of gifted children.

EDUCATION

People assume that gifted children are well behaved, eager overachievers, and mature not only intellectually but also emotionally (see above story). The assumption could not be further from the truth. Why? Because gifted children are not just extremely brilliant — they are also extremely emotionally reactive. Temper tantrums, fights in school, and depression are all common traits of gifted children.

Gifted children can be perfectionists. Perfectionism is a quirk that everyone tells their potential employer they have during interviews. In reality, perfectionism creates unrelenting and impossible standards that, if not met, mean devastation to the perfectionist. The gifted and perfectionist child becomes hypercritical of themselves. Over time, the gifted student becomes depressed, gives up in school, gets poor grades, gets in trouble, and does not pay attention during story time.

If you are a parent of a gifted child, this is nothing new. What you may not know is how to help your child. Your gifted child can solve Rubik cubes and put solid white jigsaw puzzles together in record time, but they cannot solve the problem of themselves and their role in society. This is where you come in.

The main way to help gifted children is to imbue their life with meaning, help them create an identity, and provide the means and opportunities to explore them.

Create an environment that promotes self-

expression. Give the child multiple avenues

may take a lot of false starts and different forms but the process is crucial. Provide them opportunities to explore their interests. Promote your child's natural inclination to want to know why and how. Be a positive source of opportunity rather

for your child to explore — their identity

than a rigid cookie mold.
Enroll your child in
a school that nurtures and
motivates gifted children. Self
Development Academy is an



The JROTC program started in 1916 and AJHS received a unit in 1996. Congress currently limits the program (Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps) to 3,500 high schools. No new schools are being funded and 600 schools are currently on the Navy waiting list for the program.



Ready, Set, Learn—Preparing for Kindergarten

indergarten at Mesa Public Schools is the perfect jumpstart for early learning. With kindergarten registration just around the corner, schools and parents are preparing young learners for the big day.

Kindergarten is a time of great discovery and growth, and a big transition for parents and children. Rachelle Sears teaches kindergarten at Las Sendas Elementary School and shares that the rigor in kindergarten is higher than it was ten years ago.

"Today, children are more likely to attend full-day kindergarten," Rachelle says. "There is a heavier focus on reading and math. The rigor of writing has shifted away from scribbling and random letters to more phonetic spelling."

Rachelle incorporates whole body movements and music, making lessons fun for students to help them retain information. For example, when teaching students letters, they learn the sound, how to sign it and sing songs that incorporate the letter they are learning.

PREPARING STUDENTS FOR A SUCCESSFUL YEAR

Over the last few years, the district has been taking a closer look at social and emotional lessons to help students develop the self-awareness, self-control and interpersonal skills vital for school, work and life. People with strong social and emotional skills are better able to cope with everyday challenges.

"Giving students a preview of kindergarten by visiting campus and attending events before school starts helps students be at ease on their first day," Rachelle says.

Preparing emotional kindergarten parents is just as

Understanding Arthritis and Joint Replacement

any people struggle with joint pain throughout their lives. This can be caused by many factors, but one of the most common causes of pain is arthritis.

Arthritis is a type of joint degeneration where the protective cushion of the joint wears away, either due to repetitive use or due to an accident or injury. When this occurs, the joint will begin to grind, bone on bone, causing inflammation and painful symptoms in the joint.

The most common joints that are affected by this are the knees and the hips, although other areas of the body can also experience the same type of effects. Knee and hip pain may eventually require joint replacement surgery.

Joint replacement surgery is a type of orthopedic surgery in which a dysfunctional joint surface that has been damaged is replaced with an artificial surface. This is typically recommended by a physician when other treatments have not been



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successful in alleviating symptoms. Other treatments could include activity modification, medications or injections.

It is likely that, with the other treatments, you would see a physical therapist to attempt to improve the function of the joint as well. If these treatments are ineffective, then a replacement surgery would likely be recommended.

Following any surgery, you are likely to experience post-operative pain, swelling, and some limitations in your ability to complete activities such as walking, running or moving your leg due to these symptoms. These are typically temporary symptoms, and will begin to improve within a few weeks of your surgical date. The use of ice to help control pain and swelling, as well as exercises given at the hospital, will be integral to your recovery over the first few days.

Your surgeon will most likely refer you to physical therapy, whether in a homebased environment or to an outpatient clinic. During physical therapy you will complete exercises designed to improve your strength and mobility, and improve your ability to walk independently. Therapy can help reduce swelling and painful symptoms.

Many people are able to return to hiking, biking, swimming, tennis and many other activities that are very important to their well-being. Most importantly, the goal of the surgery and therapy is to get you back to doing the activities that you love, and with less pain than you had prior to the surgery! ■

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

MAY: Mesa-grown Aqua-Tots, the world's largest swim school franchise with 100 locations in 14 countries on three continents, broke ground on its new 12,000-square-foot headquarters facility. CMC Steel opened its 63,000-square-foot expansion at its Mesa micro mill and a new Residence *Inn* by Marriott opened its doors, both in Southeast Mesa. And, Potato Barn located its 100,000-square-foot store in Mesa's Gateway area.

JUNE: The Landing at PMG, a 281,000-square-foot Class A industrial subdivision, opened in Mesa's Gateway area and announced its first three tenants, Collabtech Group, Huesman

Brothers Door and Custom Molding, and Russell-Sigler Inc. Nearby, Times Microwave Systems expanded its Mesa manufacturing facility to 62,000 square feet, an increase of more than five times its original size.

JULY: Google announced its intention to acquire 187 acres to build a future data center campus in Mesa's Elliot Road Technology Corridor. AT&T opened a new 97,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art customer call center that will employ more than 500 people in West Mesa.

AUGUST: CAVU Aerospace announced it will locate an 80,000-square-foot maintenance, repair, and overhaul (MRO) at the Landing at PMG, hiring 75 employees, again in Mesa's Gateway area.

SEPTEMBER: CenturyLink announced a major expansion of its network infrastructure in Mesa's Gateway area to support the growing commercial, industrial, and residential development. The Mesa Office of Economic Development launched efforts to develop a brand for Mesa's growing Asian district. Marwest Enterprises announced Landing 202, a 605,000-square-foot Class A industrial development, on 45 acres just north of Phoenix-Mesa Gateway Airport.

Able Aerospace, a Textron company, celebrated the opening of a \$9 million, 60,000-square-foot expansion of its existing 200,000-square-foot headquarters and MRO campus at the Phoenix-Mesa Gateway Airport. The expansion will create 100 new jobs.

OCTOBER: SkyBridge Arizona, the nation's first and only joint U.S. and Mexican customs hub, broke ground on the first two buildings in its 360-acre, master-planned industrial development located at the southwest end of the runway at Phoenix-Mesa Gateway Airport. Home2 Suites by Hilton broke ground on a four-story, 111-room hotel in the Falcon District. Ground was broken on the first building of the 1.35 million-square-foot Union, a Class A office campus located in Mesa's Riverview District next to the Chicago Cubs spring training facility. Raging Wire received City planning and zoning approval to construct a 1.5-million-square-foot, seven-building data center campus in Mesa's Elliot Road Technology Corridor.

North Carolina-based insulation manufacturer Greenfiber announced it will be locating a 74,000-square-foot manufacturing plant in Mesa's Gateway area. And, Nammo, an international aerospace and defense company headquartered in Norway, announced it will replace its current U.S. organization of several smaller units with a new, consolidated defense manufacturing company called Nammo Defense Systems, which will be based in Mesa's Falcon District. Nammo will invest nearly \$20 million into the Mesa facilities.

NOVEMBER: Urbix Resources, a graduate of our LaunchPoint accelerator program, opened a 31,000-square-foot headquarters and state-of-the-art graphite processing facility in Mesa's Falcon District, with the expectations of creating as many as 100 jobs. 

District 5 Updates address **NEW RECYCLING PROGRAM**

any citizens have expressed concerns regarding recent changes to Mesa's recycling program. I have enlisted the City's



Environmental Management and Sustainability experts to help shed light on these developments.

RECYCLING TODAY

The global recycling industry has experienced dramatic change over recent years and its effects are being felt across the United States, including here in Mesa. You may have heard that several U.S. cities are discontinuing their recycling services, reducing their list of accepted items, or finding it necessary to charge additional monthly fees to cover the rising costs associated with recycling.

All recyclable materials are first delivered, sorted, and prepared for transportation at a Materials Recovery Facility (MRF). Most municipalities, including Mesa, do not own their own MRF. Instead, they have contracts with third party vendors.

The recyclables are transported to both domestic and international markets. However, several international markets, including one that purchased approximately 30 to 40 percent of the recyclable material generated globally,

stopped buying material due to the excessive amount of contamination they were finding in the imported bales of material.

Imagine you are a paper mill opening a bale of paper and also finding carpeting, diapers, garden hoses, plastic tarps, food waste and yard waste in the bale. To avoid becoming the world's landfill, decisions were made to no longer import material. This in turn weakened demand for material and in some cases, for certain types of items, market demand no longer exists.

THE ROLE YOU PLAY

To help sustain Mesa's recycling program, please continue to recycle, but recycle right. Only place empty, clean and dry accepted items into your recycle barrel.

And while recycling helps manage our waste stream, we should always reduce and reuse first. Avoid single-use and single-serving products whenever possible. Buy longer lasting items and decrease replacement frequency. Following these guidelines will reduce the amount of waste

Mesa will continue to evolve its recycling program to adapt to the current recycling industry trends. For a current list of accepted items in Mesa's recycling program, please visit MesaRecycles.org.

they tend to be retained by the player who won it or the player's family. However, they do end up being offered for sale sometimes for a variety of reasons.

Because of the high resale value of a Super Bowl ring, there are very high-quality reproductions out there which are meant to deceive the public. So, be careful if you are ever approached with an opportunity

to buy a genuine Super Bowl ring. Credible provenance (history) of the ring and a thorough examination by a knowledgeable professional may save you a great deal of money in the long run.

Additionally, costume jewelry replica rings are readily available and make popular collectibles. They can be found online for

as little as \$20 each and can run from \$250 to \$900 for full sets, depending on quality and the number of rings in the set.

Here are some notable genuine Super Bowl rings that have sold on the secondary market:

- A ring from the very first Super Bowl in 1966 belonging to Green Bay Packers quarterback Steve Wright sold at auction in 2011 for \$73,409.
- Chicago Bears William Refrigerator Perry's Super Bowl XX ring sold at auction in 2015 for \$203,150. It was a size 25!
- And the current world record auction price is for New York Giants linebacker, and Hall of Famer, Lawrence Taylor's Super Bowl XXV ring, which sold for \$230,401 in 2012.

So, here's wishing you and yours a Happy New Year filled with fortune and goals achieved. And hopefully your favorite team won! ■

During this time, Medicare Advantage eligible beneficiaries are able to change their plan, or elect Original Medicare and coverage under Part D. Changes are effective the first of the following month.

(with the final change taking effect January 1 of the following year), beneficiaries are only able to make **one** change during the MA OEP.

Learn to Spot the Early Signs of Pneumonia for Elders

Then there is the cough. Deep and wet sounding. They cough and cough desperately trying to clear the thick mucus out of their lungs.

- Rest. Your body is able to fight off germs when you get adequate sleep. Encourage your loved one to stay in bed if they are weak or have a fever. While they are recovering, work in regular rest periods.
- **Hydration**. Keeping your body well hydrated can prevent the build-up of mucus in the lungs. Provide your loved one with plenty of fluids, such as hot tea or water with lemon. A warm bath or humidifier can also help open the airways.
- Follow doctor's orders. Your loved one may need to see a doctor if they have other health conditions, are having trouble breathing or the symptoms get worse. A doctor may prescribe antibiotics if the pneumonia is caused by bacteria. It is important to finish the

prescription as ordered. You may also ask about using aspirin, ibuprofen or acetaminophen to treat fever and aches.


