## RECREATE RESPONSIBLY WITH SAFE DISTANCING

SRTR encourages floaters to help ensure a responsible *safe distancing* atmosphere at the SRTR terminal building and on its shuttle buses during transport to the Salt River. SRTR's safety protocols **require** a face covering/bandana during the Tube Rental Transaction process, shuttle bus transport to/from the Salt River, as well as during the Tube Return process at the end of the floater's visit. No exceptions.

- SRTR requires its employees to wear face coverings as well as gloves.
- Daily temperature checks are administered.
- SRT'R's passenger buses have been downsized to transporting fifteen (15) passengers per bus.
- Shuttle buses are disinfected nightly (every 24 hours).

SRTR enforces safe distancing between guests awaiting the tube rental transaction process, and last but not least, family and/or friends that have traveled together in vehicles to SRTR may choose not to socially distance themselves since they chose to travel together with said precautions.

These safety protocols will remain in place until safe distancing restrictions have been relaxed or eliminated.

Daily operating hours at Salt River Tubing are 9 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Salt River Tubing accepts Visa, Mastercard, American Express and Discover cards and cash. Credit card and cash transactions require a valid driver's license for tube rental deposits and credit card information. Please visit saltrivertubing.com for more details regarding credit card transactions.

#### **TUBING TIPS**

Shooting the Salt River rapids is great fun, and company officials recommend the following helpful tubing tips to assist tubers in planning their floating beach blasts:

- A valid driver's license is required for a tube rental deposit per five tubes rented.

- Children must be at least eight years or older and four feet tall for tubing and shuttle bus service.
- Life vests are strongly recommended for children, non-swimmers and inexperienced swimmers.
- Glass containers by law are not allowed in the Salt River Recreational Area. Ice chests will be inspected for glass containers before boarding shuttle buses.
   Please use plastic bottles or aluminum can containers.
- Have a great time during your floating beach blasts, but remember that drugs, alcohol and the Salt River do not mix. Responsibly appoint a designated driver before your tubing adventure.
- Floating picnic ideas include fresh fruit, burritos, fried chicken or sandwiches. Pack picnic items in Ziploc bags to keep dry. Please stash and bag all picnic supplies in litter bags while floating.
- Ice chest/coolers: Fill with ice, sport drinks, fruit juice and water. One to two bottles of water per hour while floating is recommended to help prevent dehydration.

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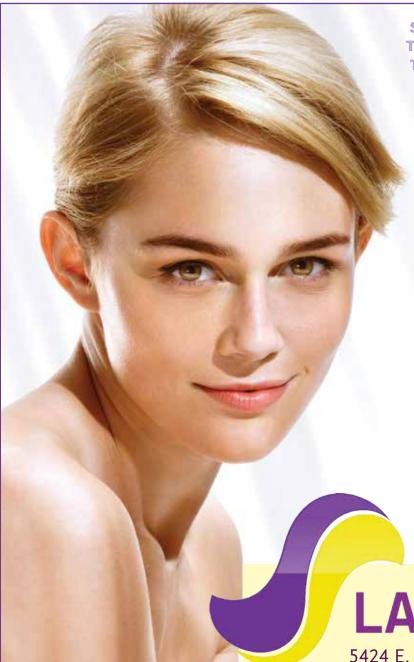

## Sweet Repeats Launches **High-End Consignment Website**

ittle did Jenn Franco know that when she decided to launch her high-end retail website, her Sweet Repeats Ladies Consignment Boutique would soon be closed due to

a pandemic.

In a serendipitous move, Jenn said she had been thinking about doing the website for awhile and had started working on it just before the shutdown. "I wanted to feature the more unique and expensive items that were consigned in the store. We wanted better visibility to Internet shoppers and thus be able to command better pricing for our consign-

The website also gives sellers the opportunity to set up a personal account and keep track of their balances online. "Consigners can contact me to get a password to set their consignor account active," Jenn explained.

With the store temporarily closed, Jenn had the time to work out the bugs and finally got the website up and running May 1. The brick and mortar location, at the southeast corner of Recker Road and University Drive, is also open for business after being closed for 45 days. Shoppers now have two choices for updating that summer wardrobe with style at deep discounts.

And don't worry about cleanliness. According to Jenn, all items accepted for consignment must be freshly cleaned and without spots or damage. In addition, Jenn steams items or airs them for at least 24 hours before offering them for sale.

Only five items are allowed in the try-on rooms, and they are also steamed or aired before re-stocking in the shop.

Jenn gives shoppers the option to wear masks. Disposable masks on request are subject to availability, but she said she will always wear one during consignment appointments. Consignments are by appointment only. No walk-ins can be accepted at this time. If you have gently



used, designer brand-name clothes, shoes or accessories, Jenn encourages you to give her a call or email for an appointment.

Only 10 people (including staff and shoppers) are allowed in the store at once. Sanitizing is done regularly throughout the day.

"But if venturing out is still not for you, check out the website at SweetRepeatsMesa.com for all the latest fashions and accessories. You can also buy online and pick-up at the store," Jenn suggested.

"Many of you may have made your way back to different parts of the country, so if you can't come shopping with us in person make sure to check us out online, as we can ship across the country and into Canada."

"At first it was very labor intensive to photograph the chosen items and get them all uploaded," Jenn explained. "Now we can do it immediately, so we always have fresh new finds to browse." ■

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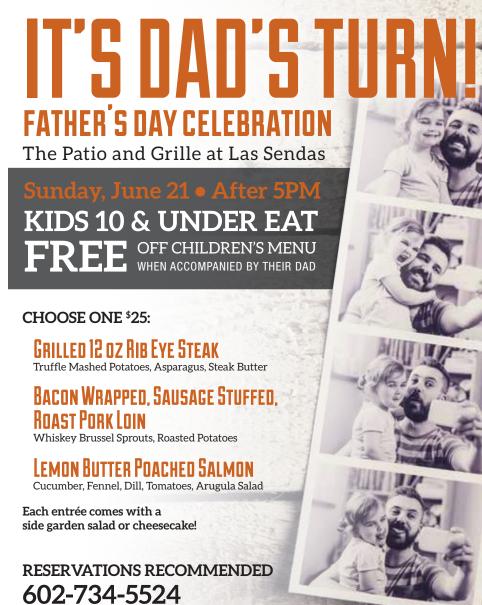

## How Has the Real Estate Market Been Impacted by the Recent Crisis?

**→** he top question on everyone's mind right now is How is the housing market?

With so much talk about how the economy will be affected by COVID-19, everyone is

wondering will home sales and home prices drop and if so by how much?

In March, when COVID-19 was declared a pandemic, we saw the first signs of how this crisis could impact the market as potential sellers decided not to list and some current sellers cancelled their listings. By early April, we saw more sales than normal fall out of escrow for a number of different reasons but most related to the crisis in one way or another. With the stay-at-home order, closure of schools and non-essential businesses, and fearful news reports, the market started hitting the pause button.

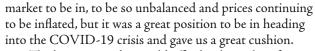
However, by the middle of April, things already began to turn around as people still needed to buy and sell homes. We were still having showings, just a lot fewer, no looky loos but buyers who needed to buy, and homes were going under contract.

By the end of April, people were getting some confidence back and in May it was like the flood gates opened — sellers were ready to list their homes again and buyers were ready to buy, and move quickly.

We couldn't have picked a better state to be in while we had the stay at home order. Suddenly, we had extra time to get out and explore more of our amazing desert landscape, hike, bike ride and spend time with our family. Not only were we in the best state for staying-at-home and closures, but Arizona was in the best position to weather

The Cromford Market Index™ (CMI) is a single value that indicates the balance of the residential resale market. Values below 100 indicate a market that favors buyers. Values above 100 indicate a market that favors sellers. A value of 100 is equally balanced.

Supply and demand are one of the main factors that determines home prices, and 2019 saw that spread widen with lower inventory and higher demand. The Cromford Market Index (CMI) increased by 78 percent in 2019 and the trend continued into 2020. In March 2020, there was such a shortage of inventory that a listing would have multiple offers on the first day of being on the market. Buyers were having to bid above the asking price, buy as is or waive the appraisal contingency just to get their offer considered. It was a dangerous position for the housing



The housing market could afford to lose a lot of demand and gain a lot of supply and still be in a strong market, which is exactly what happened. As you can see from the chart below, the index did a major drop when everyone paused in March/April, but is leveling out again in May. Even with that significant drop we are still in a strong sellers' market with the index at 181.

The chart below shows the CMI for Mesa for the past 4 years. 2019 rallied with far more demand and even less supply. By the time we headed into March 2020, the Cromford Market Index was at 310, which is 210 above a balanced market, which is 100.

So back to the question? Will sales and home values drop and if so by how much? Homes in the low to mid-price range have not been negatively impacted and this market remains strong or even stronger than it was before. The luxury market on the other hand has seen a slight decline in home sales as this is usually the market that is impacted first.

Home prices are down by 3.5 percent for May compared to April for the entire Phoenix metro area. However, the primary reason for lower average pricing is

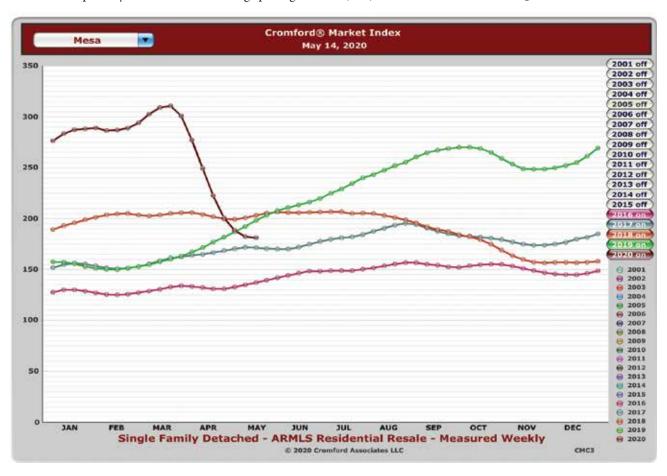
the absence of the usual number of high-end homes. This became more extreme in the last four weeks as the regular market started to build in volume while the market over \$1 million did not.

Overall home prices are unlikely to fall without a glut of homes for sale, and that is something that does not look likely at this point. Almost no foreclosures took place in May and many borrowers took advantage of mortgage forbearance programs. The greatest risk to the market is in what happens to lenders and loan servicers over the next 12 months with all the loans in forbearance, and how unemployment will impact the economy.

Currently, I have seven homes listed with a price range of \$270,000 to \$1,450,000 and all are under contract. The last three were sold in the first two days of being on the market and two of them were sold above asking price.

I have more listings coming on the market and expect them to be under contract within the first week or two as well. At this moment, I anticipate the market will be very strong through the summer and into the early fall.

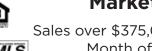

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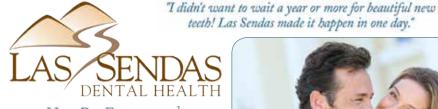

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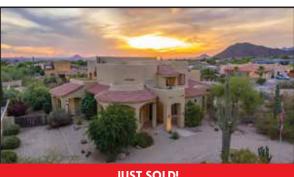
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## **Create a Beach House Feel**

**7** ell it's over. The school year

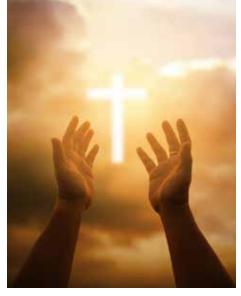

## **Navigate the Reopening** of Businesses Carefully

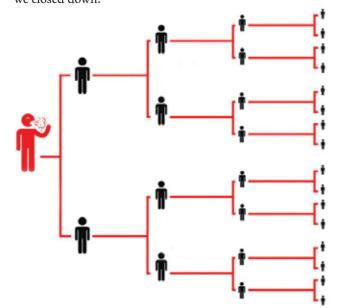

eelings of anticipation are reopening.

This is challenging our sense of safety versus our need to get out of the house and go back to work. How we navigate in an infected population is a tricky situation many of us are trying to figure out.



As of May 15, here in Arizona, we continue to have more than 200 people being diagnosed daily with COVID-19 and 11,380 active infected cases. Since March 20, 651 people have died. We've been shuttered eight weeks and we are extremely more infected now than when we closed down.



What do these numbers tell us on how we should stay safe with the reopening? Of the people who have gotten sick with COVID-19, one out of 20 people have died here in Arizona. Our population is about seven million. The disease is spreading at a rate of about 1 person/630 people. Now, that may not sound bad but with the reopening of businesses where people gather, here is a possible scenario:

If one person directly encounters 10 people, and assuming that those 10 people each encountered 10 people, and that those 10 people also encountered 10 more people (making the encounters  $10^3$ ), then directly or indirectly one person has come in contact with 1,000 people to which 1.3 people are infected. Everyone in this 1,000-person group has now been possibly exposed to the infection.

Basically, social distancing is still needed to keep this disease from spreading at an even faster rate.

Should we continue to wear masks when we are out at the store and around areas where people are gathering? There's so much conflicting data about masks. At a minimum, a mask reminds us not to touch our faces when we are at the store where people are touching everything. It also helps keep our own germs from spreading outwardly. Whether it's a bandana or N95 mask, a mask helps to some degree.

Continue hand washing and visiting six feet apart. Stay home if you are not feeling well. At this time, we all should still be cautious about gathering in groups. Our community is more infectious now than before the lockdown. Protect your health and the safety of your family. Be very careful how you move about as businesses open. ■

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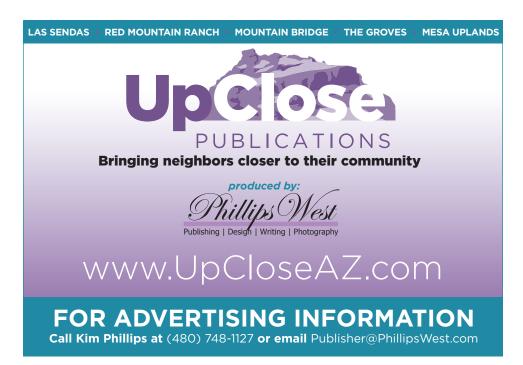

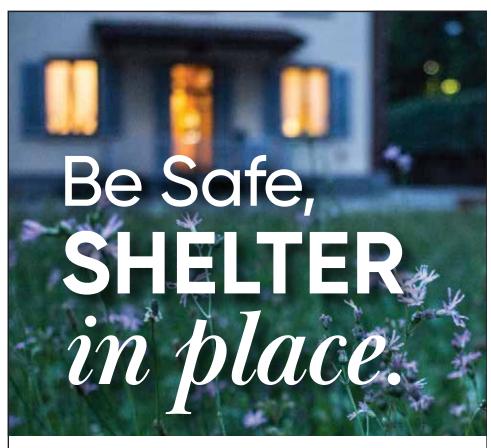

## **Summer Learning Opportunities** abound at Mesa Public Schools

xciting learning opportunities abound for students at Mesa ■ Public Schools.

Through the Mesa Distance Learning Program (MDLP), students in grades seven through 12 can take up to two semesterlength summer courses at NO cost.

MDLP courses are taught by certified district teachers and align with the district course catalog. Course options are robust and range from core subjects such as English language arts, math and sciences, to electives such as Spanish, music, finance

MDLP courses are self-paced and can be completed anywhere you have an internet connection. Students currently assigned a district device will be able to retain the device throughout summer

school. Summer courses can be taken to address credit deficiencies or for advancement.

"Taking summer online courses through MDLP is a great option for any student," said Heidi Hurst, Mesa Public Schools director of communications and engagement. "The online, accessible format means students can learn anytime, anywhere. We hope eligible students take advantage of this valuable opportunity."

To qualify for tuition-free courses, students must register and begin coursework by June 30. Courses should be completed by July 31. Students not currently active in an MDLP course can enroll at mdlp.org. ■

estaurants had the opportunity to invite diners back into their restaurants last month, but everyone from restaurant owners to servers to community members are still navigating the changes that come with the increased safety measures.

During the process, restaurant owners are doing their best to keep customers safe and provide an outstanding dining experience while hoping to recoup the financial losses they experienced during the extended closure.

For those dining in, they can help

by making reservations to decrease wait times, dine at off-peak hours and expect a new type of experience one without shared condiments or spices on the tables, spaced out tables, and servers wearing masks.

"It's going to be different for the guests when they first come in," said Dennis Shaw, director of food and beverage for The Patio and Grille at Las Sendas Golf Club. "We're doing our part to keep them safe, but it's also going to take a little bit of an adjustment on our end in how we take care of people, and an adjustment on their end in having a little more patience."

Guests can also aid in keeping restaurant staff safe by following the CDC guidelines themselves and not dining in while they're sick, or gathering in large groups.

> "We would ask that the public understand the needs of my staff in helping keep them safe," said Jeff Flancer of Flancer's. "Please don't show up with 20 people. We want to respect our guests and make sure they're as healthy and safe as possible, and we would appreciate they respect the basic rules that are out there as well."

And while restaurant owners continue pivoting to make dining inside and outside of their restaurants safe, they're also grateful to the East Mesa community that's helped them stay on their feet during these unprecedented times.

"We're blessed to be here," said Pacino's owner Frank Spaccarelli. "The people who were here and supported us over the last month are phenomenal. We're so humbled. They spend a lot of money and have tipped us, supporting the staff and supporting us. It made me a cry a few times, what they've done to support us. It's been amazing." ■

## **Coronavirus Stimulus Scams**

The coronavirus has created a new group of scammers.

They want to steal your money, personal information, and often both. Government agencies, including the FBI, are alerting us that phone calls, texts or emails asking for personally identifiable information to be eligible for

federal payments are not legitimate.

Many of the scams being used are re-works of classic financial scams. They use the pandemic and stimulus payments as a hook. People anxious to receive their stimulus money often take the bait and give up personal details before looking closely at the details.

Most of these scams use one of these tactics:

- · Fake checks sent in the mail
- Phishing schemes sent out over text messages, email and social media
- Phone calls by impersonators pretending to be a government official

The fake check scammers create fake stimulus checks for more money than was expected. The victim is then notified that they were overpaid and need to send the overpayment back through various means, including cash, gift card or money transfers. Later, the fake check bounces and the victim is out the money they sent to the scammer.

The phishing scammers attempt to trick the victim by pretending to be someone who is known and trusted. They send out emails aimed at collecting the victims personal and/or financial information, such as Social Security numbers, bank account information or login information. They then use the information to drain the victims bank account, open credit cards, or other similar identity frauds.

Here are some tips to keep your stimulus check out of

the hands of these scammers:

- The IRS will not call or text you about your stimulus payment.
- If you have filed taxes for 2018 and/or 2019, you don't need to do anything to claim your stimulus payment.
- The official term for this payment is economic impact payment. If someone is using terms like coronavirus check or stimulus payment, there is a good chance they are scammers.
- It is not likely you will be overpaid by the IRS. They
  use your recent tax returns to calculate your payment.
  An overpayment could be a sign of the fake check
  scam.

During this pandemic, any of us can be particularly vulnerable. Be aware, be vigilant and remember, "If it feels too good to be true... It probably is!"
