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Kicks 4 Kids Provides Hope for STUDENTS AND FAMILIES IN NEED

Arizona summertime heat, but one Mesa church is well on its way to planning for kids who need help this coming school year.

Kicks 4 Kids is a community outreach event designed to help students feel prepared and excited about the upcoming school year, able to focus on academics, friends,

and extracurricular activities, rather than wondering if they are going to have the school supplies they need when they arrive on campus the first day. The event is on Saturday, July 20.

"Kicks 4 Kids is an annual event that helps prepare students in kindergarten through senior year to have an incredible school year! We believe that students should have the supplies that they need to confidently start off the year," said representatives from JustServe.org and Living Word church.

"Every student who is registered will leave the event with a brand-new pair of sneakers in their size, a backpack filled with school supplies, and an opportunity to receive a free haircut and breakfast if they desire," the group confirmed.

The volunteers for this upcoming event are enthusiastic. "It helps alleviate some of the financial burdens of sending children to school. It is incredible to see how the community comes together to supply shoes, school supplies, backpacks, and volunteers for this event. This year we have 260 students registered."

Kenzie Anderson, outreach director for Living Word church, said in 2023, volunteers served 250 students. "This year, we have a goal of serving 500 students in need in our community," she emphasized.

The church group is searching for volunteers for the upcoming July 20 event, focused on students and families in need. In addition to the church's own outreach website, volunteers may also utilize JustServe.org to support and volunteer for this event and many others.

"JustServe does the work of researching organizations, finding service projects, coordinating schedules, and bringing local service projects to your fingertips," the website says.

"All you have to do is register to join a community of volunteers who are already changing the world," said Bruce Kiene, a JustServe specialist who with his wife, Mary, are two of many.

Bruce and Mary are not only JustServe representatives who work with service sponsors in Mesa, but as Mesa residents they are also strongly involved as volunteers, helping to strengthen the community through events such as Kicks 4 Kids.

"We are both retirees and it has been fun to work with so many fine organizations to help our city," Bruce said.

"What we like about our work with JustServe is watching ordinary people feel something different, a real change, as they serve total strangers here in Mesa," he continued. "As we link volunteers with community service opportunities like Kicks 4 Kids, it really supports the underserved individuals and the community. And that's a home run every time."

Living Word church is looking for Kicks 4 Kids volunteers to help distribute backpacks and shoes during the July 20 event. The church needs volunteers who can help set up and take down tables, stands, and other related structures, people who will serve breakfast, check in registrants, and finally, hair stylists and barbers who are currently licensed.

"We are always needing more Spanish speaking volunteers," said a Living Word church representative. "If you are able to assist in this way, please indicate when signing up to volunteer."

Living Word is also seeking donations for the Kicks 4 Kids event, which you can drop off at the church building, located at 3520 E. Brown Road, in Mesa.

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Instilling A Passion to Learn

elf Development Schools, a beacon of education in Mesa for almost four decades, have woven themselves Into the very fabric of the community. Our journey, which commenced in 1988 with establishing a preschool and later expanded to include an elementary school in 2000, is a testament to our commitment to education. We are not just a school but an integral part of the community. We asked our students and teachers what a good education means to them and how Self Development Academy provides it. PERSONALIZED EDUCATION

Our survey results were clear: good education recognizes and caters to the unique learning styles of each student. At Self Development Academy (SDA), we foster a nurturing learning environment through our dedicated educators who strive to build strong relationships with each of their students. This approach makes certain that every student feels safe, supported, and valued in their educational journey.

"One of the aspects of the teachers I appreciate is their dedication to ensuring that each student grasps the topic," shared a middle school student, reflecting the nurturing learning environment at SDA. This student's experience is just one of the many inspiring stories that fill our halls, and we are excited to share more with you.

GREAT EDUCATION

Our students shared that a good education is about feeling comfortable to make mistakes and learn from them. At Self Development Academy, we embrace the idea that, "the most instructive answer is a 'wrong one." A right answer only teaches what something is. But a wrong answer tells you why something is. We believe in the power of learning from mistakes, turning them into valuable lessons for personal growth.

We do not measure academic success based on answers. "Learning is asking questions," a student of Mrs. Smith writes. We encourage asking questions and wanting to know why. One third-grade student remarked, "SDA teachers are great" because "when a student asks a question, a teacher always answers."

SUPPORTIVE LEARNING ENVIRONMENTS

"The teachers have one-on-one conversations with us whenever we need help," says Alexis, an 8th-grade student at SDA.

"I like it when they try to make us laugh while still teaching us," adds a 7th-grade student.

Teachers should not be a stuffy panel of professors but real people with real solutions to problems. A good education has "teachers that you can talk to." Relatable teachers are good teachers. "You can understand the topics more" when teachers try to relate to their students.

TEACHERS ARE APPROACHABLE

So, how does SDA create supportive learning environments? Our teachers "are more approachable, so I can ask them things," shares one 6th-grade student. It's humor mixed with insight, discipline mixed with compassion, and time mixed with empathy.

"I continue to work for SDA because of the positive work culture it provides," Mr. Hansen writes. He describes SDA as a strong ethic of inclusion and collaboration, concluding that, "everyone works closely with one another, especially when bringing in students from the previous grade."

At SDA, we create a school and more than a community. It's a temporary village with diverse talents assembled together to carry out shared goals. When we hire teachers, "it is often the last job they have to apply for," says Vernetta Madsen, who started working at Self Development Preschool in 1988 and is now the Director of the Preschool and Human Resources of the Self Development Companies.



The best description of our philosophy comes from a student's answer. Describing what it is like to learn at SDA, this student

shared that it is like, "Learning the universe." In so many ways, her description is apt, read literally and figuratively. Literally, we should learn about the universe, the cosmological entity, and the fabric of time and space. Figuratively, we should learn the universe, the summation of things in total.

True, we may be reading unintended profundity into this child's words. Yet, a common theme is running through our students' answers: education must instill a passion for learning. Teachers engage with students in a way that when they leave the class, students want to learn more. What our students love about SDA is that it is not just the facts or the concepts nestled within the subjects that help them learn. It's the connections between math and history, science and art, and more. ■

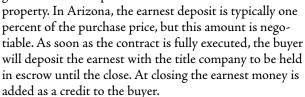


Does the Seller Keep the Earnest Deposit if the Sale Falls Through?

WHAT IS **EARNEST MONEY**

The earnest money deposit is included in the purchase contract to reassure the seller that the buyer is "earnest" and is making a good faith offer to purchase the

Sellers tend to look at the earnest more like a guarantee that if the buyer cancels the contract, then at least they will get to keep the earnest deposit as compensation. But that is not the case in most cancelled contracts as the buyer typically gets the earnest money back. The seller only keeps the earnest money if the buyer is in breach of the contract and that rarely happens. Nearly all purchase contracts are cancelled by a contract contingency not being met, which allows the buyer to get the earnest money refunded.

WHAT ARE CONTINGENCIES

The Arizona purchase contact favors the buyer more than the seller and has several contingencies and timelines where a buyer can cancel and get their earnest money back. This is to protect the buyer from losing their deposit if the sale is cancelled through no fault of their own, which makes sense. The flip side to that however is that the seller really doesn't have any protection and most of the time won't receive the earnest money or any kind of compensation if the sale is cancelled. The good news is most sales go through and none of this is even an issue, but certainly something a seller needs to be aware of.

Here are the main contingencies where a buyer can cancel the contract and receive the earnest back:

INSPECTION PERIOD

Unless stated otherwise, the buyer has 10 days from contract acceptance to do all their inspections and due diligence. During this time, the buyer can cancel the contract for pretty much any reason and get their earnest money back.

After the 10-day inspection period the buyer may ask the seller for any repairs they want done to the property before closing. If the seller agrees to fix all repairs requested the inspection period is complete and the contract moves forward. If the seller responds to the repair request with anything other than fixing all requested items, the buyer has five days to accept the seller's response or cancel the contract and get their earnest money back.

APPRAISAL CONTINGENCY (ONLY FOR FINANCED TRANSACTIONS)

The buyer's lender will order an appraisal of the property. This is usually done after the 10-day inspection period. If the property appraises for at least the contract price this



contingency has been met and the contract moves forward.

If the property does not appraise for at least the contract price, the buyer has five days to move forward and agree to bring in the extra funds at closing, negotiate with the seller and come to an agreement on how to handle the difference, or cancel the contract and the buyer will receive the earnest money back. If the property does not appraise and the buyer and seller agree on a price and terms, then this contingency is met, and the contract moves forward.

LOAN CONTINGENCY

The buyer must be pre-qualified with a lender when submitting an offer. The pre-qualification confirms the buyer has been pre-approved for the loan amount. If the buyer is unable to obtain loan approval for the loan prior to closing, the contract is cancelled, and the buyer receives the earnest back. However, if it is due to the fault of the buyer, for example they made a large purchase that reduced their credit score or debt-to-income ratio and they no longer qualify for the loan, then they are in breach of the contract and the seller would get the earnest.

BUYER CONTINGENCY ADDENDUM

When the buyer needs to sell their home to purchase another one, they will include a Buyer Contingency Addendum in the contract. If for any reason the buyer's property does not close on the date listed on the Buyer Contingency Addendum, the contract can be cancelled, and the buyer will receive the earnest back.

Your Realtor should monitor the contingencies and time frames to help ensure all contingencies are met and the sale closes as smoothly as possible.

"Our goal is to offer guests an unforgettable experience of geological and natural wonders while the captain recounts the legends and lore of the Superstition Mountains," said Cindi.

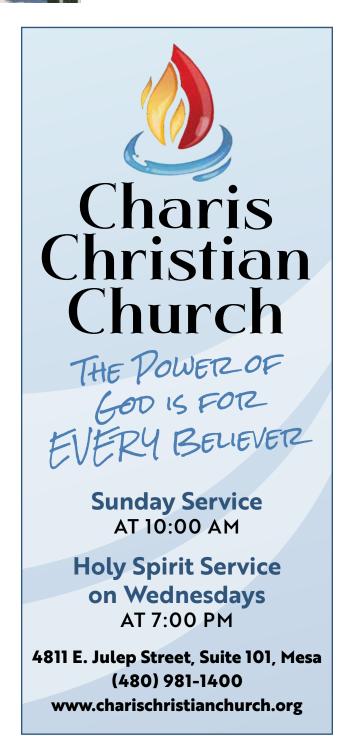

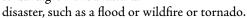

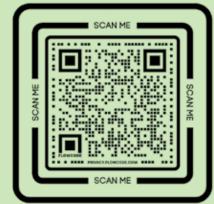

Property Scams in Our Neighborhood

We first published this article a year ago, but have heard that several more property scams were attempted over the past few months in Las Sendas. We are republishing this article to try and generate more



awareness and we encourage you to share this information with friends and neighbors - especially those living out of state who may not be aware.

ver the past few years, property fraud has increased dramatically both nationally and right here in our community. The most common scam now is deed theft.

How does it work? Scammers impersonate the legal owner of the property, list the property, sell the property, and pocket the proceeds – all without the true owner's knowledge. Some scammers fraudulently list the properties with real estate agents (tricking them into believing they are the rightful owners) while others just list the property "by owner" on a national website.



When these scams are successful, ownership is legally transferred to the buyer. The loss of the asset can be financially devastating and trying to regain ownership is a long and challenging legal process.

The fraudulent sellers typically present themselves as out-of-state owners and usually only communicate via What's App, email, or text. They use fake emails and signature blocks to perpetuate their scams and often use an out-of-state power of attorney to forge identity documents and deeds.

Scammers are targeting land, vacant properties, properties owned in LLCs, out-of-state homeowners or those with recently deceased owners, investment properties, and homes that are owned free and clear. They like to prey on properties that have absentee owners so their schemes can go undetected.

PROTECTING YOUR PROPERTY

If you own property here or out of state, set a Google Alert for your property address or regularly Google your address. Search your property on Zillow and on other third-party sites to see if it is listed for sale. Visit your property or ask a neighbor to ensure there isn't any unusual activity on the property. You can also check the county recorder and treasurer's office to confirm you are still the owner on record.

SUGGESTIONS FOR BUYERS

If you are a buyer who is interested in purchasing property here or elsewhere, be aware of these red flags: the "Seller" won't provide detailed property information, the price is too good to be true, or the seller is in a hurry to close. Also, be sure to have your own professional real estate

Just because a property is "for sale by owner" does not mean you can't have a Realtor representing you. Let your Realtor speak with the seller (experienced agents have spidey senses!), hire a reputable title company, choose a very experienced title agent, and last but not least, buy



One of the title companies we work with has told us they have stopped several fraudulent sales in the past few months, so be sure to have people you trust on your team!

Again, please share this information with your friends and neighbors so we can all protect our community and don't hesitate to reach out with any questions!

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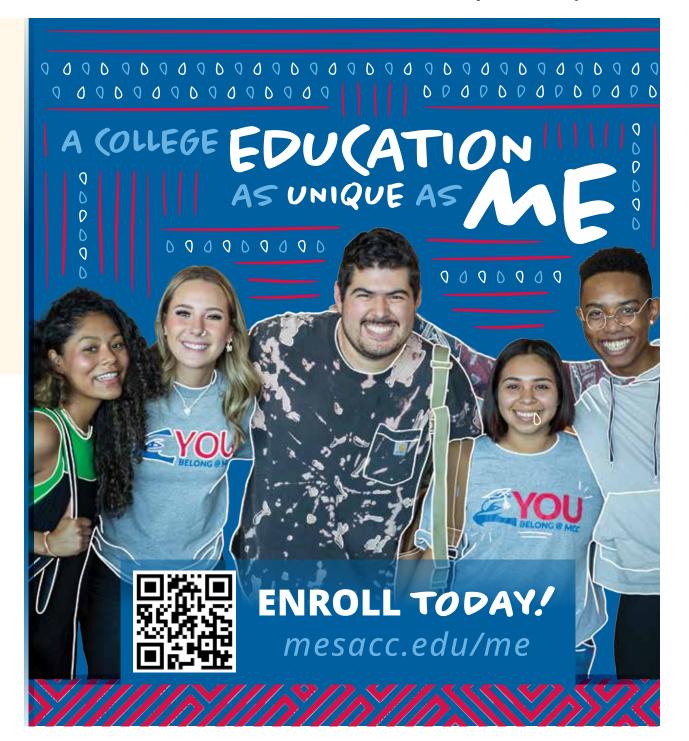
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Arizona Lifestyle - Are We Almost There Yet?

h, the idea of a summer road trip! Destination: somewhere close enough to drive, yet far enough to escape.

Whether you are chasing a cooler climate in the northern part of the state or venturing through the desert stretches to cross Arizona borderlines, we hope it is a journey filled with excitement and curiosity. That said, have you ever wondered how certain places in Arizona (large and small) got their 'odd' names?

Back in 1928, author Hoffman Birney completed a 7,250-mile loop around the American West in a Chrysler roadster named Betsy. This adventure took him across Arizona, the Four Corners, the Rocky Mountains, the Mojave Desert and California's Eastern Sierra.

Undoubtedly, his journey took him through places in our state with unlikely names. During his expedition, he photographed and documented his experiences in a much adored, much later, book called *Roads to Roam*, with no thoughts of publishing in mind at the time. Something unplanned, yet later remarkable.

In hopes of adding interesting facts to your summer 2024 road trip, and for those who long to 'get lost' in a bit of history about our state, we are sharing eight unique places and their names, for you to add to your vacation chronicles this summer.

 Barbershop Canyon – Located east of Rim Road near Mogollon Rim, east of Payson. This specific area within the canyon currently offers hiking near a running creek for outdoor enthusiasts. Rewinding the clock reveals that it is an area believed to have been



- traveled by both shepherds and their flocks, with a stopping point for the sheep to be sheared accompanied with a makeshift barber for the men.
- Bloody Basin Located on Interstate 17 between Flagstaff and Phoenix, this strangely named exit is believed to be named from a violent conflict between settlers and American Indians.
- Cornville A small town near Sedona is not named for its corn. The town was intended to be named Cohnville, after a family named Cohn. When the Cohns settled in the area, they applied to have a post office within their general store, but when the paperwork came back to them from Washington, D.C., it read "Cornville." The typo was not corrected, nor was the town ever renamed.
- Fool Hollow Lake Located near Show Low, Ariz., settler Thomas Adair unknowing bought land unsuitable for farming; nothing would grow in the area. His not-so-friendly neighbors nicknamed the area Fool Hollow in spite of him. Eventually a dam was placed where Show Low Creek and Fool Hollow met, and a 150-acre lake was formed. The lake remains today.
- Nothing Located west of Wickenburg, Ariz. on U.S. Route 93, the town once consisted of two buildings, four people, one gas station, and a rock shop. The town was eventually abandoned and then revived by the owners, who irregularly make wood-fired pizzas in a trailer-mounted oven for passersby's. Former residents in the town put up a sign that reads, "Through the years, these dedicated people had faith in Nothing, hoped for Nothing, worked for Nothing, all for Nothing." These factual tidbits make Nothing something to talk about!
- Tombstone Located in Cochise County, close to the Arizona/Mexico border, this spot on the Arizona map was founded by prospector, Ed Schieffelin, back in 1879. Warned by his companions about meeting hostile Apache along the way, possibly resulting in his death, Ed set out alone to explore the area. Rather than meeting his own death (or finding his own tombstone), he discovered an area rich in silver that generated millions of dollars of ore in a brief period of time.



Tortilla Flat – Located in Eastern Maricopa County.
 The drive out to this unincorporated landmark takes you through twisting roads and switchbacks with beautiful desert views along the way. The area, nestled deep within the Superstition Mountains outside of Phoenix, boasts a large number of flat-shaped rocks, possibly a feature for naming the place.

However, Connie Phelps, owner of the town in the late 1940s, tells a story of cowboys stranded in the area due to a flash flood. As the story goes, the men ran out of food, waiting for the water to recede. Using one of their only remaining food resources, flour, the stranded men made tortillas to hold them over as they camped among the rocks for several days.

• Why – Located in Pima County at the intersection of two major Highways 85 and 86, that used to be a mere 'Y' in the road. At the time the town was named, state law required all city names to have at least three letters. The town's founders name is 'Why' instead of merely referring to it as a 'Y' dividing the highways. The intersection has since been removed and replaced with two highways. It remains a conversational piece for travelers today, who can grab refreshments and knick-knacks in the Why Not Travel Store.

Whether you are seeking adventure, like author Hoffman Birney did back in 1928, or simply in need of some modern-day travel trivia to keep the kids from asking, "Are we almost there yet," we hope you enjoy these historical tidbits that reveal meaning behind some of Arizona's landmarks.



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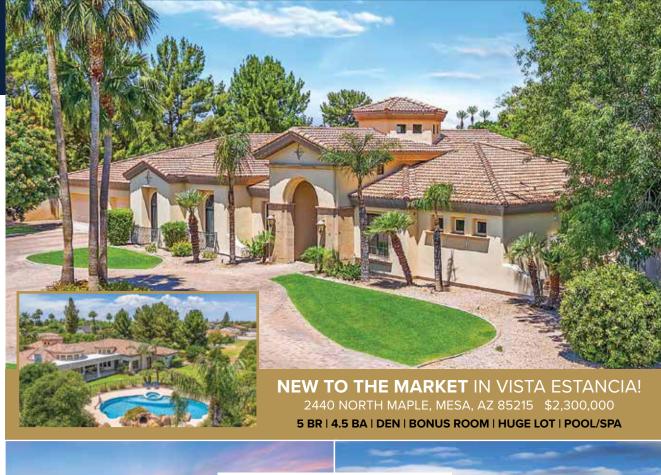

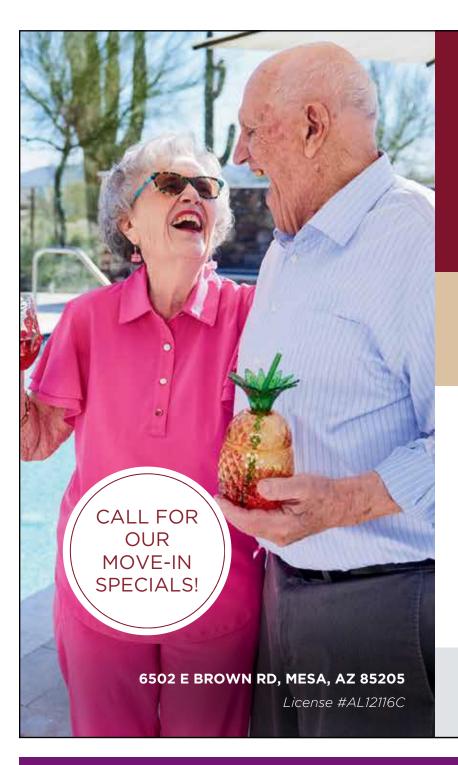

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
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
