They have removed thousands of pounds of trash from the river this year and recently cleaned up the Boulder Recreation site.

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## Intrinsic Motivation and Student Learning

otivation drives individuals to accomplish a task or reach a goal. It is essential in propelling oneself to great heights. Through motivation, which is at the root of all human achievement, one becomes engaged, creative, and driven. The results are high accomplishment and a sense of empowerment to continue to be involved and perform.

As a result, motivation is highly important in education, especially in schools. Of the two types of motivation, extrinsic and intrinsic, there is increasing evidence that intrinsic motivation is a more powerful and lasting driver than extrinsic motivation. It comes from the internal joy or satisfaction of doing something rather than the separable consequences.

As an educator, I am very aware that the rigor of the curriculum or my teaching approach has little to do with students' learning. However, what does matter is my students are motivated to learn what is being taught in class.

Of course, many teachers may use bonus points for grades, prizes, stickers, or even negative consequences such as detention or calls to parents to encourage learning. These types of strategies used for motivation are extrinsic and have short-term benefits. Unfortunately, as we grow older, we get fewer and fewer scratch and sniff stickers. At some point, we have to learn how to motivate ourselves without a gold star, a red ribbon, or a participation trophy. We must foster the development of intrinsic motivation.







#### WHAT IS INTRINSIC MOTIVATION

Intrinsic motivation, so much meaning packed into just two words. It's a powerful force, even if simply muttered. The word "intrinsic" itself connotes an inner flame. Intrinsic motivation is a much-desired quality for maximizing one's potential. "Perhaps no single phenomenon reflects the positive potential of human nature as much as intrinsic motivation, the inherent tendency to seek out novelty and challenges, to extend and exercise one's capacities, to explore, and to learn." (Ryan & Deci, 2000)

Intrinsic motivation provides a poignant image for teachers, who act as infinitely loving and caring guides, lighting and leading the way to unlock a child's true potential. When a teacher displays intrinsic motivation, we can tell they are doing the right thing.

#### STRATEGIES FOR FOSTERING INTRINSIC **MOTIVATION IN STUDENTS**

The school's culture must prepare the soil and create an environment with optimum conditions for the seeds of intrinsic motivation to germinate. The strategies employed for fostering the development of intrinsic motivation of students are many. First, we must understand and recognize individual-specific talents and challenge students. The focus should be on student strengths, not their weaknesses.

Second, frequent positive feedback and appreciation build a sense of competence and encourage students to work harder and more diligently on challenging projects. Third, by creating a feeling of belonging and connection with others in the classroom, students feel safe and are more apt to express themselves and take on new responsibilities. Another critical aspect of developing intrinsic motivation is autonomy.

The sense of autonomy refers to our desire to do what we do over which we feel we have control. We often go over and beyond to finish our assignments well if we have selected the assignment ourselves. Good schools welcome and promote autonomy by having students select their assignments. Finally, inculcating a sense of accomplishment encourages students to continue striving for success and personal growth.

At Self Development Academy, some of the strategies we use include assignments that are designed for individual student's interests. We include self-directed projects teaching leadership skills. Assignments and promoting group work connect students. These generate a greater sense of belonging in a lifelong love for learning.

In conclusion, rather than relying on grades as external motivators, teachers can help students develop intrinsic motivation by providing opportunities for autonomy and building their sense of competence.

Let's start with someone who has recently purchased a home. Whether that be a new home with bare grounds or a resale home that has established landscaping, including both plant material and existing hardscape.

A homeowner with a newly purchased home with no landscaping will first need to see if the HOA has a list of requirements for both plant materials and hardscape. Hardscaping would include walkways, ground cover, irrigation systems, lighting, extended patios, additional walls, etc. Also important are the requirements for submitting a plan and when the landscaping needs to be installed.

Homeowners who purchased a resale home without an HOA, including homeowners who have lived in for

some time, would benefit by having some type of working plan too. The plan should include what materials need to be taken out and what should be added to make the outdoors more appealing.



After homeowners have put a plan together, it's a good idea to have a third party, such as a landscape designer, review the plan. The designers should take your ideas and add some of their own to develop a final plan.

In future articles I will discuss what makes up a good design plan and how to bid work out for landscape companies. ■



## **Arizona Commercial Signs Builds Vintage Marquee**

#### FOR THE CENTURY-OLD LANDMARK NILE THEATER IN DOWNTOWN MESA


n honor of its 100th year, the Nile Theater in Downtown Mesa is again making its mark. In recognition of the theater's historic and architectural significance, the City of Mesa designated the Nile Theater a local landmark.

The discovery of King Tut's tomb in the 1920s drove America's fascination with everything Egyptian. Trading on that appeal, the 600-seat Nile Theater was built on West Main Street in 1924 using locally kilned Lehi brick. Identified by its glittering marquee and Egyptian-themed interior the popular movie palace became the place to see the latest films, attracting crowds from across the Valley from 1924 through the 1950s.

That was not the only draw; the Nile Theater was pretty cool. Literally. It was the first "air-cooled" building in Arizona, where air was blown across blocks of ice to keep moviegoers comfortable in the desert heat. This luxuriant theater became the inspiration for other lavish theaters later built in the Valley.

Business owner Michelle Donovan, who now runs a vegan café and live music venue in the building, nurtured a dream to pay homage in a special way to the structure's illustrious roots. Her dream was to install a replica of the original 1924-era marquee. Working closely with Michelle, Arizona Commercial Signs developed a sign concept to bring her dream to life. "It's not often that a sign maker has the opportunity to resurrect a 100-year-old marquee," explains Carl Hawke, project manager with Arizona Commercial Signs. "Working only from an old black and





saur to life using a trace of DNA."

Using contemporary sign-making techniques, Arizona Commercial Signs cleverly created a marquee sign that honors the original marquee's soul and gives it a fresh

In a nod to the original Egyptian-themed theater, Sign Designer Kirk Fairchild created a sign design that features engraved Egyptian hieroglyphics, plus the iconic image of King Tut, the world's most famous pharaoh. Art Deco lettering on the faces mimics the look of traditional neon benefiting from the efficiency of modern LED lighting. The theater's name frames the logo in chic faux neon, illuminating yellow at night and appearing as polished gold during daylight hours. An electronic message display announces upcoming events.

Pulling a two-dimensional design off the page and making it live in three dimensions is the job of the fabricators. Expert Fabricator Sejad Delic breathed life into what became an exquisite piece of craftsmanship, precise to the millimeter.

Adding this large sign structure to the century-old building and its delicate facade presented unique challenges. A careful assessment of the building for adequacy to support the sign and the engineering of attachments

to the existing brick structure was an essential step in supporting the sign while preserving the historic nature of the building and its façade. Original architectural renderings from 1924 provided exact measurements of structural

beams that still exist within the old walls into which support for the marquee was tied.

"Bringing Michelle's vision to fruition was definitely a team effort," notes Carl. "We partnered with structural engineers, Schneider Structural Engineers, Mellow Construction, and RNR Steel to help stabilize, preserve the twenties-era building." The basement space is also unique, and its building materials and design tell a hidden story of how versatile these downtown buildings really are," says Don Mellow of Mellow Construction. "During the footing excavation," says Don, "the concrete in the basement wall was found to have large 1 to 3-inch colorful round rocks: reds, greens, and white indicative of materials sourced locally from a long time ago, and not commonplace in current construction use. These stones tell

a story of strong and reliable foundation." "This project while uniquely challenging," remarks Carl, "has been gratifying." He continued, "Seeing history come to life and preserving it for generations has captivated everyone." RNR President Robert Van Beekum,

relates, "It's very cool to see our local history restored,

R-N-R was excited to be a part of this project." With the recreation and installation of the marquee, Michelle has set her sights on obtaining national landmark status for the theater building.

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
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






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## The Appraisal Came in Low - Now What?

ppraisals are a standard part of the **L**homebuying process unless it's a cash transaction. For buyers using financing the lender orders an appraisal to ensure that the home is worth the purchase price.

doesn't appraise for its sale price.



The purchase contract includes an appraisal contingency, which makes the sale contingent on the home appraising for at least the agreed purchase price. If the appraisal comes in low, the buyer has the option to walk away from the deal without penalty and receive their earnest money. This contingency protects the buyer from being forced into purchasing a home that

#### WHEN IS AN APPRAISAL DONE DURING THE **HOME BUYING PROCESS?**

Typically, the appraisal is ordered after the 10-day inspection period, once the buyer and seller have agreed on necessary repairs. Buyers want assurance that the deal is moving forward before committing to the cost of an appraisal, which typically starts around \$550 and can go up from there. Paying for an appraisal before repairs are agreed upon could mean unnecessary expenses if the deal falls apart.

#### APPRAISAL SHORTFALL MISCONCEPTION

There is a common misconception regarding appraisals: many people believe that the property only needs to appraise for the loan amount, not the full purchase price. However, this is incorrect. The appraisal must support the full purchase price of the home. If it doesn't, the buyer, seller, or both must find a way to make up the difference.

#### **EXAMPLE OF AN APPRAISAL FALLING SHORT**

Let's break down an example to illustrate this:

Purchase price of the home: \$600,000 Buyer's down payment: 20%, or \$120,000 Loan amount: \$480,000

If the home appraises for \$580,000 — \$20,000 below the purchase price — the lender will not approve the loan based on the original sale price. Even though the appraised value exceeds the loan amount, the lender won't approve a loan for more than the appraised value.

There are several ways buyers and sellers can handle a low appraisal:

- The Buyer Pays the Difference:
- The buyer agrees to make up the entire shortfall by increasing their down payment. This often happens when the buyer is highly motivated or when the competition for the property is strong. In this example the buyer would need to increase their down payment from \$120,000 to \$140,000.
- The Buyer and Seller Split the Difference: In this case, both parties agree to equally cover the difference between the appraised value and the purchase price. This is a compromise that keeps the deal alive while not putting the entire financial burden on the buyer. The buyer would increase their down payment by \$10,000, and the seller would reduce the price by \$10,000.
- The Seller Lowers the Purchase Price: In a buyer's market, the seller may agree to lower the purchase price to match the appraised value. This may be necessary to keep the sale on track, especially if the seller has limited options for finding another buyer quickly.
- The Contract Is Canceled: If the buyer and seller cannot reach an agreement, the contract is canceled, and the buyer is entitled to receive their earnest money back.

#### **NAVIGATING A LOW APPRAISAL**

A low appraisal can feel like a significant roadblock, but it doesn't have to derail the sale. Communication and negotiation are key. Understanding the options available — from adjusting the price to covering the difference in the down payment — can help both buyers and sellers move forward.

In a balanced or buyer-friendly market, sellers may need to be more flexible, while buyers may have more room to negotiate. Ultimately, the goal for both parties is to find a solution that works for everyone.

#### **CAN A LOW APPRAISAL BE DISPUTED?**

If an appraisal comes in low and the Realtor feels there's been a mistake, there are ways to dispute the appraisal. However, it's important to understand that the chances of overturning a low appraisal are slim. Lenders rarely allow a second appraisal, so there's typically only one shot at getting the appraisal right.

#### **HOW TO AVOID A LOW APPRAISAL**

While appraisals are out of the control of both the buyer and seller, there are steps the seller's Realtor can take to help prevent a low appraisal. The appraiser should be provided with all relevant information about the home, including a list of upgrades and improvements that add value. The seller's Realtor should meet the appraiser at the property with a detailed appraisal package.

When selecting a Realtor, sellers should ask whether they will meet the appraiser and provide an appraisal package. Choosing an agent who takes this extra step can help mitigate the risk of a low appraisal.

In conclusion, while a low appraisal can be a bump in the road, it doesn't have to end the transaction. With proper communication, negotiation, and preparation, buyers and sellers can navigate this challenge and keep the

## Is Your Rental Property Subject to New Federal Reporting?

Tf you own rental properties, you've likely been advised by your



attorney or CPA to put them under an LLC (Limited Liability Company). This is generally good advice, but if you've done so, you now have a new federal reporting requirement thanks to the Corporate Transparency Act, which Congress passed in 2021. Don't worry though — it's not as complicated as it sounds. I just completed the process for our two LLCs, and it took less than 10 minutes each. FinCEN even has a YouTube page with some great "how to" videos.

Starting in 2024, most small businesses, including rental property owners with LLCs, must file a "Beneficial Ownership Information Report" (BOIR) with the Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN). This report asks for details about who owns or controls the business. The goal of this bipartisan act is to combat illegal financial activities by cracking down on shell companies used for shady or corrupt practices.



#### WHO NEEDS TO FILE?

If you have an LLC, corporation, or other business registered in the U.S., you're required to file unless your company meets certain exemptions. For companies formed before 2024, the deadline to file is Jan. 1, 2025. If your business was created or registered in 2024, you have 90 days from the date of creation to submit your information to FinCEN.

#### WHAT IS A BENEFICIAL **OWNERSHIP INFORMATION REPORT?**

This report is meant to expose criminal activities that can harm national security and hurt honest businesses. It's designed to be simple and not overly burdensome for small business owners.

Many small businesses are structured as LLCs or corporations because of the legal and tax advantages. Unfortunately, criminals also use these structures to hide their identities and launder money. The Corporate Transparency Act aims to prevent such misuse by requiring businesses to report their "beneficial owners" — the individuals who own or control the company.

In short, this new rule helps fight money laundering, human trafficking, drugrelated crimes, and tax evasion by making business ownership more transparent. If you own an LLC for your rental properties, you'll likely need to file this report.

The penalty for failing to file is up to \$500 per day, so don't forget! It is extremely easy to do yourself, but your CPA or attorney should also be able to do it for you for a fee. ■

## Day in the Life of an **Elementary School Nurse**

Tendy Gerth's day begins early as one of 55 66 health assistants, and two classroom resource nurses, all committed to serving the students, staff, and families across Mesa Public Schools.

Before the first bell rings, Wendy is in her office, reviewing student health records, preparing medications, and gearing up for a busy day. Each day brings its challenges, but one constant remains: her door will welcome a steady stream of students with a wide range of needs.

An elementary school nurse is far more than a medical professional they are a caregiver, educator, and first responder, all essential to the well-being and success of students. With over 35 years of nursing experience and 13 of them spent in schools, Wendy currently serves both Porter and Irving Elementary. Her expertise and compassion make her an invaluable part of the school community.

#### **MORNING MEDICATIONS AND FIRST-AID**

For many children, stopping by Wendy's office is the first step before heading to class, and her calm approach sets a reassuring tone for the rest of the day.

Wendy assesses each case, determining if the student needs a quick rest, should return to class, or requires a call home. "Every case is different," she explains, "and a big part of my job is knowing how to balance care with making sure students feel supported."


#### **MORE THAN BUMPS AND BAND-AIDS**
















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## Feel, Heal, Live

This time nothing worked. Every


step I took to fix one problem created another one. Finally, giving up, I said, "I can't do this."

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




