The average amount of time it takes for your body to recover and become stronger is a couple of days, which is why The Exercise Coach employs intense periods of exercise a couple of times a week. The frequency we need to perform high intensity exercise is less when the intensity itself is higher.

Muscle is the window to the rest of the body. Growing stronger makes the rest of your body more effective as well, such as increased bone mineral density, improved metabolic function, weight loss, improved balance, balanced hormonal levels, and many more.

Observing Kathi teach a kindergarten class, one of her former principals suggested, "Kindergarten is the perfect spot."

Kathi started teaching kindergarten at SDA in 2011. She takes her profession very seriously and wants to be a role model for her children. She wants to model for students her love of learning. She focuses on "how her students can feel good about themselves."

Kathi adds, "I want teachers to think when they were little, how did they want to live their lives?" She does expect students to respect rules. She adds, "Everything I do, I do with love," which inspires her students to develop a love for reading and learning. She makes learning fun.

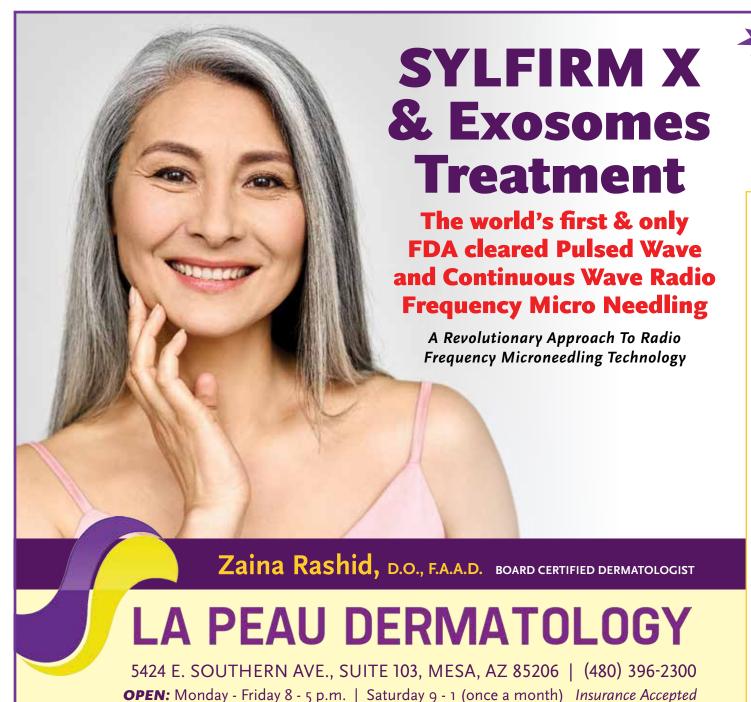
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BODY20 Las Sendas Celebrates Grand Opening

chieving your fitness goals in under an hour a week might sound too good to be true, but BODY20 utilizes a tech-forward FDA-cleared electro-muscle stimulation suit and one-on-one coaching to make it possible with a maximum of just two 20-minute sessions each week.

Alexia Bertsatos, BODY20'S Las Sendas franchise owner, struggled to make fitness a part of her life as a busy real estate agent and single mother, even with an active lifestyle, until she tried BODY20.

"There was a man in a wheelchair who started doing the workouts and within weeks he was able to start walking with a walker," Alexia shared. "The

technology allows us to target muscles you can't target through exercise and it's effective for everyone from body builders to those who want to lose weight."

ment," said Alexia. ■

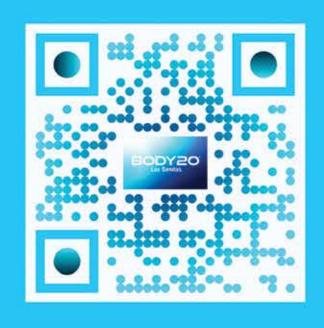
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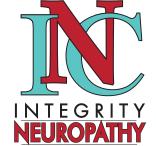

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Are Buyers or Sellers Paying the Buyer's Agent Commission?

y now, you've likely heard about the new rules regarding buyer agent commission now referred to as compensation stemming from the National Association of Realtors (NAR) settlement. These rules took effect on Aug. 1, 2024 but



so far, aside from making the process more complex and harder to explain to buyers, we haven't seen any significant changes.

For those who may have missed the details, here is a quick overview of the changes and how they affect buyers, sellers, and Realtors.

WHAT PROMPTED THE CHANGE?

The National Association of Realtors (NAR) settled a class-action lawsuit alleging that their rules regarding real estate commissions violated antitrust laws, essentially forcing sellers to pay both the buyer and seller agent commissions, which inflated prices; as part of the settlement, NAR agreed to pay a large sum of money and change their practices to allow buyers to directly negotiate their agent's compensation with no pre-set commission displayed on list. Of course since the change in August last year we have not seen prices come down as a result of the change.

HOW THE CHANGE AFFECTED REAL ESTATE

The NAR settlement has significantly altered how buyer agents are compensated. Previously, it was standard practice for the seller to pay the buyer agent's compensation, which was determined before the property was listed. This compensation amount was included in the Multiple Listing Service (MLS) and the listing agreement.

However, under the new rules, buyer agent compensation cannot be included in the MLS or the listing contract. Instead, it must now be negotiated separately, bringing a fundamental shift in how buyer agents are paid.

BUYER BROKER AGREEMENTS: A NEW REQUIREMENT

One of the most significant changes from the settlement is the requirement for buyers to sign a Buyer Broker Agreement before viewing any property.

This agreement outlines the terms and responsibilities between the buyer and their agent, including:

- The agreed-upon compensation amount (usually a percentage of the sale price).
- The responsibilities of both parties.
- The duration of the agreement.

With this agreement in place, the buyer becomes responsible for compensating their agent. This means compensation must be negotiated with the offer to have the seller cover the buyer agent's compensation or the buyer needs to pay it themselves at closing.

HOW IS THIS WORKING IN THE CURRENT MARKET?

In many areas, the real estate market has become more of a buyer's market. Despite the new rules, sellers are still willing to pay buyer agent compensation to attract more buyers.

Here's how the process typically works under the

- 1. Signing the Agreement: Buyers sign a Buyer Broker Agreement committing to a specified compensation amount for their agent.
- **2. Making an Offer:** When the buyer's agent prepares an offer, they request that the seller covers the buyer agent's compensation.
- 3. Seller's Response: If the seller agrees, the compensation is included in the transaction. If the seller counters with lower compensation or refuses to pay, the buyer is now responsible to pay it at closing. If this happens it may become another negotiation between the buyer and the buyer's agent.

If the buyer cannot cover the agent's compensation and the seller refuses to pay, the buyer may have no choice but to withdraw their offer and look for another property where the seller is willing to pay the compensation.



WHY ARE SELLERS STILL PAYING BUYER **AGENT COMPENSATION?**

With more homes on the market than buyers, many sellers are willing to pay buyer agent compensation to make their property more attractive. Offering to cover these costs can widen the pool of potential buyers and increase the likelihood of a successful sale.

WHAT BUYERS AND SELLERS SHOULD **KNOW MOVING FORWARD**

For buyers, understanding their financial responsibility is crucial. They should discuss compensation expectations with their agent and how to negotiate these costs with the seller. They also need to discuss and have a plan on what to do if the seller is unwilling to cover the cost.

For sellers, offering buyer agent compensation remains a strategic tool to attract interest and ensure a smoother transaction. This becomes a point of negotiation when an offer is received, and whether you agree to pay buyer agent compensation will depend on several factors — such as the current market conditions, how quickly the home sells, and whether there are multiple offers.

As the real estate landscape continues to evolve under these new rules, staying informed and working closely with experienced real estate professionals can help both buyers and sellers navigate the changes effectively.

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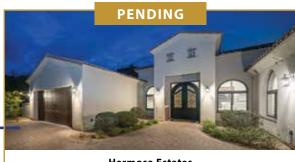

Planning Your OUTDOOR SP

ast month's article focused on planning and designing a great backyard. ■ The basics of this article came from a booklet titled, Landscaping with Style in the Arizona Desert.

Again, referencing this booklet, I will try to help homeowners like yourself begin to attack some of the key issues that are needed to accomplish your goals.

Oftentimes, homeowners may choose to call a landscape designer like myself. On a personal side, I am a semi-retired designer who lives in the Red Mountain Ranch area.

First questions to deal with: Is this going to be a plan for a new home with zero landscaping? Is this going to be a plan for some existing landscaping and you want to add both hardscape and plantscape? Or is it going to be a plan to start over again by pulling out most of the existing landscape work?

Homeowners need to consider their wish list and most importantly ask themselves if it will meet their landscape and budget requirements.

Another question to consider, if you live in a neighborhood with an HOA is, "What are the requirements regarding landscaping?" If you do not live in an HOA community, then you are free of those restrictions.



The booklet also points out essential elements to consider: Good planning and design, low water-use plants, appropriate turf areas, efficient irrigation, soil conditions, use of ground cover types, and appropriate maintenance that may be required.

Hopefully we'll receive some rain this month. We do need to remember to adjust time clocks too, if you have one. This is to save on your water bill and save on your sewer bill, which is correlated to the amount of water used during the winter months.

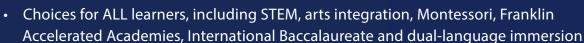

Importance of the Nitric Oxide Cycle

itric oxide (NO) is a gas the body produces to dilate and relax blood vessels and help deliver oxygen throughout the body. NO supports a healthy heart, blood pressure, exercise performance and recovery, and libido, as well as digestion and cell metabolism. When your body senses stress on the blood vessels, it signals the body to produce NO to relax the vessels and increase blood flow to the area.

One way NO is produced is through what is called the "nitric oxide cycle" by converting L-arginine to L-citrulline (the biproduct) and then back again. During the conversion, there is an off-gassing effect, which is NO. L-arginine (LA) and L-citrulline (LC) are amino acids found in food. LA comes from animal-based products, whereas LC comes from plants.

Both are critical to the NO cycle. Some supplement companies promote taking LC.



However, it is the conversion from LA to LC that makes NO. While both supplements can be beneficial, I believe L-arginine to be superior and the best form is via injection or intravenous (IV) because your body does not have to digest it.

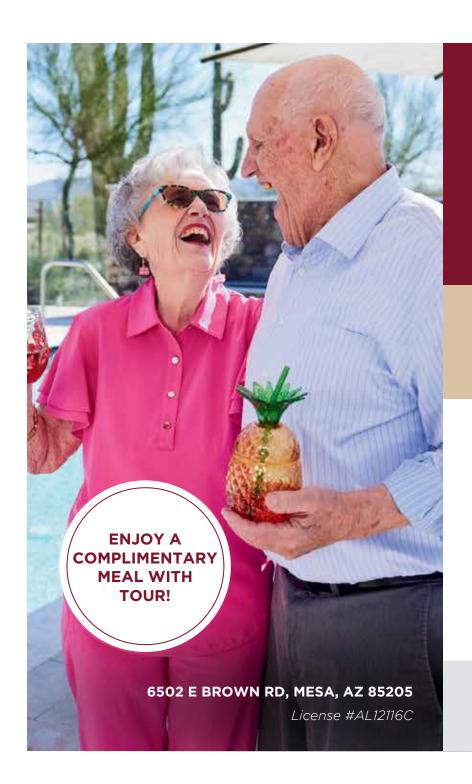

Medicare Supplemental Insurance Choices

Thave worked with several **L** people this past month who are turning 65 or are older than 65 but just now retiring. It is a busy



time and a lot process concerning leaving employer health insurance, signing up for Medicare and then the big process of picking an Advantage plan or a Supplemental plan. I thought it might help to review what is supplemental insurance.

Medicare Supplemental insurance is different from Medicare Advantage plans. Supplemental insurance is something you purchase through a monthly premium. It does not have networks or many of the restrictions that some of the advantage plans have.

Someone might choose a supplement plan if they did not want to be bound by counties or state networks. When you have a supplement, you can go to any medical facility that accepts original Medicare.

Something to be aware of is that to enroll in a supplement, generally you will need to go through the underwriting process and the companies have the right to rate you based on your health or to deny coverage.

However, when you first enroll in Medicare part B (either at 65 or when you choose to leave employee insurance), you have a six month *guarantee issue*. This means that you can enroll in any supplement plan, with any company at the lowest rate. This makes your choice even more important. I always recommend speaking with an agent who can guide you through this significant time.
